## Tawas Area School Building Bond Proposal Loses Again in Energetically Fought Contest

### 1091 to 1003 Vote Cast in Bond Election

A difference of less than 100 votes in Wednesday's bonding election prevented the Tawas Area School District from proceeding with construction of a new junior and senior high school.

In what proved to be the largest election ever held in the Tawas Area School District, since its inception in November 1952, more than 2,300 electors went to the polls to cast their votes.

Both propositions offered to the electors were turned down by small majorities. A total of 1,003 votes were cast in favor of Proposition No. Two, while 1,091 electors cast a negative vote. On Proposition No. One, 1,115 affirmative votes were cast while 1,192 voted against the proposal.

An unofficial break-down of the returns indicates that electors voted in favor of both propositions in three out of the four voting districts. Precinct No. 1 comprised the City of East Tawas and portion of Baldwin and Wilber Townships; Precinct No. 2 included the City of Tawas City and portions of Baldwin and Wilber Townships; Precinct No. 3, Tawas Township, and Precinct No. 4, Alabaster and Whitney Townships.

Election boards indicated that 20 spoiled ballots cast were not counted in the returns of Proposition 2 and 21 spoiled ballots were not counted in final returns on Proposition 1.

Qualified school electors of the district voted on two proposals offered by the Tawas Area Board of Education. Proposition No. One asked that the limitation on the total amount of taxes against the district be increased by 0.35%, or 3/8% mills of the assessed property valuation. Proposition No. Two asked that the district be authorized to borrow the sum of \$575,000 and issue its bonds for the purpose of erecting and furnishing a high school building and securing a site.

Only qualified taxpayers were eligible to vote on the second proposition.

Both propositions were turned down due to a large majority of negative votes from Precinct No. One at East Tawas. In this district only 75 out of 936 ballots were cast in favor of Proposition No. Two, while proposition No. One was defeated by approximately the same margin with 93 "Yes" votes and 950 "No" votes.

The margin of defeat in this election, which would have authorized the building of new school facilities, was smaller than either of the two preceding elections held this year. The proposals offered by the board of education in February were defeated by approximately 100 votes while the same proposition in June was defeated by a slightly larger majority.

The original plan of the school board was to build the new school on the Neumann-Reinke site in Tawas Township, but was turned down twice in heated elections.

### Pleads Guilty to Larceny Charge

### Tawas City Park Skating Rink Ready

Barring continued mild weather this week-end, the new city-owned skating rink in the Tawas City Park will continue to operate, stated Reginald Bublitz, superintendent of public works.

The 90 by 130 foot skating rink, which is sponsored by the Tawas City Businessmen's Association, was put into operation early this week and a large number of school children have enjoyed the facilities during the Christmas vacation.

The facilities at the rink are free of charge and everyone in the area is invited to use it. A public address system will be set up in the bandstand to provide recorded music for night skating parties.

Superintendent Bublitz said yesterday that as of now, the city council does not know when the proposed warming shelter facilities will be made available.

The cooperation of the public is needed to keep the rink in good condition, Mr. Bublitz said. Children are requested to stay off the rink when the ice is soft because this will result in its fast deterioration.

The department of public works will keep the rink in condition by plowing off snow and re-freezing when necessary during mild weather.

### Gypsum Company Recovers Projectors

Two valuable film projectors which were found recently in Alabaster were returned to the United States Gypsum Company last week, after it was discovered by company officials that the projectors had been stolen from a conference room at the plant.

The projectors, an Ampro 16-mm and a TDC film strip projector, were found several weeks ago in a clump of brush by an Alabaster resident and turned over to the Michigan State Police at East Tawas. The loss of the projectors at the plant was not discovered until several days later.

State police said that someone had gained entrance into a conference room at the plant by knocking out a panel in a door with an ice spud. The police are still investigating the theft.

### Former Iosco Supervisor Dies at Pontiac

Albert Louis Bleau of Pontiac, a former resident of Alabaster, died December 16 at Pontiac Osteopathic Hospital after an illness of 10 days.

Born in St. Henry, Quebec, Canada, December 2, 1878, he was the son of Gregoire and Christina Thibeault Bleau and came to Michigan with his parents when a small boy settling in Alpena. In December 1903, Mr. Bleau enlisted in the United States Marine Corps and served with that corps until December 1907, all of which time was spent in the Philippine Islands. Upon his return to civilian life, he came to Alabaster where he worked for the United States Gypsum Company for several years. While living in Alabaster, he served in all the township offices and had been a member of the Iosco County Board of Supervisors while serving in the capacity of Alabaster Township supervisor.

