## Davison-Rose Inc. Awarded School Contract

### \$513,400 Proves Successful Bid

Two Tawas firms were successful bidders on contracts to construct the new 625-student Tawas Area Junior and Senior High School. The bids were opened at a special meeting of the Tawas Area Board of Education Tuesday night.

Davison-Rose Builders, Incorporated, of Tawas City, with a base bid of \$513,400, was the successful low bidder on the general trades construction contract and Northern Plumbing and Heating of East Tawas was the low bidder on the mechanical trades contract with \$126,774.

The other successful bidder was Krown Electric Company of Saginaw which entered a bid of \$53,777 on the electrical trades contract.

After opening the bids publicly before a large group of interested citizens, the board of education and the architects evaluated the bids in a private session before awarding the contracts.

#### Bids Lower than Expected

Complete total of all three of the base bids was \$693,951, a much lower figure than was anticipated by the architects and school board members last September. It was estimated at that time that the total would be approximately \$749,500 on the base bid.

Due to the lower figure submitted, the board of education accepted several alternatives offered by the contractors. The contract were terrazzo floors in corridors at \$9,000 and aluminum sash at \$2,200. The electrical trades alternatives include stage lights in the auditorium at \$1,647.67 and stage and auditorium dimmer switchboard at \$2,967.88. With the alternatives, the complete total of contracts is \$709,776.48, a figure still below the total which was anticipated.

#### Pleased With Bids

Supt. of Schools Reynold Mick said Tuesday night that he was very pleased with the reception by the bidders to the project. His feelings were also expressed by all members of the board of education and Henry Haberman and Clarence Herring, members of the architectural firm who have worked on the project since its initial planning stage.

"A preliminary check on the cost of supplies for the building would make it appear that there is enough money to purchase nearly all of the equipment needed in the building," stated the superintendent.

Among the bids received on the general trades contract, not including Davison-Rose's construction Company, Flint, \$549,800; J. R. Heineman and Sons, Incorporated, Saginaw, \$578,000; Consolidated Construction Company, Bay City, \$592,986; Arthur Vollmer Construction Company, Saginaw, \$586,000; Ward M. Ross, Incorporated, Pontiac, \$538,000; and Spence Brothers, Saginaw, \$542,400.

Mechanical trades bids received, not including the successful bid by Northern Plumbing and Heating, were: Lloyd W. Schweinsberg, Bay City, \$153,603; Bay City Plumbing and Heating, Bay City, \$139,000; Fairfax Mechanical Contractors, \$153,200; and Great Lakes Plumbing and Heating, East Lansing, \$12,000.

Bids on the electrical trades contract, not including the successful bidder, were received from: York Electrical Company, Bay City, \$61,796; Smith-Mavnard Company, Bay City, \$69,590; Preim Electrical Company, Bay City, \$55,600; and Pronocer Electric Company, Bay City, \$60,800.

#### Phenomenal Growth

With the award of contracts to Davison-Rose Builders, Incorporated, and Northern Plumbing, it is the first time that the community has had large enough local contracting firms to handle such a large construction project. Davison-Rose has had a phenomenal growth in the construction field, building several schools in Northern Michigan, the Iosco County Jail, St. Joseph Catholic Church at East Tawas, and recently was awarded a contract to build the new Immaculate Heart of Mary Church in Tawas City.

"We are very happy and feel that we are fortunate to be the successful bidder on the contract to build the new school here in our own home area," stated Edward Davison of the local contracting firm. "We will start work in about 10 days on the contract."

The same sentiments were expressed by Albert Foco of Northern Plumbing and Heating.

Submitted to the Michigan Department of Health, a check on the skull revealed that it was of a person dead for "at least 50 years and possibly longer."

