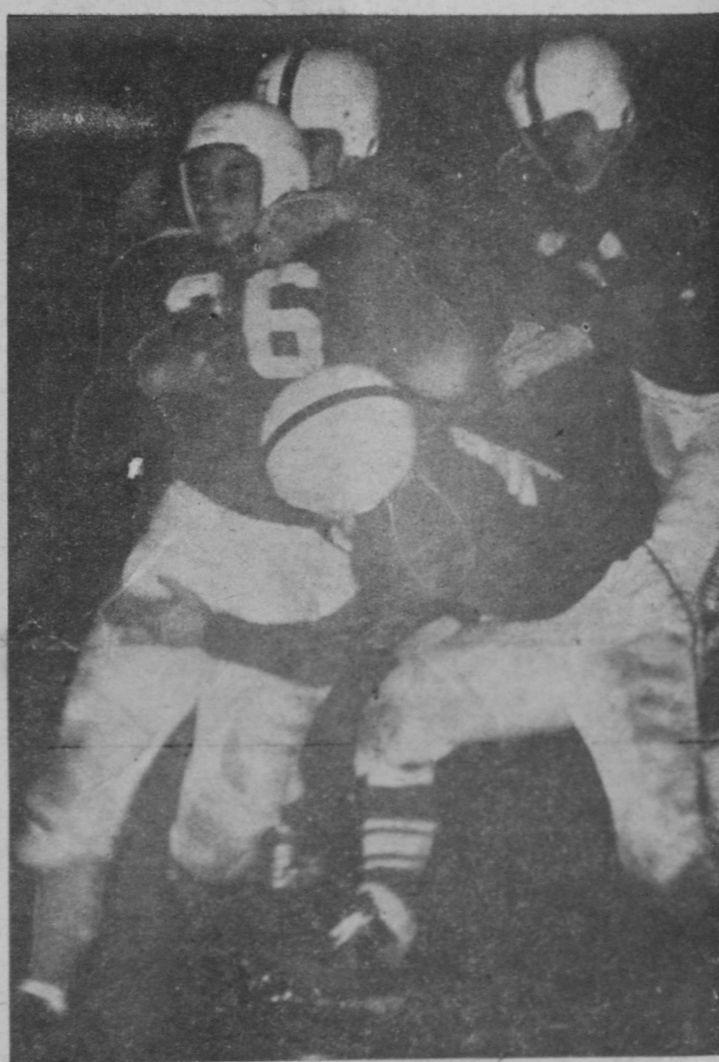
PAIR BOUND OVER ON JUSTICE COURT CHARGES

Clarence Stine, RFD No. 1, Lum, Michigan, and Bernard R. Harmon, Columbiaville, waived examination in justice court this week on breaking and entering charges and were bound over to the December term of circuit court on bond of \$2,000 each. The men are being held at the Iosco County Jail after failing to post the bond.

Stine and Harmon admitted breaking and entering five cabins in the Hale area. The property which was stolen was recovered by Detective LeRoy McClure of the Michigan State Police and Undersheriff Leon Brohm of the Iosco County Sheriff's Department.

Among the cabins entered were the Levi Marsh cottage, two miles east of Hale; Sam Springsteen cottage, two miles east of Hale; Paul Deubner cottage, two miles east of Hale; F. B. Thorndike cottage, Esmond Road, Hale, and the Shellenbarger cottage, Allen Road, Hale.

A warrant for their arrest was issued by William R. Barber, Iosco County prosecuting attorney, after an investigation by police officers. The men were apprehended in Lapeer County.

Braves Lose Game to Undefeated Oscoda Owls

The Oscoda Owls, undefeated during the 1955 football season, racked up their fifth straight win Friday night by taking a 31-7 count over the Tawas Area Braves in the annual intra-county tilt between the two schools. The Owls finished the season with a five-win, one-tie record.

Playing under the lights at the Oscoda field, the contest marked the second meeting of the two schools in the past two years. Oscoda won last year by a 32-0 score.

Although the score at the game's end had all indications of being a complete rout over the Braves, the local high school team held its own during the first half and owned a slight 7-6 edge over the winners at half-time.

Oscoda broke into the scoring column in the first quarter on a pass play to Fullback Dick Brohm, who ran the ball 32 yards for a touchdown. The point after touchdown was missed.

Late in the second quarter Tawas Area took the lead when Fullback John LeClair powered his way into the end zone for a touchdown and the extra point was good. Oscoda made a great goal line stand before the Braves were finally able to cross into touchdown territory.

In the second half Oscoda's fine offensive attack began to click and they were quick to capitalize on several costly fumbles on the part of the Braves. It was, however, the hard-hitting tackles by Oscoda linemen which jarred the ball from the Braves.

