Tawas Mayors Issue Proclamation

Whereas, the Tawas have been selected as headquarters for the Veteran Motor Car Club of America's 1956 Great Lakes Regional Tour; and Whereas, some 100 persons and 50 old-time cars are expected to be here for the week-long convalesce on Sunday, July 29, to Saturday, August 4;

We, the mayors of Tawas City and East Tawas, do hereby proclaim the week of July 29 through August 4 as "Horseless Carriage Week" in the Tawas; Now, Therefore, we urge all citizens of this community to extend a most sincere welcome to old-time automobile owners, their families and guests.

Headquarters for the tour will be set up at the Sunset Motel on US-23 in Tawas City. Anderson Coach Company of East Tawas will provide one of its new mobile homes as a place for registering guests.

Highlighting the convalesce will be a gas light parade of old-time cars with occupants dressed in linen dusters, veils and other costumes of early twentieth century vintage. Other events planned to entertain guests besides tours to all points of interest in the area, are dinners, dances and contests.

To be eligible to compete, cars must be of 1930 vintage or older, and drivers are required to be members of either the Veteran Motor Car Club of America, Horseless Carriage Club or the Antique Automobile Club of America.

After participants register at the Sunset Motel Sunday, July 29, where they will receive accommodations at various resorts, a 6:00 "restoration hour" will be held at the Barnes Hotel in Tawas City.

At 9:30 Monday morning, the group will leave for a scenic lakeside drive to Oscoda. From Oscoda the drivers will travel through the Huron National Forest to Lumbermen's Monument where they will have a "relief" stop. At 1:00 p. m. they will return to Tawas via Silver Valley, traveling a total of 65 miles.

Tuesday, July 31, will be "Air Force Day." After an 8:30 o'clock breakfast at the Barnes Hotel, the old time car owners will make a slight run to the Coast Guard Station at Tawas Point and then to Wurtsmith Air Force Base, Oscoda, where they will be guests of Colonel Ralph G. Taylor, base commander. Lt. Colonel Robert Woody, executive officer, is in charge of the program at the base.

Drivers and their families will be able to spend Wednesday just as they wish. A pioneer run will be held in the morning for those who wish to take it. At 6:30 p. m. a beach party will be held at Cabbie's Tawas Resort.

Highlight of Wednesday's activities will be a gas light parade (cars will be illuminated by carbide lamps) through the back streets of the Tawas to let the townspeople view the parade from their homes.

Overburden Removal Will Soon Start on Newly Acquired Gypsum Land

BUFFALO, July 23—Sales and earnings of National Gypsum Company for the first half of 1956 were the highest for any six-month period in the company's history. Board Chairman Melvin H. Baker reported today.

Sales for the period jumped to \$81,394,696, up more than 13 percent over the \$71,743,505 reported for the first six months of 1955.

Mr. Baker noted that his company's sales for the first six months of this year were almost \$3,500,000 more than those for the entire year of 1950 when the company reported 12-month sales of \$75,990,000.

Earnings for the first six-months of this year rose 15 percent to \$8,934,684 equal to \$2.61 per common share before including new shares sold under a June offering to stockholders.

Mr. Baker noted that the cost of goods sold in the second quarter of this year included substantial amounts for starting up new plants.

National Gypsum's earnings in the first half of this year compare with earnings in the first half of last year of \$7,791,459 or \$2.32 a share. After including the 416,666 new shares, earnings for the first half of this year also were \$2.32 per common share.

Mr. Baker said National Gypsum is mapping plans for a \$19,000,000 Great Lakes area expansion program. "Bulldozers soon will begin removing the overburden that covers the company's new Northern Michigan gypsum deposit (near Tawas City)," he disclosed.

Last Saturday night's all-star game at Oscoda saw the south win over the north, 8-1, in a long-distance slugfest contest. Although the final score separating the two teams was seven runs, the early innings of the game proved to be a good pitchers' duel.

With the largest crowd of the season on hand to watch the Huron Shore League's first all-star game, proceeds will be used to send league-leading Hale to the National Baseball Congress state tournaments at Frankfurt in August.

Winning pitcher for Manager Dennis Chrivia's southern all-stars was Gene LaVack of Oscoda, who took over from Mousseau in the fourth inning. Mousseau, who is the Hale team's star pitcher, allowed only one hit, a triple, during the three innings in which he was on the mound.

Leading the winners' long-distance hitters was Marvin Thompson of Oscoda, who hit a long home run over the right field fence in the sixth inning. Thompson was also voted the most valuable player by league officials.

Others who starred for the south-team were Bud Johnson of Hale, who tripled in the fifth inning to drive in a run, and his teammate, Wereley, who doubled to score the first run. Keith Jung led the southern hitters with two safeties.

New Owners Start Preparing Western States' for Opening

Sale of the SS Overmire, as announced by the Detroit and Cleveland Navigation Company in last week's Tawas Herald, was completed Thursday of last week. Work is now underway to renovate and improve the big ship, anchored at the Tawas City Park dock.

