Tawas Hospital Given \$14,700 Ford Grant

Announcement of Gift Made Monday Night

In an announcement released Monday night, the Tawas Hospital has received a \$14,700 appropriation from the Ford Foundation as part of the foundation's \$200,000,000 grant to aid voluntary non-profit hospitals. The disclosure was made following the close of the three-day quarterly meeting of the trustees of the foundation in New York.

The grant to some 3,500 privately supported hospitals, to help them improve and extend their services to the public was part of an unprecedented \$500,000,

000 appropriation to privately supported institutions in communities all over the land.

The sum is in addition to new appropriations for projects under the foundation's established program, the total of which was approximately \$30,000,000.

"Most Pleasant Surprise" Sister M. Rita Louise, administrator of Tawas Hospital, made the following statement Wednesday.

"The grant to Tawas Hospital proposed by the trustees of the Ford Foundation is a most pleasant surprise. Needless to say, the staff of the hospital is most grateful to the Ford Foundation for including the institution as one of its beneficiaries.

"Just how the gift can be used cannot be determined as yet because details governing the use of the grant have not been received from the foundation. News releases seem to indicate that the funds will be available for improvement and expansion of existing facilities, for the training of personnel and for research."

The joint statement of Henry Ford II, chairman of the board of trustees of the Ford Foundation, and H. Rowan Gaither Jr., president, said, "Population increases and the advances of medical knowledge in recent years have placed heavy burdens upon the facilities of the nation's voluntary non-profit hospitals.

"Several hundred thousand additional general hospital beds are needed. Old obsolete buildings require replacement or modernization. Many hospitals need better equipment. All hospitals need to extend the scope of their services if they are to serve satisfactorily as health and rehabilitation centers in their communities.

"Moreover, the rising cost of both hospital construction and hospital operation places these institutions in a serious financial straits.

Will Dedicate Plaque to Honor Charles Miller

Arrangements for erecting a bronze tablet in memory of Charles C. Miller, Iosco County sheriff, who was killed in the performance of duty 21 years ago, are being made by a special committee of the Northeastern Law Enforcement Officers Association. The plaque will be erected at the new Iosco County Detention.

Preliminary plans for dedicating the plaque were made at a recent meeting of the association, composed of law enforcement officers from Iosco, Arenac, Ogemaw, Gladwin, Oscoda, Crawford, Roscommon, Montmorency and Alcona counties.

A special committee was selected at that time to make arrangements for obtaining the plaque and working out plans for the dedication ceremonies. The committee is composed of Conservation Officer Arthur Leitz, Deputy Sheriff Charles Kurtzrock and Justice H. E. Friedman, all of Iosco County. Sgt. Lynn Smith of the West Branch post, Michigan State Police, is president of the organization.

Deputy Kurtzrock said that final plans for the plaque were made at the December 14 meeting of the association. He said that delivery probably would be in January and that dedication ceremonies would be held shortly after.

On July 1, 1934, Sheriff Miller was one of four persons shot and killed by John A. Wood at East Tawas. Sheriff Miller was summoned to the home of Arthur Janson at East Tawas during the early morning hours of July 1 (See Dedicates, page 10.)

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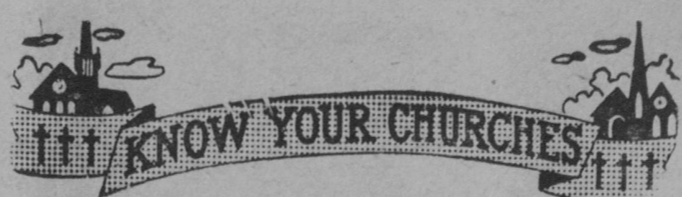

TAWAS, OSCODA KIWANIAN ENJOY GM SHOW AT WAFB

"Preview of Progress," a program which dramatized the scientific progress of a competitive society, was enjoyed by members of the Tawas and Oscoda Kiwanis Clubs at a joint meeting last Wednesday at Wurtsmith Air Force Base, Oscoda.