Mr. Bleau married the late Mary E. Kinney of Alabaster, October 12, 1909, in St. Joseph Church, East Tawas. Mrs. Bleau preceded him in death over 23 years ago. He left Alabaster 23 years ago and was a retired employee of the Pontiac Motor Division at the time of his illness.

A member of the Holy Name Society of St. Michael's Church and a life member of the Knights of Columbus, and also a Fourth Degree member of the same, he was very active in both societies up to the time of his illness.

Surviving Mr. Bleau are five daughters and one son and 18 grandchildren. The funeral was held on Monday, December 20, from St. Michael's Church, Pontiac, of which he was a member. Burial followed in Mount Hope Cemetery.

Edward Berzinski passed away suddenly from a heart attack Tuesday evening at his home in Tawas City. He had not been ill. He was an employee of the United States Gypsum Company at Alabaster.

### TAWAS MAN SUCCUMBS TO HEART ATTACK

Born January 28, 1914, in this city, he was the son of Frank Berzinski and the late Mrs. Berzinski. He attended St. Joseph Catholic School and during World War II served in the armed forces. He married Arbutus Lincoln on June 14, 1941, who survives him. Other survivors are his father, Frank Berzinski; a brother, Raymond Berzinski of Detroit; three sisters, Mrs. Florence Cornett of Toledo, Ohio, Mrs. Agnes Kutchners of Detroit and Mrs. Frances Hill of Tawas City.

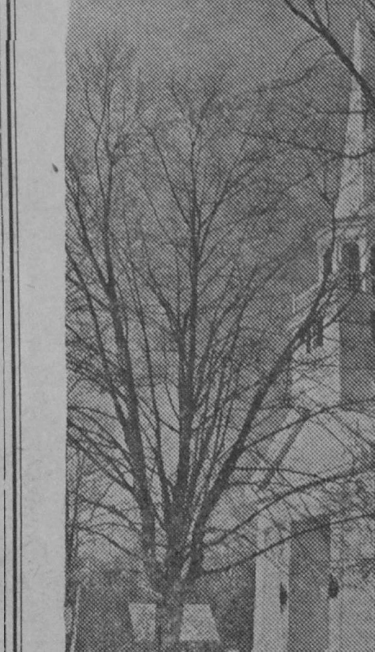

### Four Accidents Mark Week-End

Four automobile accidents occurred last week-end in Iosco County, it was reported by the Michigan State Police at East Tawas.

Emil F. Rose, 21, Route Two, Tawas, suffered lacerations to the neck and chin last Friday when the car in which he was driving left US-23 near Alabaster and struck two guard rails. Investigating officers said that the driver apparently fell asleep at the wheel.

A six-year old child was struck by a car last Friday afternoon in Tawas City. Joyce Ann, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. George Feuteringill of Tawas City, was struck by a car driven by Marjorie Shover near the Wilbur C. Rosen residence on Tenth Avenue. Police officers said that the little girl ran from behind a parked car in front of the Shover vehicle, which was traveling west on the Meadow Road. She was treated by Dr. J. A. Justin for injuries.

Ice roads contributed to a two-car collision last Sunday in East Tawas at the corner of Church and West Lincoln Streets. The two drivers, Carol W. Michaels of 407 East Bay Street and Clifford E. Elliott, Bay City, collided while approaching the intersection. The vehicles skidded on the ice when both drivers applied their brakes. The vehicles were not seriously damaged.

A bus operated by Fred W. Look of East Tawas struck a car operated by Patrick J. Quinn of Route One, Glennie, last Sunday on the Monument Road. Investigating officers said that the driver of the bus apparently struck the approaching vehicle in an attempt to bring his vehicle back on the roadway after it had slipped off the pavement.

### WORLD WAR II VETS LAST CHANCE TO FILE

This is the last opportunity for World War II veterans, who for one reason or another, have never received the World War II State bonus. Veterans have until December 30 to file application. The last session of the Michigan Legislature extended the deadline, which originally expired on May 31, 1953, to December 30, and there is little indication that the deadline will be extended again.

The Bonus Division of the Adjutant General's Office has advised that because of the wording in the amendment which extended the deadline, applications must be postmarked no later than midnight of December 30, because the law says they must be "received on or before December 31." Therefore, they cannot be mailed on December 31 because the application must actually be received by the Bonus Division on or before December 30.

## OUR Urgent School Problem

Again, the children of the Tawas Area School District were the losers, as the school building proposition went down before a close margin at the Wednesday school election.

The people of the district who want schools and the area school board have been unable to put a bond issue across against the usual 25-30 percent "No" vote because of taxes and a group voting "No" on the site question.

