15 Deer Killed by Dogs in Alabaster Area

"Dog owners will be prosecuted for letting their dogs run deer and other protected game," warned Conservation Officer Arthur Leitz yesterday. "This is a bad time of the year for deer, they are very weak. A number of deer have been killed by dogs in Alabaster Township during the past few weeks."

Leitz said that he found 15 deer which had been killed in Alabaster Township, one a large buck. He said that there is about 12 to 20 inches of snow in that area.

The local conservation officer stated that owners of dogs which are found running deer will be prosecuted under Section 19, Act 286, Public Acts of 1929.

"If you own a dog, you had better keep it tied up," warned Officer Leitz. "Your dog is liable to be shot if it runs deer and you run the risk of being prosecuted for its action." Three dogs were killed Wednesday morning in Alabaster Township.

This action by the conservation department follows a similar warning from the Isoco County Sheriff's Department last week.

Werth Gets Overwhelming Vote for Mayor

The twin cities of Tawas City and East Tawas were the honor cities on the Stroh Hockey Radio Network Tuesday, February 15, and to represent this community, Mayor George Myles of Tawas City and Mayor Elmer Werth of East Tawas, appeared at Olympia in Detroit to watch the Wings first-hand and to make their comments over the Stroh Radio Network.

Seek Attorney General's Opinion

The Tawas Area Board of Education has been asked by A. Conrad Carlson of the forestry department to secure an opinion from the state attorney general as to whether or not the district has the legal right to enter into an exchange of lands with the federal government for the federally-owned Beal Nursery property.

This new development in the controversial site question was announced at the board's regular meeting Tuesday night. The question was referred to Isoco County prosecuting attorney, William R. Barber, who has asked for an opinion from the attorney general.

Several other communications were read during the meeting. The legal right to enter into an exchange of lands with the federal government for the federally-owned Beal Nursery property was discussed by the board.

Board chairman, Randall M. Posz, stated that no further information had been received by the board as to the cost of the exchange property or the cost of the privately-owned property adjoining the fairgrounds. He said that no decision could be reached until the legal right to enter into an exchange of lands with the federal government was established.

The board discussed the annual budget for the year 1955-56 following the public meeting, which gave an increase of \$100 on the base salary for teachers. A yearly salary of \$3,300 for beginning teachers with a bachelor's degree, and a maximum salary of \$4,100 was authorized.

City Retires All of Original Water and Sewer Bonds

During a discussion of the annual budget Monday night, Albert H. Buch, city clerk, told Tawas City Council members that the original issue of general obligation water bonds sold by the city on September 1, 1935, would be retired in April of this year.

The original bond issue was for \$15,000 and undertaken during WPA days for financing the construction of a water works system in the city.

In 1953 and 1948 two other water and sewer bonds amounting to \$25,000 were retired by the city. Both of these were sold during WPA days.

The council approved recommendations of the city park board which would exchange a piece of land 20 by 180 feet from the east end of the park for the Plank Road lot of equal footage fronting Tawas Bay and adjoining the park property.

The land exchange would give Andrew Oberla of Detroit, who recently purchased the former Goldsmith property, an entrance on US-23 as a part of the property exchange. Oberla also made a \$500 contribution to the park fund.

Representatives from Tawas Township met with the council to discuss means of financing road improvement on the Plank Road commencing at M-55 and continuing to the city limits. The city plans to blackout Harris Avenue from the city limits to the public school buildings and would tie in with the proposed improvements of the Plank Road.

The council approved a resolution read by the city clerk regarding the recent changes in the names of streets in the city. At its last meeting the council authorized the action and ordered 37 new to-date maps be prepared, up-to-date maps of the city hall showing the changes.

A date permit application by Peter Young of Young's Tawas Bar was approved by the council, subject to the approval of the Michigan State Liquor Commission.

Mr. Tuttle accompanied them during the visit to Chicago.

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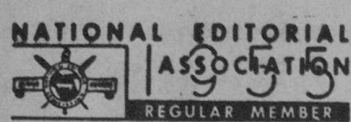

Dear Editor,

At the last meeting of the Committee for a School, a group of citizens interested in obtaining facts for the sole purpose of enlightening the voters of the school district, several more questions were presented. The committee feels that the answers to the questions below and those asked in an earlier letter will clarify erroneous information and affect a solution to the school site problem.

