

Harrisville Ends Tawas High Win Streak, 4 to 2

The Tawas Area Braves dropped a 4-2 decision to Harrisville last Friday, ending their winning streak at five straight victories. The game was played at the Tawas City Athletic Field.

Harrisville took advantage of weak fielding in Tawas' outfield in the second and third innings to score two unearned runs. The Harrisville nine combined two walks and two hits in the fifth stanza to score their final two runs.

The Braves sent one run over the plate in the opening frame, when Durant lead off with a single, advanced to second on Landon's sacrifice and scored on a single by DeLosh.

The final score for the Braves came in the sixth inning when Landon tripled and later scored on a single by Anschutz. Art Anschutz pitched the entire seven innings for Tawas and was nipped for five hits by Harrisville.

The Braves collected six hits off the slants of the Harrisville pitcher, including two each by Landon and Anschutz.

This afternoon (Friday) the Braves will play Hale at the local athletic field.

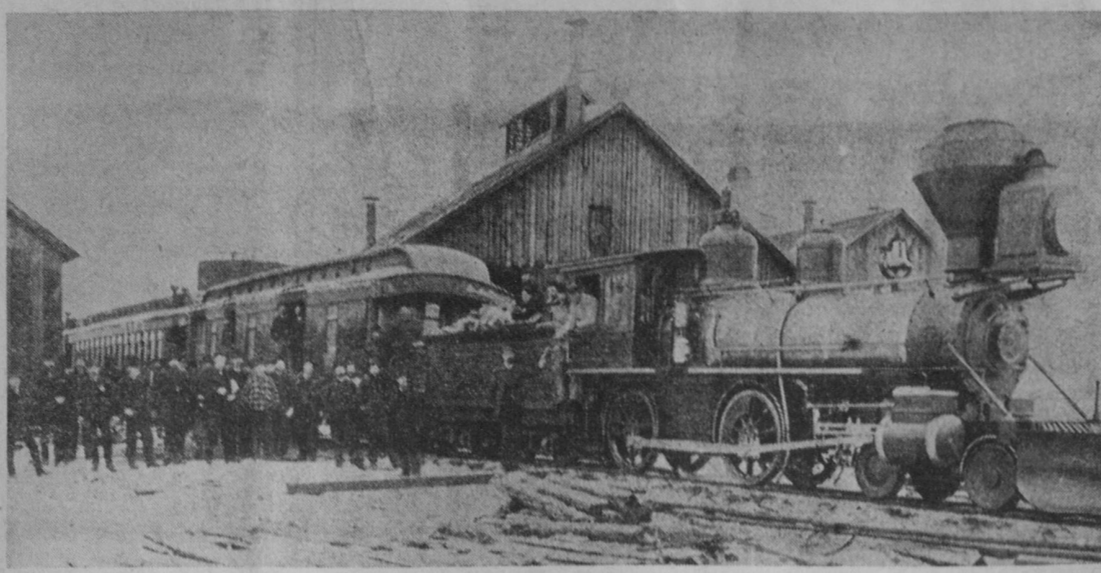

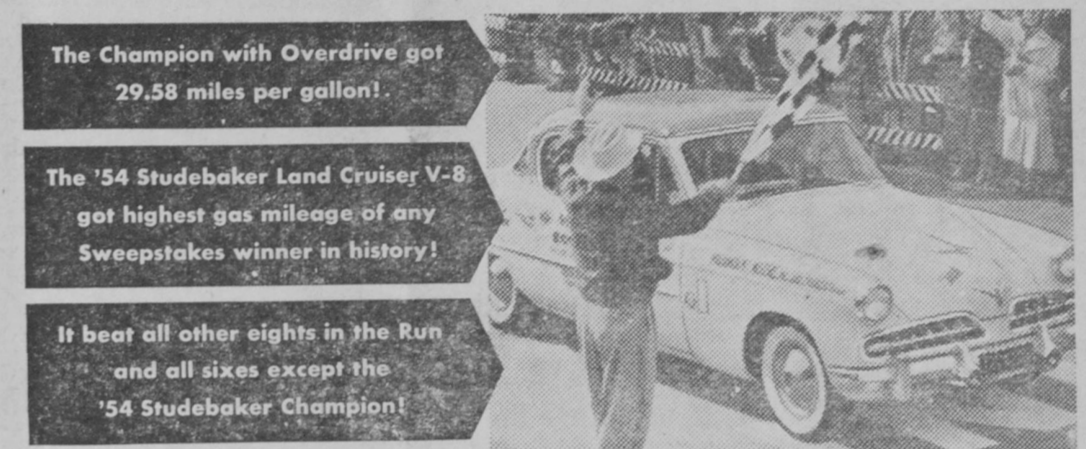

Agricultural Notes

In a recent visit to Philip Watts' farm, I learned his lambing crop was 200 percent, three sets of twins. Of course, Philip would like to have his ewes complete lambing with 200 percent lambing, but that's expecting quite a bit. Yet I know that Philip and all other sheep raisers can help to keep the lambs they do get with the right kind of parasite control program. The time to start (if you haven't already) is right now. Our local elevators, farm stores and drug stores have an ample supply of phenothiazine that should be mixed at the rate of one pound of phenothiazine to 12-14 pounds of salt. Use a trace of mineral salt containing iodine and cobalt. This should be kept before the flock during the grazing season, at all times. Keep it in a box protected from the weather. After the ewes have lambed a phenothiazine drench for the ewes before they are turned out to pasture would be advisable.