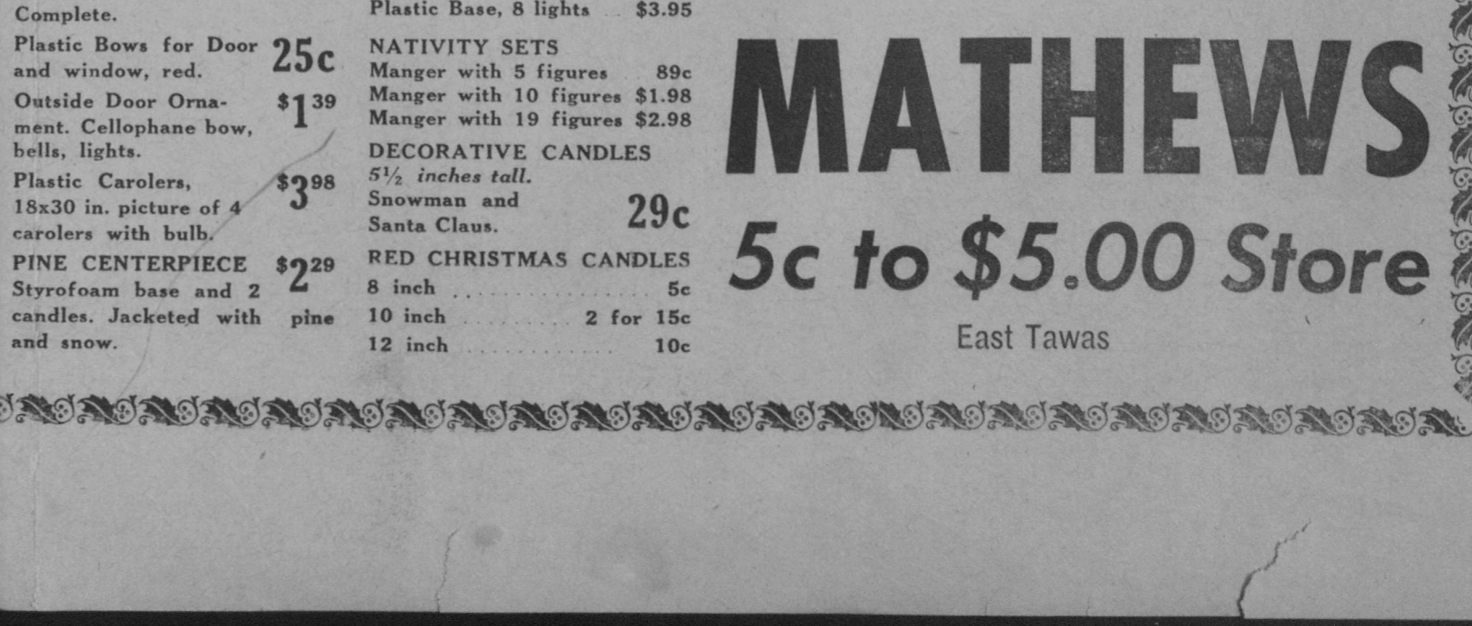

Born October 15, 1889, he married Miss Lillian Fuehr on June 22, 1910. Surviving are the widow and two children, Mrs. Vernon Hawkins and Howard Eymmer, both of Oscoda, and five grandchildren.

Funeral services were held Friday afternoon at the Oscoda Methodist Church. The Rev. Alfred C. Fennel officiated. Interment was in the Oscoda Cemetery.

The nation's traffic deaths on Safe Driving Day, December 1, surpassed last year's toll of 51 by more than 25 percent. Do any of you folks recall Harlow O. Whittemore? I received a very nice letter from him asking about Iosco County and what has happened there these past 50 years. He is chairman of the department of landscape architecture at the University of Michigan in Ann Arbor now. He mentioned that his father had a farm on the Meadow Road some 50 years ago and he wondered if farmers were growing some of the crops today they grew then.

Since having read and answered his very complimentary letter, I have been reminiscing about some of the things I have noticed that have changed in the last five years!

