3,600 Iosco Youngsters Set for School Opening

Over 1,000 Increase in Past 10 Years

Some 3,600 youngsters of elementary and high school age in Iosco County will return to their classrooms from September 6 to 8, the official opening for most schools in the county. Prior to the students' return, after a three-month summer vacation, schools will already have been rejuvenated in a fall housecleaning and faculty members will be set to take charge of instruction for another school year.

According to statistics released Tuesday by County Superintendent Russell A. Rollin, there are 3,668 youngsters in Iosco County who are of school age. This figure, compiled in a recent school census, is an increase of 161 students over that of 1954. In 1945 the Iosco County school census total was 2,337 pupils.

According to the census released by Mr. Rollin's office, there is a noticeable increase in children of pre-school age. This year there are 1,509 children between the ages of four and five. This is an increase of 196 children over the 1954 total.

Children are eligible to enter school in cases where the school has a kindergarten, if they reach the age of five years before December 1, stated Mr. Rollin. This probably will result in an increase in the total number of students.

Opening day of school in most cases will be devoted to registration of students, class scheduling, bus scheduling and teachers' meetings.

School will open officially at Tawas Area on Tuesday, September 6, with teachers' planning meetings. All elementary pupils will come in on Wednesday for regular sessions at the same time as last year. In the high school division, freshmen and sophomores will come in on Wednesday while juniors and seniors will come in on Thursday.

Principal R. W. Butterfield will be in his office in the Tawas City unit from 9 to 12 and 1 to 3 o'clock, starting Monday, August 22 through September 2, for registration of high school students. Bus routes will be essentially the same as last year except that an additional route will be established on US-23, west of Tawas City.

Rural kindergarten pupils will again be picked up at noon and will attend afternoon sessions. Those kindergarten pupils in the Tawas Lake region will attend morning sessions.

The Vine Unit will be open for first and second grade pupils of Tawas and Grant Townships. The Waits Unit will accommodate third and fourth grades only from that same area.

Classes for the city pupils in high school who can arrange their schedule will begin at 8:00 a. m. Pupils attending at 8 o'clock will be eligible for either (See School, back page.)

AuSable Marathon to be Held September 3 and 4

The Ninth Annual Michigan Canoe Championship race is scheduled for September 3 and 4 down the AuSable River from Grayling to Oscoda. Starting time for this 240-mile non-stop marathon is 8:30 p. m. Saturday evening.

Record time for this gruelling race that includes six portages over dams is 17 hours and 27 minutes. In past years 40 to 80 canoeists have entered the race. Canoes must be standard round bottom models with two-man teams.

The Second Annual Junior Canoe Race for youngsters 12-15 years old will start at Foote Dam Pond at 11:00 a. m. Sunday running 23 miles down the AuSable to Oscoda.

Cash prizes totaling \$2,050, trophies and medals will be awarded race winners at the Oscoda finish line including \$1,000 first prize in the big race. Participating in the awarding of prizes are Fred A. Huber Jr., publicity director of the Detroit Red Wing Hockey Club, and Chuck Davey, Michigan boxer.

This annual event is staged under auspices of the Crawford

County Chamber of Commerce, Oscoda-AuSable Chamber of Commerce and the East Michigan Tourist Association.

LOCAL SAILORS ENTER INTERNATIONAL RACE

Among the four Lightning class sailboats which won the honor of representing the Michigan District in the International Lightening Regatta being held Labor Day week-end at the Southern Yacht Club, New Orleans, is the "Humbig III," owned by Saginaw sailors, Edward and William McKinley.

The McKinley brothers sail at the Tawas Yacht Club. They qualified for the championship regatta by finishing second out of 45 entries at Lake Leelanau, third at Higgins Lake and tied for fifth at St. Joseph, the first local boat ever to win its way to the big championship.

The third crew member is Tim Moulthrop, Bay City, also a summer resident of Tawas.

3 Formosan Foresters Kiwanis Guests

Three Formosan foresters, Nai-kun Pan, Hsioh-hsun Tsu and Foo-Hoo Liu, currently studying forestry operations in the United States, were guests of the Tawas Kiwanis Club at Tuesday's noon luncheon.