The Owls scored four times in the second half to wrap up the contest for another year. Scoring touchdowns were Right Half Mike Gilbert, Left Half Dave Skillman, Left End George Buchner and Fullback Dick Brohm.

The second half found both teams having long runs nullified by penalties. LeClair ran 75 yards to the three yard line, displaying some very fine broken field running, but the play was called back. The Owls had a 23-yard touchdown run called back due to a penalty.

The defeat was the Braves fourth of the season. Their lone win came at the expense of the Alpena Catholic Central Reserves 13-6.

A colorful halftime program was presented by marching bands from Tawas Area High School and Oscoda Township Schools. Several intricate maneuvers and formations featured the entertainment along with selections by the massed bands.

The Braves will wind up their fall football schedule next week when they meet West Branch on Friday, November 4. The Ogemaw County team was rated fourth in state Class C football. The game will be played at the field in East Tawas and will get underway at 2:00 p. m.

The Tawas Area freshmen team will meet the West Branch freshmen eleven next Thursday afternoon, November 3, at the latter's home field.

Airmen Admit Theft of Autos from Oscoda Dealer

Two Wurtsmith airmen were bound over to the December term of circuit court after waiving examination in Justice H. E. Friedman's court Monday. Bond was set at \$4,000 each.

The two men, James W. Birukoff and Stanley H. Oldham, both 18, admitted to police officers that they had stolen a 1953 Mercury and a 1956 Mercury automobile from an Oscoda auto agency. The 1956 car was stolen from the Iosco Motor Sales week ago Monday night.

The men were apprehended by Trooper Nalbert Gerber of the Michigan State Police Post Sunday at the Holland Hotel in East Tawas as they alighted from a bus. They were taken into custody and were later taken to the Iosco County Jail.

Police said that apparently the men abandoned one car in Richmond, Indiana, and the other car is being held by police officers in Davenport, Iowa.

Receives Jail Sentence After Justice Court Trial

Leo Burch, 25, of Tawas City entered a plea of guilty to charges of reckless driving and driving while license was revoked before Justice Arthur J. Goulet Monday. He was fined \$50 and \$430 costs on the reckless driving charge and was sentenced to 90 days in jail for driving with the revoked license.

Burch was involved in an auto accident at Indian Lake Saturday night. Two passengers in the car, a 15-year-old minor girl, and his brother, Richard J. Burch, 28, were slightly injured.

The two men also entered a plea of guilty to charges of contributing to the delinquency of a minor before Justice Goulet Monday. Leo was ordered to pay a \$25 fine and \$8 cost or 30 days in jail. Richard paid a \$20 fine and \$8 costs.

VanEttan Group Seek Tax Levy on Their District to Repair VanEttan Lake Dam

VanEttan Lake property owners petitioned the Iosco County Board of Supervisors for a special \$20,000 tax levy at the continued October session of the board held Monday of this week. The tax levy to be spread on property within the VanEttan Lake Dam special assessment districts setup in 1947. The levy would provide funds for repairing, improving and maintenance of the VanEttan Lake Dam.

The board of supervisors will meet November 12 for the purpose of hearing objections of property owners in the special assessment district who will be affected by the tax levy. The hearing will be held from 9:30 to 12 o'clock noon.

Constructed in 1948 at a cost of about \$50,000 to riparian property owners around the lake, VanEttan Lake Dam was intended to maintain a normal water level of VanEttan Lake.

Because of lack of repair, the operation of the dam has caused damage by erosion to land above and below the dam. As early as 1950 suit was started in circuit court by certain property owners seeking relief from continued damage and compensation for damages at that time. The suit is still pending and the dam has been operated under the control of a court order issued by Judge Herman Dehneke.

Hailed by VanEttan Lake property owners as a boon before its construction the dam has since caused dissatisfaction to many because the water level maintained was either too high or too low for each individual's interest.

The petition to the board was signed by 196 land owners in the assessment district. It provides for \$20,000 in tax anticipation bonds to be paid from taxes levied on property in the VanEttan special assessment district for the years 1955, 1956, 1957, 1958 and 1959. It was agreed in the petition that the county at large would not be chargeable with any costs relating to damages or improvements to the dam.

At the meeting Monday, the board voted to concur with the resolution submitted by other Northern Michigan counties in being unilaterally opposed to the discontinuance of the Northern Michigan Tuberculosis Sanitarium at Gaylord. A move has been made to discontinue this sanitarium.

Other routine business of the October session was completed at the continued meeting before adjourning until the special meeting of November 12.

Born February 15, 1885, at Alabaster, he married Miss Lena Bay on July 1, 1930, in Ohio. He was a member of Baldwin Masonic Lodge and the East Tawas Men's Club.

