## Anticipate Large Iosco County Vote at Next Tuesday's General Election

With two county party slates on the ballot for the first time in many years, it is expected that next Tuesday's election will bring out a large number of voters, both Republicans and Democrats.

In anticipation of a large vote, County Clerk George A. Prescott had 6,500 sets of ballots prepared for the election. Nearly 3,100 Iosco County people voted at the 1952 general election. This was an all-time record vote and brought out 90 percent of the qualified voters.

In naming the Republican county ticket is William R. Barber for prosecuting attorney. He is unopposed. Barber, a lawyer with many years experience, has practiced law in the county for the past eight years, and previously had served at various times as prosecuting attorney in Alcona County.

The other county office candidates on the Republican ticket need no introduction. Each one is experienced in the office and has given a number of years of efficient service.

They are: Ivan O'Farrell, sheriff; George A. Prescott, clerk; Grace L. Miller, treasurer; Albert H. Buch, register of deeds; Richard E. Elliott, train commissioner; Carl H. Small, surveyor; and E. D. Jacques and E. John Moffatt, coroners.

Special interest will be taken by Iosco County electors in the vote for the member of the state legislature. Iosco county's candidate, James P. Mielock, on the Republican ticket, is opposed by John J. Mack, Democrat of Alpena.

Charles T. Prescott, candidate for re-election on the Republican ticket for state senator is unopposed.

William J. Kelly, veteran Democratic candidate for congress, is opposing Elford A. Cederberg, the present incumbent. Kelly has made eight unsuccessful bids for the office. Both men are from Bay City. Cederberg is a candidate for a second term.

A thorn in the side of Michigan Republicans is Democrat G. Mennen Williams, candidate (See ELECTION, Back Page)

### DEMOCRATIC CHAIRMAN INTRODUCES CANDIDATES

Tuesday's election will be the first opportunity in 12 years that Iosco voters can vote for a Democratic county ticket, it was announced this week by County Chairman Wilbur C. Roach.

The Democratic candidate for sheriff is Robert A. Oates, 32, of Alabaster, a veteran of four years in the United States Navy in World War II, Oates is now a farmer in Alabaster where he was born.

He has been a member of the Iosco County Production and Marketing Committee for four years, four of them as vice chairman. An elected member of the Iosco County Soil Conservation Committee, Oates is also a member of the Farmers Home Administration of Iosco County.

A graduate of the Alabaster high school, Oates also attended the Veteran's Agricultural School at Hale for four years. He is a member of the Jesse Hodder American Legion Post in Tawas City.

Lionel D. Wesenick, 41, Reno Township, is the Democratic candidate for Iosco County Clerk. Wesenick, born in Iosco County, is a farmer and machinist presently employed by the Precision Manufacturing Company at West Branch. He has been a member of the Reno District No. 2 school board for the past 18 years. Married and the father of four children, Wesenick is at present assisting in the formation of the Farm Union in Iosco County.

The Democratic candidate for county treasurer is William S. Sheffer, 45, of Burleigh Township. Born in Ogemaw County, Sheffer has been a resident of Burleigh Township for the past 18 years. After farming for a number of years, physical disability has kept him from farming. (See DEMOCRATS, Back Page)

Representatives of 10 communities heard Dr. Howard Y. McClusky, professor of educational psychology of the University of Michigan, speak at Hale last Monday evening, during his 35th conference.

The university sponsored community conference met at the Plainfield Township Rural Agricultural School at 3:00 p. m. for registration and coffee. This was followed by a discussion "Why We Are Here," by panelist Gordon Helmbold, superintendent of schools at Hale; Mrs. Aaron Schick, school board member of Rose City; Miss Gregg of Sterling; E. L. Dow, superintendent of schools at Sterling, and Dr. Clifford Larsen, consultant in adult education, University of Michigan Extension Service.

A film, "The Tale of Two Towns" and a discussion period closed the first session. Members of the conference were served a 6 o'clock dinner by the American Legion Ladies Auxiliary. They were entertained by selections by the Plainfield Glee Club to open the evening meeting in the school gymnasium.

Gordon Helmbold, chairman of the community council, conducted the dinner program consisting of group singing, welcoming of delegates from Tawas, Hale, Rose City, Sterling, Standish, West Branch, Omer Twining, Turner and Oscoda by Dennis Chrvia, president of Plainfield Board of Education, and Doctor McClusky's address which outlined scientific methods for attaining successful community leadership and management through faith and good will.

