## New Traffic Ordinance Replaces Obsolete Laws

All regulations pertaining to traffic on the streets of Tawas City were brought into one comprehensive ordinance when the common council adopted Ordinance No. 138 last Monday night.

Obsolete regulations were repealed by the new ordinance which others amended to fit present conditions, and made to conform with state traffic regulations which now prevail and are in use to control traffic on the streets of the city. The new ordinance makes very few changes in traffic rules which have been used by law enforcement officers during the past few years.

Rules as to how a car should approach a horse drawn vehicle, 10 miles per hour speed limits, drinking troughs for horses, proper placing of hitching posts, speed limits of bicycles and many other regulations adopted down through the years have ceased to be traffic problems.

During the 50 years that cars have been on the streets, the city has tried to meet the various traffic problems and many later regulations adopted down through the years have ceased to be traffic problems. A heterogeneous group of traffic rules was the result. The new ordinance modernizes them and brings them all into one ordinance.

## Barber Announces Candidacy

Announcement was received this week that William R. Barber of Tawas City is a candidate for the Republican nomination for prosecuting attorney.

He served as state auditor from 1922 to 1927. Following this he was in the accounting business in Detroit until 1933 when he was admitted to the bar and began his law practice.

## 8-Year Old Rescued from River Tragedy

Second Accident in Week Brings Warning from Police Chief George Ruth

An eight-year old Tawas City boy was rescued from the Tawas river early Wednesday morning. Glenn, the son of Mr. and Mrs. Alvin Kendall, fell into the river near Gordon Clute's boat well. He was rescued by Lloyd Peltier of Oscoda.

The Kendall boy, along with several young companions, was fishing from a commercial fish boat tied up at the boat well. He lost his footing and plunged into the water and his cries attracted the attention of Peltier, who was working on a nearby boat. After rescuing the boy from the river, Peltier revived him with artificial respiration. George Ruth, Tawas City chief of police, was called to the scene of the accident.

This was the second such accident this week involving small children playing near the river. Chief Ruth warns all parents that children should not be allowed to play near the river unless under the supervision of an adult.

## Hospital Gives 100% Return on Investment

A one-hundred percent return on your investment was the report released by the Tawas Hospital Association this week, following final tabulations on the year-end financial report of the Tawas Hospital.

According to the report, the hospital has returned to this community a payroll of \$93,724.65. This payroll includes the amount paid to nurses, nurses aids and administrative workers. An additional \$13,249.75 has been paid out to local merchants for supplies.

The Tawas Hospital Association's secretary, H. Read Smith, reports that about \$100,000.00 was contributed locally to pay for the initial cost of building and equipping the hospital. In comparing the amount contributed locally with the 1953-4 hospital payroll, plus the amount expended on locally purchased supplies, the resulting figures show that this amounts to a little more than 100 percent return on this community's initial investment.

During the 12 months in which the Tawas Hospital has been in operation, a total of 14,442 in-patients have been received at the hospital. In addition to this figure, 413 out-patients have been received. This includes patients who were treated by local physicians and entered the hospital for x-rays. (See HOSPITAL, Back Page)

Brugger had recently been appointed to fill the vacancy caused by the death of John B. King. His resignation leaves Tawas City with only two members on the board of supervisors at the June meeting which convenes Monday.

Russell Rollin appeared before the council representing the Tawas Kiwanis Club committee on youth activities. Rollin suggested that the tennis court at Tawas City Athletic Field be repaired for use this summer. The council agreed to cooperate and is investigating the possibilities of leveling the concrete slab with a coat of blacktop.

An ordinance which would provide for the licensing of all business places in Tawas City is being studied by the council. The purpose would be for the control of itinerant peddlers and the operation of transient stands and business places.

## Prescott will Seek Re-election

George A. Prescott, Iosco county clerk, announced today that he will seek the nomination to succeed himself in office at the August 3 primaries.

Prescott has served the county in his present capacity since May 1951, when he was appointed by Judge Herman Dehnke to fill a vacancy caused by the resignation of R. H. McKenzie. In 1952 he was re-elected without opposition.

A lifetime resident of the county, Prescott is married and the father of four sons and one daughter. Graduating from Michigan State College in 1935, he entered the livestock business with his late father. He resides with his family on his 160 acre farm in Tawas township, where he raises registered Holstein cattle.

