## Fuelgas Moves to New Home; Will Hold Grand Opening

Fuelgas Company of the Tawas will celebrate the completion of its new salesroom in Tawas City next week with a three-day grand opening event on Thursday, Friday and Saturday, October 27, 28 and 29.

Edwin Habermehl, manager of the local firm, said this week that each customer who attends the big grand opening event will receive a free souvenir and a lunch of coffee, doughnuts, cheese and crackers will be served.

"Those who attend will also have the opportunity of winning such items as electric trains, radios, phonographs, silverware, towels, deep fat fryers, magnetic timer clocks, television lamps and dishes," Mr. Habermehl said.

The new 50 by 25 foot salesroom, located at 624 Lake Street (US-23), south of Hulitz, Oil Company in Tawas City is of concrete and steel construction. The new building has a solid plate glass window front which extends about 10 feet back on the building.

Construction of the building was by Henry Oates, contractor, of Alabaster. Tawas Bay Floor Coverings of Tawas City installed asphalt floor tile, Hall's Electric of Whittemore installed the plumbing and Spencer Electric of East Tawas, the electrical work.

Located on the bank of the Tawas River, the company received permission from the city council this week to start construction on a new warehouse which adjoins the building.

Directly across the Tawas River from the salesroom, on property formerly occupied by the Detroit and Mackinac Railway's West Tawas yards, is the company's 30,000-gallon bulk storage plant for liquefied petroleum gas.

Established here in 1946 by Mr. Habermehl and his two brothers, Clarence and Howard, the local plant services an area as far north as Rogers City, west to US-27 and south to Standish. Fuelgas Company, Incorporated. (See Fuelgas, page 10.)

## Supervisors Set County Budget at \$151,348.00

Iosco County supervisors budgeted the county expenses for 1956 at \$151,348.00 at the October session of the board which ended Friday. The five-day meeting just completed was one of the shortest October sessions that has been held in a number of years.

Called by statute each year for the purpose of setting up the county's tax structure and making appropriations for county expenses and other purposes, this year's meeting included an inspection of the new jail and participating in the cornerstone ceremonies.

While the county expense budget totals \$151,348.00, only \$133,511.50 was spread on the tax rolls. The remainder comes from receipts from other sources. Other items in the county tax spread were the special levies: New courthouse \$30,516.92, new jail \$19,073.07.

Special appropriations made at the session of the board were: East Michigan Tourist Association \$500, Silver Valley \$300, Iosco County Fair \$500, More Trout, Incorporated, \$300.