Arriving in this country two months ago, the Formosans will spend a year visiting various headquarters of the United States Forestry Service in order to get a cross-section of forestry techniques used in the United States.

During their visit to the Tawas Ranger District, headquarters at East Tawas, Harold Peterson, assistant forest ranger, will take the men on a tour of various plantings in the Huron National Forest. They will also view different selective cutting areas and pulpwood cutting operations.

The three foresters, who are representatives of the Chinese Nationalist government, told Kiwanis of their government's re-forestation project now in progress.

Explaining that Taiwan (Formosa) was in the sub-tropics, Mr. Pan told Kiwanis that the heavy rainfall in his country, about 100 inches per year, was very conducive to the growth of trees and such crops as rice, sugar cane and sweet potatoes. He said that in some instances trees grew as much as four feet in a year.

Timber from the country's mountainous interior is one of its principal exports to Japan and other Asian countries and the government is stressing to its people the need for improved soil and timber conservation practices.

Formosa, which has received world-wide attention in recent years as Nationalist China's dramatic last-ditch stand against Communism, is an island 200 miles long and 100 miles wide. It has a population of 8,000,000 people.

Mr. Tsu told the Kiwanis of the different species of trees which grow on the island and said that its long growing season enabled the farmers to grow a surplus of rice for export to other Asian countries.

The Nationalist government is stressing the importance of fire safety in forests. Mr. Tsu said that in several instances, fires were set intentionally in the mountains by the aborigines to clear land for farming or for hunting game. He said that his government was now conducting an educational program among the mountain people to curb such waste.

An interesting program of color slides was shown by Mr. Liu. The slides depicted tea picking operations, forest plantings and rural life. Also shown were slides of his family and scenic views.

The three men will leave East Tawas Friday to visit Huron National Forest headquarters at Cadillac and other points in Michigan.

East Tawas Pastor Wins in NEM Tennis Finals

The fire department plans to have stickers printed with the department phone number to be pasted on the cover of telephone books. "The number will be conspicuous and convenient in case of fire," stated Chief Musolf.

With the entrance of Alabaster Township into a fire protection agreement with Tawas Township and the City of Tawas City, home-owners in that area are assured of adequate protection.

During the past few years citizens of Alabaster Township have stressed the need of such an agreement to their township board and negotiations with Tawas Township and Tawas City were started earlier this summer.

Seven years ago Tawas Township purchased a new fire truck and entered into an agreement with the City of Tawas City for manning the truck. Tawas City's truck is used in a stand-by capacity in case of local calls.

Home Demonstration Council Meeting not far away.

The accomplishments of more than 2,000 of Michigan's 4-H Club boys and girls will be on parade at Michigan State University, August 30 through September 2, dates of the annual state 4-H Club show.

You and your family are most welcome to plan a visit to the campus at that time to see the 4-H Club boys and girls in action and view their exhibits. There is no admission charge, but a wealth of admiration and satisfaction awaits you.

Have you had the experience of knowing you were driving by a livestock farmyard even on a pitch-black night? Many people have.

You know that it is possible to reduce barn odors, prevent cattle from slipping, help provide better light, give the barn a better working atmosphere, and at the same time greatly improve its appearance by means of a daily sprinkling of lime in the barn and on the driveway in the barn?

Last year Michigan imported approximately \$500,000,000 worth of goods. In terms of quantity these United States imports are not so very different, but their qualitative importance is seen in the fact that more than 300 imported products go into every automobile produced in our state.

Powdered lemonade is now on the "What's New List." This fruit powder has been developed by the United States Department of Agriculture. It is quick and easy to use, dissolving instantly in cold water to make lemonade equal in flavoring and nutritive value to that prepared from freshly squeezed lemons. It ships and stores conveniently, needing no refrigeration.

The new product, rich in natural flavor, is made from lemon juice and sugar with a trace of stabilized lemon oil added. A puff-drying process dries the lemon juice under heat and with vacuum it is cooled fast. No, you won't find it on the market this summer, but watch for it later.