Prescott has been an active member of many county organizations. A former supervisor from Tawas township, fair board member and farm bureau member, he has always been a staunch supporter of the young people of the county, each year furnishing an expense paid trip to Michigan State College for a boy and girl who possessed outstanding achievement records in 4-H Club projects.

In commenting on his filing for the nomination for re-election, Prescott said, "I believe I have just learned to be efficient in the office. The people of the county, state and nation today demand a swift, accurate service." (See PRESCOTT, Back Page)

The two boys are: Charles Wilson, son of Mr. and Mrs. Claude Wilson of Tawas City, and Donald Harmon, son of Mr. and Mrs. Robert E. Harmon of East Tawas. Wilson is sponsored by Jesse C. Hodder Post, American Legion, and Harmon by the Audie Johnson Post, American Legion. They were selected because of their good moral character, good sportsmanship and potential leadership ability.

Boys' State was originally and is primarily a Legion sponsored program. It was established to promote a better citizenry and to inculcate the ideals of democracy in young Americans, and develop the responsibility of leadership.

The program will include city conventions, county conventions, state conventions and state elections. Bipartisan, the election is the "Nationalist." There will be political campaigns, with posters and banners, campaign speeches and group meetings in preparation for the election. The boys will participate in all phases of the election and the operation of a state government following the election.

This will be the 17th annual assembly of Wolverine Boys' State. It will be held on the campus of Michigan State College and the activities will be centered in the Frederick Cowles Men's Gymnasium and F. House.

## Stopped Cars on Highway Cause Accident at Bridge

Heavy week-end tourist traffic along US-23 in Tawas City moved at a slow pace Sunday, following a traffic accident at the Tawas river bridge.

A tractor-trailer semi-truck swerved to avoid a collision with three automobiles and crashed against the guard cables at the south end of the bridge. The heavy weight of the tractor dug the tires into the soft shoulder of the road and prevented the trailer from toppling over an embankment.

The driver of the truck, John Foran, an employee of the Wolverine Storage Company of Detroit, said that he was forced to swerve his vehicle to the right in order to avert a possible collision with three cars stopped on the highway. The driver of the lead car was waiting to complete a left-hand turn off US-23. All four vehicles involved were headed north. No injuries were reported.

## Businessmen's Group Receives Report on Carnival and Add to Park Fund

The Tawas City Businessmen's Association reported this week that the organization has received \$169.20 from Lee Shows, Incorporated, in payment for the first week of summer concessions in the Tawas City Park.

The amount received represents the percentage of total income derived by Lee Shows for the operation of concession rides in the park during the summer months. The money will be turned over to the Tawas City Park Fund.

The city park has been cleaned up by employees of the department of public works and Lee Shows workmen. It is planned to clean and rake the shoreline along Tawas Bay and to set out picnic tables for the use of local residents and tourists.

A weekly check of the concessions operating in the city park is being made by local businessmen. This is to insure that no gambling concessions are being operated.

In other matters discussed during the weekly businessmen's meeting Thursday at Vic and Zel's Restaurant, it was reported that the People's State Bank of East Tawas had contributed a check for \$100 to the Tawas City Centennial Fund.

## Pilot Killed in Jet Plane Crash Near Oscoda

United States Air Force F-86 Sabre-Jet plane crashed and exploded five miles south of Wurtsmith Air Force Base Thursday, killing the pilot instantly. The accident occurred shortly before 8 o'clock in the morning.

An official Air Force spokesman said that the name of the dead pilot was being withheld until notification of next of kin.

According to officers who investigated the crash, the plane apparently lost power and crashed into a small wooded lot on a Wilber township farm. A crash crew from Wurtsmith Air Force Base was dispatched to the scene of the tragedy. The crew was assisted in putting out a brush fire which ignited from the flaming debris of the plane by Bert McGreggor, United States Forest Service fire marshal, and Arthur Leitz, Michigan Conservation Service officer.

