Fox, Look and White Elected to Tawas Area Board of Education

5-Mill Tax Levy For Building Fund Defeated

Carries in Every Voting Precinct Except East Tawas

Electors of the Tawas Area School District voted to return Randall M. Fox of Tawas City to the school board at the school election held Monday. Fox received more votes than any of the three other candidates running for the two full term vacancies for trustee.

In a hotly contested election, Fox received a total of 762 votes from the four voting precincts. William K. Look of East Tawas, with 739 votes, was named to fill the other vacancy.

Alice R. Dimmick of East Tawas came third in the trustee race with 685 votes and Lutie O'Loughlin of East Tawas received 337.

Robert H. White of Baldwin township was unopposed for the short term as trustee, receiving a total of 836 votes.

A total of 1,501 school officer ballots were cast by voters in the four precincts. Alabaster cast 105 ballots, Tawas township 180; Tawas City, 520, and East Tawas, 696.

The election this year marked the second time in which Fox has led all other candidates for the trustee position on the Tawas Area School Board.

Here is how the voters cast their ballots in the contest for trustee. (Two vacancies to be filled):

Fox—Alabaster, 74; Tawas township, 138; Tawas City, 449; East Tawas, 101. Total 762.

Look—Alabaster, 32; Tawas township, 59; Tawas City, 99; East Tawas, 569. Total 759.

Dimmick—Alabaster, 29; Tawas township, 41; Tawas City, 63; East Tawas, 550. Total 685.

O'Loughlin—Alabaster 32; Tawas township, 49; Tawas City, 150; East Tawas, 106. Total 337.

The vote on Proposition No. 1 was turned down by the voters 813 to 643. The proposal would have increased the limitation on the total amount of taxes which may be assessed against property in Tawas Rural Agricultural School District, No. 1, F.R., by five-tenths of one percent (0.5%) for the year 1954.

The proposal received a majority of favorable votes in every precinct excepting East Tawas. Here is how the electors voted on the proposal: Alabaster—Yes, 58; No, 48. Tawas township—Yes, 93; No, 13. Tawas City—Yes, 398; No, 134. East Tawas—Yes, 126; No, 555.

The electors also turned down the vote on Proposition No. 2 by a margin of 747 to 603. This proposal asked for the renewal of the five-mill tax levy in 1954 to create a sinking fund for the purpose of constructing school buildings and would have raised about forty thousand dollars during 1954. Only qualified tax payers could vote on the proposition.

The results of the second proposal were the same as on the first: Alabaster—Yes, 47; No, 45. Tawas township—Yes, 101; No, 71. Tawas City—Yes, 339; No, 120. East Tawas—Yes, 118; No, 509.

At the regular meeting of the school board Tuesday night, the members cleaned up the remaining school business for the year 1953-54 and canvassed the votes from the election on Monday.

Lou's Sport Shop of East Tawas filed the low bid to furnish football uniforms for the fall school athletic season. Payment for the uniforms will be made from the athletic fund.

