Specializing in barbecued chicken and ribs, the Red Chief has installed a new rotisserie which will barbecue 20 chickens every 35 minutes. It will also turn out about 40 pounds of barbecued ribs per hour.

Constructed of all stainless steel with individually turning spits, the rotisserie is regarded as the most modern piece of equipment of its kind available.

The Red Chief is located in the building formerly occupied by the Case Manufacturing Company. The building has been completely remodeled on the inside and has a large kitchen, dance floor and enough room for more than 140 tables.

2 Isosco Boys Awarded for Outstanding Achievement

Announcement was made this week of winners in the fifth annual Prescott-Soper 4-H Club livestock achievement award, presented Friday at the office of Marvin Davenport, Isosco County agricultural agent.

Winners were Robert Waters, son of Mr. and Mrs. George Waters of Reno Township, a senior at Burreleigh Township Rural Agricultural School, and William Laidlaw, son of Mr. and Mrs. Walter Laidlaw of Tawas Township, a junior at Tawas Area Schools. Both boys are in their sixth year of 4-H Club work.

The annual award, presented jointly by George A. Prescott of Tawas Township and Wayne Soper of Prescott, is a two-day trip to Michigan State University at East Lansing.

The winners will be accompanied by Mr. Prescott and son, Allen, and Mr. Davenport.

While there they will visit university dairy farms, barns and buildings on the campus. As an added feature of the trip, the group will watch the Michigan State-Minnesota football game at Macklin Field.

A junior leader and vice president of the Burreleigh Topnotchers 4-H Club, Waters' projects this year are dairying, tractor maintenance, electrical and gardening.

Dairying, electrical and gun safety projects were chosen by Laidlaw this year, a junior leader in the Laidlawville 4-H Club. This is his second award trip to MSU this year, having been selected as the district dairy judging delegate last summer.

'Not Guilty' Jury Verdict in Catto Case

After deliberating for nearly two hours Friday, a jury of 10 men and two women brought in a verdict of "not guilty" in the two-day circuit court trial of Marvin W. "Scotty" Catto, Onocoda resort operator, who was charged with involuntary manslaughter in the May 12 traffic death of Harold Lixey of East Tawas.

Catto was charged with driving the car which struck a light truck driven by Lixey four miles north of East Tawas on May 12. Mr. Lixey was killed instantly when his truck crashed into the front end of a north bound Greyhound bus after the initial impact.

At the time of the accident Mr. Catto was rushing to the bedside of his stricken mother in Flint. Police were attempting to contact Mr. Catto to tell him that his mother had passed away.

Taking of testimony in the case was completed Thursday morning. During the trial Mr. Catto testified on the witness stand that he was driving 60 miles an hour at the time of the accident.

Following the summation of the case for the jury by Prosecuting Attorney William R. Barber, followed by James E. Haggerty, who with John R. Watkins, represented the defendant, Judge Herman Dehnke pointed out three possible verdicts in his charge to the jury: involuntary manslaughter (a felony), negligent homicide (a misdemeanor), or acquittal.

Deadline for Proposals Set at December 6

The Tawas Area Board of Education approved final plans for the new junior and senior high school at its regular meeting Tuesday night. Present at the meeting were representatives of H. E. Beyster and Associates, architects of the new school.

During the meeting members of the board and the architects discussed final details in the plans. The board made a check of several minor changes recommended by Supt. Reynold Mick and Principal Ronald Butterfield at a recent meeting with the architects.

Specifications and plans for the new school will be ready for bidders next week. A \$50 deposit will be required for plans on the general trades contract and \$25 each electrical and mechanical plans.

Closing date to receive the sealed bids from contractors will be December 6 at 8:00 p. m., at which time all proposals will be publicly opened and read aloud. The bids will be received by Walter Niles, secretary of the board.

Plans and specifications will be on file at the following places: Office of the Board of Education, East Tawas; office of H. E. Beyster and Associates, Incorporated, architects and engineers, 700 Griswold Building, Detroit 26; Builders and Trades Exchange at Detroit and Lansing; F. W. Dodge Corporation at Detroit and Flint, and Tri-City Builders and Traders Exchange at Saginaw.