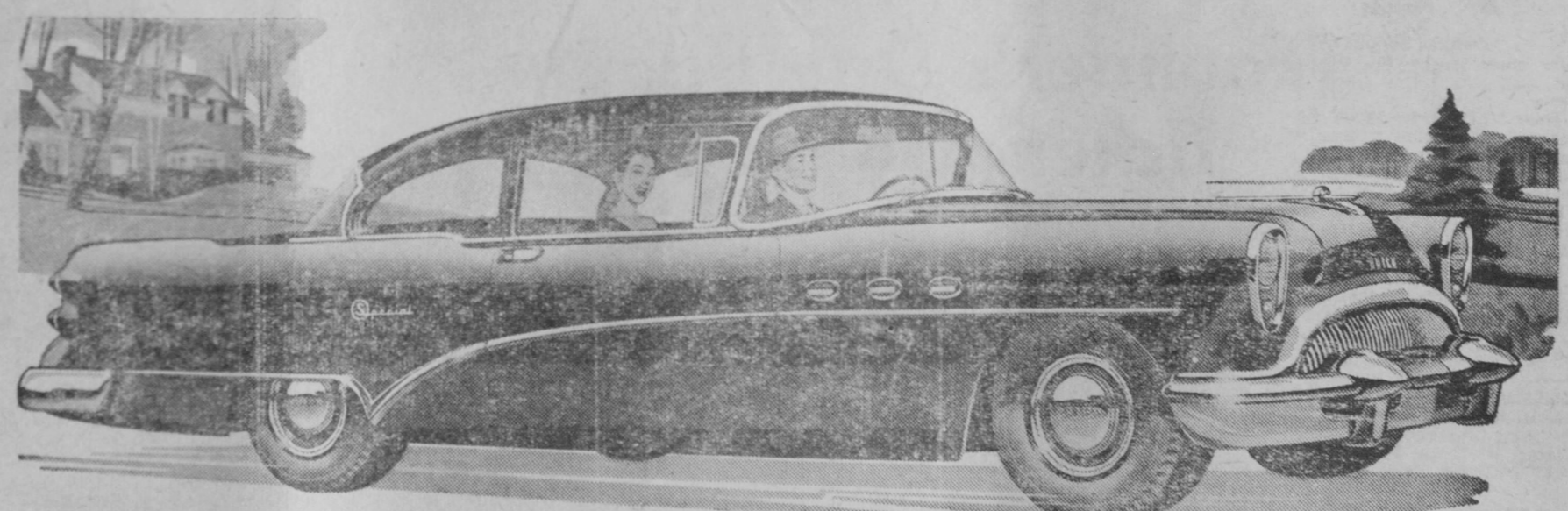

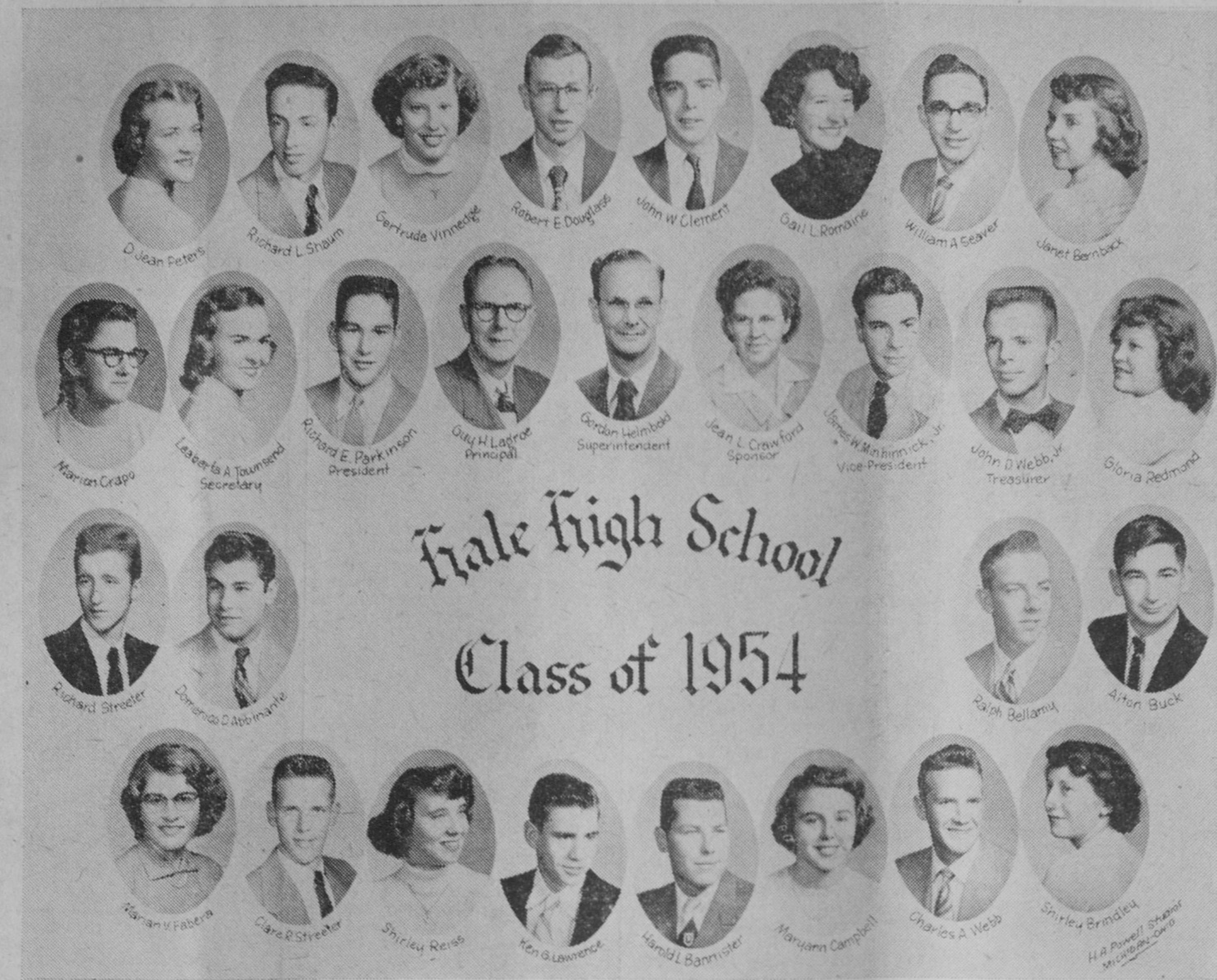

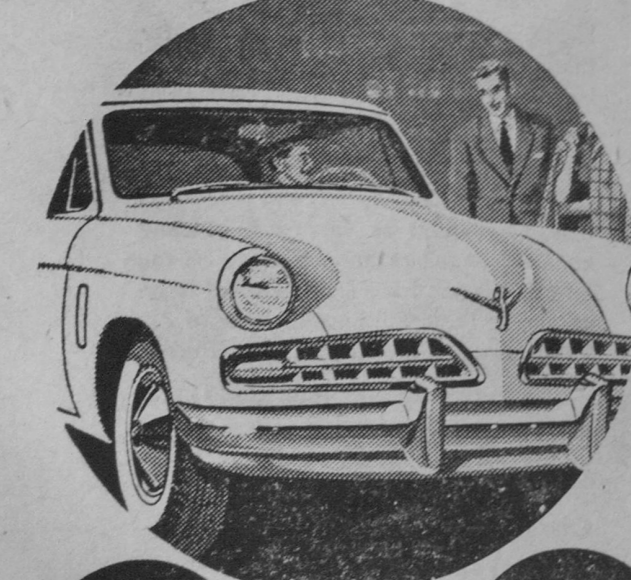

## Agricultural Notes

Here are some folks that will get some help on egg candling: Mrs. Sophia MacDonald, Mrs. Ila Laidlaw, Mrs. Grace Atkinson, Mrs. Joy Bellen and Mrs. Clyde Ranger.

J. M. Moore, poultry specialist from Michigan State College, will be paying them a visit this month because they requested that help. Are you interested? You too can be included if you'll drop us a line. We will tell you well in advance when we would be coming.

I received a call last week about a rabbit marketing problem. Where can I buy some white pelted rabbits weighing about 4 or 5 pounds? How many do you want? I asked. I could use 200 a week if I could get them every week of the year. Are there any rabbit raisers in the county—4-H Club members and otherwise?

