## Only 5 Contests on State, District and County Ballots

There are only five contests for nomination on the ballots delivered last week to Iosco County township and city clerks for next Tuesday's primary election. On the Republican side of the primary ballot there are three contests. Two offices are contested on the Democratic side.

Contested on the Republican ballot are nominations for governor, representative in the state legislature and prosecuting attorney.

For governor, Albert E. Cobo, mayor of Detroit, is opposed by Donald S. Leonard. Leonard was an unsuccessful candidate for governor in 1954.

The nomination for representative in the state legislature is contested by James P. Mielock, incumbent of Iosco County and Walter W. Weinkauff of Alpena. Mielock is a candidate for a second term. Weinkauff was one of the candidates who opposed Mielock in 1954.

William R. Barber, candidate for a second term as prosecuting attorney, is opposed by Reginald J. Barnett. Barber defeated Barnett for nomination at the primary election in 1954.

Dale Vaughan of Oscoda and William J. Kelly of Bay City are candidates for the Democratic nomination for representative in congress. Vaughan is a member of a well known Iosco County family which has taken an active interest in politics for many years.

The Democratic nomination for representative in the state legislature is being sought by two Alpena County men, John E. Norkowski and William S. McGurn.

Candidates for nomination without opposition are:

Republican—Clarence A. Reid, lieutenant governor; Elford A. Cederberg, representative in congress, 10th district; Charles T. Prescott, state senator, 28th district; Ivan O'Farrell, sheriff; George A. Prescott, county clerk; Grace L. Miller, county treasurer; Albert E. Buch, register of deeds; Richard Elliott, drain commissioner; E. D. Jacques and E. John Moffatt, coroners; Carl R. Small, county surveyor.

Democratic—G. Mennen Williams, governor; Philip A. Hart, lieutenant governor; and Thomas McGinnis, county treasurer. McGinnis was the only Democratic candidate to file for county office.

Judge H. Read Smith is unopposed for the non-partisan nomination for judge of probate.

At the primary election next Tuesday, delegates to the county convention are named by each party. Space is provided on the ballot for writing in the names of the delegates desired. Proper representation at county conventions is essential to good government and very voter should indicate whom he wishes for delegates from his precinct.

## Tawas 'Speed Trap' Rumor Squelched by Michigan Auto Club

A rumor circulating in this community during the past two weeks to the effect that the Tawas was had been named as a "speed trap" to motorists by the Automobile Club of Michigan, was discounted last week by Harry Rogan, director of travel services of the National Auto Club of Michigan. In a letter written to the Tawas Chamber of Commerce, Mr. Rogan said that he personally checked with his organization's legal department and found that they have no records of any complaints of unjustifiable arrests in this area.

"We, in the travel activity, have heard no complaints from our members," wrote Mr. Rogan. "Naturally, members do advise that they were picked up here or there for this or that charge, but in reviewing the case, we often find that they were apparently guilty of the violation."

In reply to a letter written by Chamber President Walter Champion, Rogan said, "The Auto Club of Michigan is often the victim of spurious rumors not only from the standpoint of being accused of boycotting certain towns because of speed traps, but also because of not recommending certain areas because of high prices, etc."

"We hope that you will pass the word along that we know nothing about a speed trap existing in your area. In fact, we had not heard that our members or the motorists were being intimidated," stated Rogan.

## FIVE CHANNELS-OSCODA RACE SET FOR AUG. 5

The first annual AuSable River Five Channels-Oscoda Canoe Classic will be held on Sunday, August 5.

The start is scheduled for 11:00 a. m. and it is expected that the winners of this new race, starting at Five Channels Dam with portages over Cook and Foote Dams, will cross the finish line in Oscoda at about 3:00 p. m. Cash prizes totaling \$400 will be awarded.

The race, held under the auspices of the Oscoda-AuSable Chamber of Commerce, will serve as a preview and also as a training event prior to Michigan's biggest canoeing event, the 240-mile 10th annual Championship Canoe Marathon, which will be run the length of the AuSable River from Grayling to Oscoda on September 1 and 2.

## New Ore Dock Planned South of Tawas City

"Preliminary engineering studies have indicated that the most logical and economical location for National Gypsum Company's new shore loading facilities would be outside of and to the south of Tawas City," stated C. H. Hill, superintendent of the company's plant at National City. "Further studies may reveal that another site would be preferred, but this does not seem likely," he stated.