There have been 106 less farm families in Iosco County since 1950, a drop from 696 to 590. Areas like the Meadow Road have been a part of this trend. I have heard many old timers say that the Meadow Road was the "Meca" of Iosco County agriculture in the early days. I have no way of knowing myself. But another change that has taken place very recently has been the "changed" kind of agriculture.

According to the 1954 census figures we had 14 farms that sold \$10,000 or more of produce off the farm as compared to two in 1950. But for every other income bracket the numbers have decreased. In 1950 there were 53 farms grossing from five to 10 thousand. In 1954 there were 26 thousand. Those grossing \$2,500 to \$5,000 numbered 80 in 1950. In 1954 that was reduced to 61.

Part time employment among farmers has increased 10 fold in the past three years in Iosco County. We see more today than five years ago, a mechanized agriculture. The big are getting bigger and the small are as small as they can get!

Cattle numbers have jumped from 10,337 in 1950 to 12,529 in 1954. Dairy farms have dropped from 288 in 1950 to 222 in 1954, but the size of farms has increased from 155 acres to 171. This is a national trend, too. Where we had 15 percent of our population on farms in 1950 we have a little over 12 percent today.

Yes, Mr. Whittemore, Iosco County's agriculture has fallen in line with the rest. Its agriculture and people are changing.

Agriculture Department Now Studying New Proposals to Help Average Farmer

The United States Department of Agriculture is studying a new proposal to alleviate conditions for the average farmer which may be the most enthusiastically received plan put to farmers in some time.

Big farmers may not like the proposal, but a vast majority of small farmers are sure to approve of it. In brief, the new plan is to limit support to farmers on a dollar basis. In other words, a farmer might not be extended but \$25,000 worth of support.

If larger farmers wanted to plant more than that, they could, but the government would plunk out only that much money to support prices for them. That is just one figure which has been mentioned. If the plan is recommended and adopted, it may vary in detail.

Another provision of the new idea being studied in Washington is that to stop limiting acreage and start limiting crops, instead, which will be supported by the government. This, backers of the plan think, will be a firm, dependable way to control crops and check over-production.

The fact that the department of agriculture is reported studying these new approaches to the farm situation is proof that Secretary Ezra Benson is planning to come up with more than one new proposal when he presents (or the president for him) the new farm proposals to congress in January.

Some experts believe the latest ideas, involving limiting support in terms of thousands of dollars, instead of a percentage price support for a fixed number of acres, may be the best proposal the departments has yet hit on for 1956.

Small Communities Should Have Airport In Plans for Future

Many cities, mostly the smaller ones, have no adequate airport. Nor do they have adequate markers for identification, by which pilots can discover their identity and use them for landmarks.

Realizing the need for more airports in the United States, a planning program and may possibly be able to take advantage of this appropriation to get federal aid in an airport construction program.

In too many communities there is a lack of appreciation of the potentialities of flying and a lack of enthusiasm for providing air travelers with a stopping place.

Chinese Communists Still Hold Prisoners Says General Clark

General Mark Clark, speaking at a celebration of Austrian independence in New York recently, said that, in his opinion, the Chinese Communists still held captive many United States and other United Nations personnel, captured in the Korean War.

Clark said it was his opinion the Chinese were holding both military and civilian personnel taken during that war. He believes the Chinese are holding these prisoners secretly, waiting for an appropriate time when they can barter them to the United States for concessions.

He suggests they may be holding them back to free them in dribs and drabs for "concessions." Clark, who was supreme commander of the United Nations forces in the Far East during much of the Korean fighting, says that the present Geneva spirit should not fool Americans. He believes some people are being taken in by the supposedly new spirit in Russia. Says the general:

"Many people who know better seem to think they denote a change in objective intentions of the Communists. I cannot go along with that sort of thinking. I am sure the objective of the Russians is still world domination. Perhaps they think that by smiling they can anesthetize us. As far as the Russian smiles are concerned, they have added up to exactly nothing in the way of German unification, freeing of some of the satellite countries and in other fields where Communist reforms are urgently needed and long overdue."

Midnight of November 30 marked the end of the most intense recruiting drive ever carried on to obtain candidates for these positions. The campaign was by far the most successful ever conducted, 3,100 applications being received.