Last week I attended a northern Michigan meeting with Donny Bellville, your county A. S. C. chairman, on how our farmers will be marketing their wheat. All boiled down into one sentence—Get your wheat marketing card if you're planning to sell wheat between now and June 30, 1955. It makes no difference whether you were an A. B. C. cooperator or not. A law passed in 1938, compels our secretary of agriculture, under the existing conditions, to require marketing quotas. So I repeat, (in case you skipped over this lightly) you must have a marketing card to market any wheat whether you have an allotment or not.

Did you hear about Thurman and Wendall Scofield? They probably prayed for rain just as hard (maybe too hard) as any of the rest of us a few weeks ago. As you already know they got it, too, but a little more than they wanted all at one time.

They made themselves a scraper to prepare a waterway, they leveled off the waterway to get rid of the excess water. When the heavy rains came, the water all went down the waterway as expected, but a great deal more than the outlet could handle. Thurman said at times the water was 12 feet deep in the outlet as well as 18 inches deep in the barn.

## Slow Down and Live Longer, Says Sgt. Chaput

"Slow down and live longer. Drive too fast and die that much sooner."

That's the message of Sgt. Joseph Chaput, commanding officer of the East Tawas Post of the Michigan State Police, in pointing out that June, July and August are the months when speed, the Number One public enemy on the highway, takes its greatest toll.

Michigan law enforcement agencies are now cooperating in a state-wide campaign to make motorists more speed conscious.

"Last year 45 percent of the fatal accidents reported in fatal accidents were for speeding or driving too fast for conditions," Sergeant Chaput said. "Safety appeals are meant for all. If drivers will gear their speed to existing conditions, such as traffic and weather, it will definitely cut down the number of fatalities."

In 1953, there were more than 1,900 persons killed and nearly 58,000 injured in 184,000 accidents in Michigan. This was an increase over 1952 of nine percent in deaths, 13 percent in injuries and 15 percent in accidents.

Ran-off-roadway accidents, the type most commonly attributed to driving too fast for conditions, accounted for 435 of the deaths.

Motor vehicle travel in Michigan during the summer months will jump from the daily average of 71,000,000 miles to 80 million.

"This means greater exposure to accidents," Sergeant Chaput said. "The state law does not set a specific speed limit, but it does require that speeds be no greater than conditions justify. In other words, be sensible and use good judgment at the wheel."

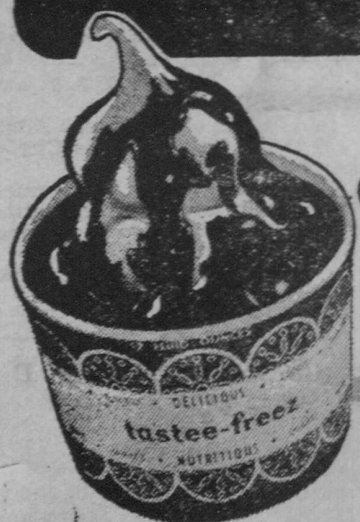

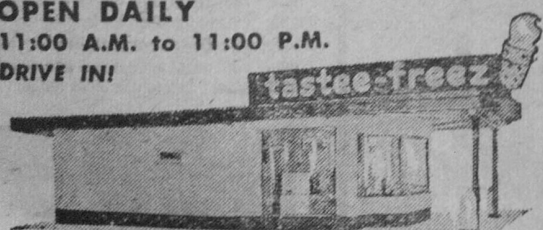

**Wheat Farmers May Still Join Acreage Program**

Wheat growers in Iosco county who have overplanted their wheat acreage allotment, may get in compliance with the 1954 Wheat Allotment Program if they turn under for green manure, pasture or cut for hay or silage, their excess acreage while it is still green, advises Donace E. Bellville, chairman of the Iosco County ASC Committee.  
 Wheat still standing after June 15, will be counted as "wheat" under the program and will be checked against the wheat acreage allotment for the farm. Wheat from any farm on which the wheat acreage allotment is exceeded will not be eligible for price support. All of the "excess wheat" from a farm with a wheat allotment of more than 15 acres will be subject to a penalty of \$1.12 per bushel. Farmers with an acreage allotment of 15 acres or less may produce as much as 15 acres of wheat without incurring marketing penalties. However, if the farm allotment is exceeded the wheat will not be eligible for government price support.