## Police Search for Auto Stolen at Oscoda

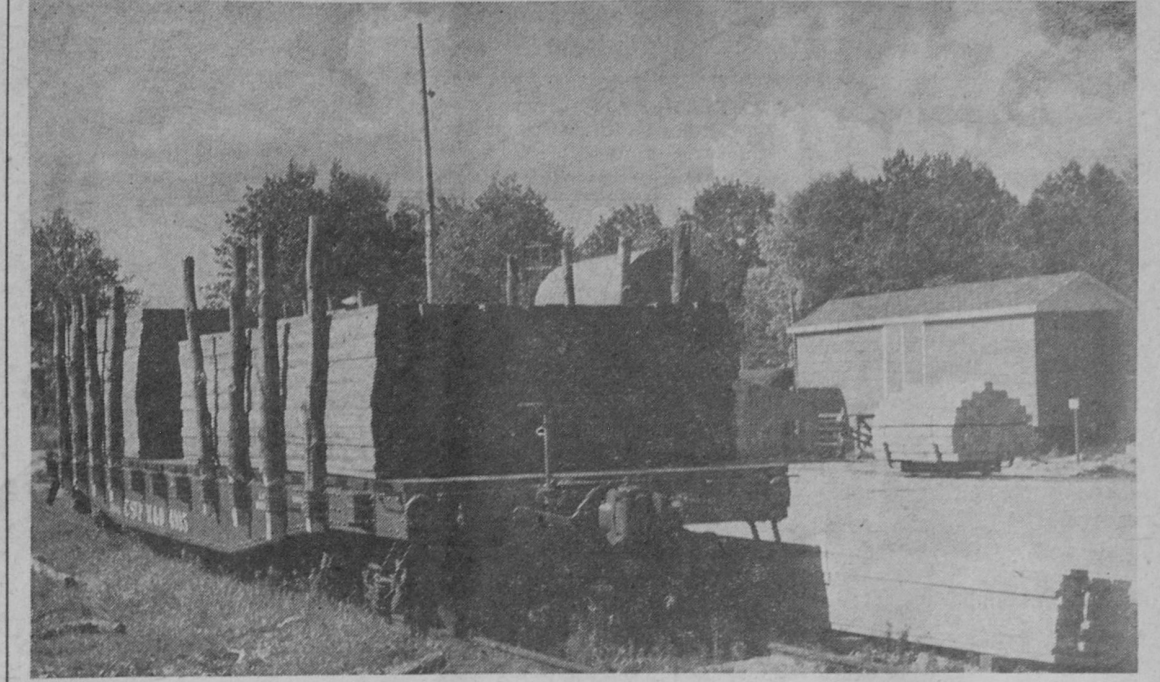

## Osiose Plant Here Makes First Shipment in State Highway Contract

Since opening its new low pressure retort plant here on May 27 of this year, the Osiose Wood Preserving Corporation of America has produced very close to 1,000,000 board feet of treated lumber at its local plant, it was reported this week by Orville Moore, plant manager.

Pictured above is the first car load of treated lumber for the Michigan State Highway Department which the plant shipped two weeks ago to the Upper Peninsula. The shipment consisted of 22,100 board feet of Douglas fir two by six's to be used for bridge construction.

To the right of the railroad car is shown a load of lumber ready to go through the treating process.

The largest single contract for the Tawas plant is the Detroit and Mackinac Railway Company. Osiose treats 25,000 ties yearly for the railroad.

Mr. Moore said that the company is now stockpiling treated lumber for next summer. It is expected that raw materials will be plentiful this winter with off-season employment in the woods providing a good supply of timber.

The Osiose plant here is the only one of its type in Michigan, treating fence posts, railroad ties and lumber against deterioration from natural elements.

## VALLEY SKI AREA BRIDGE UNDER CONSTRUCTION

The bridge over Silver Creek at the new Silver Valley ski area is under construction.

Material for the project was donated by the BeMent Sawmill, the AuSable Forest Products Association and the Detroit and Mackinac Railway Company, with the material being treated free of charge by the Osiose Wood Preserving Corporation.

The Silver Valley committee is awaiting approval and return of plans for the ski shelter house, from the United States Forest Service. As soon as plans return, work on the project will get under way.

## Solution to Downtown Parking Problem Sought

Seeking means to alleviate the downtown parking problem and the possibility of setting up a long-range program which would gain alleyways in back of stores on both sides of the downtown US-23 business district, members of the Tawas City Council turned the project over to the street committee Monday night for possible action. The committee will report its findings at a future meeting.

At a recent meeting of the council, a spokesman for a group of businessmen presented a plan in which the businessmen in the downtown area would share the cost of purchasing additional parking space with the city.

Several alternate plans were also discussed, among which was the possibility of establishing a special assessment district to finance the program.

During the discussion of the project this week, it was pointed out that the only means to gain entrance to the rear of stores in the downtown area was by way of crossing private property.

In other business taken up during the meeting, the council gave approval to four building permits which were presented. Those approved were:

Donald Watson, addition to Sunset Motel, Lake Street, five 14 by 14 units and one 14 by 24 unit. Estimated cost \$15,000.

Paul M. Barton, remodel dwelling, two additions to existing structure, Bay Drive, one 28 by 16 feet and one 12 by 10 feet.

Fuelgas Company, Incorporated, addition to business building Lake Street, 24 by 44 warehouse. Estimated cost \$4,000.

William C. and Rhea Kendall, addition to home, Ninth Avenue, 34 by 36 feet. Estimated cost \$3,500.

City Clerk Albert H. Buch presented a contract to the council from the Iosco County Board of Supervisors for the removal of the old jail building. The contract terminates April 1.

Also discussed at the meeting was the possibility of crossing Lake Street at the Bay Drive station with a sewer main before cold weather prevents its construction. The city received permission from the Michigan State Highway Department recently to make the crossing.