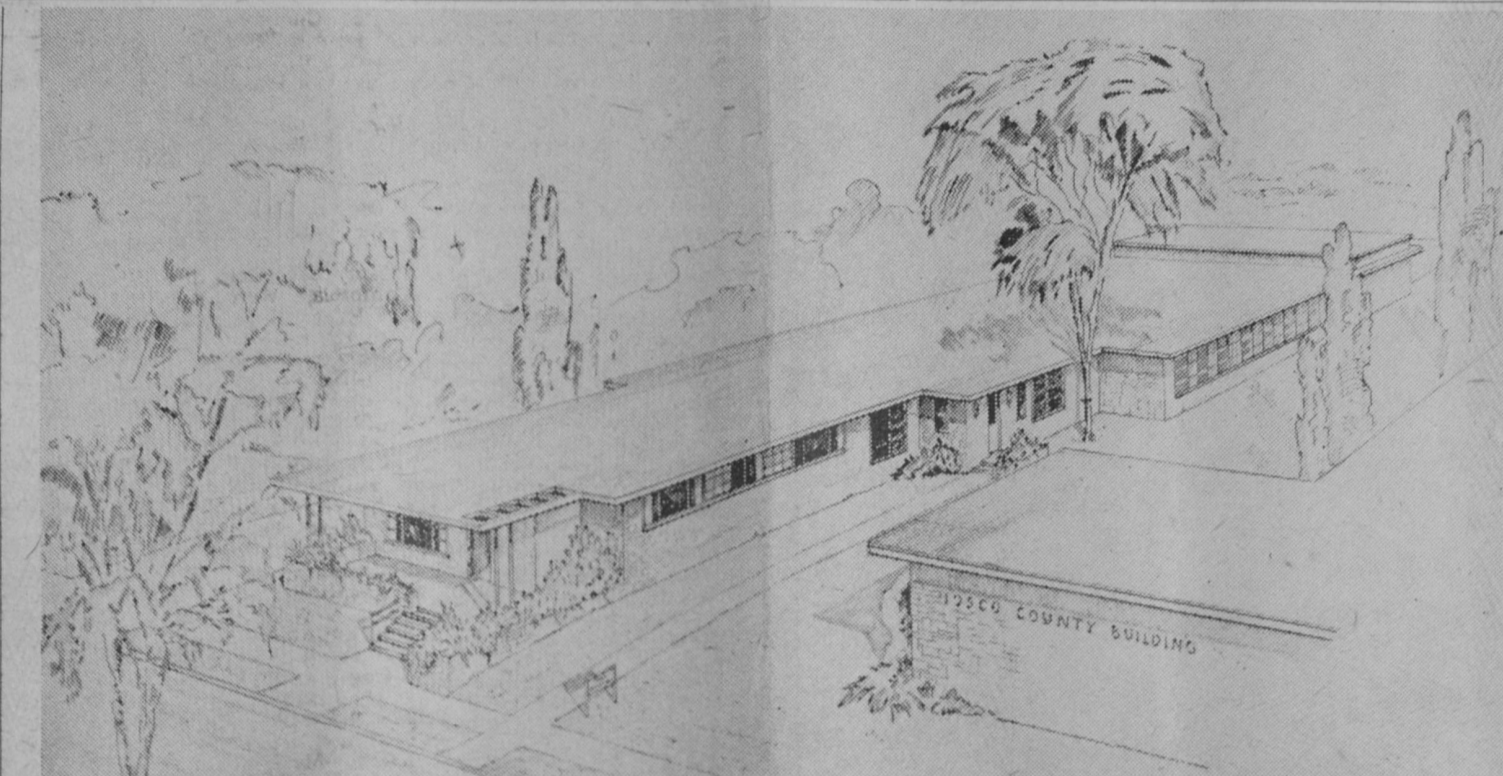
Next Tuesday night the school board will hold a special meeting at the Tawas Chamber of Commerce Building for the purpose of electing new officers and organization for the coming year.

Burleigh Voters Say "No" to Proposal

A five-mill tax increase proposal in the Burleigh Agricultural School District was defeated at Monday's election by a vote of 186 No to 119 Yes.

George Erickson and Kenneth St. John were elected to the board of education for three year terms. They defeated Leon King and Arthur Aulerich. Erickson received 158 votes; St. John, 154; King, 141; Aulerich, 130.

In the contest for the one-year term, Colin Perry defeated Gunnar Brevik by a vote of 163 to 129.

The county board of supervisors was recently forced to make a decision on the building of a new jail by the State Board of Corrections. The state board con-

demned the old building and gave the board of supervisors a limited time to take action in providing a satisfactory jail.

Architect's plans have been prepared which have the approval of the State Board of Corrections.

Hale Youth Dies From Auto Accident Injuries

William Green, 17-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Lester Green of Hale, died at 4:55 Thursday morning at the Tawas Hospital. Death was the result of an automobile accident about an hour earlier at the intersection of the River and Monument Roads.