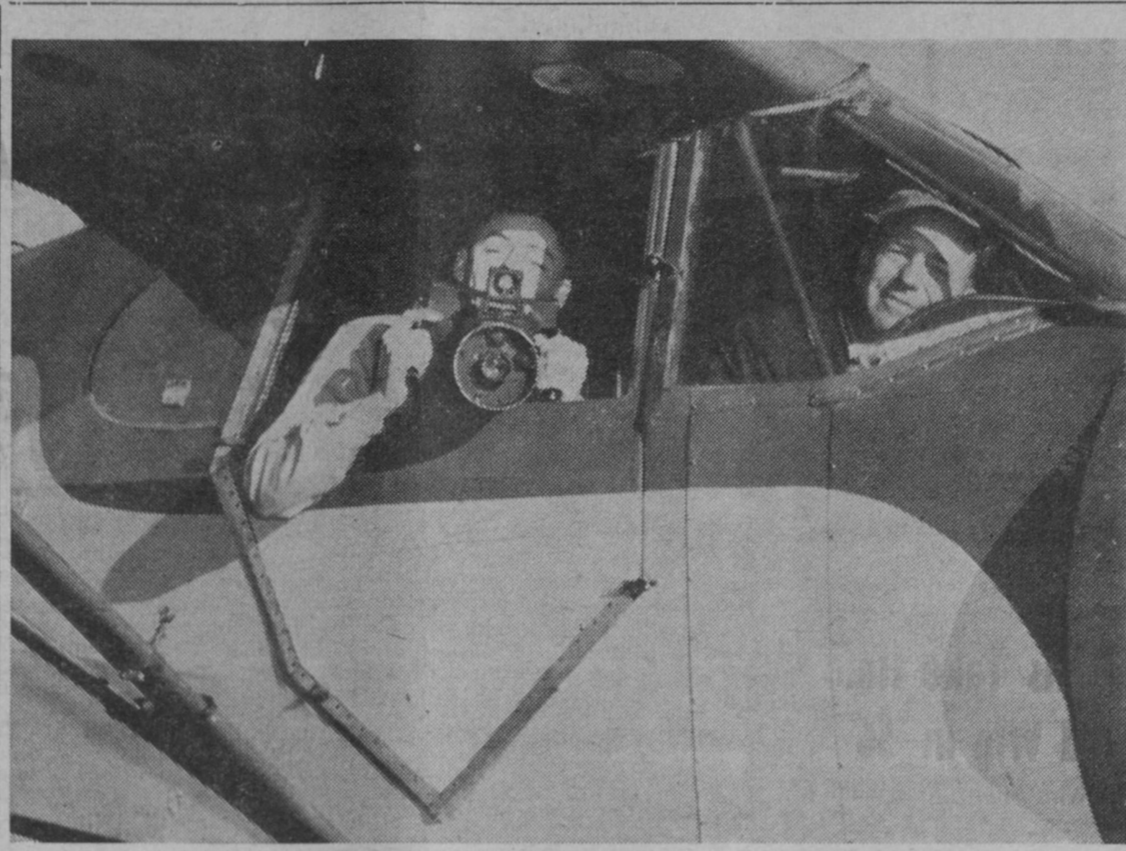
### Installs Two-Way Radios in Truck Fleet

Nobody knows whose farms were photographed, not even the pilot and photographer, until readers of this newspaper identify the farms when they are published in The Tawas Herald. Identifying the farms will be an interesting game and publication of the photos will be a means of recognizing farming as the big business it is in this county. In taking the pictures, the photo-plane flew back and forth over Iosco County, covering about 300 miles while selecting the farms at random.

### Herald to Start Series of Aerial Farm Photos

Readers of The Tawas Herald will have the chance to prove their knowledge of farms in this area with the publication of a new "Mystery Farm" feature starting soon.

Aerial photos were taken of 52 farms in the area served by this newspaper and one picture will be published each week, along with an invitation to readers to "guess whose farm." The pictures were taken by the Zekan-Robbins Company of Harlan, Iowa, specialists in this kind of low-altitude farm photography, and this newspaper arranged to have the photos snapped in different parts of the county so that every farmer has an equal chance of having his farm picture published.

Nobody knows whose farms were photographed, not even the photographers. The editor of The Tawas Herald is relying upon the readers for identification, and those recognizing the "mystery farm of the week" should notify this newspaper immediately.

The surprisingly fast Atlanta club, although losing its first start of the season to Whittemore last week, 50-46, bounced back to whip Coach Mark Defibaugh's Tawas Area team quite handily.

In the first quarter, Atlanta's Barry and Ut lost no time in setting their sights on the hoop, each scoring eight points. Six markers by their mates totaled 22 points to the Braves' 13.

By halftime the winners had gone far out in front with a 47-30 lead.

In the third quarter Ron Marliatt connected on five field goals for the winners to put the game safely on ice. Earlier in the second quarter he flipped in 12 points on eight foul shots and three field goals.

The Braves were able to outscore their opponents only in the fourth quarter when they totaled 20 points to the winners' 16.

Although Coach Defibaugh had two high scorers in Dave Featheringill and Dar Lepard, who scored totals of 14 and 16 points, respectively, the Braves were unable to set up a good enough defensive stand against the Atlanta attack or to come up with a good offensive contribution.

Atlanta had four players, who reached double figures in the scoring column. P. Barry, left forward, garnered 15 points; Ut, center, dunked 10 points; Ray Marliatt, right guard, meshed 10 points and Ron Marliatt led both teams in scoring with 24 markers.

Following Featheringill and Lepard, scoring leaders for the Braves, was Guyette who collected nine points.

The Tawas Area Junior Varsity lost its initial contest of the new season to the Atlanta JV's, 63-58. The locals took nearly 15-14 lead in the first quarter but were unable to hold it in the next stanza, the halftime score reading in favor of Atlanta, 35-33.

In the second half the Atlanta JV's edged Tawas Area by totaling 28 points to the locals 25. Top scorers in the game were See Braves, page 2.)

### Braves Drop Season Opener to Atlanta Tuesday Night, 83-59

The Tawas Area Braves lost their 1955-56 basketball season opener here Tuesday night to Atlanta, 83-59. The game was originally scheduled to be played last Friday night at Atlanta, but due to a confusion in schedules the officials were not present at the Atlanta auditorium and the game was re-scheduled to be played at Tawas this week.