A certified check or a bidder's bond payable to Walter Niles, secretary of the board, for the sum of not less than five percent of the amount of the proposal will be required with each proposal condition to secure the board of education from loss or damage by reasons of withdrawal of the bid or the failure of the bidder to enter into the contract of performance, if the bid is accepted by the board.

The board reserves the right to reject any or all bids or to waive any informalities therein. No bid may be withdrawn for a period of at least 30 days.

The board of education authorized the immediate release of notices of advertisement for bids to be published in the Michigan Contractor and Builder, The Tawas Herald and The Isosco County News.

The board of education and the architects will analyze the bids at the December 6 meeting. Depending upon the amount of time required and the number of bids received, it is possible that the contracts may be awarded at that time.

At Tuesday night's meeting, Clair Herring, a member of the architectural firm, reaffirmed his statement of a few weeks ago telling board members that there should be no difficulty in completing the construction by August of next year, as specified in the contract.

Davison-Rose Inc. Awarded Construction Contract for Immaculate Heart Church

Announcement was made yesterday (Wednesday) that Davison-Rose Builders, Incorporated, had been awarded the contract for construction of the new Immaculate Heart of Mary Church in Tawas City. The announcement was made early Wednesday afternoon by the Rev. Fr. Joseph Castaner, pastor of the church.

Work will start immediately on footings and bringing blocks to grade, stated Edward Davison, member of the building firm, yesterday afternoon. The contractors have already started to move some equipment and material to the site.

The contract calls for work to start on the church structure in favorable weather not earlier than March 1. In the meantime, steel and material will be ordered so that early spring delivery may be secured.

The new church will be located west of the St. Joseph School on US-23 overlooking Tawas Bay.

Plans for the church were completed last spring. It is designed in the Solid Romanesque architecture of the twelfth century with steep pitched roofs and solid masonry walls as built in Northern Europe. The nave will seat 400 parishioners, with seating provided for an additional 200 parishioners in a large balcony over the entrance during the summer months.

The Immaculate Heart of Mary Parish was established by the Most Reverend Stephen Woznicki, bishop of Saginaw, August 22, 1952. The Rev. Fr. Bernard Kirchman was appointed first pastor. The first mass in the parish was by Father Kirchman, September 7, 1952.

The Bay Theatre in Tawas City was leased and is used exclusively for divine service with the Blessed Sacrament reserved there.

"This confirms previous estimates that the metropolitan Detroit area is by far our major source of summer tourist business," commented Richard Allen, chamber secretary-manager, who conducted the survey. "Although people come here from almost every county in the state, the most noteworthy result of the survey would seem to be the large proportion of tourists who drove here from outside the state."

The figure no doubt tends to reflect the effectiveness of out-of-state advertising and publicity by the Eastern Michigan Tourist Association," Mr. Allen said.

Owners of the new Barnes Hotel in Tawas City, Mr. and Mrs. Tony DeFilippi, announced this week that 18 guest rooms in the hotel would be ready this week-end. The remaining 12 rooms will be completed at a later date.

Opening of the lower floor of the hotel, containing the bar, dance floor and dining room, was held September 2, five months after the fire which completely destroyed the old building.

The rooms in the hotel are modern in every respect, each equipped with shower and toilet facilities, new Simmons "Theme" line of furniture, Beauty-Rest inner-spring mattresses.

Denies Motion to Set Aside Drain Tax Decree

Last Friday, Judge Philip J. Glennie of Alpena filed an order denying a motion to set aside his court decree in the Townline Drain litigation. A suit to annul the Townline Drain tax levy was tried April 22 before Judge Glennie and at that time a decree was rendered by the court ordering a reassessment of the Townline drainage district in an equitable manner and according to benefits derived from the drain.

The motion to set aside the court decree was made by Floyd T. Fuss of Saginaw, attorney for George Lapere and others in the group of plaintiffs.