Others injured in the accident were Gordon Bell, Donald Shortt, Warren Dorsey, Raymond Shortt and Robert Boughner, all of Hale, Donald Inman of Rose City and Clayton Hutzel of Cleveland.

The group of boys was in a car driven by Gordon Bell. The boys had been at Sand Lake and were returning to Hale. When approaching the intersection at the Lumbermen's Monument a rear tire blew out and the car went out of control. Going off the road at the curve, the car skidded sideways and hit a tree.

J. H. Johnson of Hale, on his way to Oscoda, came to the accident shortly after it occurred. He immediately secured the Forshee ambulance and three of the most seriously injured were brought to the Tawas Hospital, where William Green died. The other two were treated and returned to their homes by ambulance.

Undersheriff Leon Putnam was called to the scene of the accident. On his way from there to Hale, he picked up five of the boys in a dazed condition walking toward M-65.

State Police Handle 4-Minor Accidents The Past Week

Four minor property damage traffic accidents were handled Tuesday by Michigan State Police at East Tawas during the past week.

Ransom Carlos Turstenan of Detroit received a summons on July 5, following a two car collision seven miles south of the Omer city limits. While making an improper U-turn, the Turstenan vehicle was struck by a car driven by Carl J. Jones. No injuries were reported. Damage to the Jones vehicle amounted to \$200 while the Turstenan vehicle received \$100 damages.

Robert H. Lawler of Wurtsmith Air Force Base was issued a summons following an accident on US-23 near Alabaster on July 6. Lawler lost control of his vehicle and went off the right shoulder of the road into an open field for a distance of 100 yards. Lawler told investigating officers that he must have dozed off and lost control of his car.

A car driven by Dave L. Gamble of Detroit rolled over while making a curve on M-65 at the Isoco-Alcona line on July 7. He was summoned for excessive speed on a curve.

A car driven by Richard H. Clark collided with a vehicle driven by Dewey J. Pavelock on July 8 near Laura's Cabins on US-23 in Tawas City. Clark told investigating officers that he did not see the other vehicle until too late to avoid an accident.

Investigate Theft of Outboard Motors

Local law enforcement agencies are investigating a series of outboard motor thefts which occurred in Isoco county during the past two weeks.

On the night of July 5, an Evinrude, one and a half horsepower outboard motor, was stolen from a boat at Tawas Lake. The motor was owned by Lazernia Moffatt of Flint.

A five horsepower Egin outboard motor, owned by Orville Bennett of Vassar Road, Flint, was stolen from a boat at Floyd Lake. Bennett told investigating officers that the motor was stolen following his return from a fishing trip on July 6.

Erwin Petzel of Detroit reported the theft of a five horsepower Sea King outboard motor on the Barkfield Dam pond. Petzel stated that the motor was stolen from his boat the night of July 9.

The Michigan State Police warn all fishermen and motor boat owners that outboard motors should not be left on boats at night. Safeguard your property by locking your motor when not in use.

Water Sports Program Planned for Tawas Bay

A new summer water sports program on Tawas Bay was inaugurated this week by Del Coler of Jerry's Fishing Resort of East Tawas.

The Tawas Point resort now operates a 15-foot aluminum speed boat and 25 horsepower motor, equipped with either surf board, water skis or flying saucer for the water sport enthusiast.

The new equipment will be available by day, hour or week, Coler stated.

Summer water sports on Tawas Bay recently received state wide publicity over WNET-TV, Bay City, and in downstate newspapers. The area is rapidly becoming a popular water sports playground.

The annual Michigan District Lightning Regatta will be held on Tawas Bay July 23-24-25. The event is sponsored this year by the Tawas Bay Yacht Club.

Many top Lightning skippers in the state will be in attendance and 37 have registered with the committee to date. Twenty-three of the entries are out-state craft, and it is expected that about 10 more will register prior to the races.

The defending state champion, H. J. Cawthra, top Lightning skipper from the Crescent Yacht Club, Detroit, will enter the events. Dr. Gerald Murphy of the Lake Trenton Yacht Club, the July 4 winner in the Tawas Bay Regatta, will be on hand for the events.