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### NORTH STREET NOW BEING ROUGH GRADED

Work on clearing and extending North Street in Tawas City is progressing rapidly and will be completed this week, it was reported by a spokesman of the department of public works at a meeting of the Tawas City Council Monday night.

According to the report, the project started at Fifth Avenue and by Monday afternoon was rough-graded to Eleventh avenue. The bulldozing work is being done by John Konenske, Tawas City contractor.

This project, part of a long-range plan whereby unused city streets in the northwest section of Tawas City would be utilized, was approved by the council several months ago. When completed, the improved streets will open a large area to housing development.

At Monday night's meeting, the council approved a building permit for construction of the new Immaculate Heart of Mary Church, to be located on US-23 west of the St. Joseph School. Estimated cost is \$189,000.

Councilmen approved a recommendation by the purchasing committee for the purchase of a new pick-up truck to be used by the department of public works. The council is advertising for bids on the truck this week.

### COOPERATIVE EFFORTS HELP SILVER VALLEY

Community cooperation in the planning and operation of the Silver Valley Winter Sports area has always been a notable achievement of the Tawasites, this fact was again borne out last Sunday when more than 35 businessmen and interested citizens turned out to work on the winter sports park's new ski area chalet.

According to the spokesman for the winter sports committee, the turn-out, in answer to a call for help by the committee, was the largest yet and a great deal of work was accomplished toward finishing the chalet before the opening of the winter sports season.

By late Sunday evening, the workmen had constructed a roof on the building and completely enclosed the sidewalls with fiber board and nailed on most of the siding.

When completed, the addition of the new chalet and the improvement and extension of ski slopes will add greatly to the facilities offered at Silver Valley. The winter sports park, located in the Huron National Forest, has been described by many as the most beautiful area in the state.

A second work bee is scheduled this Sunday and George Baldwin, chairman of the winter sports committee, asks that anyone interested in donating time to complete the project to be on hand. Work is scheduled to start any time after church services Sunday morning.

### Investigate Theft

The Arenac County Sheriff's Department and Michigan State Police are investigating the possible theft of two cows from an Iosco County farm in Arenac County.

The owner of the farm said that two of the cattle were missing after a fire burned two of his barns last month. Seventeen head of cattle were sold by his two sons after the fire and one was lost in one of the barns destroyed in the blaze.

At the time of the fire, Mr. Blata was in Texas.

### Doran Gets 5 to 15 Years at State Prison

Harold W. Doran was given a sentence of five to 15 years in Southern Michigan Prison by Judge Herman Denhke during Tuesday's session of the December term of Iosco County Circuit Court. At a circuit court jury trial held October 31 Doran had been convicted of robbery.

Doran, with James LaFave had been charged with robbing the Huron Drug Store at Oscoda. About \$300 had been taken from the cash register and an attempt had been made to break open a safe. Both men asked for jury trials. LaFave will be tried in January.

Investigation of Doran's record by law enforcement officers revealed that he had served time in prison for two felonies and had several arrests on misdemeanor charges. The two felony convictions were for robbery and forgery. His activity ranged from California to Michigan.

The robbery of the drug store, which is owned by Clarence Voll, occurred during the early morning of August 14. While the robbery was taking place an inter-communication system between store and the Voll residence was instrumental in its discovery. The unusual noise awakened Mrs. Voll. One of the men, who apparently was working on the safe, was seen through the back window of the store. While the sheriff's department and state police were being called by telephone, the robbers escaped. Later Doran and LaFave were arrested and identified with the crime.