Operating a garage at East Tawas for many years, more recently he had been employed by the Iosco County Road Commission. He was a former councilman and member of the Iosco County Board of Supervisors.

Surviving are his wife; a son, Elmer of East Tawas; three grandchildren, and two brothers, Albert Sheldon of East Tawas and Edward Sheldon of Detroit.

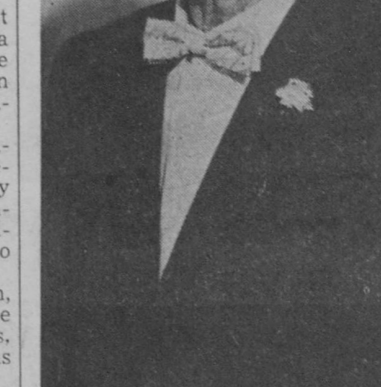

Conditions Excellent in Hunting Areas

Michigan Conservation Department game officials are comparing the current pheasant season with the highly successful 1941-42 seasons. Reports of excellent hunting conditions and good shooting during the first week-end of the 1955 season were conceded. It is reported that the bag generally was higher than last year.

Here in Iosco County hunters were reporting the best season in years. However, several veteran sportsmen stated that the birds seemed to be "very educated" the first day when reports indicated that the birds were running in front of the dogs instead of flushing into the air.

One hunter was of the opinion that this was due partially to sportsmen giving their bird dogs pre-season practice in the fields, thus "educating" the birds before the opening day of shooting.

Michigan's best pheasant range was in the Thumb area, as usual, along with the Ottawa-Geogewie area of the region. Department officials say that it took an average of two to three gun-hours to kill a pheasant in that area. In the poorer ranges it was estimated to take around 10 to 25 gun-hours per pheasant.

Hunters are urged to return metal bands found on deer, bear, woodcock, grouse, waterfowl and other game to conservation agencies.

Waterfowl bands should be returned to the Fish and Wildlife Service in Washington. Most other birds can be mailed to the Michigan Conservation Department in Lansing.

Have you had things blossoming out of season? Gerald Bellen, Whittemore mentioned he had and several other folks have, too. Gerald also has something that will be blossoming that he doesn't want in 1956—yellow rocket. He has the answer in the spraying he plans to do this fall. In order that others see how he plans to do it, we have set up a spraying demonstration on one of the established alfalfa fields. Yes, the next two or three weeks will be the time to control the 1956 yellow rocket crop. We will use MCP at the rate of one pint per acre, at a cost of about \$1.25. Robert Ruckle of Plainfield Township will do the spraying for us, weather permitting, on Monday, October 31, at 2:00 p. m. Everyone is welcome to attend. The demonstration will be on the field adjacent to Ernest Bellen's buildings.

Fall sure isn't a slack season for our farm folks. Those with fruit trees can do some work now that will pay off next season.

The first thing to consider is fall fertilizing of the orchard. Growers have more time for fertilizing in the fall and manufacturers and dealers are eager to make fall sales, since it eliminates storing all winter. Besides the convenience, there are sound biological reasons for applying fertilizer in the fall. Root systems of orchard trees go very deep into the soil, in some cases over 50 feet, and if the fertilizer is put on the fall it has time to reach the root zone where the trees can use it before spring comes. This is especially true of such elements as phosphorous and potash.

Another thing for the orchardist to consider at this time of year is the rodent problem. If left to themselves, mice can girdle and kill a healthy tree in just one year. Paul Larson, horticulturist at Michigan State University, says that if you have been mulching your trees, most of that material should be moved away from the tree trunks. Many growers put gravel, ashes or wire screens around the bases of

the trees. Poisons, such as zinc phosphide or oats treated with strychnine, are effective if they are placed in mice runs. This is also a good time to spot dead trees and limbs for removal, since the leaves are still on most of the trees. This will eliminate bark beetles. It is also a good time for ordering replacements.

Insects in stored grains: Better check that grain bin now because the pests are reported to be at work.

Take a scoopful of grain from the top and sides of the bin to check for beetles. Put a small amount of the grain on white paper to get a better view of the pests. A matted surface of the grain means moths, too. And an infestation of either insect means fumigation is needed. Ray Jones, entomologist at Michigan State University, says to be sure the bottom and sides of the grain bin are tight before fumigating.

Two chemical mixtures are recommended: One is a mixture of ethylene dichloride and carbon tetrachloride. The other is

the same mixture with the addition of five percent ethylene dibromide. Follow the manufacturer's directions because the chemicals can harm the person using them.

Social Security: Will those social security benefits have any effect on the credit rating of farmers? They may have a profound effect, according to the way E. B. Hill, a Michigan State University farm economist, figures it.

He says the fact that the value of social security benefits will be considerable for the farm family after the farmer dies can now be taken into account by bankers when they lend money.
