Cardinals Win District Basketball Championship

Defeat Hale and Harrisville for Class D Honor

The Whittemore Cardinals won the Class D District Championship at Au Gres Saturday night by handily downing Hale 72-43. The champions reached the finals by dropping a scrappy Harrisville quintet on Thursday night 61-41.

The Tigers of Harrisville tried their best to upset the Cards, who played part of the game without the services of their lanky center, Francis Pagel, who left the game in the first quarter because of illness.

Harrisville tied the game up three times in the second quarter only to have the Cards put the game out of reach in the second half when Pagel returned to the floor.

John Pavlik, a promising sophomore forward, was the scoring star of the game with 11 buckets and a charity toss for a 23-point total. Sam Gozior led the josing Tigers with 16.

In the Saturday night final with Hale, it was Whittemore all the way with Roger Hall leading the parade with 28 points on nine field goals and 10 gift points, followed by Francis Pagel, center, with nine field goals and two foul shots for a 20-point total.

Nelson Shellenbarger was Hale's only consistent scorer with 22 points. The rest of the squad gave him little help, finding it almost impossible to crack the tight Card defense.

With the Red Birds leading in the fourth quarter by 28 points, Coach Dudo put in his reserves who proved a good match for the Hale five, scoring eight points to Hale's seven in the rest of the game.

School Site Issue Brings Out Heated Discussion

The final few words spoken at the Tuesday evening meeting of the Tawas Area Board of Education held at the East Tawas school building offered the only constructive information to come from a long, drawn out discussion of the school controversy.

In closing Randall Fox, president of the board of education, stated that a committee meeting will be held next Tuesday and at that time it will be determined what to do on a school vote. The decision will be given at the regular board meeting the following Tuesday evening.

The fore part of the meeting was taken up with a display of band uniforms. Edward Rima, band instructor, discussed the 16 different companies represented, quality of uniforms, materials and cost. He also stated that uniforms now used by the school band could be sold for \$1,000 per set. The board authorized Mr. Rima to proceed with arrangements for the purchase of new uniforms, an approximate cost of \$3,910, and the sale of the old ones. The school district would pay the balance.

The school site discussion presented its usual discord. An opinion of Isoco County prosecuting attorney, William R. Barber, with the endorsement of the attorney general, was read stating that the school district could not legally purchase land outside the school district in exchange for the fairgrounds property.

William Look, a determined fairgrounds supporter, read several passages of school law and stated that the attorney for the Citizens' Committee for Better Schools, A. J. Kinnane of Bay City, said that Barber's opinion applied to money raised in 1933. He contended that Barber's opinion was not legal and only the school attorney could issue the statement of opinion needed to clarify this most recent development in the attempt to secure use of the fairgrounds property as a site for the proposed school.

It was pointed out that Supt. R. E. Mick had contacted the attorney general's office and was informed that he would have to present his question through the county prosecuting attorney's office and then the attorney general would give his opinion.

Attorney Richard Newman, representing the East Tawas City Council, addressed the board informing the members that if the school board would relinquish all efforts to obtain the fairgrounds site and request the Forestry Department to obtain the land exchange with the City of East Tawas, then East Tawas would re-sell it to the school district at the purchase price in order to "get around" the law.

President Fox attempted to present a comparison of cost of sites, directly to the school district and indirect costs to the two cities. His report, based on architects findings and estimates of the Tawas City and East Tawas superintendents, on public works, was interrupted repeatedly with questions from the audience and by Mr. Look, who scoffed at these findings.

A communication from Mr. and Mrs. Louis Dubovsky, who wished to clear up any misunderstanding about their property which adjoins the fairgrounds, stated that they do not wish to sell and if forced to sell for school purposes the price of their property would be \$18,000.

Church Practices Parable to Gain Building Funds

Like the three servants in the parable of the talents as recorded in the 25th Chapter of St. Matthew, last Sunday about 40 members of the Tawas City Methodist Church were allotted \$10.00 each to invest in gainful projects for the increase of the Memorial Church Hall building fund.

In the parable, a man traveling into a far country divided his capital of eight talents or about \$8,000.00 among his three servants and instructed them to use it according to their ability for his gain.

The Rev. Benjamin Whaley, pastor of the church, had used the 25th Chapter of St. Matthew as the theme of the morning sermon, emphasizing the spiritual side of the parable.

The \$10.00 allotted to each member of the church will be used in a profit making project. On September 1 there will be an accounting and the capital, with the gain, will be turned back into the building fund.