This group had brought suit into circuit court asking to annul the Townline Drain tax levy, alleging improper notice and other irregularities in organizing the drainage district. County Drain Commissioner Richard Elliott and County Treasurer Grace Miller were named as defendants.

The board of supervisors retained Richard T. Newman as special attorney and he, with Prosecuting Attorney William R. Barber, defended the case.

Judge Glennie in his decree last April set aside the drain taxes and directed that these taxes be reassessed against the district.

The plaintiffs have 20 days to appeal to the supreme court following the filing last Friday of Judge Glennie's order denying the motion to set aside the court decree.

If there is no further action on the part of the plaintiffs, at the end of the 20-day period, work will start on reassessing the drainage district, according to statements made by Attorney Newman and Prosecuting Attorney Barber.

To facilitate the court decree of an equitable reassessment of the district, there will be the following representation from the interested district and the county in making the reassessment: Glenn Long, supervisor, Tawas Township; Henry Oates, supervisor, Alabaster Township; Clarence Everett, supervisor, Third Ward, Tawas City; Richard Elliott, county drain commissioner; Attorney Newman and Prosecuting Attorney Barber.

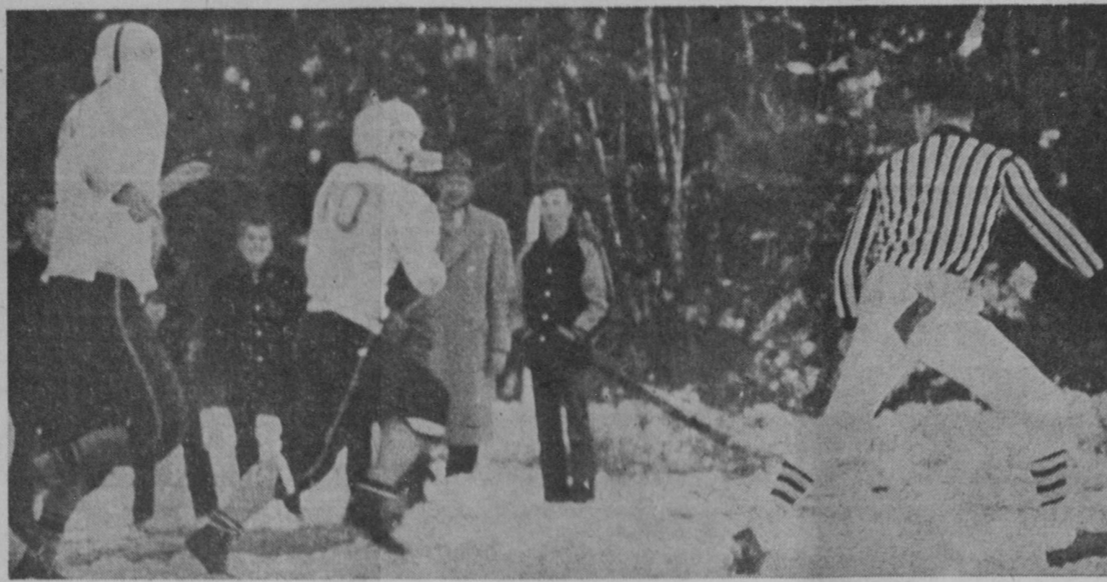

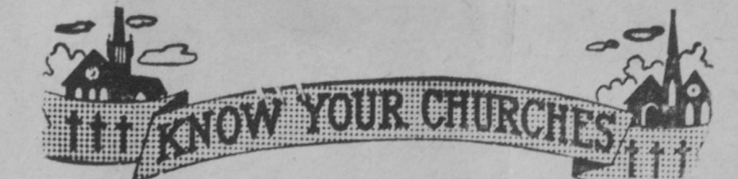

FARM EVENTS

Fertilizer pays. I had a few callers who were anxious to see the 264 bushel yield of wheat on the Waldo J. Curry farm. Maybe some day our farmers will approach that figure, but I doubt if it will be in our life time. I was interested in comments made by several folks—\$75.48 return for a \$16.00 fertilizer investment made a neat profitable return.