Cleanliness is essential in many things, including freezing. Freezing kills only a portion of the bacteria, yeasts and molds usually present in products to be frozen. So, because freezing does not sterilize products, it is necessary to keep them and the equipment you use as clean as possible. Use only drinking water for washing products or making syrup and brine. Keep products cool at all times.

Sealing, or blanching is necessary for vegetables to be frozen, and that means sweet corn, too, whether it is to be stored on the cob or as cut corn. Ears blanched for cutting are timed from immersion into rolling boiling water for four minutes, then cool them in cold water for at least as long a time. To prepare corn on the cob for storage increase the blanching time to about seven minutes, depending upon the size of ears.

Pack in moisture-vapor-proof containers or wrap and freeze as quickly as possible. Sweet corn must be gathered from the field only a short time before the processing takes place to have a first-quality frozen product.

Peaches are ripe, to eat, can or freeze. J. H. Hale, H. H. Haven, Elberta and Red Haven varieties are the ones recommended for freezing. Peaches at the firm-ripe stage are best to freeze. Best packing method is to slice peaches in a 50 percent sugar syrup (equal parts of sugar and water). A piece of crumpled parchment or waxed paper placed under the container lid

assures keeping every peach slice under syrup and away from air which turns it brown. Working quickly and with not too large a batch of peaches at a time is important to prevent fruit.

Hard cooked eggs keep for hours without refrigeration which is why they make a good picnic basket ingredient. That is because of the protection provided by both the shell and paper-like lining underneath. Top quality eggs are best for hard-cooking as they are likely to have well centered yolks and a more delicate flavor.

It takes a little longer to simmer eggs than to boil them, but the tenderness of the "simmered-cooked" eggs is worth the difference. Cool in cold water.

Remember, though, that hard-cooked eggs out of the shell, stuffed or in salad and sandwiches, must be kept cold to be safe against spoilage. Only a couple of hours are needed in a warm picnic basket to make deviled eggs and egg mixtures a spoilage hazard.

With the Iosco 4-H Clubs

Congratulations for a "First" go to Donna Coates, reporter, and the Friendship 4-H Club. It is our first 4-H Club to make plans for the 1955-56 4-H Club year and tell us about them. Officers elected were: Joyce Coates, president; Verna Kay Wehrman, vice president; Phyllis Watts, secretary; Dewayne Durant, reporter; Donna Coates, song and recreation leader. We presume the officers will be installed at the September 4-H Club meeting.

Donna says that projects were selected, but did not say what they are. If we guess, and say livestock, electrical and clothing projects, will we be correct? Let's hear from other 4-H Clubs as to their officers for the coming year. We will be having an officers training school in September so that the newly installed officers are ready to begin conducting meetings in October. We need to know who the new officers are, to let them know when to come for the training school.

Any 4-H Club wanting help to make its 1955-56 plans is asked to let us know of its needs. This is the time when a new 4-H Club should get started, by that we mean a 4-H Club in a new community. The four winners will receive a trip to the National 4-H Club Camp in Washington, D. C., next June. District elimination contests cut down the number of contestants in the various finals for judging, demonstration, fun festival and speech contests.

And for the participants in these contests something new has been added this year. It is a trip to Washington, D. C., for one week in late September which will be awarded all judging and demonstration contest winners who do not compete nationally following the state show. This year there should be about 40 boys and girls receive this award trip.

The Michigan State 4-H Club Show has been held on the Michigan State campus since 1942, when the state fair in Detroit was discontinued during the war. Meeting with the representatives of 53 different counties on the campus of Michigan State University, provided a few hours opportunity to see the Farm Mechanization Show. Acres and acres of tractors and the implements required more time to see than I had. The men that went with me had a chance to see some of the old time threshing rigs, and a chance to see the advancement of agricultural machinery.

Theodore Bellville, chairman of the Iosco County Board of Supervisors, Glenn Long, chairman of the Cooperative Extension Service Committee of the board of supervisors, and Lloyd Little, Grant Township supervisor and chairman of the Cooperative Extension Service Advisory Board, were the dinner guests of President Hanna. Vice President D. B. Varner and Paul Miller, director of cooperative extension service at Michigan State University.