What next?—Our schools are now on a tentative accreditation basis and if the people of the district continue at "loggerheads" for another year we could even lose this accreditation for entering our students in college.

If there is any grounds for questioning the legality of our school district, as set forth by the "Citizen's Committee for Better Schools," the district could be broken up and separate school programs begun again.

BUT, when this district was reorganized the thought in everyone's mind was a combined effort by the people of Tawas City, of East Tawas and of the surrounding area in PROVIDING A BETTER SCHOOL SYSTEM THAN COULD BE DONE SEPARATELY.

Actual figures in the Reorganization election, two years ago were: Tawas City—455 yes, 63 no; East Tawas—522 yes, 135 no; Rural—381 yes, 198 no. A total of 1,358 yes and 396 no.

This thought has been lost in the shuffle and if we are to continue toward a better school program, the electors of the district must unite their efforts in supplying the necessary funds to construct and furnish the much-needed school buildings.

All the children's welfare is involved, therefore, it is the problem of every thinking adult to help effect a solution. This cannot be done through the meetings of small groups which claim to represent an entire area. In order to know the undistorted facts, each and every one must attend meetings authorized by the board of education. It must be remembered that the board is composed of men elected by YOU from each section of the district. These men have your best interests and those of your children foremost in their minds as they attempt to effect a solution.

What has happened to many of the individuals who were instrumental in promoting the reorganization of the district over two years ago? The problem and needs of the district were clear to them then—perhaps they might aid in the restoration of the original purpose—ADEQUATE SCHOOL FACILITIES through a united effort.

After the demonstrations farmers can visit booths equipped and manned by their favorite milking machine companies. Representatives are expected from Choreboy, Conde, Co-op, DeLaval, Rite-Way and Surge companies. Then there will be tips on better milking, followed again by a chance for farmers to visit the milking machine company booths to see proper operation of equipment in which farmers invest thousands of dollars.

Mastitis can be caused by letting milking machines get in poor condition. Watch local newspapers for further announcements on the Better Milking Clinic, also being publicized by radio stations and in farm meetings. Bring your entire family and spend the day at the clinic; wives and young folks will get a better appreciation of dairy herd management problems.

electrical project members to see the Saginaw-Midland water works. He says he saw four large electric motors used to pump the water, some of them run 24 hours a day. When the electricity is off the pumps are run by 60 batteries. In the well house there was a demonstration as to how they weigh the chlorine which is put in the water to kill germs. The well is 50 feet deep.

### Booklet Cites Fight Against TB Cattle

An increase in tuberculosis in Michigan cattle will be reported by the Michigan Tuberculosis Association in a booklet called "Battlefield Without Bullets."

The booklet, reprinting an article appearing in the publication the "Michigan Farmer," quotes state and federal veterinarians as citing an upswing of TB infection in cattle in Michigan since World War II.

The TB association, supported through the annual sale of Christmas Seals, says veterinarians have been faced with the job of trying to test more cattle with less money.

Michigan's cattle population has grown from 1,536,000 head in 1921-22 to 2,043,000 in 1954. In contrast, in 1922-23, the state appropriated \$255,300.79 for the cattle TB control program, against \$92,733.68 in 1951-52.

A recent development fortunately added to funds available for the TB program. The 83rd Congress appropriated more funds for eradicating Bang's disease (brucellosis). This released some state funds earlier earmarked for the Bang's disease project. Veterinarians will use some of the released state money for the TB battle.

But in view of the rise in TB in cattle, through the Michigan Commission of Agriculture, the TB association says veterinarians will ask the legislature for \$100,000 for the cattle TB testing program next year, a sum "considerably higher" than amounts provided previously.

One southern Michigan farmer, the TB association says, has already been reported as "sacrificing heavily" to the disease spread by infected cows. TB germs were passed from the diseased cows to one of the farmer's children, who fell sick with tuberculosis. And 18 cows in the farmer's herd were found to have tuberculosis.

"This is but one of several recent outbreaks of bovine TB cited by state and federal veterinarians," the association declares. Veterinarians emphasize that any increase in TB in cattle also means increased exposure to TB for people.

In the same publication, the TB association issues a warning against complacency in the fight against human tuberculosis.

"Remember that in the past five years nearly 30,000 Michigan men, women and children have fallen sick with tuberculosis," urges Theodore J. Werle, executive secretary of the Michigan Tuberculosis Association. "This number is equal to the combined population of Cadillac, Grand Haven and Ludington. It is equal to the total population of Antrim, Clare and Gladwin Counties."

"That record calls for vigilance."

The association says the booklet carrying the report will be produced and distributed toward the end of December.