In the absence of Mayor George W. Myles, the meeting was presided over by Clyde Evril, mayor pro tem.

## Caboose to Make Summer Home

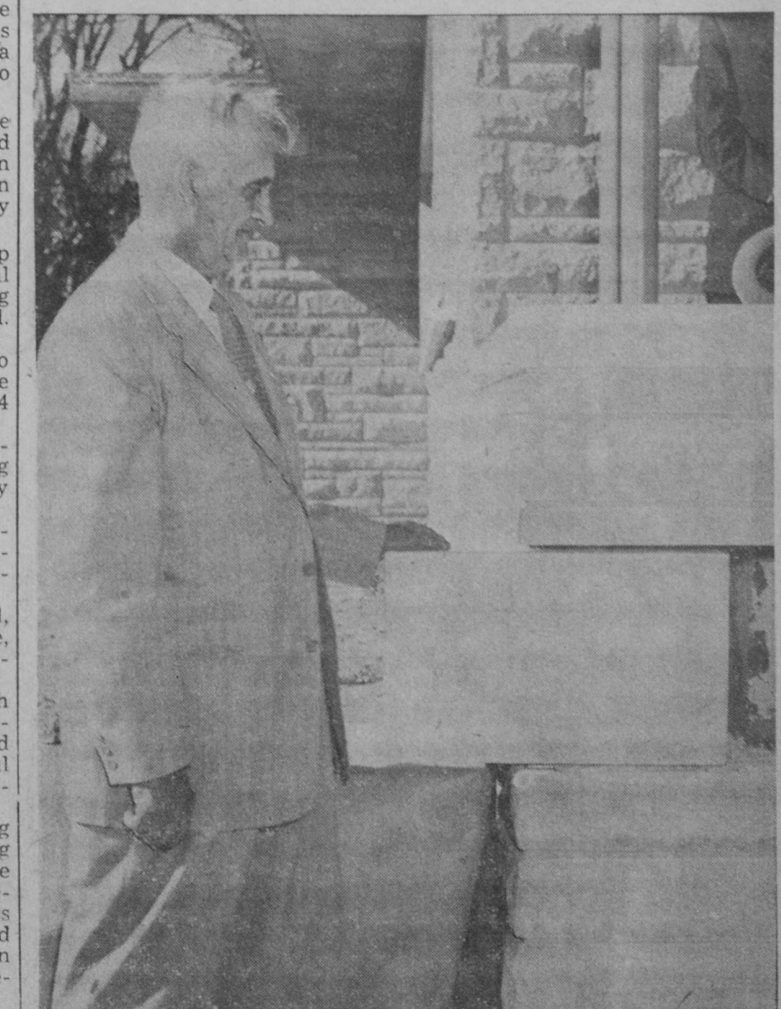

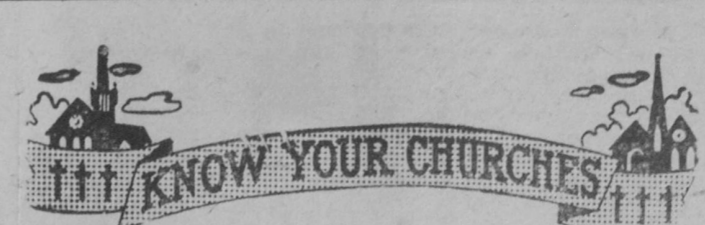

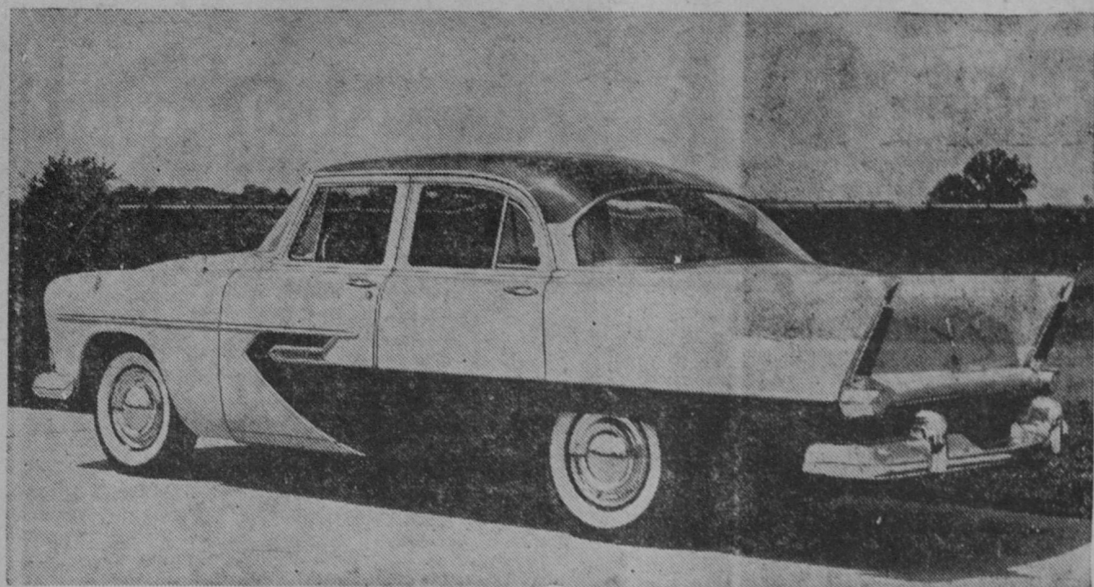

fertilizer is lost and you get that lush early growth which will let you put your stock on the pasture earlier. Other advantages of fall application are that the weather is usually more favorable and you can do it during your slack season rather than during the spring rush. Reed's canary grass pastures should be fertilized, but they need phosphorous and potash. Three hundred pounds per acre of 0-10-20 or 0-9-27 will do the job.

Mr. and Mrs. E. D. Jacques were not alone in trying to control the crabgrass and other weeds in their lawns this year. In talking with my neighbors, Mrs. Claude Wilson, Carl Schaff and Mrs. Fred Boulder, I mentioned fall and spring applications of 2-4-D to control lawn weeds. If you want a lawn free of weeds next spring, now is a good time to spray with 2-4-D. Fall is the best time to get in good blows against such pests as dandelions, chickory, wild carrot and buckthorn plants.

Many homeowners have been disappointed with 2-4-D when they applied it in the heat of the summer when the plants were dry. Weeds should be growing vigorously, such as they are in the fall, to get the best results with the weedicide.

Here are some dollars that make "cents." I have called to your attention recently the results of our wheat plots on the Waldo J. Curry farm. Here are the results that make "cents." As you recall, four plots yielded this way:

- No fertilizer, 26.4 bushels wheat per acre.
- 200 pounds of 5-20-20, 31.0 bushels wheat per acre.
- 400 pounds of 5-20-20, 41.7 bushels wheat per acre.
- 650 pounds of 5-20-20, 43.5 bushels wheat per acre.