This latest information about National Gypsum's planned expansion of quarrying and shipping operations were revealed after a meeting between company officials at Buffalo and Mr. Hill during the past week.

Mr. Hill said that the five sites which were considered included Bay City, AuGres, Point Lookout, the original site and Detroit and Mackinac property between the Tawas.

Although plans are not 100 percent definite, the company expects to replace the 6,400 foot aerial tramway included in the original proposition with a 1,000 foot 250-foot wide ledge dredged channel would allow lake carrier ships to dock at the installation with a turn-around.

Present plans call for the gypsum rock to be transported from the company's new quarry in Tawas and Grant Townships to the former LaPere property south of Tawas City. From there it would be moved by underground conveyor to the new dock for loading on to ships.

Mr. Hill said that the company plans to leave as many trees as possible standing in the area of the new dock site as a protection against noise. He said the company would make every effort to keep noise and dust to a minimum.

In answer to many questions raised during past weeks about National Gypsum Company's proposed new expansion, Mr. Hill said that the company plans to engineer new facilities at the National City plant for use in the manufacture of perlite material which will increase production for the Michigan market.

# 42 Ancient Automobiles Here in Week-Long Tour

Ancient automobiles bearing such names as Brush, Franklin, Abbott-Detroit, Locomobile, Olympian, Patterson, Paige, all time-honored in the history of automobile industry, but perhaps unfamiliar to the younger generation of motorists, can be seen chugging through the streets of the Tawas and Oscoda this week. These cars, along with the forerunners of many of today's models, are here during a week-long tour of the Veteran Motor Car Club of America.

Some 42 antique motor vehicles, their owners and families are registered for this year's tour, which began last Sunday and will conclude this Saturday night at the Sunset Motel, Tawas City, in a new Anderson Coach Company mobile home.

Participants are staying at Sunset Motel, Dale's Motel and Cable's Tawas Resort, all in the same central area.

Oldest car in the group is a 1903 Ford owned by R. C. Beattie of Drayton Plains. Seven of the members in attendance are from Ohio, one from Illinois, one from California and one from New Jersey.

A week-long program of activities, featuring visits to Oscoda, Wurtsmith Air Force Base, Lumbermen's Monument and Huron National Forest, was highlighted by a gas-light parade of the old cars through the Tawas last night (Wednesday).

With polished brass carbide lamps sputtering, the brightly painted cars motored through the back streets of the two communities providing a picturesque cavalcade for local residents, who watched the procession from front porch or street curbs. Many of the drivers and passengers were garbed in linen dusters, caps and goggles, reminiscent of the early days of motoring.

Local residents were not the only ones to enjoy seeing these antique vehicles, as was evident by the traffic tie-up south of the Tawas City business district Sunday afternoon.

The line-up of old cars at motels in that area proved to be too interesting for any motorist to pass up and vacationers jammed the area to get closer look.

While spectators looked at the cars and snapped countless numbers of pictures, car owners polished brass head lamps, radiator trim or tinkered with adjustments on engines. One 1911 Brush, owned by C. 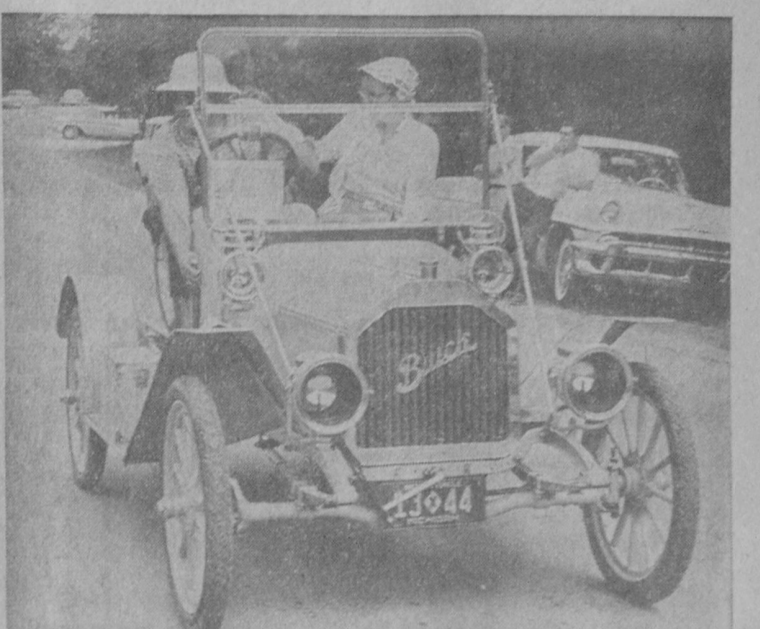