In addition to the theatre at East Tawas, Mr. Berube established the Star Theatre at Tawas City in 1912. He constructed a new theatre building here in 1925 and a few years later disposed of the business and property to Miles Main.

The building is now occupied by the Immaculate Heart of Mary Church.

### Construction Started on New Bell Telephone Office Building

The first step in bringing dial telephone service to Tawas has been taken by the Michigan Bell Telephone Company.

Construction of a new central office building to house the dial switching equipment is now under way. Located on Tawas Street, the new structure will measure 58 feet by 50 feet and will be of brick and masonry construction.

General contractor for the building is the Arthur Vollmer Construction Company of Saginaw.

T. C. Maher, area manager for Michigan Bell, said the building is scheduled for completion in January and that the long, painstaking job of installing the intricate automatic switching equipment would get under way at that time. No date has been set for the actual changeover to dial as yet, Maher said.

Cost of the entire dial project here, the manager said, would be about \$490,000.

## Injects Third Site Into Controversial Area School Issue

A third site possibility was cast into the controversial site issue that many taxpayers had contacted himself, as well as other members of the board, demanding that the site now occupied by the Tawas Area Schools in Tawas City be considered.

Board of education president, Randall M. Fox, told the members that many taxpayers had contacted himself, as well as other members of the board, demanding that the site now occupied by the Tawas Area Schools in Tawas City be considered.

No action was taken by the board on this latest move. A discussion followed by the members.

Fox said that this site had always remained in the background due to the fact that the board members thought it was too small in size for the proposed new school.

"However, it was the belief of those who supported the school site in Tawas City," Fox stated, "that if an endorsement from the board for the fairground acreage would meet the needs, then the Tawas City site would meet the needs, inasmuch as there are approximately 28 acres available belonging to the City of Tawas City and the Tawas Area School District.

It was pointed out that there are 23 acres of land leveled and cleared, with sewer and water facilities on the property. All of this land is free to the school district and immediately available.

The president of the board of education said that the endeavors of the board which would attempt to acquire the fairgrounds property has brought forth increased interest in the school again.

The board authorized efforts to acquire the Beal Nursery or fairgrounds property for a tentative school site at a special meeting last week. Congressman Elford A. Cederberg will attempt to secure the land for the district.

Preliminary investigations have shown the Tawas City site to have a sand over clay base which is desirable for construction purposes, so the persons interested in this site indicate. The gymnasium on the property is approximately the size of the Oscoda gymnasium.

Taxpayers of the area who contacted members of the board thought the present gymnasium would be satisfactory in an educational system and that the combination of free property and existing facilities would cut the cost of the proposed new school in half, with no sacrifice in educational facilities.

Mr. Fox said that the proposal by the taxpayers interested in the school site is being given preliminary consideration. (See THIRD SITE, Back Page)

## TUESDAY IS ELECTION DAY

Tuesday, November 2, is election day for the qualified electors of the state. On that date you will have an opportunity to voice your opinion in the selection of the candidates to fill state and county offices. In addition to the filling of these offices, four proposed amendments to the state constitution will be placed before you, the qualified electors of the state, for approval or disapproval. Read and study them carefully—they are important to the welfare of all of us.

On Tuesday, for the first time in many years, the qualified electors of Iosco County will be confronted with a two party ballot for electing candidates to fill county offices. Because of this and the fact that a number of electors lose their votes at every election because of improper marking of ballots, let us review these simple instructions to voters which appear at the top of every ballot.

To vote a straight party ticket make a cross (X) in the circle under the name of your party. Nothing further need be done. To vote for a candidate not on your party ticket make a cross (X) in the square  before his name.

If two or more candidates are to be elected to the same office and you desire to vote for candidates not on your party ticket, make a cross (X) in the square  before the names of the candidates for whom you desire to vote on the other ticket, and strike out an equal number of names on your party ticket, for that office.

If you do not desire to vote any party ticket, do not make a cross (X) in the circle at the head of any ticket, but make a cross (X) in the square  before the name of each candidate for whom you desire to vote.

If you wish to vote for a candidate not on any ticket, write or place the name of such candidate on your ticket opposite the name of the office.

Before leaving the booth, fold the ballot so that the initials of the inspector may be seen on the outside.