Elmer "Shorty" Anschuetz corralled me the other day and asked, "Who has some good wheat seed for sale?" There likely are many places good seed can be purchased. Our recommendations are Cornell 595 and Genesee as superior to Yorkwin in resistance to loose smut. Although loose smut can cut yields, Yorkwin did produce some high yield in 1955 in spite of smut infection.

Only one variety of soft red winter wheat was certified in Michigan in 1955. Seneca is the most highly recommended red wheat variety. Thorne wheat would be a close second but it is not eligible for certification.

Knox is a red wheat variety which is receiving some attention in certain areas in Michigan. This wheat from Indiana is earlier and shorter strawed than Seneca and Thorne. However, in tests in Michigan it has been inferior to these varieties in yields and straw strength. This variety is not recommended for Michigan.

Michigan grown certified seed of Hudson winter barley and Genesee, Cornell, Yorkwin and Seneca wheat is available for 1955 planting. Your local elevator probably has a supply or can procure the desired seed.

Some farmers are planning on putting in some winter barley for 1956. Hudson is probably the best variety of winter barley to use in Iosco County when you consider all factors.

Hudson is the only variety certified in Michigan. It has a higher test weight than Kenbar and will outyield Wong by several bushels per acre. It also appears that Hudson is slightly more winter-hardy, according to S. C. Hilderbrand, farm cropsman at Michigan State University.

Hudson is a bearded barley, as is Kenbar, while Wong is more or less bald barley. Some farmers have objected to the beards on Hudson and Kenbar but their yield advantage far outweighs the objection to beards. There is little difference as far as disease is concerned. All of the varieties are somewhat susceptible to loose smut.

Michigan's counties have made much progress in Brucellosis eradication since testing for the disease first began.

Some herd owners had their animals tested in the early 1930s and area testing of all cattle began in the Upper Peninsula a short time later. By 1954, all counties in lower Michigan north of the Bay City-Muskegon line were checked for Bang's disease and reactors removed for slaughter. With the additional federal funds allocated early in 1955, it is hoped that by 1957 all Michigan cattle will have been checked at least once and reactors removed from production.

W. L. Finley, extension animal husbandry specialist at Michigan State University, says a county board of supervisors may ask the director of the Michigan State Board of Agriculture to conduct a county-wide test for Brucellosis.

The director of agriculture must then take these steps:
1. Test all breeding cattle in the county.
2. Permanently identify all reactor cattle by ear tag or tattoo or brand.
3. Quarantine all reactor and suspect cattle to reduce danger of further spread of the disease.
4. Continue to re-test all of the suspects and other animals so checked at least once and reactors removed from production.

Almost all of Michigan's counties have requested a county-wide test for Brucellosis.

Iosco County pasture problems aren't over when the fall rains come. July and August are problem months for pasture with most farmers, but September is a critical period, too. September grazing of alfalfa fields being saved for another

year will weaken the alfalfa and probably result in poor stand next season. September is the critical period for Iosco County when alfalfa is storing up food reserves.

Grazing during this critical period will result in the alfalfa plant going into the winter with reduced carbohydrate reserves in the root. Alfalfa with low reserves is weak and subject to winter injury. Too often, the result is a poor stand the following year. Grazing later in the fall after the critical period is a safe practice.

When pasture is short, there are several ways to avoid grazing alfalfa which is to be used another year, according to Milton Erdmann, extension farm crops specialist at Michigan State University. Sudan still provides abundant pasture in September and up until the first frost. Permanent bluegrass can be used to good advantage in September. Reed canary grass can be pastured through the entire fall period. Rye seeded in early August will provide some light fall pasture. Or grass silage put up earlier in the season can be fed out now so the silo can be filled with corn.

Of course, those fields which are to be plowed next spring may be grazed as it makes no difference if the alfalfa there is injured.

A note of caution in regard to new seedings. Sometimes when the new seedings make good growth there is a temptation to

pasture them the year they are seeded. This practice is not recommended as new seedings are especially susceptible to injury. New seedings should be allowed to become well-established the year they are seeded. Results will be higher yields of hay or pasture next year.
