Another Chance to Vote on New School

The opinion of Mills Wilbur of the Michigan Department of Public Instruction, expressed at the meeting of the Tawas Area Board of Education on May 4, paved the way for the board's decison to re-submit the issue of the Proposed Tawas Area Junior and Senior High School to be constructed on the Neumann-Reinke site, to the qualified voters of the school district. Wilbur, who had spent the day making field inspections of the Neumann-Reinke site, the Fairground-Nursery site and other potential sites, outlined the qualities of the Neumann-Reinke and the Fairground-Nursery site. He stated, "I feel the Neumann-Reinke site is preferable."

Wilbur had been called in as an impartial authority to aid in clarifying the controversary over the selection of a site for the proposed school. The Neumann-Reinke site, which was chosen by members of the board of education following months of study by the site committee, composed of citizens from all sections of the newly re-organized school district; architects, engineers, and Michigan Department of Public Instruction officials, was opposed by a small group of individuals known as the Citizens Committee for Better Schools which favored the Fairgrounds-Nursery site.

Soon the electors of the school district will have another opportunity to express their willingness to provide adequate school facilities for the children of the district. The defeat of the proposals on February 8 has been costly from the time standpoint. Let's avoid additional costly delays. Exercise your right to vote.

The Crucial Polio Test

In the last few weeks American newspapers have told the story of thousands of youngsters being innoculated with the new Salk polio vaccine. School children by the thousands have lined up in a number of states to receive the injections and, in a few months, the world will probably know whether this vaccine will fulfill the promise expected from it.

Those who have made great claims for the Salk serum refuse to predict the outcome of the test and rather say the test will prove or disapprove the value of the serum. In spite of this official comment, there is guarded optimism in the medical profession over the respective results in these tests, and the results will naturally be watched with great interest

If the results are what is hoped for, then 1954 might be the last year polio gets in its heavy licks against an unarmed youth in the United States. The Salk vaccine is relatively inexpensive, is capable of being produced in quantity and if it proves effective in innoculation against polio, it will be generally used by 1955.



Despite efforts to control the Michigan deer herd by the adoption of special seasons permitting the shooting of antlerless animals, something's gone wrong with our planning. Hungry deer in Alpena and Alcona counties are moving out of their browsed-out forest habitat and into the surrounding farms now turning green with budding cherry trees and fresh sprouts of tender leaves on the strawberry plants.

Naturally, with only a few deer shot in huge tracts of land the herd has grown rapidly, over-browsed much of their natural food, and in hungry desperation moved to the fertile farm lands adjoining.

Feeding Urged

The clubs have been urging the Conservation Department to adopt a widespread feeding program. But this is definitely against department

impossible. And so the killing by permit must continue, 'though its effect on the vast numbers in the herd will be negligible. A threeway get-together and possible compromise is now being attempted involving the Department, club representatives and the farmers. 