### Final Hearing Held on VanEtan Lake Dam

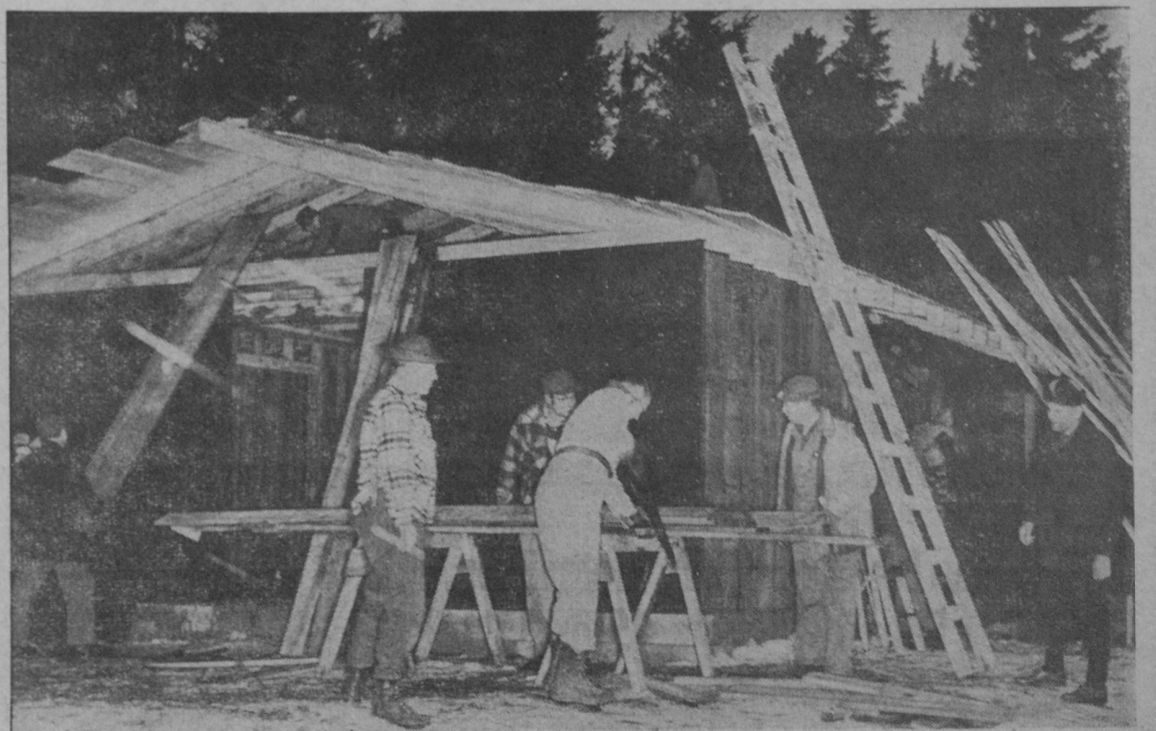
The final hearing on the \$20,000 tax levy for the VanEtan Lake Dam special assessment district was held Monday before a special meeting of the Iosco County Board of Supervisors. This hearing provided the property owner an opportunity to file a protest on any inequity in his individual assessment before it is spread on the tax roll.

The \$20,000 tax was requested by a petition signed by 169 riparian property owners in the VanEtan Lake Dam special assessment district. The levy is to provide money for improving and repairing VanEtan Lake Dam so that its operation will not cause undue erosion. Landowners below the dam have claimed that its operation has caused damage to their property. A damage suit is now pending in circuit court.

The first installment of the \$20,000 tax levy will be spread on the 1955 tax roll of the special assessment district. Bonds will be issued and the indebtedness will be retired in five annual installments.

# Postmaster Kasischke Gives Some Mailing Hints

Reporting that his "Mail Early for Christmas" campaign is really in high gear, Postmaster Martin Kasischke today gave some helpful hints on how you can be sure that your Christmas cards will reach everyone on your list before December 25.

"When you use three-cent stamps on your Christmas cards, you get first-class mail service," he said, "first-class friends deserve first-class mail and the use of first-class postage makes it certain that your Christmas cards will be delivered promptly. Also, use of first-class postage insures forwarding service if the addressee has moved or the card will be returned to you if the recipient cannot be located. Then, too, on Christmas cards sent by first-class mail, you can include handwritten messages making your greetings more personal."

It is perfectly correct and, in fact, advisable to include your return name and address on each Christmas card envelope. This helps your friends to keep their mailing list up-to-date and insures correction of your list if the card is returned as undeliverable.

Postmaster Kasischke warns that if any of your Christmas card envelopes are larger than nine inches by 12 inches or smaller than 2 3/4 inches by four inches they must be sent by first-class mail because such cards require hand cancellation.

When your Christmas cards are ready to mail, you will do both yourself and Postmaster Kasischke a real favor by putting the cards with local addresses in one bundle and those for out-of-town destinations in another. Then mark each bundle with special identification labels you can get free at the post office which read "All for out-of-town delivery" and "all for local delivery."

If you have a large card list mail your out-of-town Christmas cards several days in advance of those for local delivery and try to get all cards for distant points mailed by December 15 and those for local delivery should be started on their way at least a week before Christmas.

Regarding the mailing of Christmas gifts, Postmaster Kasischke points out that right now the big double rush is beginning with the out-going Christmas mails paralleling the flood of incoming packages and Christmas cards. He urges that you get your out-of-state packages into the post office within the next day or two and do everything possible to mail all of your Christmas gifts for local delivery by December 10.

The postmaster said that he would appreciate cooperation from all business firms to delay the mailing of circulars and catalogs until after December 25. He also suggested that they step up their regular correspondence mailings to 4:00 p. m. or earlier each day.

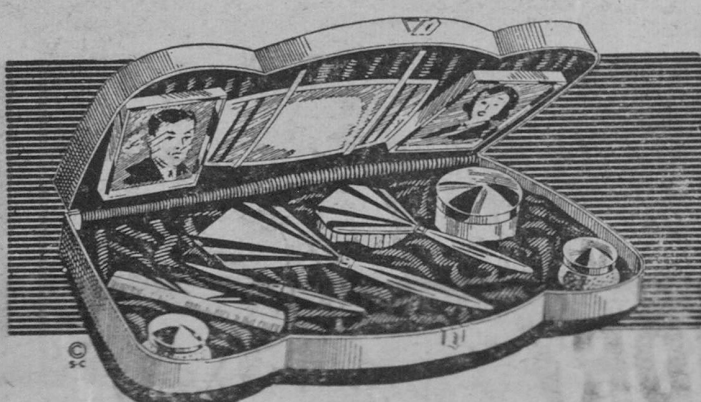

# Farm Events

By Marvin Davenport

Friday, December 9—Barnyard Economics, Russell Mawby of the agricultural economics department at Michigan State University will be here. Plainfield Township Hall, 1:00 p. m.

