
The Davison-Rose company has completed six schools in the past two years, along with other contract work, aggregating well over one million dollars.

Start to Drive Sheet Piling for City Park Dock

The first sections of sheet steel piling were driven into place at the Tawas City Park dock this week.

The 430-foot dock in the city park has been the subject of intensified improvement efforts by the Tawas City Park Board this summer.

The city council authorized the purchase of steel piling early this year. William Stender, a marine contractor from Bay City, was the low bidder on the project and received the contract for installation of the piling.

Last Monday night the common council approved a bill authorizing the park board to purchase additional steel for the dock.

The United States Gypsum Company donated a considerable amount of old railroad tracks and cable which will be used to strengthen the dock.

The dock was originally constructed from broken concrete slabs which were removed from US-23 in 1940.

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

The Tragedy of Korea

Syngman Rhee, president of the Republic of South Korea, believes that the division of South Korea into two states is a crime of unpardonable nature.

Yet there is nothing in sight to indicate that it will be united in the foreseeable future. Rhee returned to his native land last week following a two-week visit with President Eisenhower and other top officials in the United States.

Americans who once fought a great Civil War to prevent their country from a voluntary separation, can sympathize with Rhee's feeling at the involuntary division of his native land.

There may be many things wrong with Rhee's concept of free government, but no one questions his love of Korea.

Red China does not intend to give up North Korea and there is no way to get her out except to drive her out with military force, which everyone knows would be a long and painful task.

Rhee talks boldly about restarting the war with his South Korean army. But what could he hope to accomplish without full American backing? He could not supply an army and he knows it.

The plight of Korea is a tragic one. Nobody can argue against that proposition.

The importance of relying wholeheartedly on God, divine Mind, for guidance will be stressed at Christian Science services Sunday.





Born October 8, 1888, in Tawas City, he had been a resident of this community all his life. For many years he had followed the carpenter trade. He was unmarried.

Surviving are two sisters, Mrs. Mary Brandt and Mrs. Alvina Federau of Cleveland and a brother, Gustav Waack of Lansing.

HDA NOTES

By Dorothy Scott

Bulletin requests these past few days indicate that home-makers are busy with preserving food for the long months ahead when fresh vegetables and fruits are luxury items.

Most popular item right now is the snap bean. Are you aware that the latest processing timetable for canning snap beans allows us to pressure can them using 10 pounds of pressure—20 minutes for pints, 25 minutes for quarts? This spring we received information from the testing laboratories indicating that they have approved the canning of snap beans using either the hot or cold pack method. Hot pack, you know, means heating the cut beans to boiling and cooking for five minutes before placing them in jars. The cooking liquid is used to cover the beans in the jars. Cold pack means putting the cut beans directly into the jars and covering them with boiling water. The processing time is the same as for the hot pack method, say the laboratory testers, who also point out that snap beans may not be quite as full when cold packed as when hot packed. This is because the pre-cooking shrinks the vegetable.

If you are freezing snap beans, be sure to give attention to the variety you have grown or purchased. In the newly revised edition of "Freezing Foods for Michigan Homes" we note the recommendation of some new varieties of beans, Full-green and Wade.

Small, young beans may be frozen whole while large pods are best broken into one inch pieces or cut French style. Beans need to be blanched for two to three minutes in boiling water, and cooled thoroughly before packing.

We were made aware of the fact that sweet corn season is here by a phone call asking about sweet corn the other day. Corn on the cob is a treat you can appreciate from your home freezer. Select ears with well-filled, rounded kernels and sweet flavor. Be sure they are harvested early in the morning and handled quickly to preserve quality and flavor.

By "quickly" we mean within two or three hours. And doing small quantities at a time is another way to be sure that none is kept longer than that before it gets into the freezer.

Husk, silk and trim the ears. Blanch corn on the cob for five or six minutes. Blanch four minutes, cool quickly, and cut or scrape off the cob, depending upon the style product wanted.

Corn on the cob is blanched 8 to 10 minutes and quickly cooled. This long blanching time is required to inactivate enzymes in both kernels and cob which would damage flavor and color of frozen product.

All three types of corn are frozen in dry packs.

And sweet corn can be one of the more satisfactory canned products. A favorite preparation method at our house is to cut the corn from the cob without blanching. To each quart of corn add one pint of boiling water and bring to a boil. Pack the hot corn into jars, leaving one inch of headspace. Make the corn and liquid come out even. This insures getting the jars filled so that the pack is not too dense for good processing.

Corn is processed in the pressure cooker at 10 pounds pressure. The time for pint jars is 55 minutes, quart parts is 85 minutes.

Doubtless you have noted the recommendation of pressure cooker processing for vegetables. This is the only safe, and reliable way to preserve them.

County Agent News

By MARVIN DAVENPORT

I see some of our "lawn tenders" down on their hands and knees battling with crabgrass.

Dr. B. H. Grigsby, weed researcher at Michigan State College, says we don't have to do that any longer. You can knock out the pest with a single blow with a mixture of Kerosene and chlordane.

The mixture is this: One-half pint of 72 percent chlordane concentrate in a gallon of a good grade of white kerosene. That much will take care of 1,000 square feet of lawn. It is recommended for every lawn grass except bentgrass and fescues.

Harvey Gilbert of Tawas City asked me a good gardening question the other day. Harvey says, "I got a good heavy clay soil for my garden spot but this hot, dry weather makes it like concrete and it's good-bye garden! What can I do to correct that situation?"

There are a lot of folks experiencing the same thing with those clay soil gardens. This is what I told Harvey and it's what I would tell any gardener with clay or sandy soil.

Those of you with just one spot for a garden had better locate some Balbo Rye. Sow the rye between the rows in your garden at the rate of approximately 10 pounds for a 30 by 30 foot garden. Rake it in when ever possible. Early next spring, plow under the rye before it gets much over 12 to 16 inches high.

This procedure adds humus to the soil. All the fertilizer in the county won't do any good on any garden or field unless there is organic matter in it to hold moisture and keep the plant food in a liquid state for the plants. That plant food comes from the commercial fertilizer you put on your garden.

Those lucky people with two garden spots so they can alternate their garden each year can follow a procedure we have

come to call the "Walker Quickie."

This year's garden spot can be worked up next spring and buckwheat sown in June. Apply a 10-10-10 fertilizer at the rate of 100 pounds on one-fourth acre. When the buckwheat is beginning to bloom, have it plowed under. The ground can be worked until early August and the Balbo Rye then planted or sown with 100 pounds of a 4-16-16 fertilizer on a one-fourth acre spot. That can be plowed under the following spring with a full knowledge that you have added a lot of organic matter to your soil.