Two races will be held daily on Friday and Saturday. The first event will be staged at 11 o'clock a. m. and the second starting gun will be fired at 2 o'clock p. m. A single race will be held on Sunday, beginning at 2:00 p. m.

All of the Lightnings will race at the same time during each event and should prove to be an interesting program for the spectators. A loudspeaker system will announce the names of the entries and winners of races at the State Park dock.

Increased Cash Awards in Fair Live Stock Division

Only Few Days to Prepare Show Exhibits

Exhibits Assembled First Day of Event Wednesday, July 28

Less than two weeks before the fair, and department superintendents of the Isoco County Fair urge exhibitors to get prepared. Exhibits are the principal reason for a fair says Thurman Scofield, secretary-manager. The fair starts Wednesday, July 28, and ends July 31. Exhibits will be assembled Wednesday, July 28.

Orville Strauer, superintendent of the livestock department, states that to make exhibiting more worthwhile, cash awards have been increased in his department on dairy heifers, yearlings, beef cattle, saddle horses and ponies. He says, "Get your exhibits ready and plan to help make this a bigger and better fair for 1954. Bring out some of your animals and show what fine cattle Isoco county is producing."

The cattle barns are clean and will be properly disinfected. Year after year the fair has demonstrated that there are many excellent bread and pastry cooks in the county. Baked goods have been a popular division of the home economics department, with both exhibitors and fair patrons. Mrs. Elizabeth Neveu, superintendent of the home economics department, urges Isoco county housewives to exhibit some of their best baking and take-home some cash prizes. Listed are all types of bread, cakes and pies.

In the canning division the exhibits may be from last year's production. The list includes all types of canned goods, pickles and relishes and the cash awards are liberal.

In the Domestic Arts Section with Florence Dooley, superintendent, prizes are offered in 12 different sections of this department. The list includes all types of handwork such as sewing, knitting, crocheting, quilting and other home economics arts.

At the demonstrations, a contestant will be chosen to represent Isoco county at the Standard Round-Up. Exhibits will be judged Thursday.

During the afternoon of Saturday, July 31, it is planned to hold a 4-H Club tractor operator's demonstration contest. The successful contestant will represent Isoco county at the state meeting.

In addition to exhibits and 4-H Club show, there will be three days of harness racing, midway, contests, games, band concerts and other fair attractions.

Seeks Re-election As County Treasurer

Mrs. Grace L. Miller is seeking re-election to the office of county treasurer which she has held since 1925.

Mrs. Miller was born on the carpenter farm on the banks of the east branch of the AuGres river in Grant township. She graduated from Greenwood Grade School and East Tawas High School. She attended Michigan State Normal at Ypsilanti and taught in the Taft and East Tawas schools.

55 Votes Cast in Plainfield Election

A quiet election in the Plainfield township Rural Agricultural School District with less than 50 votes, gave Dennis Chrivia, with no opposing candidates, the reelection as school trustee for three years.

At the annual meeting a full financial report was read and explained to the 14 people present. In making the explanation, it was pointed out there was a \$12,482.54 improvement in condition of the general fund during the 1953-54 school year. There is also a working balance of \$11,482.54 on hand with which to carry on business during the summer months until additional income is received.

Also announced was the paying off of \$16,000.00 worth of the bonds on Bond Issue No. 1 instead of the required \$10,000.00 which were due in June. This leaves a total balance due on Bond Issue No. 1 of \$94,000.00 plus interest. On Bond Issue No. 2 the balance plus interest still remaining is \$20,000.00 making a total bonded indebtedness of \$114,000.00 for the district as compared with a total of bonded indebtedness of \$160,000.00 two and one-half years ago.

It was announced that the reserves for these bond issues as required by the Michigan Municipal Finance Commission were placed in Time Deposit Certificates bearing one percent interest. Total funds now so deposited are \$14,500.00 for Debt Retirement Fund No. 1 and \$4,500.00 for Debt Retirement Fund No. 2. These reserves must be maintained until the bonds of the respective issues can be paid in full.