### HER SMILE



Our last lamb pool was conducted at the Hereford Calf Association Yards last week at West Branch with 436 lambs being sold.

The successful bidder who purchased the lambs (except the feeders) was Armour Meat Packing Company of Chicago. Their buyer, Neal Seeley, was at the yards watching the operation. He told me what he was extremely pleased with what he saw and promised his company's support of our program.

Prices paid for the three top grades of prime, choice and good lambs were \$20.50, \$19.50 and \$18.50, respectively. Utility and cull brought \$17.00 per hundred weight as feeders and were purchased by a local lamb feeder.

Iosco County sheep raisers who brought in lambs included Alfred Guzan, Lester Robinson, Orville Lyke, Andrew Matthews, Harold Black, John Cobb and Edward Robinson. Robinson topped all 19 consigners to the sale for percentage of lambs in the prime (double-blue) and choice (single-blue) grades. There were 1,775 lambs and sheep marketed through the pool in 1954.

The lamb raisers' board of directors is planning an annual meeting in Hale on Wednesday, January 19. At that time 1955 plans will be announced. Any and all of our sheep raisers in

## HDA NOTES

By DOROTHY SCOTT

If your Christmas turkey is frozen, if it is an economy buy large one, you will need to get an early start to get it on the table in time.

It takes a large bird about two days to do that in a refrigerator and that is the best place to thaw it, so you had better get at it right away. In the kitchen, thawing will take place in one full day. Take off the freezer wrappings and cover the turkey loosely with waxed paper for the thawing process.

When completely thawed, put the turkey in a refrigerator or other cold place overnight and roast it the next day, just as you would a fresh turkey.

A word of caution—do not stuff your holiday bird until the morning of Christmas. Get your ingredients ready the day before, that is a time saver, to be sure. Keep perishable ingredients in the refrigerator. It takes only a few minutes to assemble the dressing once all the ingredients are ready.

Chilled stuffing in the center of the bird is very difficult to eat to a safe temperature and to be well cooked, and no one wants to be ill as a result of his Christmas dinner. Play it safe—do the stuffing on Christmas morning!

Folders with directions for roasting turkey or chicken are available at your extension service office. Just ask for one.

Now that we have your bird roasted to a turn, beautifully browned and resting that last 15 or 20 minutes while the dinner is hustled to the table (and the juices are re-absorbed to make the meat even more tasty), who is going to do the carving?

If you like to have the "man of the house" do the honors, make his job fun instead of a chore by doing your part as the cook.

That 20 minute rest is going to make the meat cut more easily than when it is just out of the oven. Be sure the roasting is complete. The most important preparation for carving is when the meat is neither overdone or underdone.

Make the serving platter attractive, yes, but do not overdo the garnishing. Leave enough space on the platter for the work to be done.

Arrange your table setting so that the carver will have plenty of elbow room as well as platter room. If the serving platter will not accommodate the slices, furnish an additional warm platter for that purpose.

Sliced servings cool rapidly, so have the platters and plates both heated.

Remember, too, the inexperienced carver will appreciate you as a hostess if you keep the attention of guests away from his carving.

A part of the "Spirit of Christmas" is the fragrance of the tree and the bright wreaths, lights, glass balls and tinsel. How did these things become traditions?

The foundations for our acceptance of Christmas symbols were laid even before the Christmas era. Ancients believed evergreens were symbols of eternal life and worshipped them as such. One of the legends concerning the Christmas tree is this.

Sir Wilfrid, an early Christian knight, sought to prove to his converts that they had severed all connections with the pagan, Druids. The Druids had especially worshipped oak trees, so on this day Sir Wilfrid chose a mighty oak and chopped it down to show how the Druid's pagan power had been destroyed by Christianity. As the oak fell, the legend goes, it split, and from its center sprang a young fir. Sir Wilfrid thereupon ac-

clared the fir to be the symbol of Christianity as its wood was the wood of peace (since homes were built from it), also it pointed straight to heaven, and its needles were green, as with eternal life. He commanded his followers, "Gather about this tree not in the wildwood, but in your own home, for it will shelter no deeds of blood, but shall be surrounded with loving gifts and rites of kindness."

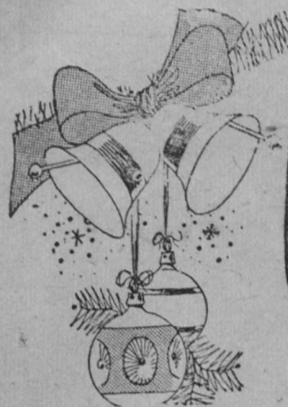

to re-submit the bonding election to the voters several months ago. At that time the board was approached by a large group of petitioners who requested that the school be constructed on property owned by the district in Tawas City and utilize available facilities. This group pointed out that this site would result in a savings to the taxpayers of approximately \$200,000 over any other site which the board has considered during the past two years.