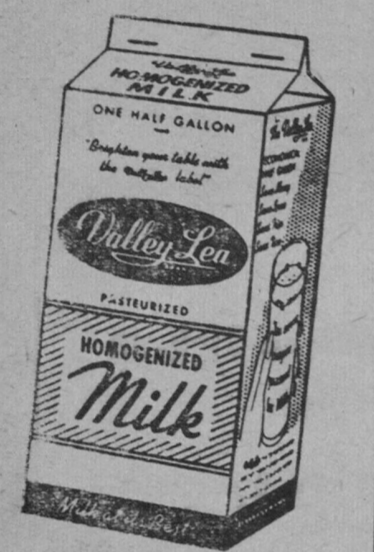

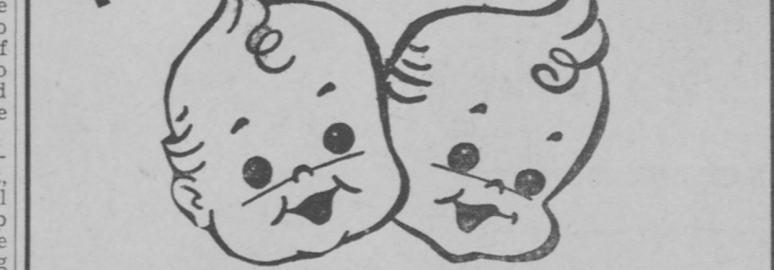

Sheriff to Rid Area of Stray Dogs

In an effort to avoid the tragedy of the winter of 1954-1955, when more than 100 deer were killed in the month of March by packs of dogs in Alabaster Township, Sheriff Ivan L. O'Farrell warns all dog owners that beginning December 19 his department will start a concentrated drive to capture all dogs running loose in Isosco County.

"Every winter several hundred deer are killed by dogs in Isosco County. These dogs are either stray or are allowed to run at large," stated Sheriff O'Farrell. "We are not going to wait until the snow is deep and a lot of deer are killed before we do something about it."

In cooperation with the Michigan Conservation Department, the round-up of stray dogs will start in AuSable Township where at the present time the situation is the worst. Along the shore line between East Tawas and Oscoda many summer tourists left their dogs when they returned home.

County Residents Urged to Answer Christmas Seal Letters

Many Isco County citizens have contributed to the 1955 Christmas Seal drive, the Michigan Tuberculosis Association said today. However, the MTA said many persons have not as yet made their Christmas Seal returns. The county is doing well but should do better. Officers of the MTA appealed to the thousands of friends of the voluntary TB movement to make their returns as soon as possible, if they have not yet done so. "With more than 100 new cases of TB being reported in Michigan each week, we cannot let down," said Theodore V. Eddy, president of the voluntary organization. Eddy emphasized that the seals are the sole support of the voluntary fight against TB. Cards reminding Isco County residents to buy Christmas Seals have been mailed by the MTA. The cards carry a reproduction of two children who have tuberculosis. "If Michigan citizens could visit these most appealing, helpless, pitiful little ones, they would understand the threat of TB to their own families," said Eddy. The cards ask "Did you forget?" Isco County cannot forget, Eddy said, that TB is an infectious disease and every family is subject to attack by tuberculosis. "The children pictured on the card are but two of more than 400 youngsters who each year are found among the unknown number of children with TB. They are infected by persons who are ignorant of the fact they are spreading TB or who willfully ignore early warnings of the disease," explained Eddy. "There is no effective vaccine to protect our children or ourselves from this disease which still kills more Michigan citizens than all other infectious diseases combined."

