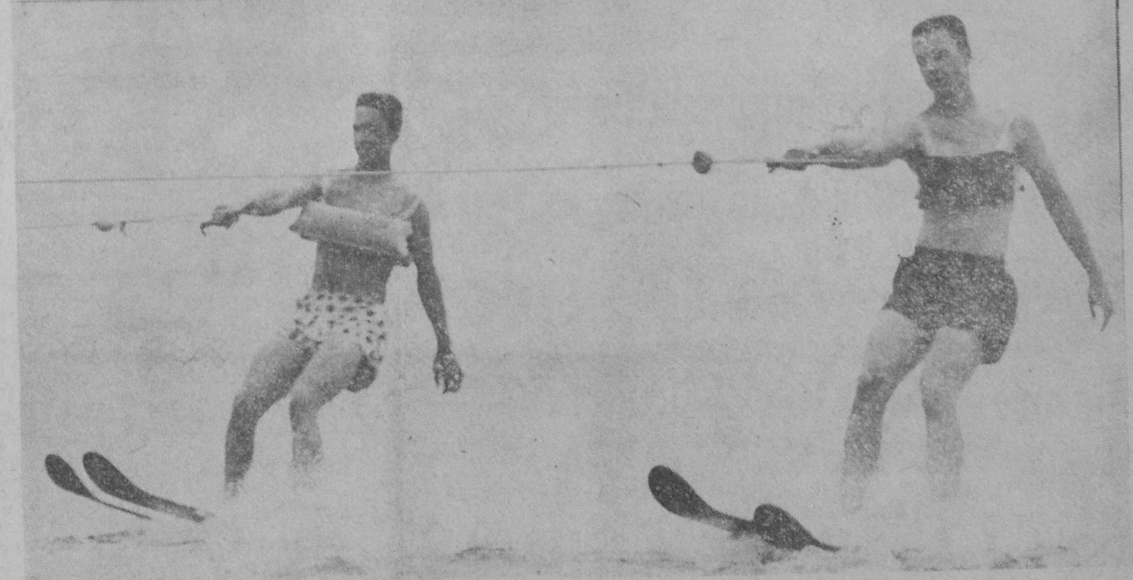

TEACH CHILDREN TO SWIM

If you are having trouble teaching your child to swim, you can breathe easier. The experts say it's easy. In fact, there is almost nothing to it.

Unfortunately, the experts are not teaching your child to swim and you will have to do the job yourself. So, this is how the experts say it can be done easiest.

First, familiarize the child with the water and encourage him to duck under water.

Second, teach him how to kick his legs, by providing him support for his arms, or by holding him firmly at the shoulders.

Third, let him kick his way in the water, as you walk beside him, holding his so he will not go down, but leaving his face under water with his arms straight in front of him.

Fourth, show him how to use his arms, while he kicks at the same time. You can do this on a bench, with the child laying stomach down.

The final step is to take him into the water, letting him use both his hands and legs as you hold him at the waist, while he practices swimming.

By the way, the experts say your child cannot swim if he is thrown off a diving board, or pier, into deep water. Unlike a dog, the child will not swim—he will drown.

Now that the wheat is harvested, it is time to think of planting it again. Many farmers every year ask about the Hessian fly-free date. For Iosco County, sowing wheat after September 7, should help the farmer to control damage to wheat by the Hessian fly.

It is well to avoid, if possible, planting wheat following a crop of wheat, rye or winter barley. If you must plant wheat following these crops, delay sowing another 10 days (or September 17).

When preparing the seed bed for wheat avoid those practices that leave the soil vulnerable to wheat exposed. Turning down the stubble is very important.

Lamb and sheep raisers, don't forget that Friday, August 19, is the last day you can vote on the proposed agreement between the United States Secretary of Agriculture and the American Sheep Producers' Council, Incorporated. If approved, the agreement would provide for the deduction of one cent per pound of the incentive payment to be received by the grower. This deduction would provide a fund estimated at two million dollars annually for the promotion of lamb and wool.

All growers, who owned one or more sheep six months old or older for a consecutive 30-day period since January 1, 1955, are eligible to vote. This referendum is provided under section 708 of the National Wool Act of 1954, commonly known as the "self help" section.

The voting is being conducted by Mary Byrd, Iosco County ASC office manager.

Growers who have not received a ballot may secure one at her office. To be valid, ballots must be mailed and post marked or delivered not later than August 19 to the Iosco County ASC office in the Federal Building, East Tawas.

One of the biggest changes proposed in the dairy industry for the next few years is the switch to bulk milk handling. Several dairies in the state have already gone completely over to bulk handling and many more are planning to change in the near future. Bulk handling equipment is a major investment for both the farmer and the creamery, and so it is a good idea to find out the why's and where-fores of the situation before taking the plunge. Donald Murray, dairy extension specialist at Michigan State University, has investigated the situation.