After the annual meeting was adjourned, the board of education met and re-elected the following officers:

Dennis Chrivia, president; Ernest Herzog, treasurer; Lula Bell Zilio, secretary; Ira Scofield and Clarence Brindley, trustees.

Cowan Real Estate Sold This Week

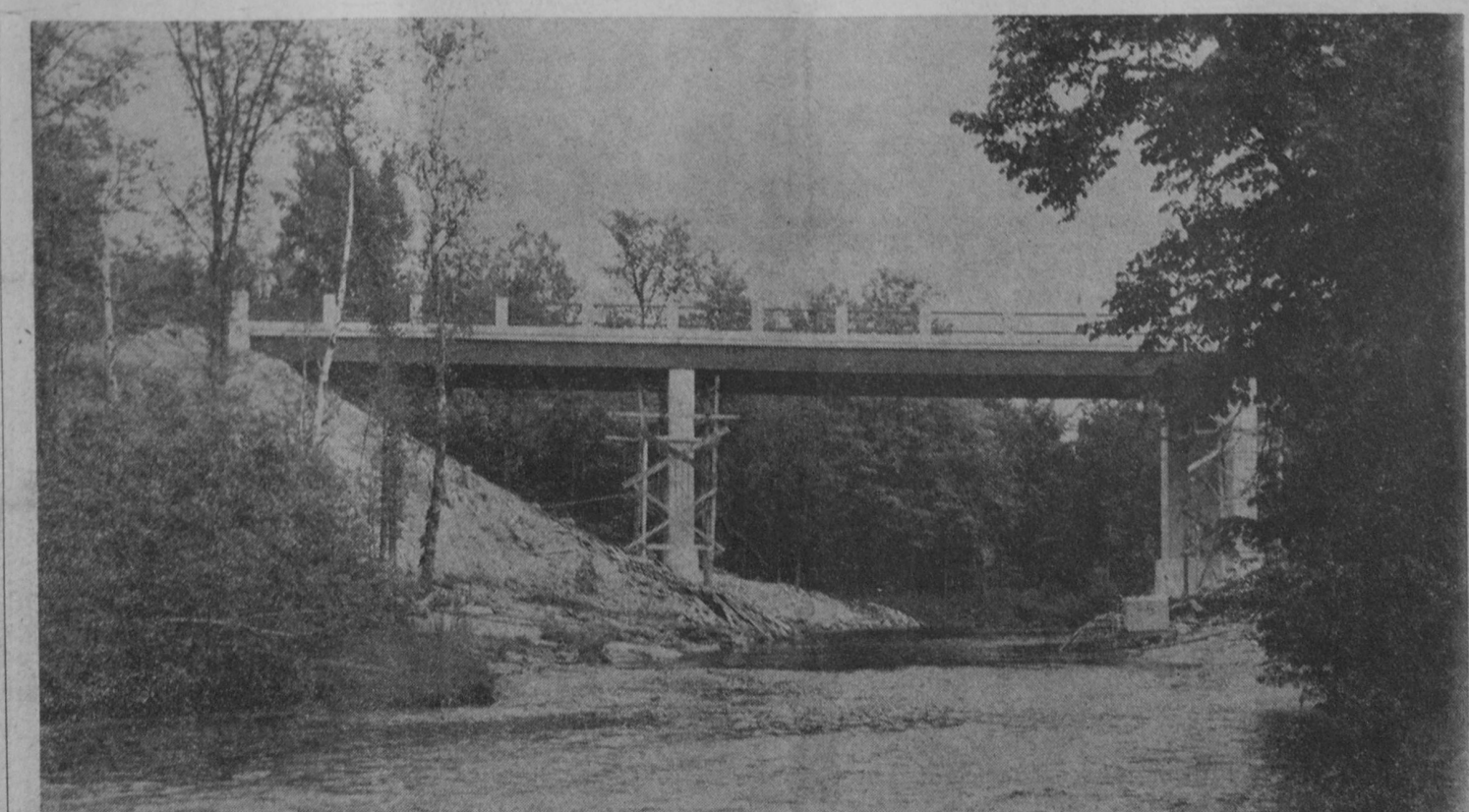
Mr. and Mrs. William Borosch have purchased the Cowan real estate business on Lake Street in this city from Mr. and Mrs. Arthur Cowan.

