(Continued from First Page.) mentioned above, and it is in addition to your already staggering debt of \$1,300,000,000 in Michigan, plus the federal debt of \$24,000,000,000.

Do you, the worried taxpayer, want to think about that additional financial burden before it is thrust upon you? Or do you wish us to saddle you with these additional obligations and then worry how you will pay it? The governor glibly brushed off this additional staggering obligation with these words in his first message to this session of the legislature:

"That is a bridge we can cross when we come to it, if we ever come to it—and I hope we never do."

"We'll come to it, alright! When you buy on credit, you always come to the time for settling up! And when we do come to settling up time for the governor's program, it will cost you real tax dollars. It will not and cannot be paid by any one tax, as the governor suggests. The Michigan legislature would have to dip into your pockets for millions of new tax dollars. This means the legislature would have to increase all sources now taxed and add many new taxes."

To carry out this enormous spending program would require not only the corporation income tax the governor is proposing but also a personal income tax, real estate property tax, higher gasoline tax, and new taxes in many other fields.

The people of Michigan have already repudiated a personal income tax, and our memories are certainly long enough to go back to those years when the real estate tax became confiscatory and finally required a 10-year moratorium. We could keep our farms going and the very roofs over our heads.

The move is on again as we look for more tax revenue to increase the real estate property value to the State Board of Equalized Values rather than at the local level level. What is as sacred as the home? Let's keep the roof over our heads. The people of Michigan know you can't get two turkeys for a chicken, that there is no such thing as something for nothing.

There is no such thing as something for nothing. Shall we taxpayers cross the bridge now? Or shall we gamble the economy of Michigan for the next 20 years as the governor suggests and cross that tax bridge due to stationarity. I, as your senator, would like to know your thinking. It is my honest belief that if the taxpayers know the facts, they will come up with the right answers. Your legislature, I am sure, will represent your wishes. This problem is above politics. It is above party. It is bigger than any man or any group or any industry. It affects the entire economy of the country for many years to come. As your senator, I am appealing to you to let me know your thinking on this problem. I cannot accept the thinking that you, the taxpayers, will accept everything and anything.

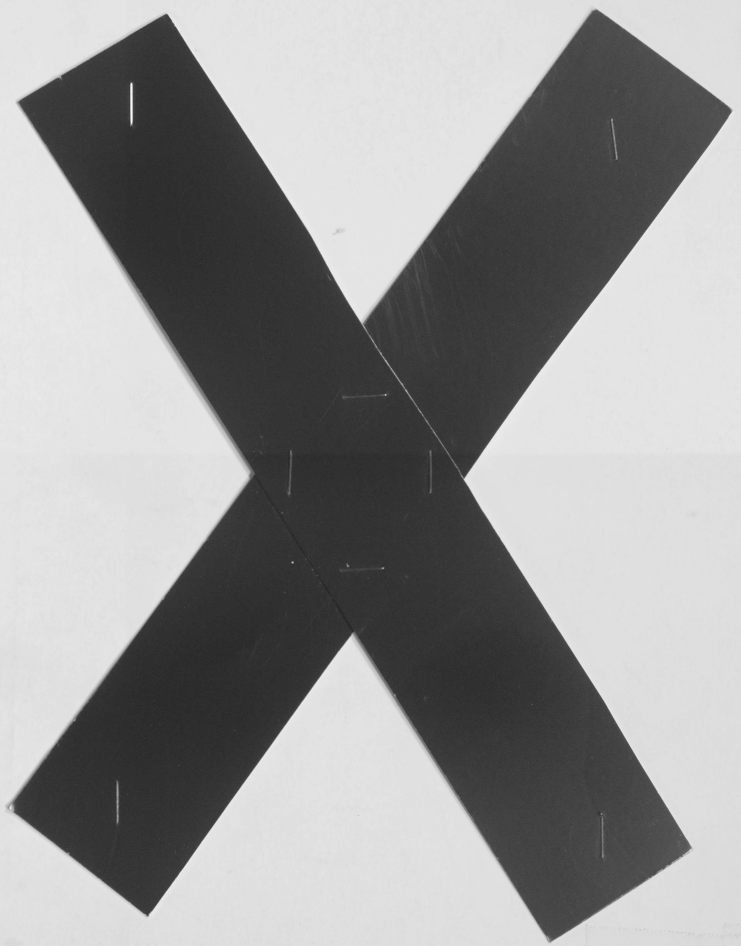
