

The old saying, "There's no use crying over spilled milk," is as true today as in years gone by, but when one looks at the picture captioned, "What Could Have Been," there is good reason for sadness. Just think of the pride the members of the Class of 1955 could have taken in being the first class graduated from the new Tawas Area Junior and Senior High School. Instead, because of the refusal of the electors of the Tawas Area School District to support the school building program, the Class of 1955 was denied that honor and doubtless its members hold among their fond school memories the systematic loading and unloading of buses and crowded classrooms.

Those of you who have taken an interest in the school problems are well aware of the handicaps under which the faculty, superintendent and the board of education are working. They are to be commended for their efforts in making the school system as smooth running as possible under such conditions.

How many more classes will be graduated under similar circumstances? The construction of school buildings takes many months. In order to utilize the warmer months of the year needed for building operations, the wheels of approval must be set in motion-NOW!

Three bonding elections to finance construction of the school have failed. Two of these elections called for the school construction on the Neumann-Reinke site in Tawas Township at a cost of \$775,000. Because the first proposal site had been selected after diligent study as the best site for the district as a whole, the board re-submitted the proposal a few months later after attempting to correct groundless rumors circulated by a group supporting the fairgrounds site and informing the voters of the district of the facts. Again the proposal was defeated by the fairgrounds supporters' use of misinformation and false promises.

The third bond proposal presented an economy measure calling for the construction of a school at the site of the Tawas City unit of the Tawas Area Schools, using the present gymnasium and other facilities on the premises, at a cost of \$575,000. An important factor in defeating this issue was the insistence of the fairgrounds supporters and their attorney, A. J. Kinnane, that the formation of the two-year old school district was illegal.

Immediately upon the announcement in October 1953 by the board of its selection of the Neumann-Reinke site which was based on careful study, opinions of architects and engineers and the approval of the Michigan Department of Public Instruction, this group favoring the fairgrounds registered its protest. Months were devoted to clarifying ques-

There are those individuals who say forget all and start anew, but society's progress is made by learning from past experience. In view of what has happened in the past, is there any reason to expect the fairgrounds supporters have suddenly decided to put a time limit on the title, "Citizens' Committee for Better Schools," under which they class them-

Their insistence that "While in the opinion of the board, this might not be the best for us" is as confusing as their election propoganda. Who is us? The issue is what is best for our children in the way of school facilities.

All we, the electors of the school district, need to do in overcoming any uncertainty in this situation is use the same judgement as in selecting food and clothing for our children. Price and our own financial circumstances govern our decisions, but much thought is given to getting the most and best for our children from the money spent. In other words, if your child needed corrective shoes to prevent a future walking handicap, you would exert every effort to secure these specially constructed shoes as recommended by your doctor, purchasing the best quality your budget would allow. You would completely ignore a layman's suggestion that you purchase a high-priced pair of tennis shoes. Almost any situation involving your child's welfare can be applied to the school situation, clearly pointing out the way to rectifying this long-delayed and essential part of his well being-

No doubt you have often thought of writing your congressman, senator, state representative or legislator of your opinion on an issue. Why not write a letter to your trustee on the board of education or to the board secretary, Walter Niles, so that the board will know that you recognize the needs of the children and how you would like to see the

In October of 1954 the board of education approved the authorization required by Congressman Elford Cederberg to attempt to secure the federally-owned fairgrounds property for a school construction site in answer to the demands of this group. To date the land which the group previously contended was free is still not available to the school district. The next "change in policy" was that the fairgrounds property would have to be exchanged with the forestry by securing government appraised land of equal value. The most recent twist is that the United States Forestry Department questions the right of releasing this land by exchange. The board of education is awaiting the opinion of the state attorney general on this legal matter.

Meanwhile, why not form your own opinion. The children of the district can not "exchange" their educational facilities without the approval of the electors of the district. Start them on their way with a vote of approval for a school building program soon!