## Downward Accident Trend Halted in May Police Report

The downward trend in Michigan traffic accident fatalities that prevailed in January, March and April was halted again when 132 persons were killed during May, according to the monthly statistical report of the State Police.

The figure represented an increase of 16, or 13 percent, over the same period last year, and was the highest reported for the month of May since 1941, when 193 persons lost their lives.

Injuries during May amounted to 4,777, or 10 percent below 5,394 in May of last year. Accidents were down 11 percent from 16,092 to 14,258. Urban areas accounted for a substantial reduction in both injuries and accidents.

During the first five months of this year, 623 persons have been killed and 20,534 injured in 74,426 accidents. Compared to the same period last year, deaths were down 36, or five percent, and injuries decreased 734, or three percent. Reported accidents increased three percent.

Estimated mileage for the first four months of 1954, the latest figures available, was 8.2 billion, an increase of four percent over 7.8 billion in the same period last year.

## Bible Comment:

### Jesus Taught The People With True Authority

At the conclusion of the Sermon on the Mount it is said that the people were "astonished at His doctrine; for He taught them as one having authority, and not as the scribes."

Among the amazing things concerning the teaching and ministry of Jesus none is more remarkable. The scribes were the official interpreters of the law, and were supposed to speak with authority.

Jesus, in fact, recognized their authority as those who "sat in Moses seat," though He warned the people that they should do as the scribes said, but not according to their works, for they said, and did not.

But even in what was said, those who heard Jesus realized a difference. They felt that He had an authority which those who claimed authority did not possess.

He had had the good education that was the heritage of every Jewish boy of that time in the schools associated with the synagogues.

But He possessed, apparently, none of the outward credentials of authority which both then, now and always have assumed so much importance in the eyes of men. He was neither a scribe nor a rabbi and it is certain that no school of the time would have given him an honorary D.D.

Yet to those who heard Him He spoke with an authority which none of the possessors of the outward credentials of authority could command.

The secret of the authority of Jesus was that it rested on truth. His authority was that of the great Revealer of God, speaking in harmony with the truth of God and the universe, the foundation upon which all authority must ultimately rest.

# Urges Farmers to Make Exhibits at Iosco County Fair

By MARVIN DAVENPORT

Our Iosco County Fair is Wednesday through Saturday, July 23-31, at Hale. Can we have more grain, livestock and garden produce exhibited by our farmers in and around Iosco county than we had last year?

Why not exhibit? You'll find a peck of oats, wheat or rye properly cleaned can make good exhibit and can bring you a good premium.

Let's have Iosco county livestock on exhibit, too. Dairy classes, sheep and beef cattle premiums are large enough to cover cost of transportation. Let all of Iosco county take part this year in making our fair bigger and better than ever!

How about our Farm Bureau groups and Granges making a booth? Let your neighbors know what these rural organizations stand for, what they are doing and why farm folks should be represented.

If you have any questions about exhibits contact Thurman Scofield of Hale, Joseph Barnes of Whittemore, Orville Strauer of McIvor, Lloyd Newvine of McIvor or Gerald Bellen of Whittemore. Do your part to make this a big fair year.

Mexican bean beetles are not "south of the border"—they're here, bean growers and gardeners.

The beetles are busy now laying eggs—and there is nothing to be gained by waiting to control the insects later. The important thing is to move in with sprays before they lay too many eggs.

The spiny larvae are more difficult to control later because of their numbers.