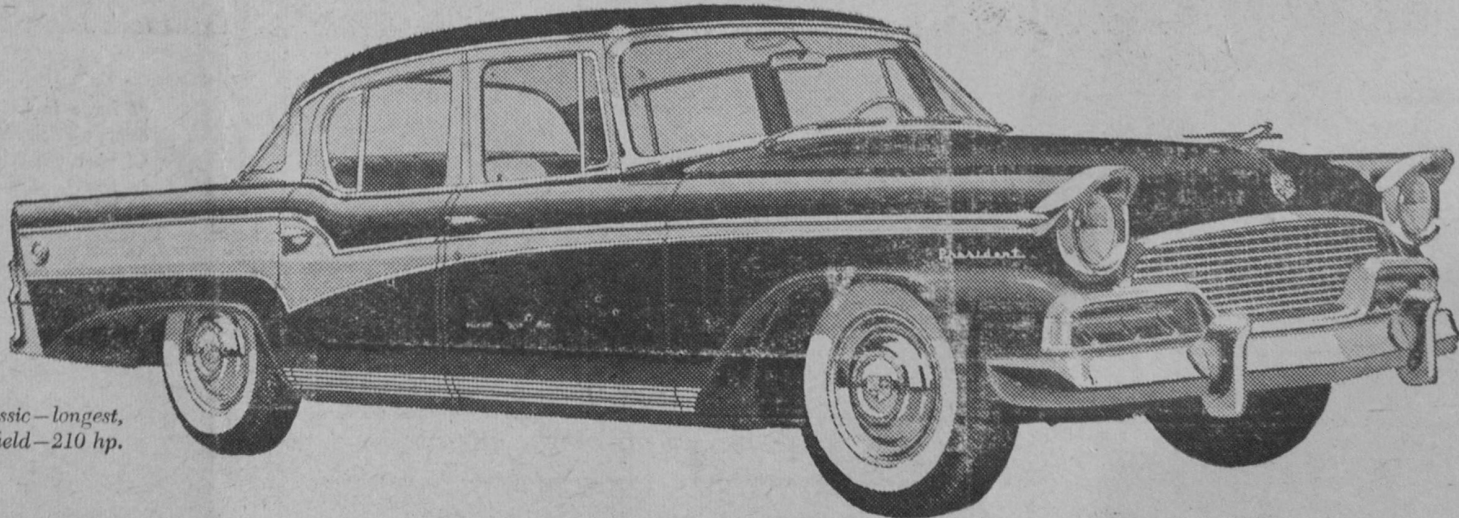

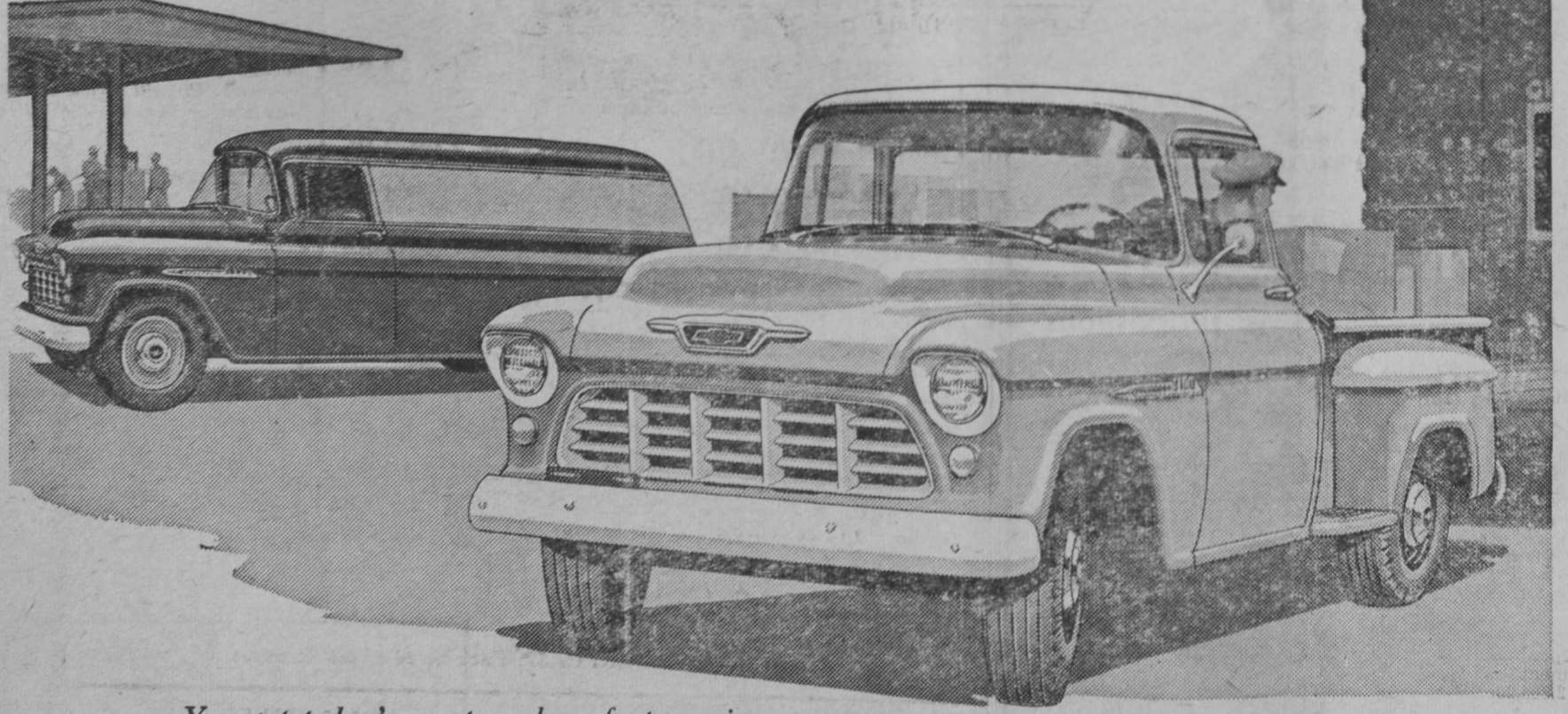

"Christmas Decorations" is a bulletin with ideas using evergreens in various ways to adorn your home for the holiday season. It is available to you for the asking.

Perhaps you already know, and perhaps not, that the pines, firs and the cedars are best evergreens for indoor Christmas decorating. Hemlock and spruces are good exterior decorating materials but lose their needles within a week if brought indoors.

In your own yard you can get juniper and other greens by careful trimming. Be sure to cut close to a limb so no ugly stub is left. Proper trimming can even improve the appearance of a tree and stimulate growth.

Let your children's Christmas gift reflect your love, not just the pocketbook. Parents have given our children everything— toys, money, entertainment— why, what else is there to give? Unless parents give freely of themselves the children lack what is needed most, unconditional love.

Dorothy M. Baruch, authority in parent education, lists four emotional foods needed by children: 1. Unconditional love (acceptance of child as is); 2. A sense of belonging in the family group; 3. A feeling of being able to stand on his own feet as an achieving person; 4. A need for recognition.

When you look at a toy for your child, ask yourself: Can he invent lots of things to do with it? Is it suitable for his age? Is it sturdy enough to stand the "wear" of children? Are the toys best, not because they are simple, but because they have so much imagination.

Or, consider some records which the child can play for himself. He likes lively tunes, polkas and jigs; folk songs, short melodic and rhythmic orchestral pieces, and short selections on a solo instrument.

Christmas cookies are of three kinds: Those needing to be made a week or two ahead of time to develop and mellow texture. Examples are Lebkuchen, spritz-cake and Pfefferkuchen.

A second type keeps well for several weeks but need not be stored to develop flavor. Rolled and cut-out cookies, hermits, shortbreads, tarts and chocolate nut bars are in this grouping.

A third group are butter cookies, rich fruit and nut bar cookies, meringue kisses and spritz. These high-fat cookies should not be stored more than a few days.

Do you have a holiday cookie specialty? Then why not share your success with others and make cookies for gifts? Clever packaging might be to leave a batch on the cookie sheet, wrap in cellophane and tie with a colorful bow. A wooden spoon Christmas cookie cutter, or recipes and small bouquets of greens are another wrapping possibility.

adding practical gifts to keep, as well as the food.

