Harlow O. Whittemore Will be Centennial Guest of Honor

University Professor Great Grandson of City's Founder

In a letter to the Centennial Committee this week, Harlow O. Whittemore accepted an invitation to be guest speaker and guest of honor at the "Gideon O. Whittemore Dinner." The banquet will be held at the Barnes Hotel Saturday evening, June 26.

In accepting the invitation, Mr. Whittemore states, "I feel greatly honored in being asked to be the guest speaker at the Centennial Dinner, and I take it as an honor to my great grandfather, Gideon O. Whittemore."

Tawas City was founded in 1853 by Gideon O. Whittemore, and in 1854 he brought the first pioneer settlers here by ship. He was an important figure in early Michigan history, having founded the city of Pontiac, served as secretary of state and was instrumental in the founding of the University of Michigan at Ann Arbor and Michigan State College at East Lansing.

As guest speaker, Mr. Whittemore will outline his great grandfather's activities prior to founding Tawas City and happenings in Tawas City from 1839 to 1909 when he resided here. He will also speak about the future of the small city with particular reference to Tawas City.

This week the Centennial Committee approved Jack Davis of Bay City to decorate the city for the coming celebration. Anyone wishing his business place decorated will be contacted sometime during the week prior to the Centennial.

Daniel G. Miller will give the valedictory address, while Richard J. Aulerich will give the salutatory.



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Win First Home Game in Eleventh

An 11th inning single by Gary Humphrey, shortstop for the Tawas City Independents, scored the winning run Sunday as Tawas defeated West Branch, 5-4. The contest marked the first home game of the season for the locals.

The climax of the action packed, extra-inning game came in the bottom half of the 11th inning. With the score tied at 4-4, Wayne Barnocky, snappy third sacker for the Indies, pounded out his second base hit of the game. He advanced to second base on a perfect sacrifice hit by Russ Anschutz, setting the stage for Humphrey's run scoring single that broke up the ball game.

Tawas City's right handed pitcher, Merv Warner, and Kolb, southpaw for West Branch, hooked up in what looked to be a possible start of a pitcher's duel for the first two innings. Warner retired West Branch in order in the first inning while Kolb fanned the first five batters to face him.

The West Branch nine scored the initial run of the game in the second inning when Neubecker was safe on a fielder's choice. A single by Thompson and a Tawas City fielding error allowed Neubecker to score.

A long triple by Ostrander and a Tawas City fielding error accounted for the second run of the game by West Branch.

In the bottom half of the third inning, Tawas City scored two runs to knot the score. A single apiece by Lorenz and Barnocky, two walks and a hit batsman accounted for the runs.

In the fifth inning Tawas City scored one run to break the tie. The locals scored one run in the seventh inning without the benefit of a hit to register a 4-2 lead.

In the eighth inning West Branch pushed two runs across the plate to tie up the ball game. Two fielding errors and a double accounted for the runs. The ball game remained at a 4-4 tie score until the 11th inning when the locals pushed the winning run across the plate.

In posting his first win of the season against one defeat, Warner scattered seven hits to West Branch while issuing no bases.


Following are the zones and days for sprinkling in the city:

Expect All-Time Auto Traffic High

With Memorial week-end travel expected to reach an all time high for that holiday, State Police Commissioner Joseph A. Childs has issued a warning that the increase in highway accidents since the first of the year indicates what drivers may expect unless they observe every safety precaution.

He also reminded that past days of all State Police officers, including detective and others on special assignment, have been canceled from Friday to Monday, inclusive, to use the full strength of the department on traffic law enforcement. It will be the equivalent of a 20 percent addition of officers assigned to patrol activity.

"Accidents during the first three months of this year increased 14 percent over the same period in 1953," Childs said. "There has also been an increase in travel which, given good weather, indicates that Memorial holiday traffic will be the heaviest on record for that week-end. This means a much greater exposure to accidents."

"We are going to do everything possible to assure the safety of careful drivers by canceling pass days and using every available man on traffic law enforcement to apprehend those who are or may endanger others by their recklessness. And we are following a policy of strict and rigid enforcement. But police can't do it all. The primary responsibility is the driver's to use common sense and avoid bloodshed and tragedy. We hope that they do."