Your right to vote has been protected and defended by American servicemen for many generations. Respect their sacrifices by exercising your great democratic privilege—**VOTE ON TUESDAY!**

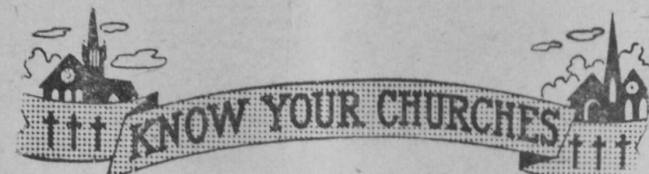

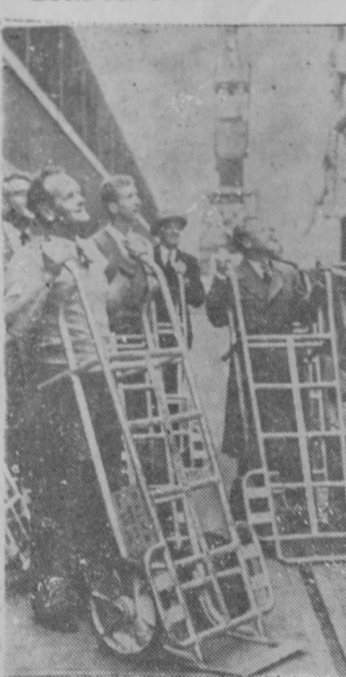

**The SNAPSHOT GUILD**

Shooting from the ant's eye view lends charm to this picture by emphasizing the height, the smallness of the kitten, and utilizing the sky as a good neutral background.

**Whose Point of View—the Bird's or the Ant's?**  
Let's stop to consider the point of view we usually take when we line up a picture in the viewfinder. At least nine times out of ten, we shoot the subject straight on. Many times this is the best way to do it, but if we let ourselves get in the habit of doing it all the time, our snapshots can get pretty monotonous.  
Look at your subject from various angles . . . think what your subject might look like to an ant who is sizing it from his point of view at a picnic spread on the ground. Then go to the opposite extreme and imagine what your subject might look like to a bird sitting in a tree.  
Of course, there may be points in between where the view is better, but don't hesitate to take a look from angles just that extreme. After all, you are only looking in the viewfinder, and that doesn't cost a thing.  
Looking up, or down, on your subject often times helps you achieve the very desirable neutral background that may be impossible otherwise. When you look at a subject from a straightforward point of view and find that the background is cluttered, try a high or low angle. It is amazing what one or the other may be able to do to improve the situation.  
In outdoor shots, the ant's eye view can give you a nice sky background, while the bird's eye view can provide the plainness of a grassy lawn or the stoniness of a terrace to help your subject stand out. Indoors, the upward view gives a wall and ceiling background which may be desirable, and the downward look through the viewfinder gives the neutral background of floor or carpet to your picture.  
Don't do all your shooting at your eye level—try seeing how your picture would come out at the level of other eyes.

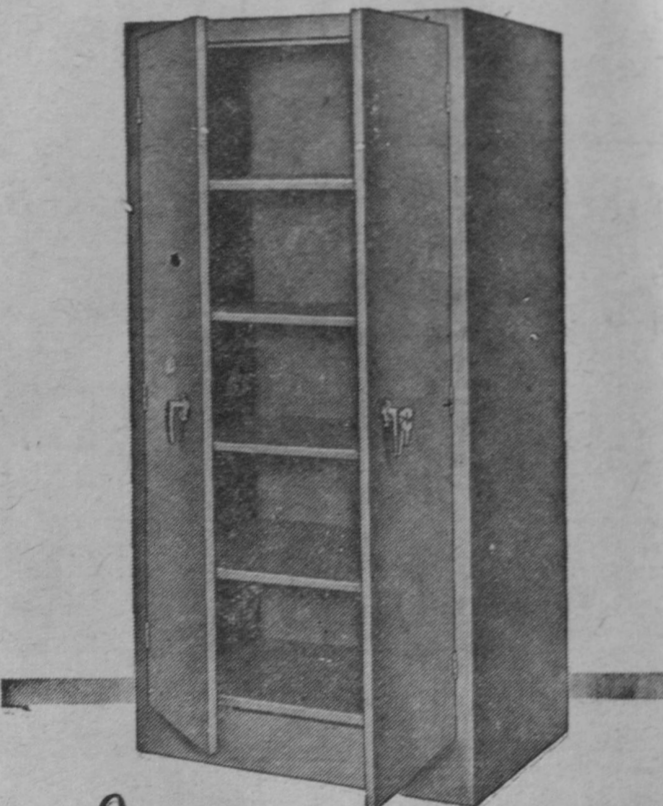

Children select the reading at will, their aim being to discover for themselves an absorbing hobby or even a vocation.

