Dr. Schmittle says that the easy methods of vaccination may revolutionize the process. But, he adds, only widespread use will tell how they compare with the present individual bird handling methods.

When frost hits, farmers should be ready to put up corn silage on short notice. That's the advice from Steve Dexterm, Michigan State farm crops specialist.

He says some of the best silage is put up the morning after frost hits the fields. If corn is not fully dented and hardening up so it has a chance to get down to 25 percent moisture by harvest time, Dexter believes, you had better plan for silage. If corn reaches the hard dough stage, with most of the kernels starting to dent—that is at about 45 to 50 percent moisture—it is 45 to 50 percent moisture—it is ready for silage. If corn doesn't reach this point itself, frost may help it get there over-night.

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