The Britts have their grain drill equipped to band seed the legumes. I have been working with them in setting out some Birdsfoot Trefoil and alfalfa plots. There will be three varieties of seeds introduced to Isoco county that have never been grown here before to my knowledge.

It sure is a picture to see Waldo Curry's beef cattle feeding on grass silage out of his new silo and feed manger. Waldo has it so constructed that he can cart the silage down the concrete manger to his dairy barn and subsequently to the cows. The idea fulfills Waldo's need for extra and efficient feeding space.

Isoco county farmers who have trouble growing corn for silage can use an oat-pea silage most satisfactorily. Three research specialists at Michigan State College have found that peas and oats make good silage in odor, looks and acidity. Cows ate oat-pea silage "with relish" but did not eat as much of it when they had no hay-and-grain ration.

Tests were made by Dr. Carl Huffman, dairymen; Dr. Steven T. Dexter, farm cropman, and Dr. C. W. Duncan, agricultural chemist. The tested silage came from a field sowed with a bushel of oats and a bushel of peas per acre. It was harvested when oats were in the late-milk or early-dough stage and pea pods were three-fourths developed. Milk production stayed up when oat-pea silage replaced hay and grain rations.

I'd like to hear from some of our farm folks who have used this mixture or are planning to use it. Drop me a line, will you?

District Gets New Conservationist

The United States Soil Conservation Service has transferred Dale Rosenquist, conservation aid, from Bay county to Isoco county to aid Gordon Hatch, local soil conservationist, in the work being done in the Isoco Conservation District. Rosenquist has been employed in the Bay County Soil Conservation District for the past two years, working with farmers on tile layout and other drainage and conservation problems. Previous to working with the soil conservation service he was employed by the Fish Division of the Department of Conservation on the Rifle river project in Ogemaw county. "His experience and training will be valuable to the local district," states Hatch, "and is needed in this area." Rosenquist built an eight acre artificial pond on his own farm near Lupton and has it stocked with fish. "He is the man to see if you are contemplating the building of a pond," said Hatch. His headquarters will be in the Soil Conservation Office at the Federal Building, East Tawas.

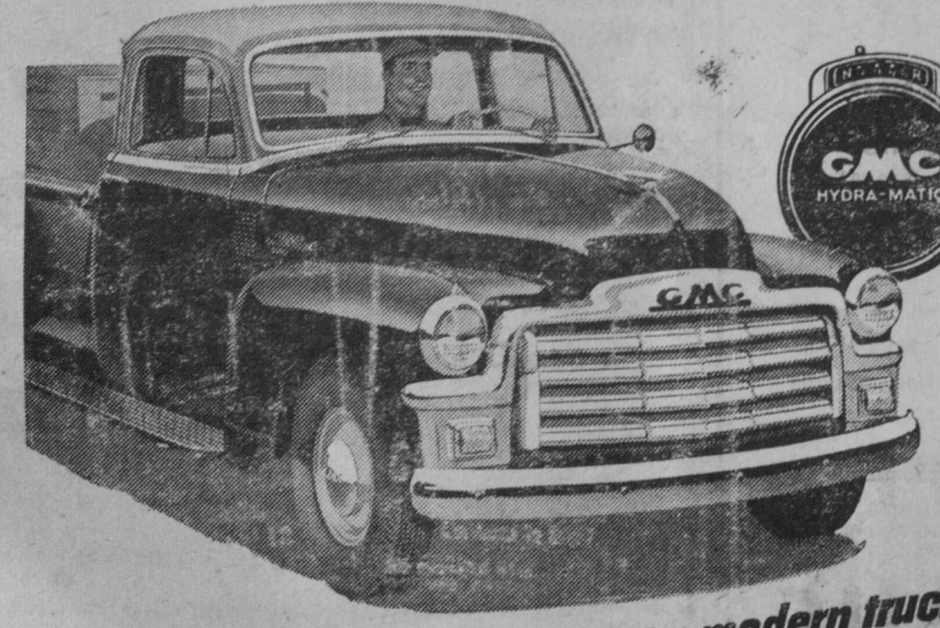

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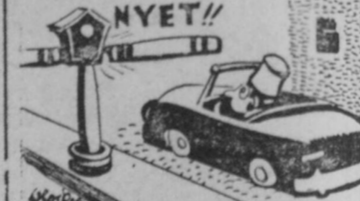

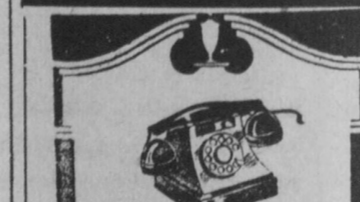