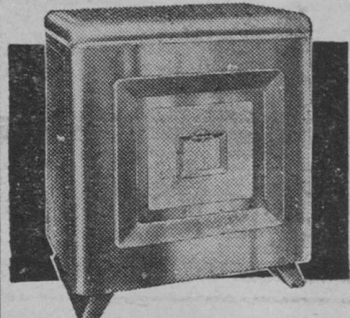
Another note to sound on fertilizer application should be made to the county's fruit tree people. Now is a good time to apply fertilizer to fruit trees. Fruit trees have root systems that often go deep into the soil, according to Paul Larsen, extension horticulture specialist at Michigan State University. Fall application gives the fertilizer a chance to reach the roots by spring so that the tree can make quick use of it when the warm weather arrives.

Potash and phosphorous can be applied in the fall to all fruit trees under all soil cultivation conditions. Nitrogen can be applied except on light soils where clean cultivation is practiced.

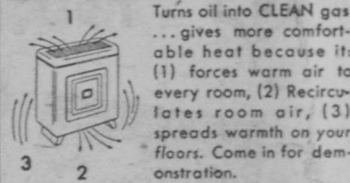
These are the rates recommended for nitrogen: For apples, one-half pound of ammonium nitrate or its equivalent for each year of orchard age until five to seven pounds per tree have been applied. For other fruit trees, about half that amount.

Phosphorous and potash should be applied if there is evidence of need in individual orchards. Usually 300 to 400 pounds of 0-10-30 or its equivalent is enough potash and phosphorous to satisfy the needs of orchard trees.

If the trees need lime, it should be applied in the form of dolomitic or high magnesium limestone.

Actually, you could probably figure on more than a week's advantage. If you waited until spring to fertilize the pasture, a soft soil may delay the application.

But if erosion is a problem in your pastureland, better wait until spring for the application. Make it while night temperatures are still at the freezing point, suggested E. D. Longnecker, extension soils specialist at Michigan State University.

The big advantage of putting on nitrogen in the fall is that the food is ready for the plants immediately when they wake up in the spring. And there's a firm footing for the spreader and tractor.

You can use one of the newer chemicals to control troublesome winter weeds in strawberries.

Chloro-IPC, at the rate of two quarts in 50 gallons of water per acre, will control common chickweed by spraying in November. It also will take care of field sorrel, the long-leaf winter weed, before it gets large. Don't expect it to take care of the mouse-ear chickweed, less common than the other kind of chickweed.

If you have the mouse-ear chickweed, identified by a hairy appearance, you will need a dinitro spray.

Don't apply dinitro weed killers until strawberry plants are fully dormant, late November or early December.

The chemicals caused much damage to strawberry beds in 1953 and 1954 when applied too early.

For detailed information on the use of dinitros and other herbicides, ask me for a copy of Extension Folder F-190, "Chemical Weed Control in Small Fruits and Orchards." We have copies in our East Tawas office.

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State Police to Recruit Additional Troopers

A Michigan State Police recruiting team will visit Oscoda on Friday, November 11, to interview applicants in connection with the current drive to obtain 200 additional troopers authorized last Friday by the special session of the legislature.

The team will be located at the Oscoda Township Hall from 3:30 p. m. to 6:30 p. m. Its members will be Cpl. Frank Roti and Trooper Jack Broard of the East Tawas post.

Of particular interest to young men is a new salary increase approved by the State Civil Service Commission. Training school pay has been raised to equal that received the first year by a full fledged trooper and there is also a general increase covering all brackets.

The range is \$151 every two weeks, beginning with training school, up to a maximum of \$192 in the trooper ranks. Likewise, the maximum is attained at the end of four years, or a year less than formerly. In the past, training school pay has been \$116.

In addition to salaries, troopers receive approximately \$75 a month for subsistence. They also are given their uniforms and traveling expense and two paid vacations a year.