What is the actual cost of supplying water and sewer to the point of construction should the school be built on the Fairground Site? According to East Tawas council authority, East Tawas would supply sewer and water as well as a lift pump for sanitary sewer to the proposed site and 100 feet on the fairgrounds property. It is our understanding that the East Tawas cost would be for approximately 800 feet and the school district would then finish the extension of 450 to 600 feet to the proposed building location. (The Neumann-Reinke engineered cost projected for sewer and water was \$7.00 per foot.)

A sewer lift station recently constructed in the Tawas area cost approximately \$25,000. Assuming the proposed station would be smaller, what would the cost of the station be? Does

the City of East Tawas have sufficient funds on hand for this type of expenditure or would the people of East Tawas have to vote a bond issue to finance same? How would the maintenance cost of the station be defrayed?

How extensive a road building project will be needed to gain access to the school, Tawas City estimated cost for road widening, surfacing and sidewalks would be a minimum of \$13,500. Does this necessitate a bond issue? If not, who is expected to pay for this project?

East Tawas spokesmen informally have stated that East Tawas would straighten out the road by the Schrieber Coal Yard and the Pfeiffer's Beer warehouse through acquisition of the land where the former Robinson Coal Yard was located and build the road over the property. What is the cost of acquisition of the land and road construction? Who will pay for same?

Traffic through the bordering industrial area consisting of the County Garage, Timco Corporation, Pfeiffer's Beer Storage, Standard Oil Bulk Plant, Kleon's Bulk Storage Plant, Consumers Power Sub-Station and pole yards, Straits Aggregate Company, Schrieber's Coal Yard, Detroit and Mackinac Railway Company, Ottawa Equipment Company, Feather-Lite Corporation, City Fuel and Mason Supply, Glove Factory, and this year the Osme Wood Treating Plant (next year possibly a foundry or glue factory)—This is a zoned industrial area and it presents a hazardous condition for children walking to school as well as an

unsatisfactory location for an educational institution.

Also, by utilizing industrial property a school would tend to retard industrial growth in the area and slow up future economic assistance for the people of the area which is so needed to further develop year round incomes for our residents.

Dear Editor:

In response to the letter of Herb Cholger, appearing in the Tawas Herald last week and which was also handed to the board of education as well as the Iosco County News, we must say that, at last, it appears that some gains are being made in the unity of our area.

Many of the points raised in Herb's letter reflect the feeling of those who are encouraging a survey and consideration of the Fairgrounds.

It will be recalled that the appearance of one of our citizens before the board, a month ago, suggested that the board now make and present to the voters a complete survey of the fairgrounds property and allow the voters the privilege of accepting or rejecting the proposition, after they have been given the opportunity to weigh the facts so presented.

Such a survey should be as complete and thorough as that which was presented on the Neumann-Reinke site. Herb mentioned in his letter a differential of cost on the Fairgrounds from "free" to \$45,000.

It was suggested that the board obtain options on sufficient land presently in private ownership to induce the government to make a trade. This is not unreasonable and when the options are obtained the board will be able to report as to the exact facts regarding this item, and it will not run from "free" to \$45,000, but rather, will be the exact dollars that we must consider.

The question concerning acreage was also mentioned. Regarding this, it was suggested to the board that the architect make a survey of the property involved and give us this further fact.

While "dollars" as a term, was used rather loosely when it was suggested that the board could not consider a site which would cost from \$50,000 to \$300,000 or more, the fact still remains that to date, a majority of the voters have not underwritten any proposition presented and we should all be glad to cast our lot with the majority after a presentation of the facts is made and the voters speak.

It should be quite evident to the board the desires of the citizens must be recognized—accurately and fairly present the facts concerning the fairgrounds as suggested by Herb, and allow us to make our own decision at an area election.

While, in the opinion of the board, this might not be the best for us, it must be kept in mind that the board represents the people of the area and they are charged with the responsibility to solve our problems to the satisfaction of the majority.

Let's all join Herb's committee for a school and have one.