Malathion is a good insecticide to fight Mexican bean beetles on field beans—but it should not be used on snap beans if the harvest is closer than 10 days off, according to Ray Janes, Michigan State College entomologist.

Use rotenone-pyrethrum mixture on snap beans.

It's important to get the spray on the underside of leaves, where the beetles hide. Use three pounds of 25 percent wettable malathion powder to 100 gallons of water—that's three tablespoons per gallon. For the snap beans use three pounds of five percent rotenone powder per 100 gallons.

Malathion and rotenone can be dusted on also. Details of their use on other insects and mites are available at our Cooperative Extension Service Office, Federal Building, East Tawas.

The bulletin is called "Insect and Disease Control on Vegetables and Truck Crops."

Visitors to the Lake City Experiment Station open house on August are in for a special treat.

It will be a cheese festival and both women and men will have the ability to judge good cheese—by looks, of course, and even better, by tasting.

Donald L. Murray, Michigan State College Extension dairyman, will draft a crew of home demonstration agents to help him put on the show. He notes that "we'll have some good cheese, some inferior cheese just for comparison, and a few foreign cheeses, also."

Iosco county farmers will take to the wheat fields (in a few days) to harvest their share of Michigan's bumper crop, predicted to run the highest yield per acre—28 bushels—since 1866.

That means a lot of wheat to handle. By now, farmers should have checked combines, wagons, bags and grain handling equipment so they won't carry old bugs into the clean wheat. They should have adequate storages ready and have them sprayed with methoxychlor for sanitation.

Hubert M. Brown, Michigan State College farm crops specialist, adds his voice to the urging for plenty of clean storage. He quotes Dale Butz, Michigan State College agricultural economist, as pointing to dangers of a glutted market forcing a price lower—with old grain still in commercial storage. It will pay to build storages, and disinfect them, before combines roll.

The extension folder, "Prevent Damage to Stored Wheat"—is available from our office in East Tawas.

We recommend getting wheat down to 13 percent moisture to be safe. Elevators can run checks. The grain and straw must be mature, if you bend your fingernail instead of denting the grain, it's mature.

Allow the morning dampness to go off fields before combining, if you don't want tough straw and wet grain. Keep grain cool after combining by putting it out in the sun.