Many old ideas and some new will be used by members in their search for projects. Already adopted by some of the women are bread and cake baking, doughnut making and apron making. One of the men in the congregation has a playhouse project on which he expects to make a 250 percent profit. Others are considering market garden projects.

The Memorial Church Hall has been under consideration by the congregation of the Methodist Church for some time, and the architectural plans have been recently approved by the district board. The structure will include Sunday School class and social room, large kitchen, storage and furnace rooms. Constructed of wood, the exterior walls and finish will conform to those of the church building.

A steadily accumulating building fund, \$6,100.00 is now in the hands of the church treasurer, states Mr. Whaley. An estimated \$8,000.00 or one-half of the cost of constructing the building must be on hand before work can be started, he said.

Tawas City Council Hires Regular Bookkeeper

The Tawas City council authorized the hiring of Fred Swartz as city bookkeeper at its regular meeting Monday night. Mr. Swartz, who took over his new duties on March 8, will be hired on a three-month trial period, during which time he will work with city clerk, Albert H. Buch, in revamping the city government's present-day bookkeeping system.

The new city employee has had many years experience as a bookkeeper and clerk, having worked in the one-time Ealy McKay and Company Bank at Tawas City and later spent several years in a Detroit banking firm.

The new position was established at city hall to relieve the work load on the elected city clerk. The clerk's yearly salary will be reduced accordingly.

Among other matters taken up during the meeting, Reginald E. Bublitz, superintendent of public works, told the council that the steel street marking signs which were recently authorized by that body would be shipped within three weeks. He said that the signs would be installed as soon as the frost is out of the ground.

The city clerk reported that the new city maps showing recent changes in names of streets would be available in approximately two weeks.

Mayor Asks for 'Filled-In Land' Clarification

Much has been said about "widespread fill-in operations in Great Lakes bottoms lands" during past weeks by Michigan daily newspapers. According to one published report, filled-in land off Tawas City is said to be used as a lumber storage area.

In an effort to clarify the information, the City of Tawas City recently requested further information from Charles E. Millar, chief of the conservation department's lands division.

In a letter to Mr. Millar, Mayor George W. Myles said: "An article appearing in the Bay City Times, written by William Kuisela on February 19, stated that there had been violations of filled-in land in Tawas City and that it had raised the interest of city officials, as they have been working with the conservation and health departments to improve the river and lake frontage and to date the city's records show no notice from the departments as to these violations."

Mayor Myles said that he would appreciate a prompt reply in supplying this information so that the city may cooperate in correcting any violations within the city.

The reply from Mr. Millar was received this week. He said, "The newspaper article you mention refers to some of the locations on the Great Lakes where, our shore officers have reported, filling of lake bottom lands is now taking place or has taken place sometime in the past. These reports have been general in nature and most of them will be corrected at a later date when time permits."

Millar continued, "It is quite difficult in many cases to distinguish between a project undertaken to control shore erosion and one which is carried out for the purpose of acquiring additional land area lakeward. The conservation department does not want to interfere with any shore owner who is taking proper and legal steps to protect his shore property from erosion during high water."

He said that five cases in Tawas City and East Tawas had been cited where filling had taken place, some of which have been projects to control erosion. "This matter remains to be determined upon further investigation," the conservation official said.

"It is not contemplated that action will be taken on any of these cases until the exact nature of the project is determined," Millar said.

The conservation department said that the department would appreciate any cooperation from the city in correcting any violations, if any.

Social Security Filing Date Drawing Near

A representative from the Bay City Social Security Office will be at the Federal Building in East Tawas from 12:00 noon until 1:00 p. m. on Wednesday, March 16. Anyone wanting to apply for social security payments or needing information about social security should contact him.

Social security returns will have to be filed reporting newly covered people in April 1955 in some cases. The 1954 amendments provided certain changes which will bring in new employees on a compulsory basis.

Paul M. Ellifritz, manager of the Bay City office, listed the following groups of newly covered employees.

1. Any household worker who earns at least \$50 in cash wages from one employer in a calendar quarter. The calendar quarters begin on January 1, April 1, July 1 and October 1. It is no longer required that the employee work on a certain number of days.
2. Any farm worker who earns at least \$100 in cash wages from any one farm operator. There is no longer any time requirement. The requirement for coverage is on a cash wage basis alone.
3. People who work around doing repair or alteration or other work in the home are covered where the cash wages are at least \$50. Ellifritz pointed out, however, that many carpenters, masons, painters, etc., are self-employed and report their own work. This coverage generally applies only to those artisans who are told when to come to work, what hours to work and supervised by the householder.
4. Self-employment coverage was extended to a number of new types of businesses. Funeral directors, accountants, engineers, architects and farmers come under in 1955. However, the self-employed will report their earnings for social security when they file their tax returns for 1955.