You may have tasted the luscious central snacks that were popular last holiday season. In case you misplaced a recipe, here is another: Melt one-third cup butter in shallow pan. Stir in one tablespoon Worcestershire sauce, one-quarter teaspoon salt, one-eighth teaspoon garlic salt or powder. Add two cups "bite-size" shredded wheat biscuits and two cups "bite-size" rice biscuits, one-half cup nuts (peanuts, pecans, cashews). Mix until all pieces are butter coated. Heat in a 300 degree Fahrenheit oven for 30 minutes, stirring every 10 minutes. Spread out to cool.

When cool, pack the mix in quart jars or in tins with tight fitting lids; keep in the refrigerator.

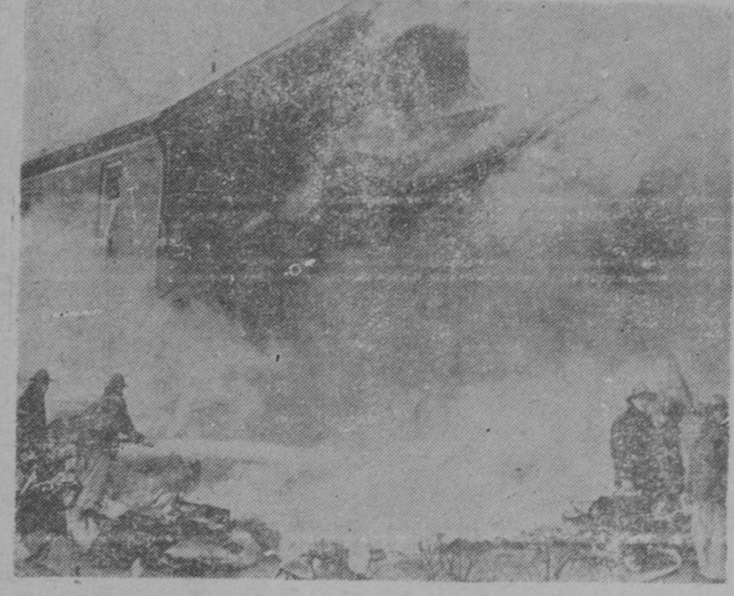

LETTERS NOW CAN BE MAILED IN PACKAGES

A letter or message can now be mailed inside a package or publication for the first time in United States postal history. Postmaster General Summerfield said today in announcing a new "combination" mail service.

Under the new "combination" mail service, letters or other single pieces of either first or third-class mail may be placed inside fourth-class mail entry. Letter or other single pieces of first-class mail may also be placed inside third-class packages.

The postage for each letter, and for each single enclosure at

the appropriate first or single piece third-class rate must be affixed to the outside of the parcel.

A statement reading "First Class Mail Enclosed" or "Third Class Mail Enclosed" must be placed on each parcel below the postage and above the address. This endorsement may be hand-stamped, handwritten, typewritten, printed, or put on by any other method.

The enclosures inside the package should preferably be placed on top of the other items in the package.

Under the old regulation, mailers who found it impractical to use combination containers were forced to use two separate pieces of mail instead of one, the postmaster general explained.

cial dilemma. Many still manage to continue operating without deficits, but they do so only through the sacrifice or curtailment of services or facilities important to community health and welfare.

"Toward the vital goal of improving and extending their services to their respective communities, the foundation will make available from \$10,000 to \$250,000 to each of the approximately 3,500 voluntary non-profit hospitals in the United States, its territories and possessions."

The terms of the grants will place full responsibility on the governing authorities of each hospital to spend the funds in accordance with local needs and problems. Use of the funds will be permitted for any program of improvement or extension of hospital service, but not for operating expenses currently being performed by the hospitals.

A particular purpose of the grants would be to assist hospitals desiring to do so to achieve full accreditation with the Joint Commission on Accreditation of Hospitals. Programs may be in the form of:

- Improvement of or addition to facilities or services;
- Addition to or training personnel;
- Conducting research.

The amount of each grant has been computed on the basis of patient days of service provided by the hospital and the number of births in the hospital. Patient days reflect the extent to which a hospital is used. Days of care given to newborn infants are not shown in the patient-day tabulation; therefore, the number of births is added to patient days as a measure of an important hospital service.