To be eligible a candidate must be between 21 and 29 years of age, inclusive, not less than five feet, nine inches in height and in good physical condition. He must be of good character and have a high school education or its equivalent. Married as well as single men are accepted.

"The visit of the recruiting team has been especially arranged so that young men may learn at first hand what a real opportunity this is to join a career service," said Sgt. Joseph Chaput, commander of the East Tawas post. "They may also inquire at any state police post or talk to any state police officer. But the recruiting team visit is for their convenience."

Applications must be in by November 30. If sent by mail to the Civil Service Commission in Lansing and postmarked by midnight of that date, they will still be accepted.

The recruits will be trained and put into service as quickly as possible. The legislature authorized more state police manpower to combat the highway accident rate through increased traffic law enforcement.

Sergeant Chaput said that interested persons may apply at the East Tawas post at any time.

With the exception of corduroy trousers, all the garments have been cut from the good parts of garments worn by adults, primarily one to help women learn how to make new garments from old ones. Class members have learned about re-conditioning materials, pattern alterations, lay-out, good marketing and assembly methods, tricks in pressing, interfacing and linings. That is a big order for three days.

Try the first of a new television program series, "County Closeup," beginning in November and produced by the Michigan Cooperative Extension Service.

Isoco tele-viewers will want to make a note to be watching on Channel 5 Sunday, November 13, at 12:30 p. m., or Channel 13 on Saturday, November 12, at 4:30 p. m.

First program will be a story about the friends and enemies of plants titled, "From the Soil." Major crops in Michigan will be described and areas where they are grown pointed out. Find out how blueberries and Christmas trees have been adapted to use in certain areas of the state where other crops have not been very satisfactory. This first program is presented by the Farm Crops Department at Michigan State University and features Dr. Kenyon T. Pane.

Both urban and rural people will enjoy and learn from this new series of programs.

Maybe this is a good time to pass along information in answer to rumors that are going around about television and your eyes.

Eyes do not "wear out" from watching television but you can avoid unnecessary eye fatigue by observing three essentials: First, have the picture in clear focus. Second, sit the right distance from the screen. Third, have the room lighted sufficiently.

Even with these three essentials met your eyes may feel tired if you sit and watch television for many hours at a time, just as your legs may get tired from a long walk. There is an easy answer to this, too. Give your eyes rest at intervals while watching television.

Let's consider light. Light is one of the reasons television is possible. The image on your screen is composed of fairly intense transmitted light. Being comfortable while viewing is largely dependent upon how your home is lighted. You should never watch television in a completely darkened room because if the contrast between the bright screen and the darkness in the rest of the room is too great, it causes the eyes to tire. Instead, plan for light in the room which is soft and indirect. Be sure the source of such light is not reflected into your eyes from the screen.

Arrange the set directly in front of the viewers chairs and have the screen at eye level. This is to avoid picture distortion. Children watching television while seated on the floor will have tired neck muscles as well as tired eyes.

Viewers are wise to sit as far away from the screen as visual comfort permits because the farther away you are the less work eye muscles have to do in focusing the image you see. Watch the children on this one, too.

"Television headache" complaints are mostly caused by an improperly adjusted picture. Reception that is blurred, "snowy" or vibrating is a real burden on the eyes.

I hope you homemakers will give consideration to your television set and these three essentials for good viewing—clear focus in the picture, enough distance from the screen and general room illumination to avoid too much contrast between light and dark. Too many of us lack in one or more of these three recommendations.

Better than I could do it... and so much easier!

