Three meals a day for 366 days in 1956 are one of the sure things ahead for homemakers. Meals to keep your family healthy and happy, a real challenge to the wide awake homemaker.

A little imagination and help of science in meal planning, together with ingenuity and skill in the kitchen will go a long way toward success in keeping a New Year's resolution to keep your family healthy and happy.

Planning meals in advance saves time, makes the menus more interesting as well. Meals planned even two or three days ahead mean more and better variety and help you from the rut of "roast beef Monday," "hash Tuesday," "soup Wednesday."

"Planning Everyday Meals" and "Make Your Meals to Measure" are two extension service bulletins from which you can get help in planning menus, some new recipe ideas, too. Another little folder packed with information of value to homemakers is called "Fact, Fad, and Fraud about Food."

Any of these will come to you upon your request to the Cooperative Extension Service, East Tawas.

Larger wires or more circuits are needed in many homes today. According to some estimates, as many as half the home wiring systems need modernizing to keep pace with automatic washers, clothes dryers, television sets, home freezers and many other appliances. Well-equipped homes may easily be using twice as much electricity as in 1945. Adequate wiring systems are an investment, not

only on home safety, but in efficiency of electrical appliances.



How can I wish you a Happy New Year and mention income tax all in the same sentence? Well, I did and like it or not it is with us. Are your account books in order? Do not do like one farmer I heard about. He took all his receipts and paid bills (unpaid, too, I imagine) to the income tax man in a paper bag and said, "Here, figure out my income tax for me, will you?" The only redeeming feature of it was he gave the public accountant four weeks to do it!

On a deal like that everybody loses, especially the farmer. Every business man is required to keep books. All farmers in business do, too. The rest of them are fooling themselves if they do not. Your Peoples State Bank of East Tawas and the Farmers and Merchants Bank of Hale are anxious to have farmers keep accurate cost account records. They will furnish a copy of the Michigan State University farm account record book with their compliments. Just ask for it. If their supply is exhausted come to the Federal Building in East Tawas and Mrs. Ruth

Hebert, our administrative assistant, will be glad to give you one. If you need help in getting started just ask Miss Scott or myself and we will be glad to lend you a helping hand.

As a matter of fact, while you are in town and at the office ask for a new copy of the Farmers' Tax Guide for 1955. The booklet explains income tax and tells how the self-employment tax or social security applies to farmers. Containing 64 pages, the publication has several illustrations on various parts of income tax returns and goes through the steps in filling out a complete return.

## Brucellosis Caused by One Specific Germ

When a cow is branded as a Bang's reactor, it is usually too late to do anything about it. But most dairy farmers do not want to wait until it is too late, claims Marvin Davenport, county agricultural agent for Iosco County.

They want to know how the cow gets the disease. Here is how Glen W. Reed, extension veterinarian at Michigan State University, explains the trouble:

Unlike mastitis, which cows seem to get in many ways, brucellosis comes from one specific germ. That germ is in abundant numbers in the genital tract of reactor cows.

Reed explains that since the brucella organisms incubate from 30 to 200 days, some cattle may be carrying the disease even if they test negative. These cattle may react even within a week after passing a test.

Brucellosis organisms get in the cattle mainly through the mouth, but also enter through eyes, skin and lungs. The germs are expelled during calving and heat periods to infect other animals in the herd.

Reed mentions that other sources of the disease are public pastures, stock yards, infected trucks, barn tools and farm implements.

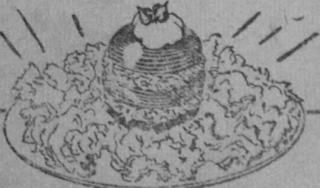

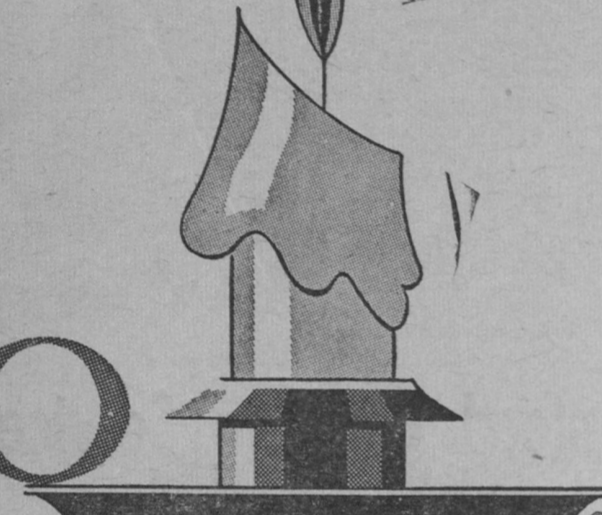