He says that there are two reasons for the change. The first is that, in the long run, bulk handling saves money. The second is that it produces a higher quality product.

Bulk handling saves money by reducing milk losses, hauling charges and can costs. It also reduces the amount of labor needed, both on the farm and at the dairy, and that is very important in these times of high labor costs. Tests show that the bulk system will save 10 to 15 cents per 100 over a 10-year period.

The bulk system definitely does produce better-quality milk; often the increase in quality is great enough to warrant a bonus payment to the farmer with a bulk tank.

The bulk milk handling system is more efficient than the old way. In these times only the most efficient farmers are going to make money, and the whole industry must give the public the best product possible for the least money in order to keep its market. Mr. Murray says that bulk handling is a step in that direction.

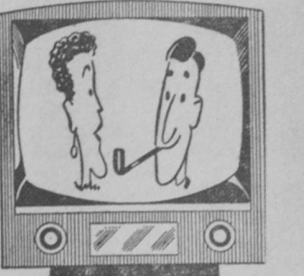

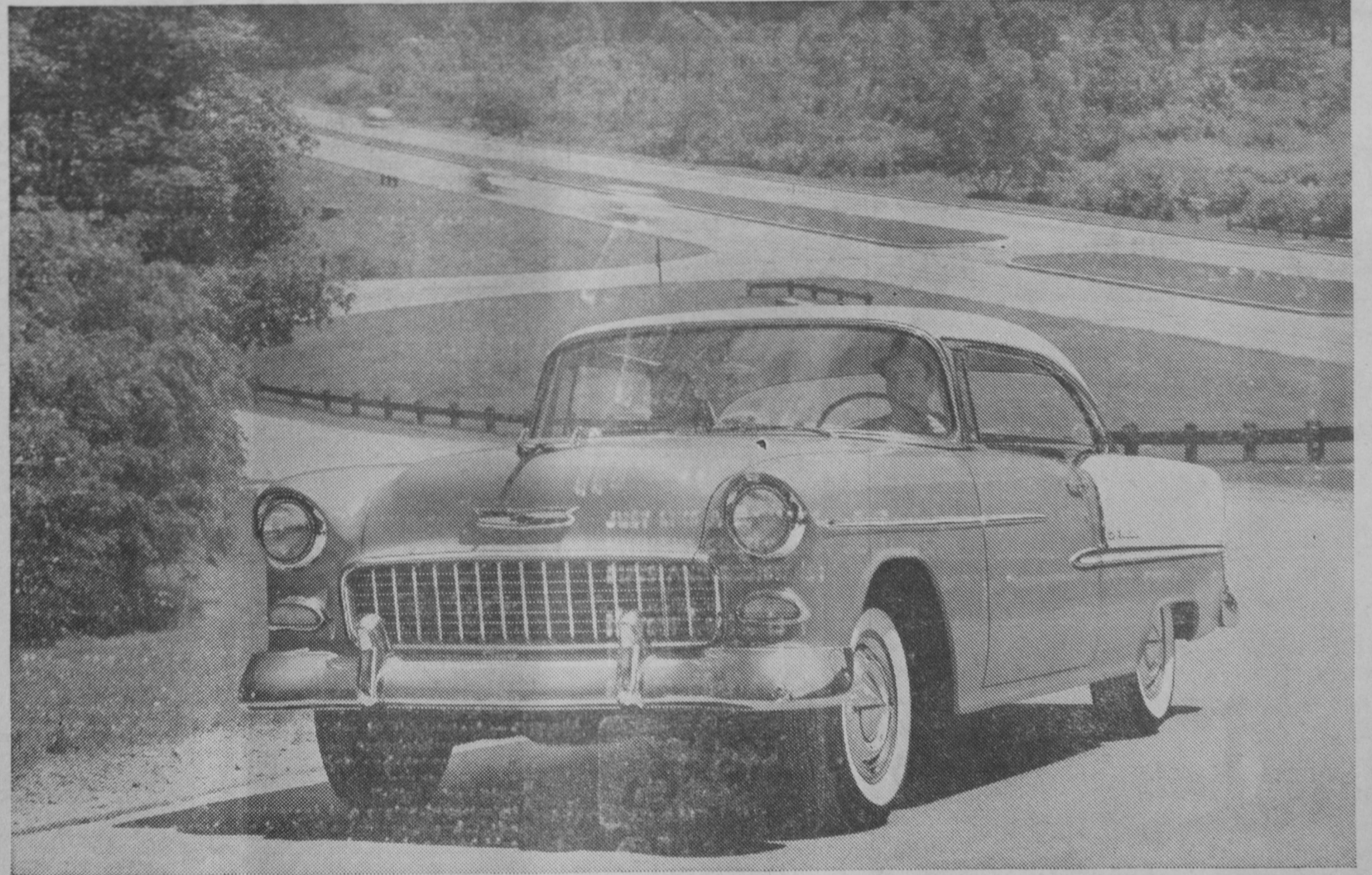
