
## **Arrangements Made for Federal** Farm Census

Appointment of Hans C. Rasmussen of Iris Road, Ludington, Michigan, as the supervisor of the 1954 census of Agriculture Field Office to be established at Ludington was announced today by Director Robert W. Burgess of the Bureau of the Census, Department of Commerce. Miss Helen C. Sergeson of 810 Diana Street, Ludington, has been named assistant supervisor.

Mr. Rasmussen will direct a force of 23 crew leaders and 205 enumerators in 36 Michigan enumerators in 50 michigan counties from the Ludington of-fice. Counties to be covered from Ludington include Alcona, Alpena, Antrim, Arenac, Bay, from Ludington include Alcona, Alpena, Antrim, Arenac, Bay, Benzie, Charlevoix, Cheboygan, Clare, Crawford, Emmet, Glad-win, Grand Traverse, Iosco, Is-abella, Kalkaska, Kent, Lake, Leelanau, Manistee, Mason, Mecosta, Midland, Missaukee, Montmorency, Muskegon, New-aygo, Oceana, Ogemaw, Osce-ola, Oscoda, Otsego, Ottawa, Presque Isle, Roscommon and Wexford.

Both Mr. Rasmussen and Miss Sergeson reported on August 23 to the permanent Census Bureau district office at Chicago for a week's training. The training covered administrative procedure, office routine, map work, practice in filling out farm census report forms and other duties and responsibilities connected with the job.

The 1954 Census of Agriculture will provide information on the number and size of farms, acreage and harvest of crops, livestock production and inven-tories, selected farm facilities and equipment, selected farm expenditures, farm values and mortgage debt.



Side and back filling may be started immediately upon completion of the joint. This joint consists of a coupling accurately machined on the inside to match the two degree taper machined on the end of each length of pipe. A block is placed over the end of the coupling which is driven on to the tapered end of the pipe with a few light blows. The heat generated by the friction of the coupling on the pipe causes it to fuse firmly against the shoulder of the pipe, providing a tight seal and a joint so strong that a straight line pull of hundreds of pounds is required to separate pipe and coupling. No special tools are required to separate pipe and coupling. No special This fusing of the pipe and coupling surface results in a permanently water-tight bond which prevents infiltration and leakage and which makes impossible the entry of roots into the pipe. These taper sleeve joints are so strong that several sections of L-M fibre pipe can be assembled on the ground before being installed.