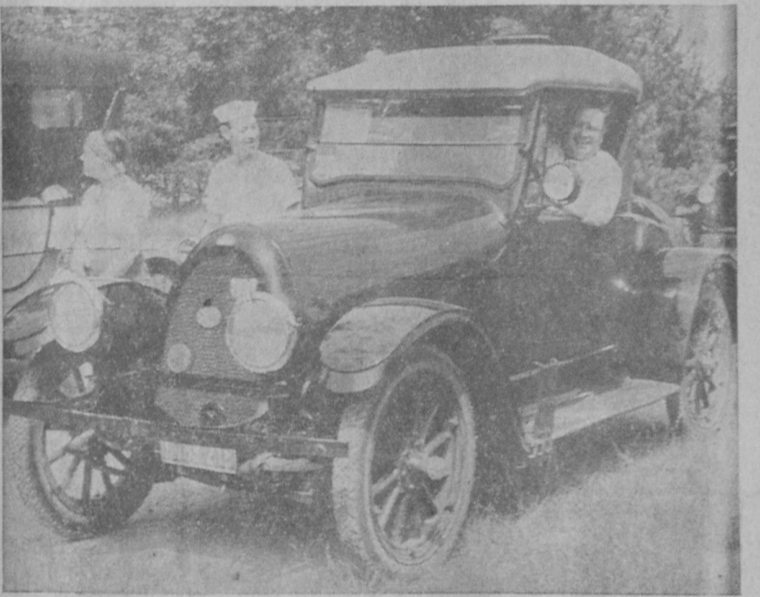
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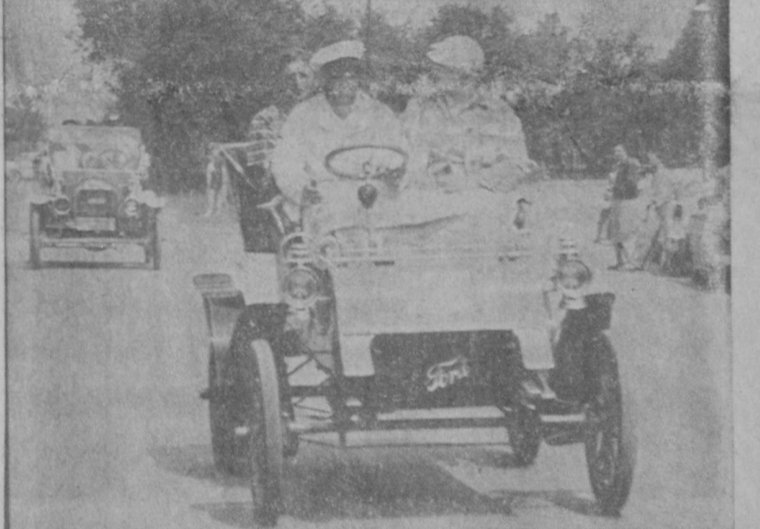

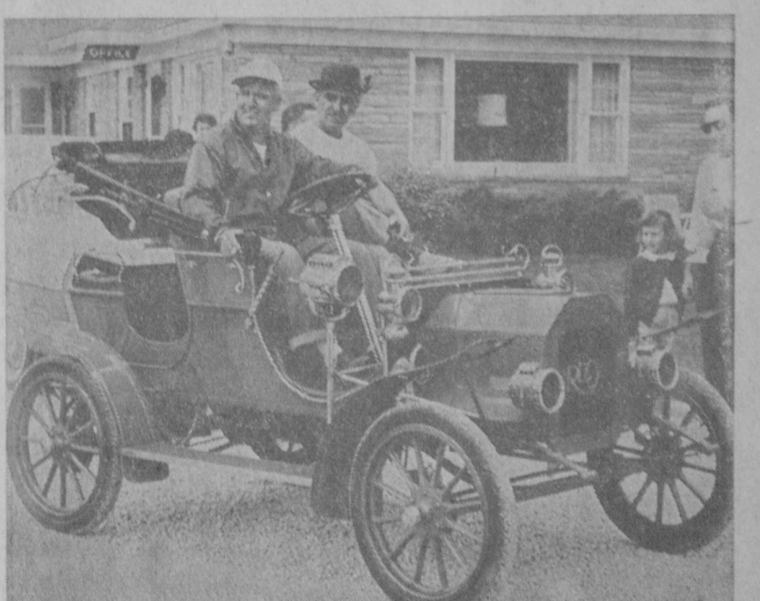

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## APPLICATIONS FOR STATE POLICE CLOSE AUGUST 22

Applications for a civil service examination to be held September 22 for the position of Michigan State Police Trooper are now being accepted.

