



Three Veteran Railroadmen Retire at D.&M.

STARTS RAILDOAD CAREER IN 1899

When Anton L. "Tony" Anschuetz, superintendent of car service for the Detroit and Mackinac Railway, checked the contents of a southbound freight for the last time on Saturday, October 2, he ended a 55-year

October 2, he ended a 55-year railroading career.

A life-long resident of East Tawas and a second generation railroader, Tony started on the Detroit and Mackinac as a baggage checker at Tawas Branch station in 1899 during school vacation. He began full time work as a station helper and night ticket agent at the East Tawas station across from the Holland Hotel in August, 1902.

In 1907 he transferred to the In 1907 he transferred to the transportation department as a clerk under the late Charles A. Pinkerton Sr. He was appointed assistant chief clerk January 16, 1920, and was promoted to chief clerk to Mr. Pinkerton on March

1, 1920.

He assumed the official position of superintendent of car service on May 1, 1933.

Tony's father, the late John N. Anschuetz, was in the station service of the old Detroit, Bay City and Alpena Railway, handling mail and express as early as 1887. An old-timer remarked recently, "Tony is as conscientious and faithful as his father, who was well known by everywho was well known by every-one in East Tawas and the surrounding area as "Uncle John."

the railroading family is Tony's son, Norman, who is presently employed as chief clerk to the president and general manager of the D. and M.

Fire Prevention Week, which is observed in the first part of October of each year, ends on the tenth of October. This year-as in other years-we remind readers at a very appropriate time of the year—that most fires could be prevented by very negligible efforts in the way of carefulness.

Fire Chief Fred Musolf of Tawas City recently suggested seveal steps to be followed in case of fire. The first was evacuation, immediately, of every house in which fire

Next, do not open doors suddenly, if you suspect fire. Feel Using steel is a new idea in silo the doors first. If hot, block them with furniture or wet mattresses or cloth and keep out the smoke and gases-if circumstances warrant. Remember that breathing is better his market. near the floor, since smoke rises.

Hold your breath when you dash through smoke or flames. Do not jump from windows except as a desperate, last resort. Do not re-enter burning buildings, since gases and smoke often fell unsuspecting victims.

We commend these suggestions to our readers, although we have one piece of advice which we think is of equal importance. That is the exercise of caution in dealing with fire this fall. Despite this advice, some now reading this editorial will lose their homes in coming months. Be sure you are not