Sherman Rosen of Detroit, one of the new owners, said Monday that they hope to have the ship in operation as early as possible in the very near future. "We look forward to rapid progress," he said.

The name of the ship has been changed back to its former name, the Western States. At one time the big ship was one of the Detroit and Cleveland's fleet of pleasure boats on the Great Lakes. It was towed here and anchored at the park last summer, operating for about two months as a floating hotel.

The Tawas City Park Board and Mr. Rosen met Tuesday night to discuss terms of a new contract for berthing the ship at the dock. The new contract is expected to be the same as the one signed with the former owners last year with only a few minor changes.

'Operation Alert' Termed Success

Iosco County Sheriff Ivan L. O'Farrell termed Monday's "Operation Alert" in this county as a complete success. "All key men involved were in their proper positions after the first alert was given," he stated.

However, the unit has found at the conclusion of this civilian defense alert that the Iosco County unit has a tremendous job to do in communications and traffic details. Also final stages of housing and feeding possible evacuees from other areas must be completed.

Spicer to Study Construction of Sanitary Sewer

As a result of a meeting of the Tawas City Water Board Monday night, the Spicer Engineering Company of Saginaw will make study on the possible construction of a sanitary sewer line from the Lynn Street pumping station to homes on Murphy and Spring Streets.

Home owners of that area appeared at the meeting requesting sewer construction. According to a report prepared by Spicer in 1953, such construction would require a lift station because of the low ground elevation.

Members of the board were of the opinion that it would be impractical to construct a \$30,000 lift station which would serve only a few homes. However, seeking to relieve the problem in the affected area, the board authorized Spicer to investigate the possible extension of sewer.

Several residents of the Third Ward were present and asked for sewer construction. Action on this matter will be considered after all applications from the affected area are received.

Farm Events

Are your dairy cows keeping you or are you keeping them? Iosco farmers will get an opportunity to start a low-cost record system on their dairy herd this fall and to have their cow's production computed by a central office.

Keeping a record on your dairy herd is the only way for you to know the answer to this question.

Under the United States Department of Agriculture and the Michigan Cooperative Extension Service, the plan works this way: The farmer simply weighs the milk from each cow in his herd, morning and night, one day a

month. No milk samples or but-terfat tests are needed. You, the dairy farmer, record the weight on a special form, which you mail to a central com-puting office. The office location will be determined later this fall. The farmer's only cost—about 50 cents per cow—is for calculat-ing the monthly milk production, the total production to date for each cow and the yearly herd total. It the farmer furnishes feed information, the central of- fice will calculate the value of the ration, its total cost and the farmer's income over feed cost for the herd.

Donald Murray of Michigan State University, extension dairyman, says the figures can be used by the farmer to cull his low-producing cows. He tells me to feed each of the cows accord- ing to her production and to select the best animals from which to raise herd replace- ments.

The plan is designed to sup- plement the 50-year-old dairy herd improvement association testing and the "owner-sampler" system USDA, Michigan State University specialists see the new program as a chance for dairymen to boost their ef- ficiency and specialists see a way to prevent excess milk from reaching market, through the culling of high-cost, low- producing cows.

Farmers and others who have treated seed on hand should have it dyed a contrasting color so there is no danger of mixing it with food grain or allowing it to be sold as animal feed or for human consumption.

That is the law passed by the last session of the Michigan leg- islature. It applies to small grains, corn or beans.

The reason for the law is that a considerable amount of treated seed has contaminated feed grain. The law allows no mer- cury compounds in food.

Several carloads have been seized by Michigan Department of Agriculture officials, because of the contamination. The new law makes a misdemeanor the possession or sale of such treated grain without an identifying dye.

The Michigan Department of Agriculture indicates that of- ficials are not particular what color is used for the dye—just so it contrasts with the natural color of the grain.

The act does not apply to the bin treatment of grain which is for killing insects.

Home gardeners who are look- ing for fruit trees to fit the size

of their gardens can take a look at dwarf apple and pear trees. These small-sized trees are particularly well suited to small gardens where space is limited, or as ornamentals on the lawn or along the shrub border.

Dwarf trees are not recom- mended for planting in orchards intended for commercial fruit production. They are shallow rooted, inclined to be short rooted and are essentially adapted to the garden.

Details on selecting dwarf apple and pear trees are included in a new Michigan State Univer- sity extension folder now avail- able at our office in the Federal Building, East Tawas. Informa- tion on planting and care of the trees is also a part of the folder. The folder is F-136 and was written by staff members of the Michigan State University de- partment of horticulture.

The white pine was the most important tree in Michigan's virgin forests. Even today, it is the state tree. Evidence has been piling up, though, which points to another native tree as better suited for reforestation in lower Michigan.

