Protecting Responsible Motorists

Despite the number of different laws, in the various states, that require motorists to carry insurance or providing stiff penalties against those who do not, in most of the states in the union irresponsible motorists are still causing heavy human and physical damage without having to compensate

Since most motorists drive through a number of states over a period of time, the problem is almost a national one. Although the effort to require motorists to carry insurance is supported by a large and growing number of people, the various states have not yet come up with this solution and, therefore, the highways are filled with irresponsible drivers, who do not have the financial means to compensate for the destruction they may at any time cause.

This is a problem which should be solved because it can be solved. If the various state legislatures do not wish to pass laws requiring motorists to carry insurance, then they should pass some sort of law which would protect the victim of the irresponsible motorists. There is no reason why any citizen should be allowed to take to the highway with a machine which might cause both death and destruction, in irresponsible hands, when he has neither the means nor the insurance to compensate for destruction which he might

This problem is not akin to the problem of normal crimes. Crimes cannot be predicted, nor are citizens given wholesale permits to carry guns and permission to shoot them at will.

However, the motorist is given a license to operate a vehicle which can cause death and if society is going to permit citizens to obtain these permits rather freely, it has the responsibility to protect those who fall victim to its misuse.