Closing date is midnight, August 22, at which time all applications must be in the mail or in the hands of the civil service commission.

Applicants must be between 21 and 29 years of age, inclusive, not less than five feet, nine inches in height and have a high school education or its equivalent.

The state police offer a career service with members being eligible to retire at the end of 25 years on a pension of half pay

which also goes to widows.

Beginning with the time he enters training school, a new trooper receives \$151 every two weeks, with regular increases thereafter up to a maximum of \$222 in that rank.

In addition, the trooper gets \$3 a day for subsistence, paid vacations, paid sick leave, extra vacation days beginning with the sixth year of service and longevity pay upon the completion of the sixth year.

Application blanks may be obtained at any state police post, from the state civil service commission or state police headquarters in Lansing.

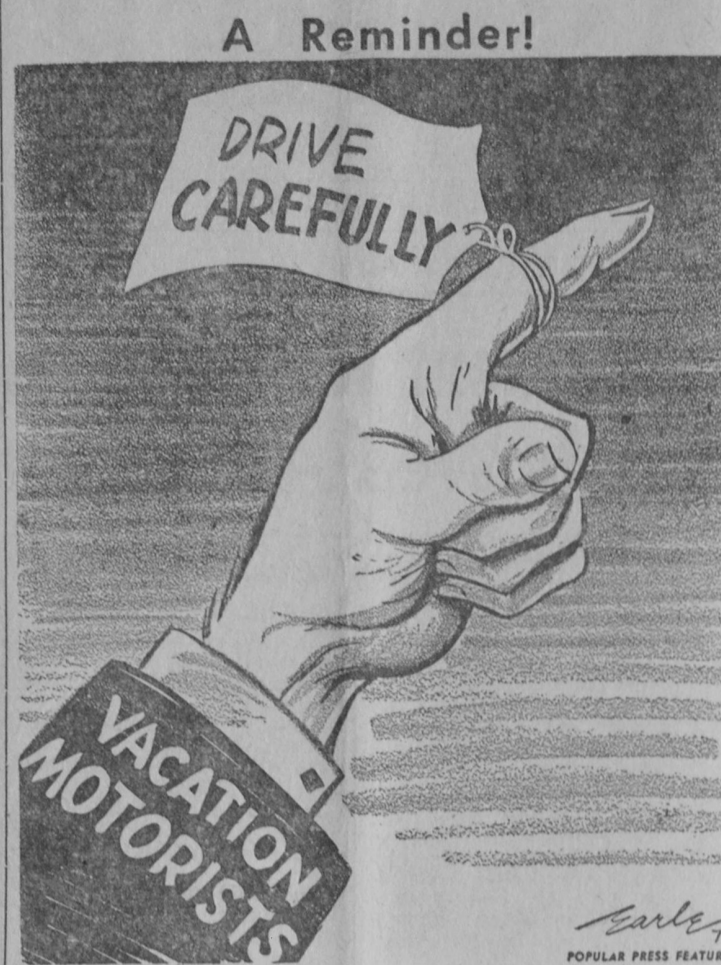
The current applications are to fill out 168 new trooper positions granted by the legislature this year.

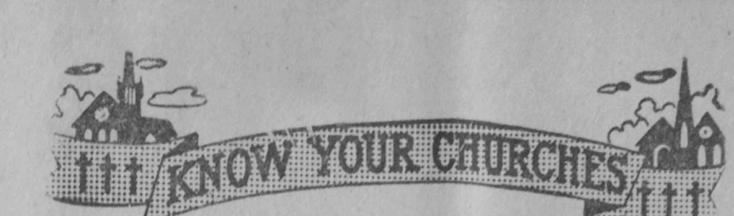

# Hemlock News...

Forms to claim the refund are available at your Cooperative Extension office, Federal Building, East Tawas. Deadline for filing the claims for the first six months of this year is October 1.

