This site consists of approximately 25

The Neumann-Reinke site is located four-tenths of one mile from the center of the student population of the entire school district, on M-55 in Tawas Township, 1.4 miles from the junction of US-23 and M-55, making it easily accessible from all points of the district.

This site was selected with the capable assistance of the citizens site committee along with recommendations by the Michigan Department of Public Instruction, Lansing; H. E. Beyster and Associates, architects and engineers, R. J. Cooke and Clifford Spicer, surveyor and engineer.

The size and location of the Neumann-Reinke site together with its superior physical characteristics were the basis for this selection.

Supporters of the Fairground-Beal Nursery site have been persistent in their efforts to have an opportunity to vote on that site. Although selection of the site is legally the decision of the board of education, the pressure and demands of these individuals, who have blocked three elections to authorize funds for construction of the school, have forced the board of education to hold a site-bonding election.