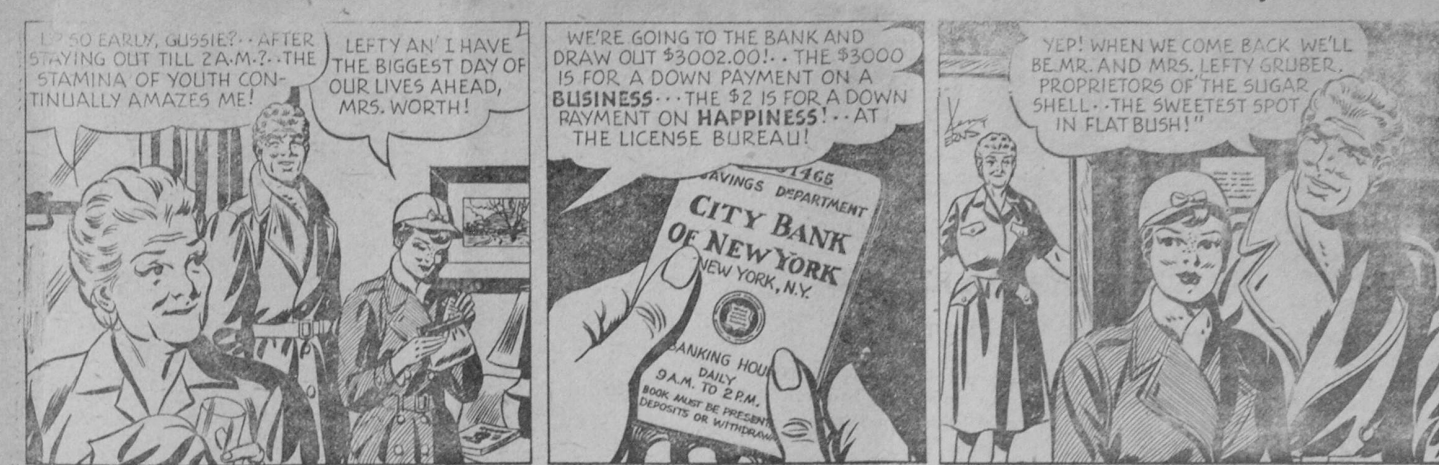

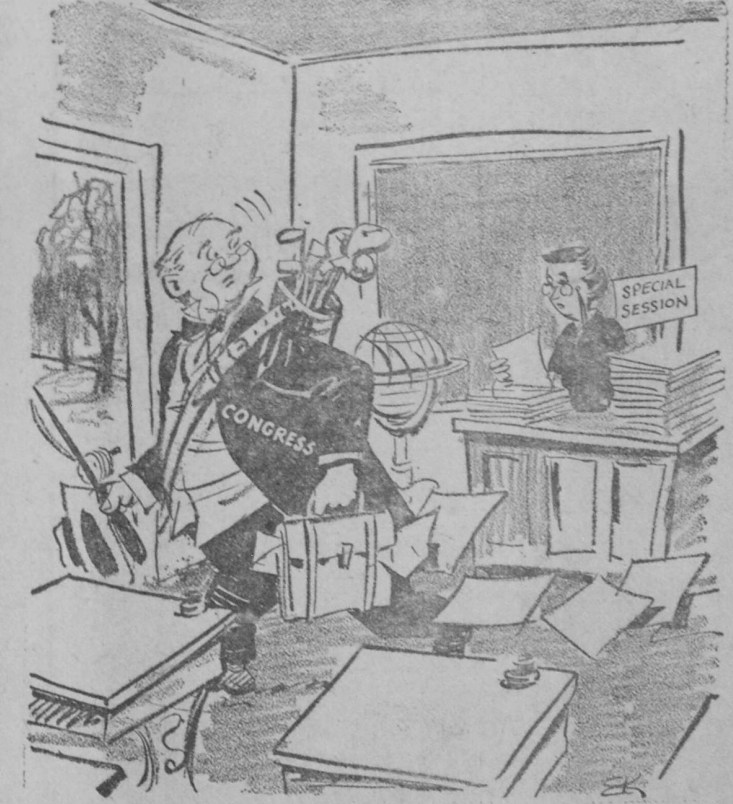

The game was an up-hill struggle throughout the entire 10 innings for the locals. The Tawas City infield committed five costly errors during the game while Hale had a total of four miscues.

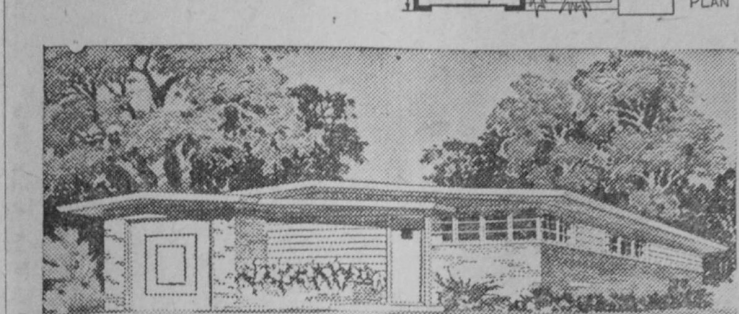
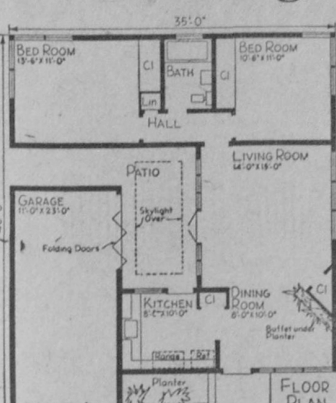
On Sunday, July 18, the Tawas City Independents will play at West Branch. In an earlier game this season, the locals defeated West Branch 5-4 in 11 innings.