This action on the controversial school question resulted in recent efforts to dissolve the district by the Committee for Better Schools at East Tawas. The committee hired a lawyer to take means to seek this end. The school board's attorney, Fred M. Thru, advised that it was doubtful if such a measure would be up-held in the Michigan Supreme Court.

The Committee for Better Schools has indicated that it would offer no support to any site other than the fairground property. Recently the board authorized Congressman Elford Cederberg to take steps to secure this government-owned property for the district, but there has been no indication to whether or not this property could be obtained.

**Finds Interest in Newspaper Files**

Leafing through old newspaper files shows a march of exciting and many times heart-warming stories have come out during the Christmas season. One of the best is brought to mind in connection with the Christmas Seal Sale of the Michigan TB Association.

Actually, the story broke in the Philadelphia North American on Friday, December 13, 1907. On one of the inside pages of the North American was this quietly phrased paragraph:

"If you got a letter from Wilmington Delaware, yesterday, it's likely that there was one stamp more on it than was needed to pay Uncle Sam for the carrying—not a sure enough postage stamp, but a 'Merry Christmas' one like this picture." Printed beside those few lines was a reproduction of the first American TB Christmas Seal.

Since that time, the TB association says Christmas Seals have helped save an estimated 6,000,000 American lives from TB—a mission which will be continued next year through your 1954 Christmas Seal contributions. So the small story, even though it appeared on Friday, the 13th, grew into a voluntary campaign.

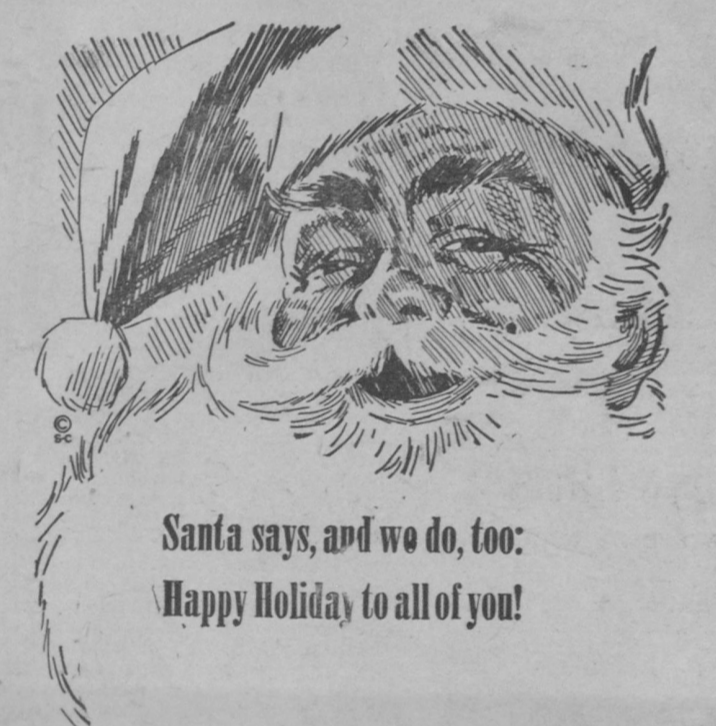

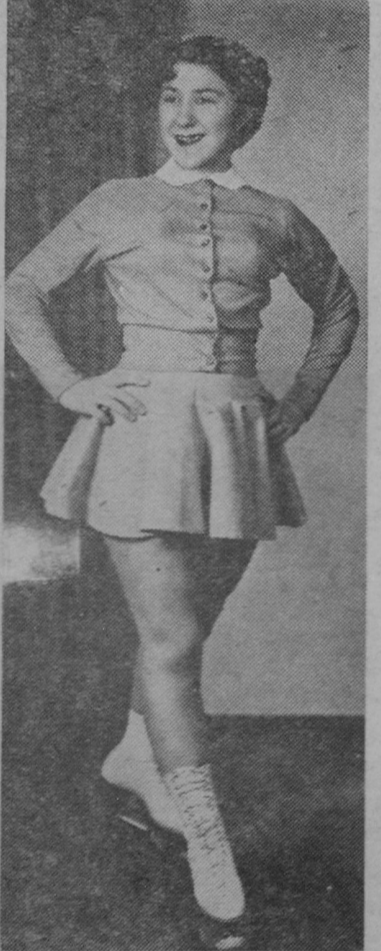