**Hale Daily Bible School to Begin Monday, June 14**

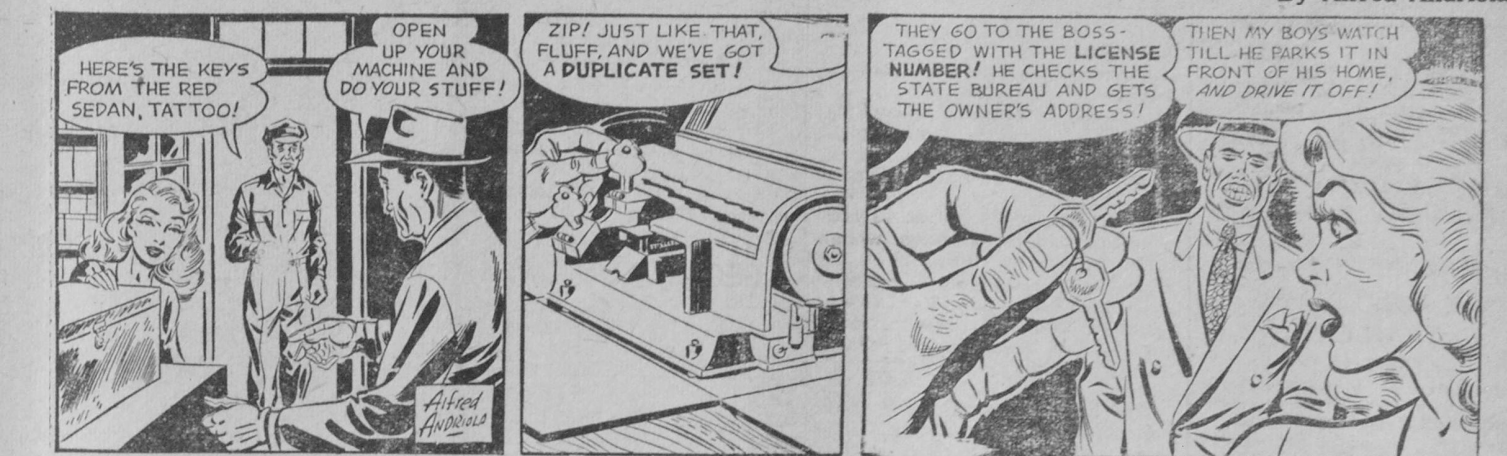

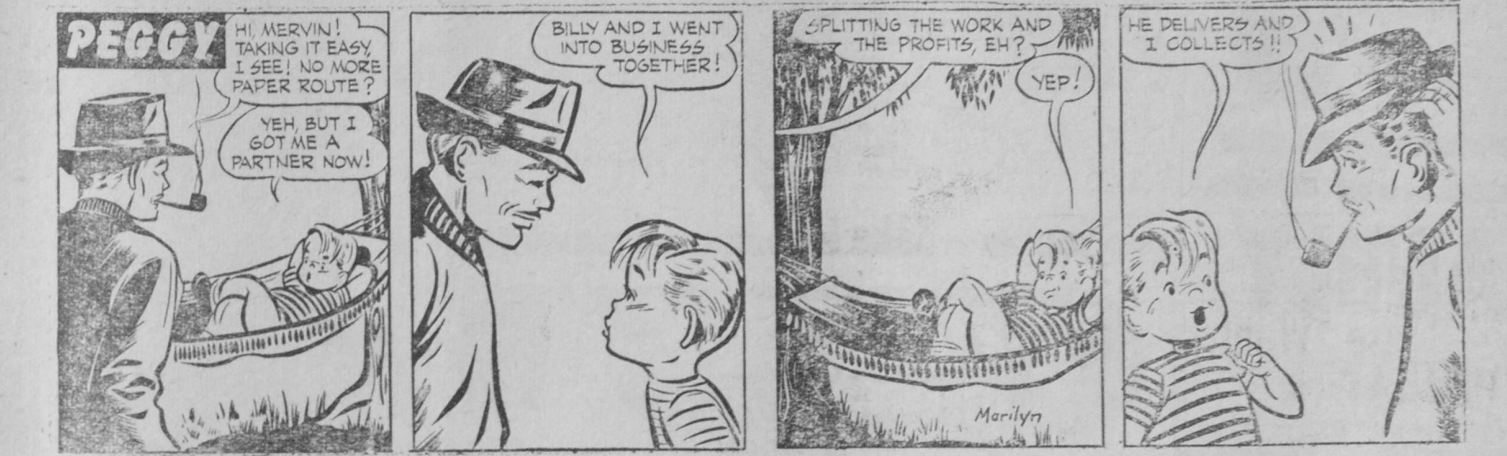

**Wheat Buyer Liable for Penalty Due on Excess**

June is the dairy month—do you know that? Milk will not scorch so easily if you wipe the bottom of the pan with a bit of butter before scalding.

Each person who buys wheat from a producer during the 1954-1955 is liable for the amount of the marketing quota penalty due on "excess" wheat of the 1954 crop. Bruce Clothier, chairman of the State Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Committee pointed out today. Since marketing quotas are in effect for the 1954 crop, farmers who do not comply with their farm wheat acreage allotments become subject to a lien on their crop until the marketing quota penalty is paid. This penalty on excess wheat is \$1.12 per bushel.

"When anyone purchases wheat from a producer, he should be certain that such producer is eligible to sell his wheat," Mr. Clothier declared. "He should, therefore, request the producer to present a wheat marketing card or marketing certificate at the time the wheat is offered for sale.

"Failure to present a marketing card or certificate at the time of sale will be evidence that the wheat is not clear of lien for the penalty, and the buyer will be held responsible for the lien the same as he would be for purchasing wheat with any other lien attached."

Mr. Clothier further explained that the first purchase—such as a warehouseman—buying from an "intermediate buyer" may deduct the amount of the penalty per bushel on all wheat purchased from the total purchase price, just as if he were buying from a producer, if such seller does not present evidence that the penalty has been satisfied. Such collection should then be forwarded to the County ASC office for the county in which the wheat was produced. An "intermediate buyer," according to