Victor Rudolph, forest man- agement specialist at Michigan State University, says both species have been used exten- sively in Southern Michigan to reforest areas which were logged off completely at the turn of the century.

These plantings are now big enough to compare the white pine against the red pine.

The plantings were made for timber purposes rather than for Christmas trees. They included stands of red pine, stands of white pine and mixed planta- tions with both species.

In all of these plantings, the red pine far outgrew the white pine. In some of the mixed stands, the red pine trees are larger in height, diameter and volume than their cousins. Over- topping and crowding by the red pine will continue to reduce the number of white pine in such mixtures. Stands of pure white pine did a little better, but here the white pine weevil, which does not bother the red pine, did serious damage.

Rudolph says this comparison has made red pine the recom- mended tree for reforestation plantings in lower Michigan rather than white pine.

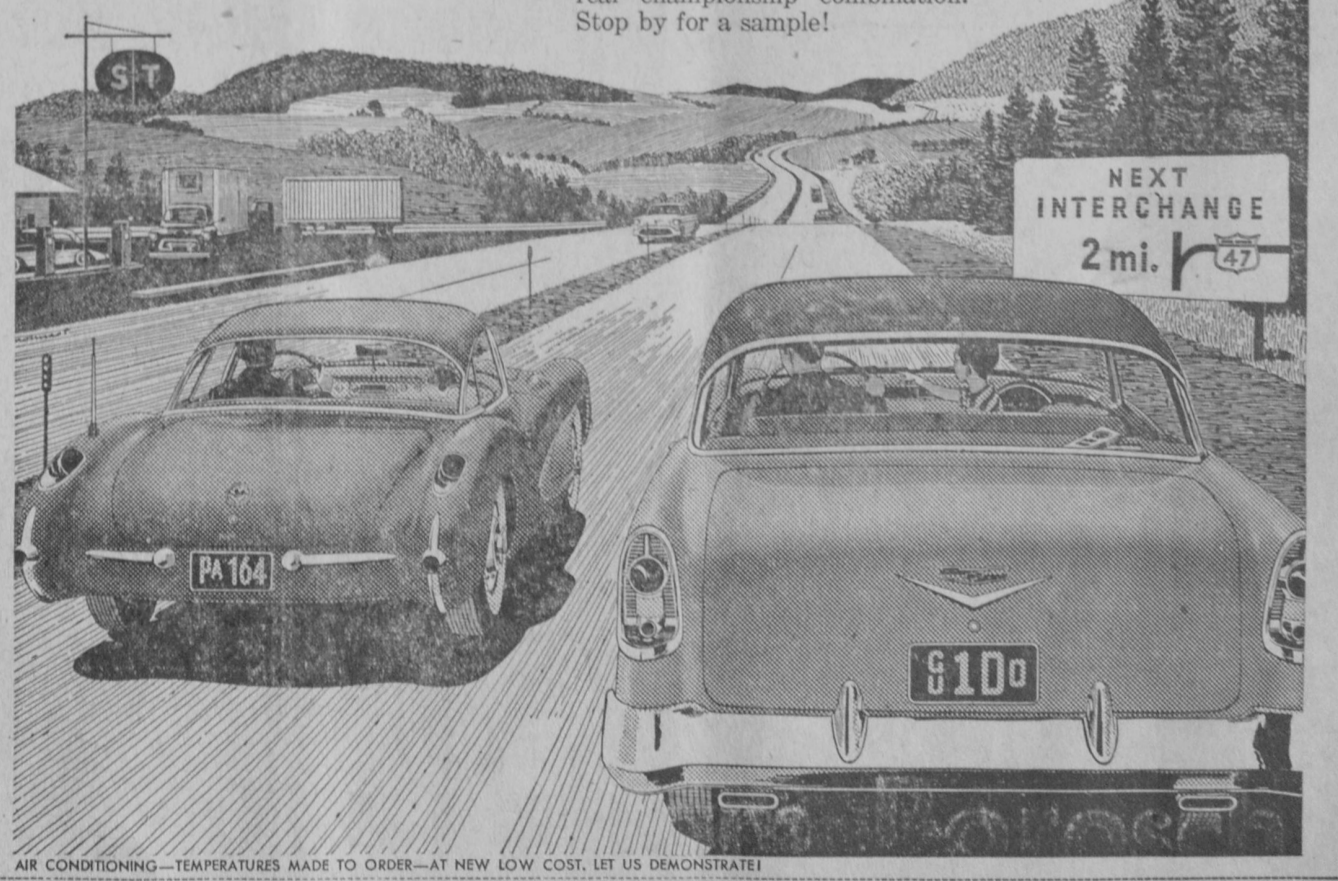

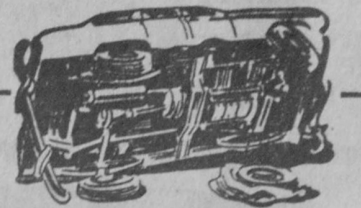