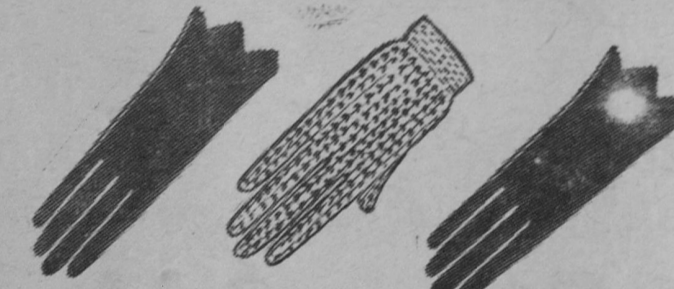

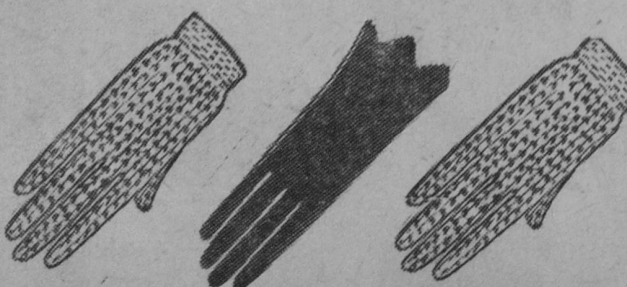

We are very proud of three Iosco fellows. Ross Williams won himself Cawklin's Scholarship for his second year at Michigan State College. While Elbert Barnes is the recipient of this year's scholarship sponsored by the Peoples State Bank of East Tawas. Both of these fellows will be joined by another outstanding 4-H'er in the person of Robert Douglass of Hale. All three of these young men are to be congratulated for their past accomplishments and our best wishes for a bright future.

Are you pasturing your frosted alfalfa? Here are some tips from James Hays, Michigan State College dairy specialist. He says that scientists indicate no difference in bloat of cattle from frosted or unfrosted pastures. However, he adds that it is a good idea to have a rough dry feed like straw or hay available right in the pasture. This rough feed will help act as a bloat preventative.

Gordon Hatch and yours truly have scheduled another soil sampling demonstration for Monday, November 1, at the several farms. Iosco's Soil Conservation District members, the A.S.C. office and Extension Service have cooperatively planned this project to help our farmers save fertilizer and crop dollars. Every farmer in the county should attend one of these demonstrations. We are trying our best to stick some dollar bills in your pocket, but you've got to be at one of the demonstrations to get them! Here is the schedule for Monday, November 1, at the 10:30 a. m., Lester Robinson; 10:30 a. m. until noon, Royden Parkinson; 1:00 p. m. to 2:30, Clayton Johnson; 2:30 until 4:00 p. m., George Lake. Pick out one that you can attend. Arnold Loomis, Hale High School vocational agricultural instructor, plans using one for his vocational agricultural soils class.

Here is another way to save money—don't forget your stored grain, especially during warm, damp fall days. Ray Janes, extension entomologist, warns that early fall can be the time for great insect damage to stored grain. Fumigation is the only method for controlling grain

storage insects, he says. But first, Janes recommends, check the upper portion of the grain to see if it's matted. If it is—treat that area carefully because damage is being done by moths. Some grain storers use a mixture of ethylene dichloride and carbon tetrachloride, and others use this same mixture with the addition of ethylene dibromide. Both are effective according to Janes, but they must be used strictly according to manufacturers' direction because the mixture can harm the person using it.

Do you share in the "hardware" bill of about a million dollars this year? If you have lost some cattle through "hardware disease" you have! Stray bits of wire, nails, bolts and similar bits of metal cause pneumonia and feed lots free of bits of hardware and occasionally checking feed for small pieces of metal. Special attention should be given to yards now that the winter feeding season is nearing.