Any owner, tenant or farm operator who buys gasoline for use on a farm can file a claim. He may also ask for a tax refund on gasoline used on his farm by a custom operator or neighbor in soil cultivation or raising and harvesting a crop. Refund claims must not be made for gasoline used off the farm or for purposes other than actual farming. Keeping record to back up the accuracy of claims is a good idea.

The amount of refund which can be claimed is two cents a gallon for this first six months. The refund amount will be three cents a gallon effective after July 1.

The farmer who does not harvest and store dry grain, or provide for drying in storage, runs the danger of having "sick" wheat.

"Sick" wheat develops when the grain is stored with a moisture content of 14 percent or more. Up to 100 percent of the kernels in a storage may be damaged because of this moisture. Insects are more active in wet grain than in dry grain.

Examine the germ of wheat kernels to tell whether or not you have "sick" wheat. The normal germ is white or creamy white. A "sick" germ is tan, brown or black. A sharp knife or razor blade will remove the bran covering of the germ.

Every farmer should be cautious about combining wheat early or late in the day. Just because the dew has dried off the heads of the standing grain does not mean the grain is ready for the combine. The kernels have had all night to absorb moisture. Wait until the grain is dry enough to thresh and store safely.

Grain should be hauled and stored as fast as combined in order to keep it cool. Cool grain keeps better in storage than warm grain.

Knock out flies in your dairy barn with a spray of malathion or diazinon applied to the walls. This spray will control the housefly for three or four weeks.

Baits of the insecticide and corn syrup can be used. Dry baits can be purchased, too. Put baits on clean concrete where the sunlight hits.

If necessary, the cow can be sprayed at milking time. Use a spray of the pyrethrin type.

Whatever spray or bait you use, be sure to first read carefully the direction on the container label.

Best control of stable flies, the kind that suck blood from animals, is possible with the space sprayer. Available are portable and permanently installed types.

How about a summer seeding of alfalfa? It can assure plenty of livestock feed next year, and an August seeding will grow as well as one in the spring.

Plow right after the wheat or oats is harvested from the field, or plant a field which has been summer fallowed. Plant as soon after August 1 as possible, and before the 20th. Use four to five hundred pounds of 0-20-20 per acre or some other similar high analysis fertilizer.

For short-term stands plant a hardy, northern-grown variety. Vernal or Ranger varieties are best for seedings to be left three or more years.

Band seed the alfalfa over fertilizer. Always cullpack after seeding on all soils. Seed without a companion crop unless the field is subject to erosion, or bromegrass is seeded with the alfalfa. In either case, no more than two pecks of oats per acre are used. The oats and about two pounds of bromegrass per acre are mixed and planted along with the alfalfa.

First, though, send a soil sample right now to my office and be sure your field has a pH reading of between 6.8 and seven. If needed, lime applied before seeding pays dividends.