Tuesday, December 13—Last lamb pool for 1955.

I was the guest of the Iosco County Farm Bureau board of directors last week at Lyle Long's home in Grant Township. The 22 of us present heard two very fine reports of the Farm Bureau's annual state meeting attended by Mr. and Mrs. Elmer Britt of Burleigh Township. In Mr. Britt's report he indicated that several of the Iosco County resolutions had been approved and now were on the state "docket" for concentrated action.

Another report given was concerned with Iosco County's security. Every farm operator who "takes in" (grosses) \$600 or more, should file an income tax return whether he (or she) has to pay income tax or not. At the same time and on the same farm will be computed the amount of social security tax you must pay. Every farmer is compelled by federal law to file for payment of social security tax. How much the farmer receives from social security at the age of 65 is determined by the amount he has paid into it.

Discussion of social security is one of the big reasons Russell Mawby, Michigan State University agricultural economist, is with us Friday, December 9, from 1:00 p. m. until 3:30 p. m. at the Plainfield Township Hall in Hale. The public is invited to attend. A question box will be provided at the door so anyone can write out his questions on social security and have them answered at the meeting.

I had a farmer recently ask me how all this "radioactive research" was helping agriculture? He heard Michigan State University had been granted funds for the study of plants and animals. Our dairy department is cooperating with Dr. Robert C. Lewis in such work. Dr. Lewis says that he has found a way to measure the thyroid secretion rate of calves. Secretions from the thyroid gland boost an animal's metabolism, the life processes.

Using radioactive iodine as a tracer, he found what he believes may mean a new technique in selecting breeding stock; a way to find the best "doers" that will compensate their good characteristics to their calves.

The radioactive iodine tracer technique was first developed by Michigan State University physiologist, Paul Reineke, to measure the thyroid secretion rate of rats. Lewis had to change the method considerably to work it on larger animals.

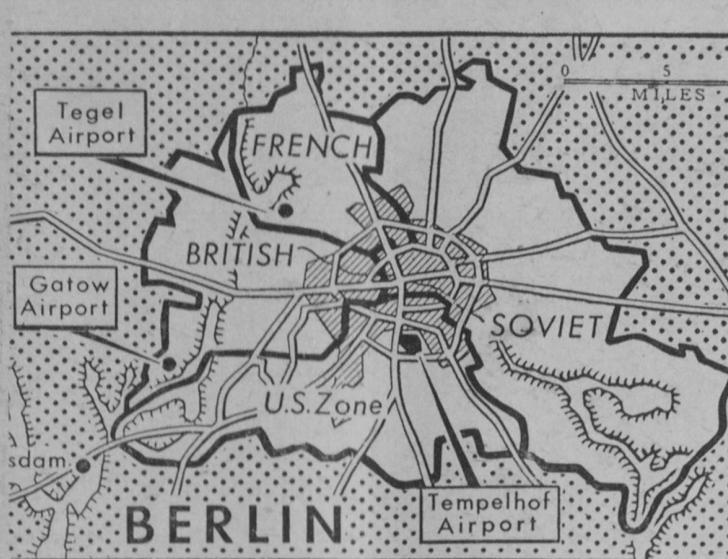

### GOOD CROP OF CHRISTMAS TREES

The first of some 1,500,000 Christmas trees, harbingers of the holiday season, have started their journey from the forests of Michigan to their tinsel place beside the Christmas stocking.

Early indications are that this year's crop should be good in quantity and quality, despite the ferocious winds that swept through the state November 16 and 17.

Most of the trees which end up in the living rooms of Michigan residents will be home grown. Michigan trees should account for 65 percent of the sales this year, with most of the balance coming from Canada.

Scotch pines and balsams are becoming increasingly popular because they shed very little. A good Scotch pine or balsam will shed only a negligible amount over a two or three-week period.

Christmas tree plantations, which provide most of the trees grown in Michigan, are a five-million dollar a year industry, one which is growing rapidly.

Under a state law designed to block Christmas tree "poaching," persons transporting more than six trees must produce a bill of sale signed by the owner of the land where trees were cut.

The agriculture department has set up checking stations at Kawikawlin, Menominee and St. Ignace. Department inspectors stop trucks at these points and require the driver to show the bill of sale.

