The term "silent" is used to describe the malignant condition in undetectable form. That is, there are no symptoms which patients recognize as danger signals.

The American Cancer Society points out that of more than 70,000 people who die in the United States each year of six types of "silent" cancer, more than 40,000 could have been saved if the cancer had been detected early. 

Then place in coolest possible place—a refrigerated container, if possible. Always clean container with baking soda and water after each trip. DOG OWNERS

In order that there may be a better understanding of the DOG LAWS by dog owners, keepers, and custodians, the IOSCO COUNTY SHERIFF'S DEPARTMENT is quoting herewith:

Excerpts from the Compiled Michigan Dog Laws such killing. Any dog that enters any

CONFINEMENT at NIGHT: - Every dog shall at all times between sunset of each day and the sunrise of the following day, be confined upon the premises of its owner or custodian, except when said dog is otherwise under the reasonable control of some person. (Sec. 287.263 C.L. '48).

KILLING of DOGS; DUTY of OF-FICERS:-It shall be the duty of every police officer, on complaint, to kill any dog or dogs which are found outside of an incorporated city, running at large and unoccupied by owner or keeper. (Sec. 287.278 C.L. '48)

'SAME; JUSTIFICATION:-Any person may kill any dog which he sees in the act of pursuing, worrying or wounding any livestock or attacking persons, and there shall be no liability on such persons in damages or otherwise, for

field or enclosure, outside of an incorporated city, unaccompanied by his owner or his owner's agent, shall constitute a private nuisance and the owner or tenant of such field or other enclosure, or his agent or servant, may kill such dog while it is in the field or other enclosure without liability for such killing. Except as provided in this section, it shall be unlawful for any person, other than a police officer to kill, injure or attempt to kill or injure, any dog which bears a license tag for the current year. (Sec. 287.279 C. L. '48)

FEMALE DOGS:- From and after June 15, 1925 it shall be unlawful... for any owner of any female dog to permit said female dog to go beyond the premises of such owner when she is in heat, unless such female dog is held properly in leash. (Sec. 287.262 C.L. '48)