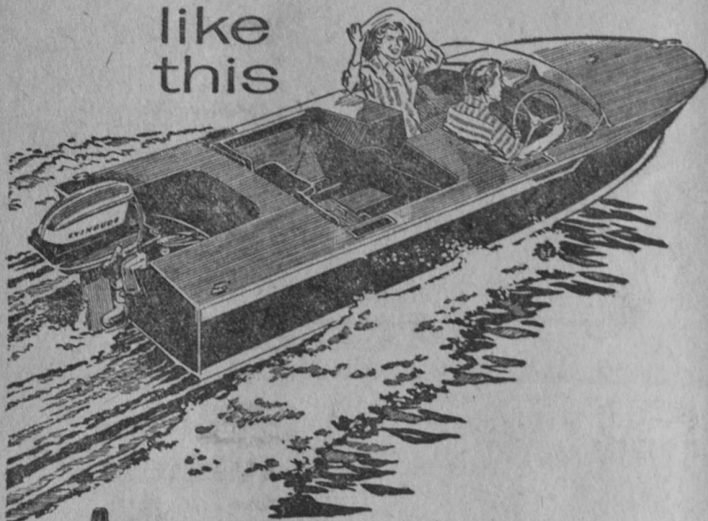

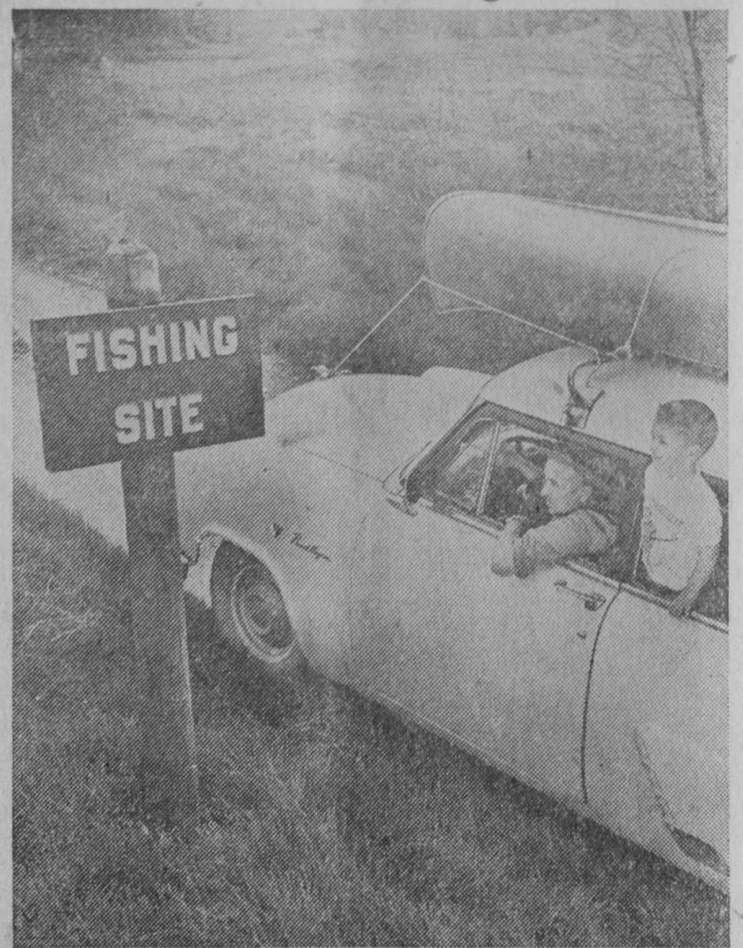

August 8-9—District Homemakers Camp, Hardwood Lake.

Plans of the camp committee have been made for an interesting time again this year at the overnight camp for homemakers. Long enough for fun sharing and relaxing, yet short enough that homemakers can arrange to get away, the camp program offers several craft activities, swimming and an evening of movies and folk games. Wednesday night supper is to be an outdoor chicken barbecue.

Any Isosco County homemaker who would like to come is welcome. Make your reservation right away at the Cooperative Extension Service office, Forest 2-3751 is the number to call. Ask for more information, if you wish. Saturday, August 4, is the very latest date for reservations to be made.

Who is interested in a field trip to learn about the latest dry equipment or how to make better use of what you now have?

A very special plan is being made to have manufacturers of electric washer and dryer equipment display equipment and to have trained personnel available to answer questions, present demonstrations. The location of the closest one is Midland and the date is September 20.

The trip will require all day and the program, which has been outlined, looks as if it will be very helpful to interested homemakers, home economic teachers and extension agents.

Each county has been asked to make reservations for the number of persons who will be coming because the building can accommodate only 400 people. If you would like to go let know right away, this week, so reservations can be made.

Shall home sewing be one of your projects for yourself, or the back-to-school children?

If so, are you aware that a new body measurement standard for patterns became effective on June 15 of this year?

All the major pattern companies are adopting the new standard of measurements. The reason for the change is give the woman who sews a better fit.

The three first measurements we think about in a pattern size are waist, bust and hip. For many years we have used a "rule" which is called "609." It meant that the bust measurement was six inches larger than the waist and the hip measurement was nine inches greater than the waist. The new measurements for these three places can be remembered similarly as "809," which means that the bust is eight inches larger than the waist, the hip measure 10 inches greater.

Another measurement spot important to check will be the back-waist length which is taken from the base of the socket bone at the neck to the waist.

A cardinal principle in food preparation is to handle the food rapidly so there is little loss of the food values. Working alone, the homemaker is wise who picks relatively small quantities at a time to avoid holding them longer than will be best for a most nutritious and flavorful product.

Pick food at the peak of maturity. Underripe and overripe products are not any more palatable preserved than fresh.

Annoyed by ant hills on the lawn? Cover each ant hill and several inches of surrounding ground with a five to six percent chlordane dust or with five percent chlordane granules. Then, soak with water to drive the chemical into the ground and down into the nests.

Yes, wild huckleberries can be frozen. They will be more tender if scalded 20 to 30 seconds in boiling water. Pack them dry without sugar, or in a 40 percent syrup, or mix one cup sugar with five cups of fruit.