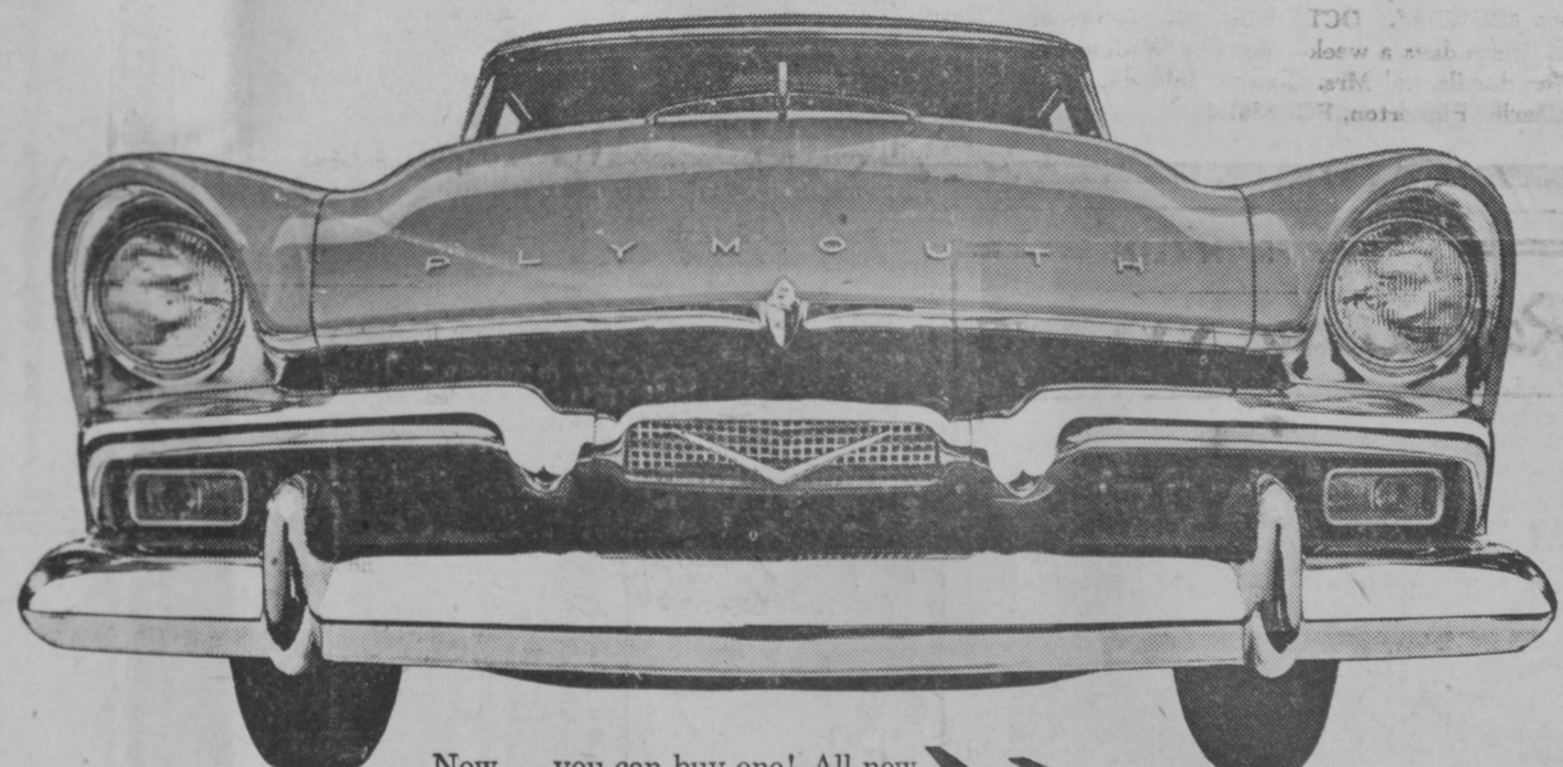
On the basis of these yields here is what the fertilizer "cents" did to create income dollars:

- No fertilizer plot returned \$47.78.
- 200 pounds of 5-20-20 returned, \$56.11.
- 400 pounds of 5-20-20 returned, \$75.45.
- 650 pounds of 5-20-20 returned, \$78.74.

Figuring the cost of the 5-20-20 at \$4.00 per 100 you can quickly see that the 400-pound application returned \$11.70 more per acre than the "no fertilizer plot."

Circumstances permitting we will give you the difference in the yield of hay, received from these plots for 1956 and 1957. How much difference do you think there will be?

I know all our experiment station data, our crops department and soils department at Michigan State University will agree that fertilizer on pastures and hay fields really pays off. That ordinarily is our thinking, but James Porter of the Soil Science Department at Michigan State University says we should also be concerned about increasing the amount of growth in pastures with other grasses. Mr. Porter says that in pastures where the seedings of alfalfa and brome have died out, and in natural June grass or bluegrass sod, yields can be doubled by proper fertilization. He recommends the application of 60 pounds of nitrogen per acre on all grass pastures. Most of them are also in need of phosphorous and potash. In this case, 500 pounds per acre of a balanced fertilizer such as 12-12-12 or 12-6-6 would give the right amount of nitrogen and also enough phosphorous and potash to supply the needs of the grass. If your grass pasture is well fertilized from previous crops, you may want to supply straight nitrogen. This could be done with 200 pounds per acre of ammonium nitrate or with 75 pounds of anhydrous ammoniac. The fertilizer can be applied either in the spring or in the fall, but best results are usually achieved with fall applications. If the application is made after October 15, very little of the

NAVY SETS DECEMBER 10 FOR ANNUAL NROTC EXAM The 10th annual competitive examination for high school seniors who desire to attend college and train for careers as naval officers will be held throughout the nation on December 10, the navy announced today. Applications for the NROTC are now available, but must be received by November 19, the announcement added.