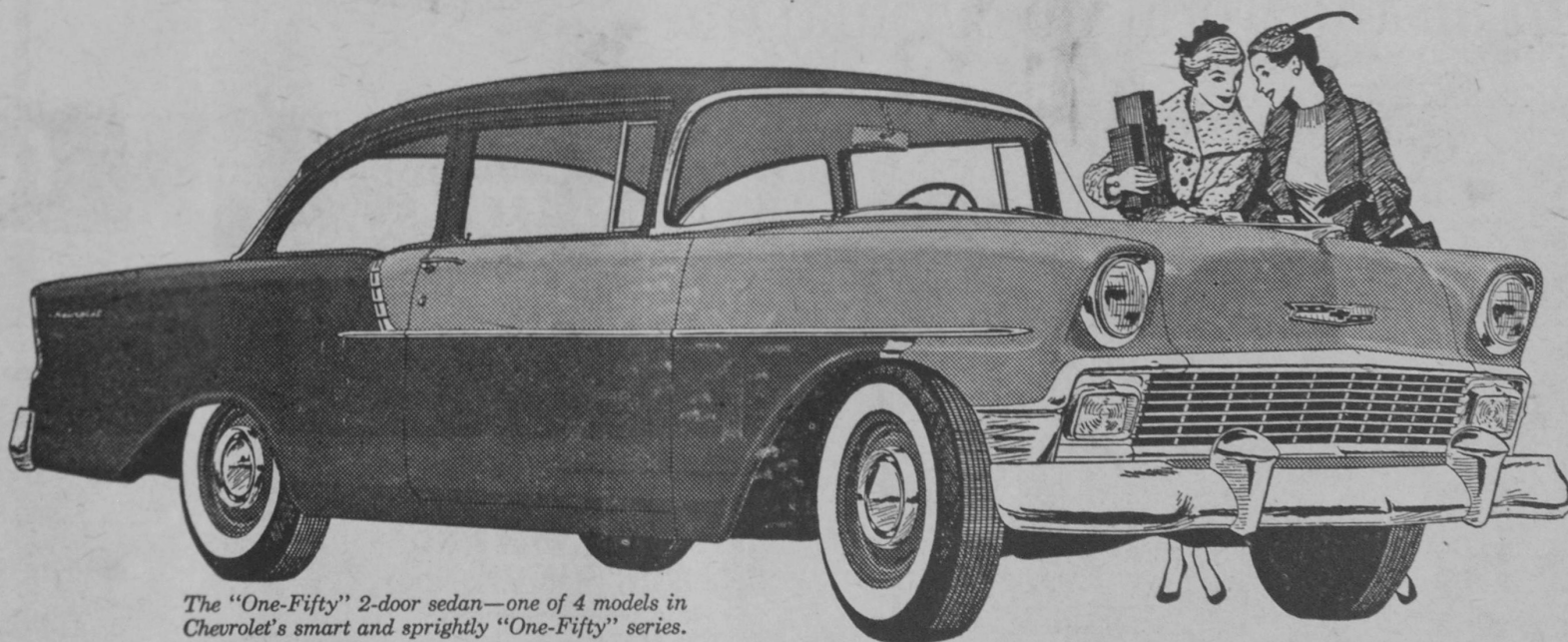

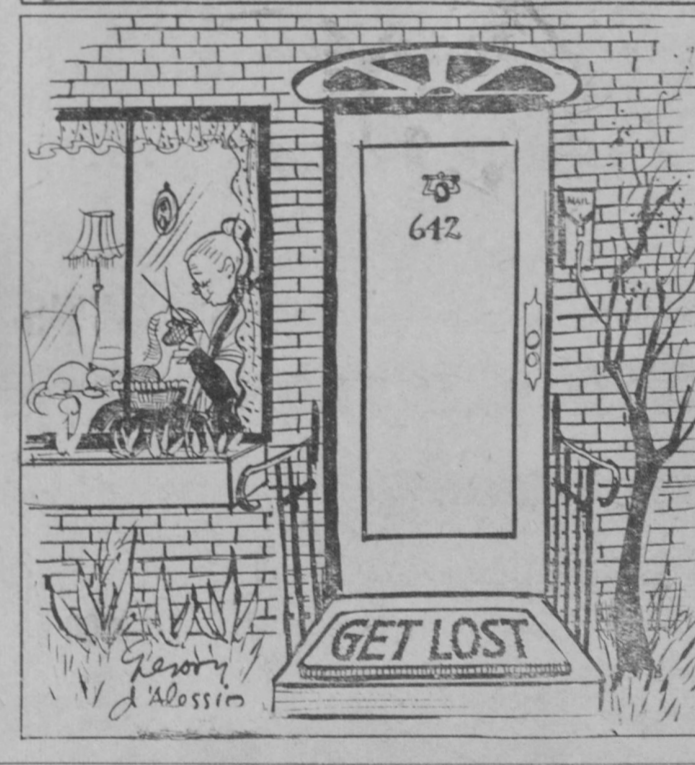

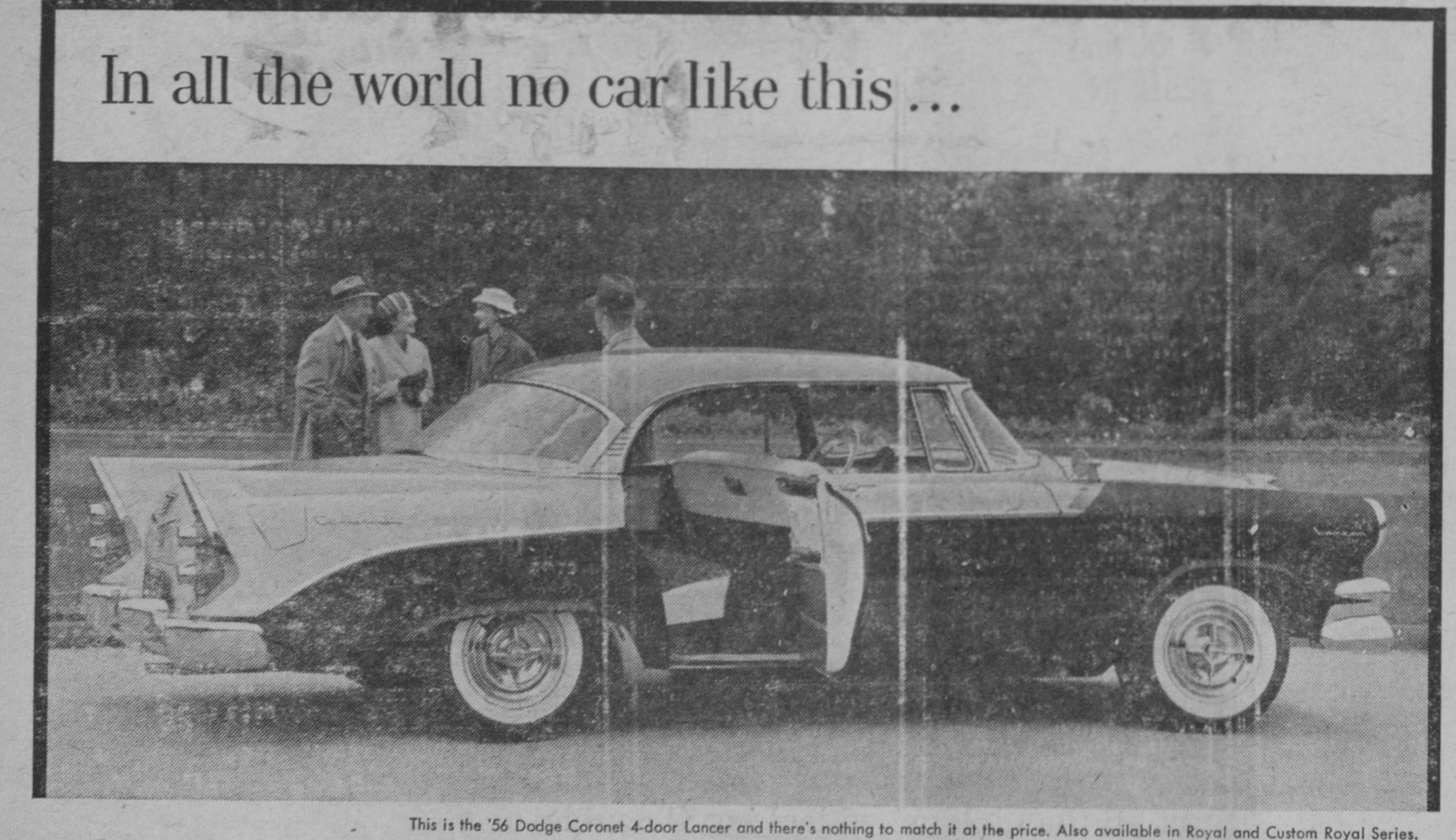

## Benson Has New Idea to Solve Farm Surpluses

Secretary of Agriculture Ezra Taft Benson has come up with what is intended to be an answer to critics of his farm policy. The new Benson proposal would pay as much as \$5,000 a year to farmers who divert surplus land from crop-producing acreage to grass, forage and tree-growing.

The proposal is intended to reduce production of surplus crops on a long-term basis and help solve the surplus problem which has hounded the Eisenhower administration and previous administrations for many years. The new proposal is the main feature contained in a new farm program to be put before congress next year.

The new program will also be taken up at the December meeting of the National Agricultural Advisory Commission, a body created by President Eisenhower two years ago.

under the new program, farmers would have to sign up for five years and agree to take specified acreage out of production of surplus crops. Farmers cooperating under the program would be able to harvest seed or graze livestock on the acreage taken out of production, but they could not harvest crops.

It is estimated they would be allowed from \$15 to \$20 an acre for seed in addition to annual payment amounting to over five percent of the appraised value of the land.

It is thought that Secretary Benson would take more than 16,000,000 acres out of production in the first year of the program. If this is done, some 800,000 farmers would probably cooperate to reduce acreage this amount. Over a 15-year period it is expected that at least 23,000,000 acres would be put in reserve by more than a million farmers.