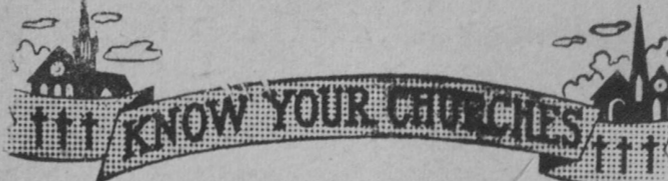

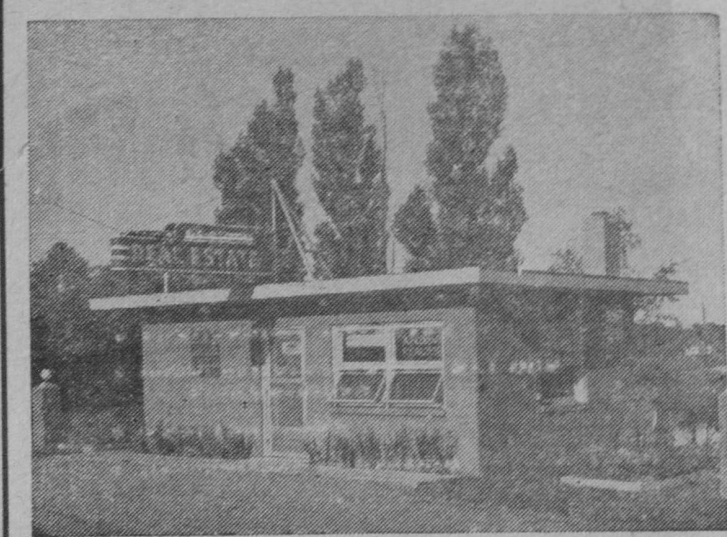

Snapshot Silhouettes

You needn't be handy with the scissors, or trace something someone else drew, to make silhouettes. All you need is your camera and your imagination put into action at the same time—that'll give you original ones that are truly your own creation.

The first thing to know about snapping a silhouette is the position of your light. Usually, we take pictures with the light in front of the subject. But for a silhouette, it definitely has to be behind the subject.

For indoor silhouette making, a sheet makes a good background. On a sunny day you can stretch the sheet over a window and pose your subject—in profile, of course—in front of it. Darken the rest of the room as much as you can and you are ready to make a silhouette. This will be a short time exposure, so place the camera on a tripod or other solid support.

You can also snap silhouettes indoors at night. Once again, you use a sheet for a background, this time stretching it across an open doorway so that you can put a light behind it.

Just as for daytime shots, you pose your subject, in profile, in front of the sheet and make your time exposure.

You can make silhouettes of any subject that can be depended upon to remain still during the length of the time exposure. That rules out most babies and pets. But even then, it is worth taking a chance, even though they might move and ruin one picture. If it works, the resulting picture would be so much fun to have.

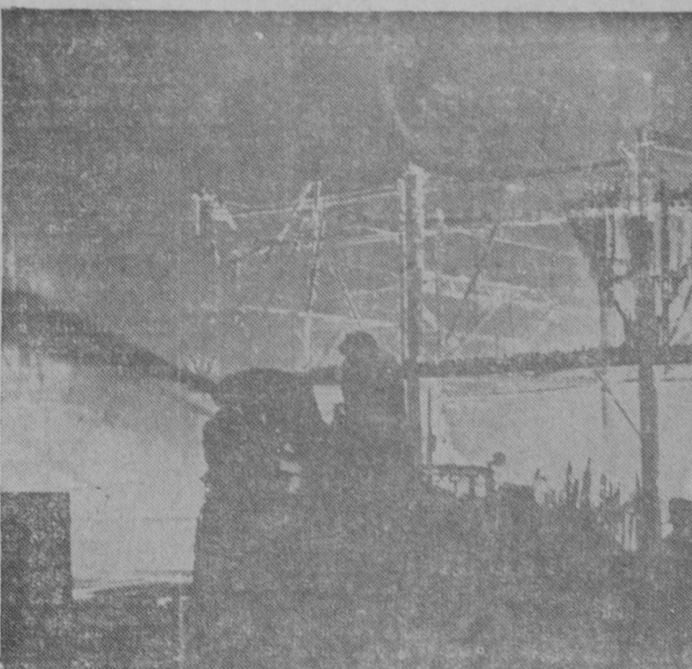

Examination for Driver's License More Stringent

Sheriff Ivan O'Farrell today announced that the Isoco County Sheriff's Department is cooperating with the Michigan State Safety Commission, under the leadership of the department of state, in a state-wide public education program on driver licensing.