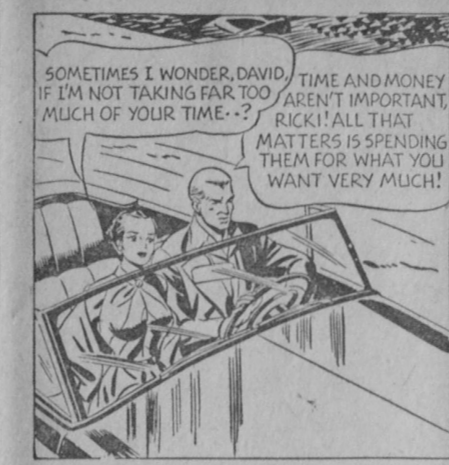

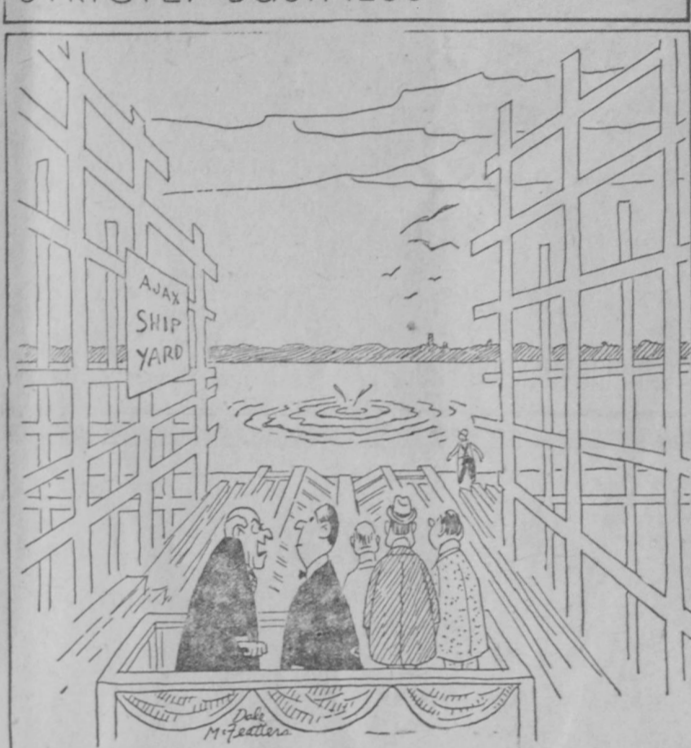
nue, Tawas City, recently was graduated from the welding course at The Ordnance School, Aberdeen Proving Grounds, Maryland.

Abbott entered the army in February of this year and completed basic training at Fort Leonard Wood, Missouri.

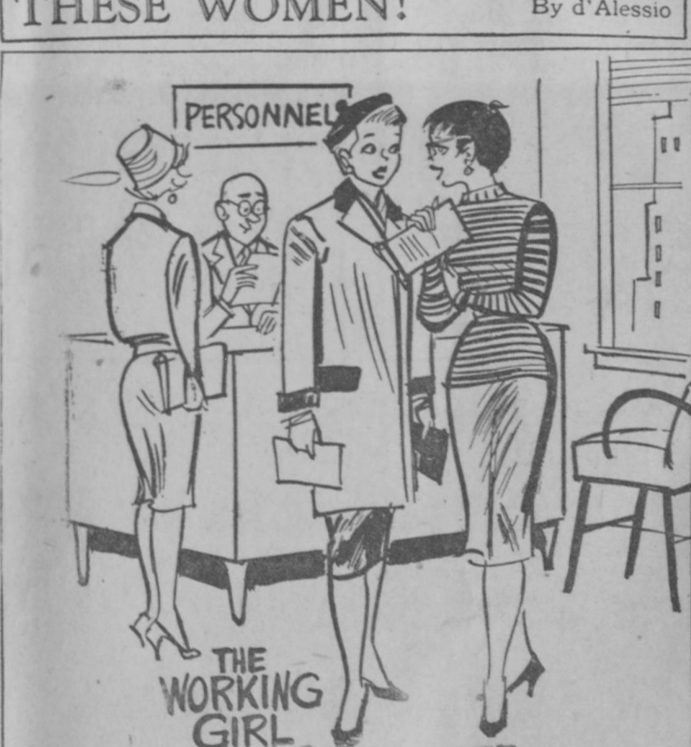