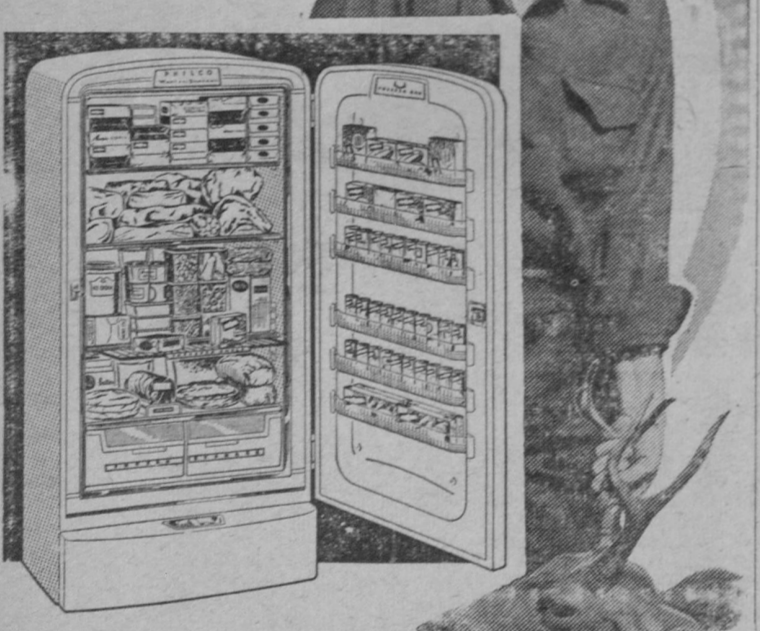

# Would Give Aid in Securing Social Security

Representatives from the Bay City Social Security Office will be in the Federal Building, East Tawas, on Wednesday, November 16, from noon until 2:00 p. m. Anyone wanting to apply for social security should contact one of them.

A social security card is identification for social security purposes only and should not be accepted as identification for other purposes. Paul M. Ellifritz, manager of the Bay City social security office, reminded local storekeepers and their employees today.

A person can obtain a social security card and work under any name he wishes, Mr. Ellifritz said. To receive his old age insurance benefits at age 65 or later, he must prove only that he is the person for whom a social security account has been set up under that name and number, and that his earnings have been credited to that account. Therefore, a social security card is no guarantee that an individual is using the name his mother gave him, or that he has a bank account.

The Social Security Administration has repeatedly warned businessmen not to accept social security cards as identification in cashing checks, giving credit or for any other purpose not connected with the Social Security Administration.

Although few people will go to the trouble of obtaining a false social security card, he pointed out that properly issued cards may be lost or stolen, and may be in the possession of someone to whom it does not belong. Moreover, a person can have his name on his social security card changed by filing a request for a change in records with the Social Security Administration.

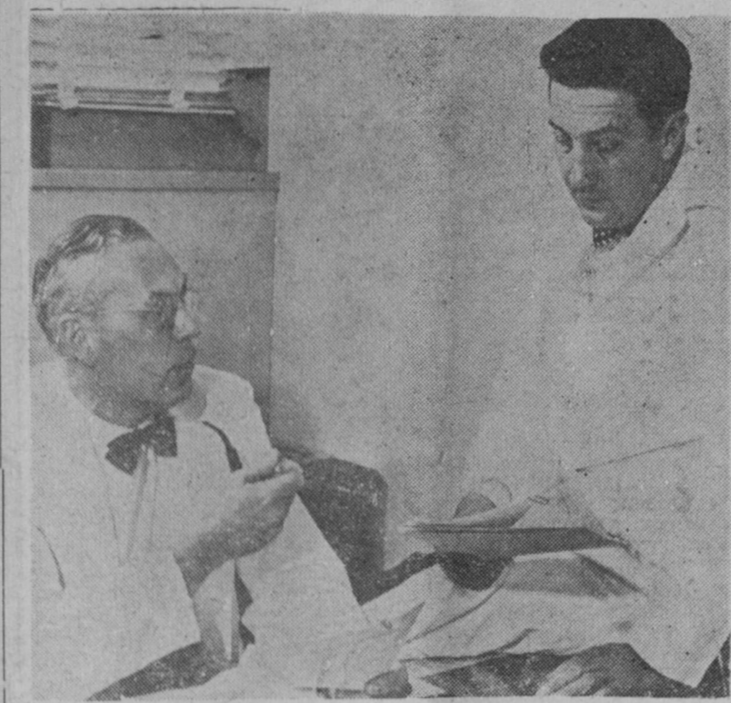