## Highway Death Toll for Year Nearly 2,000

It now appears almost certain that more than 2,000 persons will lose their lives in Michigan traffic in 1955.

This probability was borne out when the state police monthly traffic accident report revealed that 204 persons were killed during October, raising the death toll to 1,914 for the first 10 months of 1955.

The October toll exceeded 200 for the second month this year and was up 37, or 22 percent, over October 1954.

Should the total for the year pass the 2,000 mark, it will be the third time in recorded Michigan traffic history. The high record was in 1937 with 2,175, and the second high in 1941 with 2,133.

October's injury toll was 5,657, or an increase of seven percent over the same month last year. Reported accidents numbered 17,812, a nine percent increase.

Injuries for the first 10 months of this year total 49,060 and reported accidents 154,571. These figures represent increases of

nine and five percent, respectively, over the same period of 1954. Deaths in rural areas were up 15 percent while urban deaths were down seven percent.

Mileage traveled the first nine months this year, the latest figure available, was 22.1 billion, an increase of nearly nine percent over 20.3 billion in the same period last year. The death rate of 6.4 per 100 million miles of travel was up two percent.

A 17-year-old Oscoda youth was arrested on charges of attempting to derail a Detroit and Mackinac Railway train last Friday.

Police said that a south-bound freight train struck a railroad tie which was placed on the tracks west of the Cedar Road on November 30.

After an investigation by Michigan State Police from East Tawas and Earl Davis of railway company, the youth was questioned and readily admitted putting the tie on the rack.

Police said that the locomotive's wheels pushed the tie off the tracks and no damage was done to the train.

He was turned over to probate court authorities on the charges.

## Bishop Emerick Officiates at Confirmation Sunday



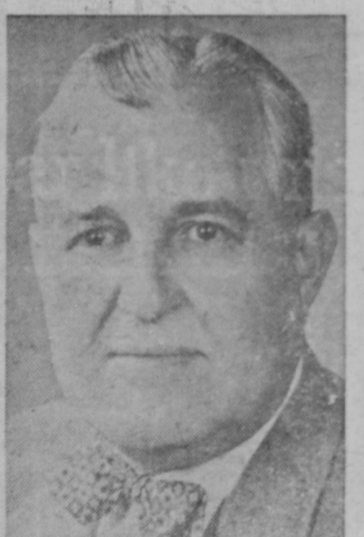

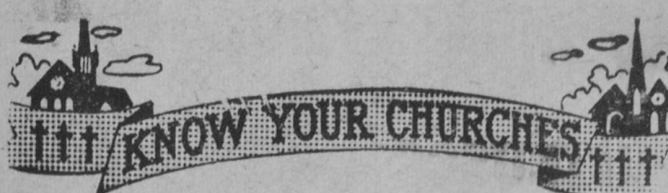

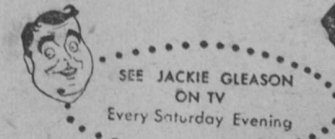

Occupancy Expected in Fall Henry Habercorn, general manager of H. E. Beyster and Associates, architects of the new school, said that the contract calls for a substantial completion of the classroom wing for occupancy by September 1, 1956. The building is scheduled for complete construction by January 1, 1957.

The general contractors stated that, although the start of construction would be during an unseasonable time of the year, they would do everything possible to have the classrooms ready for occupancy by September 1, as specified in the contract.

With the award of contracts to

successful bidders, the long-sought-after dream of a modern new school in the Tawas area is nearing realization. Ground work to begin plans for the new school was begun in 1952 with the consolidation of the districts, followed by months of planning by the board of education, architects and special committees. Many ski parks have added new facilities this year, he said. For example, at Silver Valley, new tow lifts will operate this season and a new chalet is now under construction.

Christmas Star Still Mystery to Astronomers

The mystery of the Christmas star brings popular interest in astronomy to a peak in December, says University of Michigan associate professor, Hazel M. Losh. And it is a mystery astronomers have not solved yet. "The narrative about the star is too incomplete, the date of the appearance of the star too uncertain, the early calendar too unreliable to lead us to any definite conclusions," she states. One explanation advanced is that the "star" reported to have guided the shepherds may have been a conjunction of bright planets. The sun will reach its southernmost point this month, the winter solstice, as it is called. The sun will be shining in its shortest daily arc across the southern hemisphere sky. We will have our shortest day and longest night, about nine and 15, Losh points out.

At this time of the year the earth is closer to the sun than during our summer which tends to make our winter a little milder and the southern summer a little hotter. In spite of the fact that we are closer to the sun the sun's rays now hit us obliquely which lessens their force, the astronomy professor explains.

Venus, after its long appearance during the summer and early fall as an evening planet, is now the "morning star." And Mars will be a bright orange object in the southwestern sky. Some of the most beautiful and colorful stars in all the heavens light up the eastern horizon. Professor Losh says, citing Orion, the giant huntsman, as an example. He moves across the southern sky during the course of the night.