Those buyers who purchase wheat from anyone other than a producer or intermediate buyer will not be held responsible since the first purchaser of the wheat is liable for the total amount of the penalty unless a marketing card, a marketing certificate, or an intermediate buyer's record and report showing satisfaction of the penalty is presented at the time of purchase.

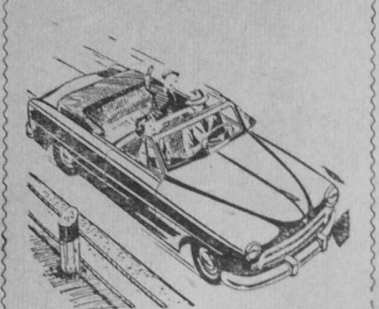

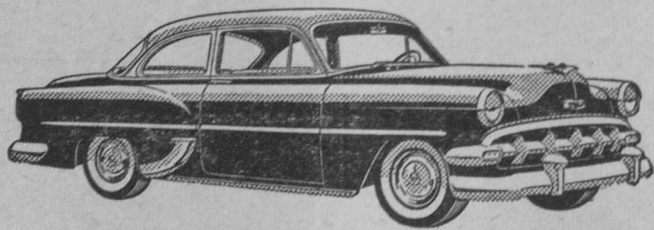

The new \$665,000.00 Tawas Hospital held its open house last June. Before the hospital could be formally opened to the public on June 8 of that year, a destructive tornado struck Isosco county. The hospital was immediately opened to treat the injured.

The local hospital has now been in operation for a little more than one year. During that time it has proven to be a valuable asset to this community and to all the communities in Northeastern Michigan. It should continue to be of a valuable service for many years to come.

Those starting out need birth certificates before obtaining employment, older people need the records for the purpose of obtaining pensions and social security. Alimony payments handled by the office have nearly doubled since May 1951. County ledgers today show bookkeeping postings of over a million dollars each year, including the recording of the local road commission receipts and expenditures.

"Circuit court work in the county," Prescott added, "averages nearly 100 days each year, and the tasks of the supervisors have increased, their workings often taking an entire newspaper section to publish."

"If re-elected," Prescott said, "I pledge the people of Isosco county, a courteous, speedy and efficient service from this office the same as I have attempted to furnish the past three years. The people of the county are welcome to call on this office at any time for any information or assistance that we may be able to give them."