According to Sheriff O'Farrell, the new driver license examination for beginning drivers recently put into effect is much more comprehensive than the previous one and is a far better measure of a person's ability to drive safely. He urged all new applicants for a driver's license to study harder on the Michigan traffic law, safe driving practices, and to practice more on their driving before taking the road test.

"Traffic authorities are determined to be doubly sure that the persons awarded the privilege of driving are able to demonstrate this ability by passing a more thorough examination. Many motorists who do not prepare for it carefully will fail this test on the first try, but those who pass the test will have the feeling they have earned the privilege of driving," the sheriff pointed out that passing the driver's license examination and obtaining a license merely launches the beginning motorist on his driving career. He emphasized the fact that the motorist must continually prove his right to retain this privilege by obeying traffic laws. If he causes a traffic accident or commits serious hazardous moving violations he will have his license suspended. Only in that way can the state protect other drivers on the highway.

The sheriff called upon all motorists to cooperate in living up to the obligations of their license. "Remember," he said, "last year 23,164 Michigan motorists did have their licenses suspended or revoked."

Former Salesman Dies in Florida

Rolla W. Brink, one-time salesman for Lee and Cady and well known in this community 25 years ago, died last week Tuesday at Jacksonville, Florida. Born at Gaines, Michigan, he spent his younger years at Grayling. He was with Lee and Cady for 26 years. He leaves the widow and daughter. Interment was at Grayling last Friday afternoon.

Frozen pies are an example of saving time and having a quick dessert sometime when you need it ever so much. The way to do it is to make up several pies when you have the time, then freeze them for later baking. Yes, pies are more like the fresh product when frozen raw and baked when you are ready to use it.

Most satisfactory for freezing are mince pies and pies made of fruit or berries. Double crust pies freeze best, but do not cut air vents in the top until after the pie is removed from the freezer. You will need extra thickening for berry pies that are to be frozen. That is because freezing develops more juice in the fruit. Even with the juiciest fruits, four tablespoons of flour or cornstarch are enough.

A dirty oven often smokes when heated and may even give food and unpleasant taste. Use a cloth with diluted ammonia for removing oven grease, or leave a dish of ammonia in a closed oven overnight. The fumes will loosen stubborn grease which you can scour lightly with fine steel wool or scouring powder and wipe off easily.

And, have you thought about this? An oven stays cleaner and fresher, doesn't rust from closed in steam, if it is left open to ventilate and cool after using.

And it is further ordered that in pursuance of said decree the lands described in said petition for which a decree of sale shall be made, will be sold for the several taxes, interest and charges thereon as determined by such decree, on the first Tuesday in May thereafter, beginning at 10 o'clock a. m. on said day, or on the day or days subsequent thereto as may be necessary to complete the sale of said lands and of each and every parcel thereof, at the office of said Court Treasurer, or at such convenient place as shall be selected by him at the county seat of the County of Isoco State of Michigan; and that the sale then and there made will be a public sale, and each parcel described in the decree shall be separately exposed for sale for the total taxes, interest and charges, and the sale shall be made to the person paying the full amount charged against such parcel, and accepting a conveyance of the smallest undivided fee simple interest therein; or, if no person will pay the taxes and charges and take a conveyance of less than the entire thereof, then the whole parcel shall be offered and sold, if any parcel of land cannot be sold for taxes, interest and charges, such parcel shall be passed over for the time being, and shall, on the succeeding day, or before the close of the sale, be reoffered, and if, on such second offer, or during such sale, the same cannot be sold for the amount aforesaid, the County Treasurer shall bid off the same in the name of the State.

