Something to Remember-

With the opening of school and the coming of autumn, many organizations are resuming their activities-civic and social. In many instances plans for programs and projects are complete, but it is hoped that club members will remember the Tawas City Park beautification program whenever possible.

During a period of several months preceding the observance of the Tawas City Centennial in June 1954 and at the time of the celebration, several clubs, groups and organization sponsored events to aid financially with centennial expenses, simultaneously aiding park development. All proceeds from that celebration were turned over to the park fund.

Nineteen hundred fifty-five has seen the park program get well underway. The level of the city-owned property has been raised, graded and leveled; the 400-foot dock constructed, a concession stand and charter fishing boat facilities made available, a parking lot and bathhouse constructed. All of these improvements could not have been made without the help of interested citizens whose contributions, along with revenue from penal fines and the lease rental of the SS Overniter and Tawas Boat Company, bolstered the onehalf mill tax levied annually for the park fund.

It is hoped that the program of improvements will continue. The recent purchase of playground equipment by the Jesse C. Hodder Post, American Legion, is a fine example of community interest and service. Shuffleboard, landscaping, picnic area development and driveway construction are but a few of the items on the park board's agenda.

A place of beauty in the heart of the city, the smiling faces of children at play against a background of brilliant green grass, clean sandy beach and sparkling blue water, would be a great tribute to a progressive community and the forethought of its people.
