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

ZIEGLER ANNOUNCES **NEW ROAD PROGRAM**

State Highway Commissioner Charles M. Ziegler has announced a construction program on state trunklines for the 1956-57 seasons totaling in excess of \$300,000,000.

\$300,000,000.

The total for the two-year period could conceivably be even greater should the congress this year pass a bill to expedite construction of the federal aid systems. Michigan would benefit appreciably from such legislation, perhaps by as much as an additional \$50,000,000 per year.

Included in the construction

Included in the construction program announced for Michigan are approximately 450 miles of four and six-lane divided highways on the major trunkline system, to be completed and opened to traffic by the end of 1957. Nearly 200 additional miles of modern divided roads will be under contract next year, but are not expected to be opened to traffic until 1958.

The 1956-57 program also includes 500 miles of construction, reconstruction and re-surfacing of two-lane highways on the

state trunkline system.

Projects scheduled for construction are in all areas of the state, although emphasis will be state, although emphasis will be blaced on multi-lane roads specified in Act 87 of the 1955 egislature. So-called "Act 87 roads" include 985 miles on the Federal Interstate Highway System, and approximately 1,000 additional miles of major trunklines on the federal aid

orimary system.

Of the total committment for \$300,000,000, estimated revenues from state fuel taxes and license fees, and federal aid at the present rate of distribution, will account for an estimated \$170,-00,000. The remaining \$130,-000,000, will be raised through

bond issues permitted by existing legislation.

Commissioner Zeigler, in announcing the program, said that the two-year total would put Michigan in the forefront of the states in highway construction expenditures. expenditures.


