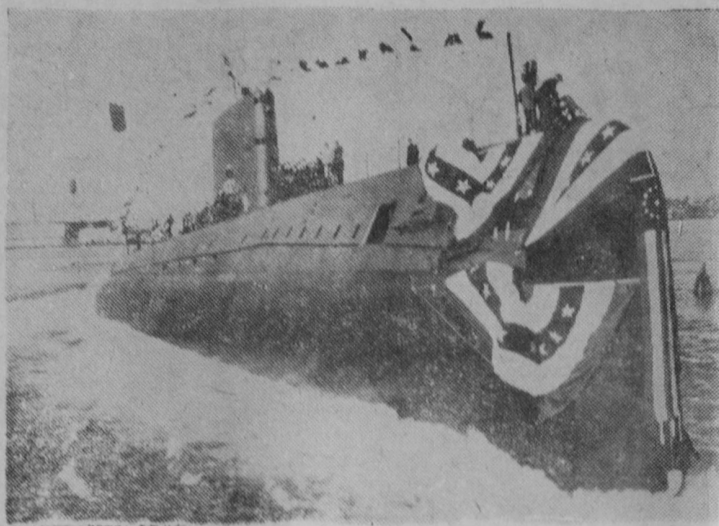

Room mothers were selected and committees for the year appointed. Election of a president and vice president will be held at the next meeting.

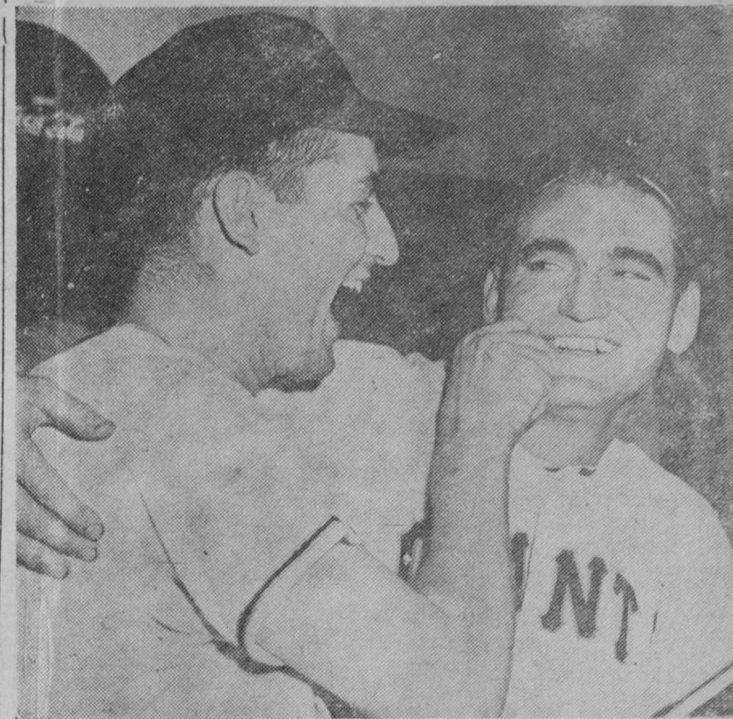

One of the biggest problems was how to plan for carrying each of these projects within a year, and yet not have more than two projects for any one child to attend at the same time. It takes some thought and juggling to work out a suitable arrangement, but it can be done, as these leaders will tell you.

We have talked, too, with Mrs. George Kindell about their 4-H Club's program for this next year. And, on October 5, we shall spend an evening with some of the leaders in Burleigh Wizards 4-H Club.

Within the next few weeks we hope to have visited with all the leaders who will be doing 4-H Club teaching this fall. Won't you let us know when you are ready to begin?

Mrs. Roy Atkinson and Harold Hammond accompanied us to the training school for 4-H Club leaders at Gaylord last week. Mr. Hammond says he has picked up a number of good ideas to share with leaders of electrical projects this fall or winter. Mrs. Atkinson says she sat in on the home improvement discussion and became interested in this project about which she did not know very much. She thinks the girls would like

to carry it if they knew more about it; so, why not ask her to tell you about it?

Clothing leaders liked the store tour arranged for them. We thought it was a good idea, too, and wonder if our clothing leaders would like to do that together sometime before beginning their clothing projects.

Leaders in the conservation group believe 4-H Club members, both boys and girls, are missing some wonderful opportunities to learn and to win recognition and trips by not carrying a conservation project each year. Improvements Contemplated for losco Farms

Recent visits to my office indicate a lot of "new looks" will be appearing on farms throughout the county.

Charles Timreck tells us that they plan on adding some new and more efficient dairy equipment to their farm.

When Merlin Perrine, dairy inspector, received a call from Alfred Guano, we knew another milk house was being planned. Alfred had received a copy of our new milk house bulletin Extension No. 325 and some helpful hints from Mr. Perrine in regard to location and construction of a milk house.

Are you planning to consign a bred heifer to the August 1955 dairy cooperative sale at West Branch? This sale is designed to offer good replacement stock for our big dairy herds and for those dairymen wanting to expand their dairy operations. A word to the wise is sufficient. Competition for the next year's sale is keen. A nearby county that has consigned but very few, now has 50 animals being prepared for the sale. Not more than 60 dairy characters. Hence, it looks as though a sifting committee, headed by Don Murray of Michigan State College Dairy Department, will have to cull out those heifers lacking growth, condition, breeding and dairy character. If you plan consigning to that sale, better start planning to have these heifers ready to freshen within a few weeks of the sale.

I've recently had some requests from farmers wanting to expand their herds. "Where can I buy some good heifers?" they'll ask. I couldn't think of a better place than West Branch on Thursday, October 21, at 1:00 p. m. when the Northeastern Michigan Hereford Calf Association conducts its annual calf sale. Members of the association have some of the finest herd sires in Michigan. Some of the heifers consigned are from those good sires. The calves are sold at auction and all bids are honored. Plan to attend.

How about our sheep raisers? They can participate in our lamb marketing pool on Wednesday, October 27, at West Branch. Lambs are graded and sold according to grade. Buyers in Detroit buy them at auction.

Here is a helpful hint from James Porter, soil scientist at Michigan State College. He says, "excellent for legume sods to be left for hay or hay pasture."

At our recent advisory board meeting at Grant Township Hall 10 of the 12 members were present, including: Warren Brit, Harold Hammond, Franklin Baschoff, Mrs. Marvin Davenport, Mrs. Sophie MacDonald, Mr. and Mrs. Harold Black, Glenn Long, Victor Anderson, and Lloyd Little.

This board acted upon the proposed agricultural demonstrations planned for 1956, as well as recommended the deletion of some and the continuing of others. All in all, they had a real view of the program for this year and next.

Their recommendations were taken to Twin Lakes Conference, and staff members commended our advisory board on the suggestions.

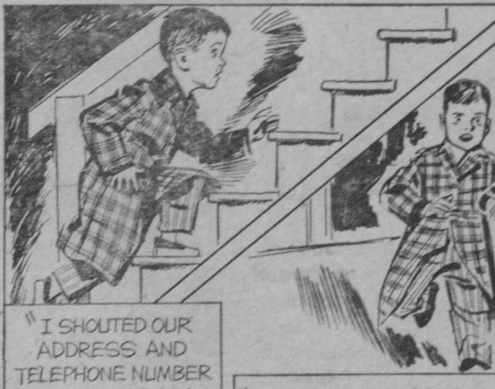