Successful candidates will start their naval careers in colleges and universities across the country in 1956 with substantial financial assistance from the government. After a normal college education, graduates will be commissioned in the regular navy or marine corps, for active duty with the fleet throughout the world.

Male citizens of the United States, between the ages of 17 and 21 are eligible to apply for the NROTC aptitude test. Persons who attain a qualifying score will be given the navy's rigid midshipman physical examination next February. From the pool of qualified candidates remaining in competition, approximately 1,800 young men will be selected for appointment to the NROTC, and the college of their choice.

Students enrolled in the regular NROTC program will spend their summers on training cruises with the fleet, and will receive \$600 annual retainer pay until commissioned. In addition to the normal college curriculum, the midshipman will study planned course in naval science. All tuition, fees and books will be furnished by the navy.

This college training program is also open to enlisted men on active duty in the navy and marine corps. Such candidates will be selected under a separate quota established for the services.

Applications are now available at all high schools, colleges, and United States Navy Recruiting Stations, or direct from the Chief of Naval Personnel, Washington 25, D. C.

Quickie exchange gifts for the Christmas party is the theme for this year's Christmas gifts workshop in early November. Group members are asked to contribute a gift idea they have used and liked. If you have one, let us know about it by the end of this month.

Secretary reports that include a list of officers for 1956 are being received. These are important to planning for an officer's training school in November.

If you buy a sweater that is not mothproof, you can have a mothproof finish applied by the dry cleaner. There are also preparations for home use. Even though a sweater has been treated, putting it away clean is still good protection against moth damage.

Be sure to find out how long whatever finish is applied will last. Will it stand repeated washings or dry cleaning.

Autumn, Hallowe'en, doughnuts--cider or milk are perfect accompaniments for a good time. If you are going to have home made doughnuts, you will want to be sure the fat used for frying has not become rancid from contact with oxygen in the air, or otherwise had a "fat breakdown."

Every time fat is used for frying it should be strained through several layers of cheesecloth. Removing all the tiny particles is

important because breakdown of fat occurs very rapidly at surfaces. Particles provide more surface than one thinks. After fat is cooled store in a closed container in a cool, dark place.

Additional light in the laying house is being provided at the Roy Atkinsons. They know that the smaller number of daylight hours mean shorter working days for the laying flock and that the layer's day can be lengthened by using electric lights.

Additional light does help old hens in production and pullets that have been laying for a month or so may also go into a slump because of shorter days. How long should the day be? Electric lights should be used in the morning and evening to make a total of 13 or 14 hours of light daily on the floor of the laying house. Morning lights do not require a dimming device but evening lights do so that the birds can find their way to the perches.

How much light? Twenty-five watts per 100 square feet is the amount recommended by poultrymen at Michigan State University. Reflectors above the light will keep the ceiling from absorbing too much. Distribute the light over the entire house. Use lights regularly or the birds may moult and interrupt egg production.

Riddle--What is a scrumptious fruit with lots of snap and crackle?

A stitch in time can save nine, but length of stitch is important and should be adjusted to thickness and texture of the fabric. Clothing specialists tell us they are having better results when sewing on synthetic materials if they set the sewing machine for shorter stitching and a looser tension. This makes for stronger seams and greater beauty in the stitching line. Actually, short stitches put more thread length into the seams than long stitches, especially important on stretchy fabrics.

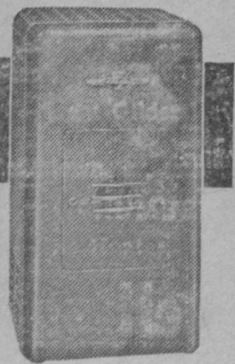