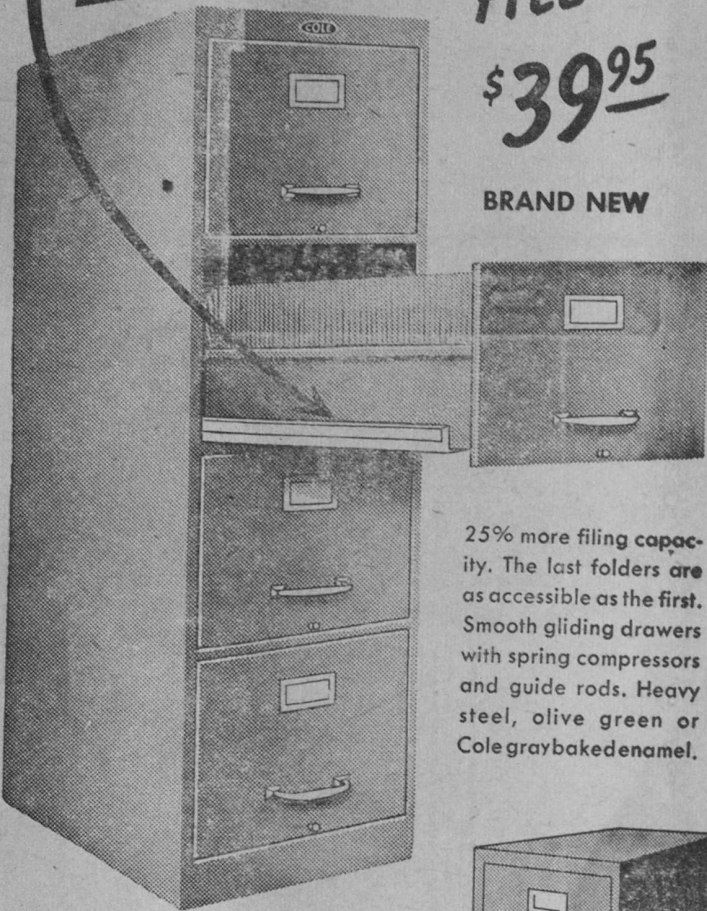

Be sure to see Laidlawville 4-H Club's exhibit in the window at the Tawas Flower Shop.

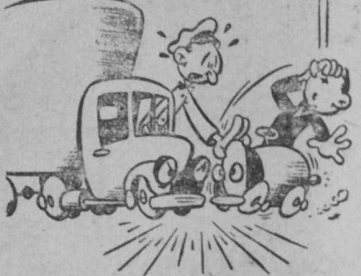
Professional looking argyle socks, sweaters in pattern stitch or with knit-in designs are a goal for every 4-H Club girl working on a knitting project.

for the "4-H Club Girl" project. It is an inexpensive activity because most of the grooming materials which girls learn about are those in everyday use.

In addition to finding out about personal grooming, the 4-H girl develops her personality and sense of etiquette through answering questions in a 4-H bulletin and referring to books on manners.

Lessons, demonstrations and finally a fair exhibit to go along with the project.

"We had our weekly project meeting at the home of Mrs. Edward Nelkie after school on Wednesday, February 23. There were eight girls present. Judy Bowsby gave a demonstration on manicuring fingernails. We also discussed bathing and care of the teeth. Next week we are to have our fingernails manicured when we meet for our lesson." Judy Ulman, reporter.

"All work and no play makes Jack a dull boy." But 4-H Club members need not worry about this because their organization holds to the philosophy that recreation as a regular part of their program promotes leadership, makes for balanced meetings, provides an outlet for creative ideas and provides camping opportunities.

Michigan's 4-H Clubs provided recreation leadership training for nearly 6,000 members last year. Seventy-seven counties in the state gave camping experience to 7,980 boys and girls in 1954.

Recreation is woven into the 4-H Club program in many ways. Games and songs are often a regular part of the meetings. Attending club parties of their sons and daughters, parents of the 4-Hers gain a knowing insight as to their part in the 4-H Club program.

Age 10 isn't too young for a girl to begin learning to plan and prepare meals. In this 4-H project, girls from 10 to 21 learn to buy food by studying food costs and labels. They also learn how best to use home-produced food.

Girls are encouraged to try new foods. But the project doesn't end with planning and preparing food. Girls also learn to serve it attractively and to set a good looking table.

Bread baking and pie making are popular topics for project demonstrations. Younger 4-H Club members are helped by girls who have already completed foods projects. The Reno Topnotchers 4-H Club openhouse featured a variety of demonstrations about food projects activities.

Other subjects available include baking, entertaining, outdoor meals and units for the three meals—breakfast, lunch and dinner.

Fifty scholarships and over 70 out-of-state trips will be the goals won by Michigan 4-H Club members in 1955. Included will be: 27 trips to National Club Congress in Chicago; 40 out-of-state trips for judging and demonstration winners; four trips to National Club Camp in Washington, D. C., the highest award offered to 4-Hers; six trips to Toronto Exposition; 50 scholarships to Michigan State College; \$2,175 in other scholarships; \$525 in savings bond awards.

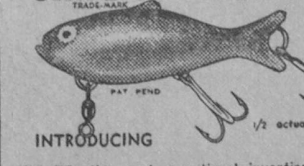
CLUB PROGRAM FOR 1955 PRESENTED TUESDAY
