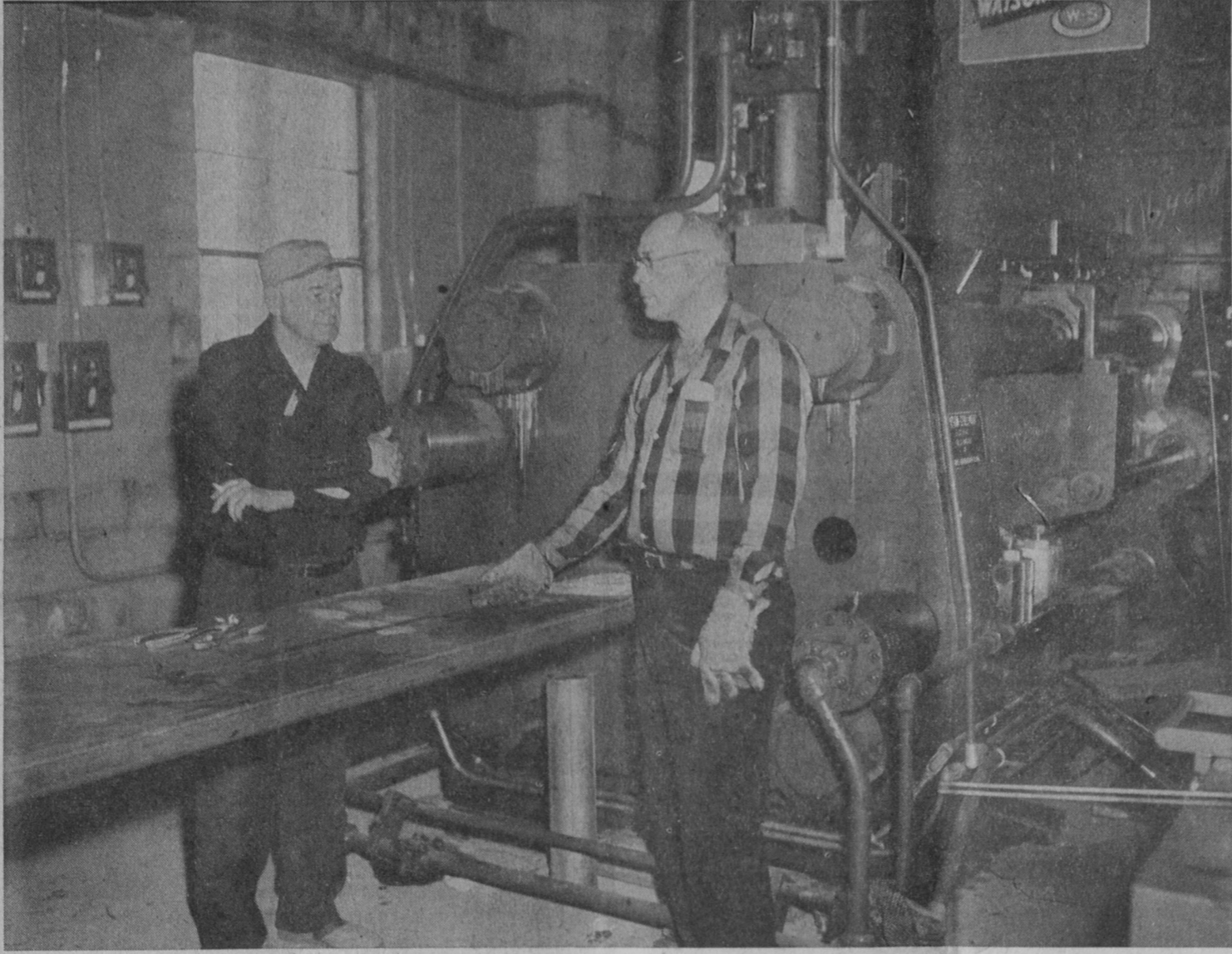

## Feather-Lite Installs Giant Aluminum Extrusion Press

Work stopped for a few minutes last Saturday morning at the Feather-Lite Manufacturing Company plant while company employees and officials, alike, watched with interest as the initial test runs were being made on the company's new 1,250-ton Watson Stillman extrusion press.

The only machinery of its kind in Northern Michigan, it will usher in a new era of manufacturing by Feather-Lite here when it goes into full operation in about two weeks. Heretofore, all metal used by the local plant was purchased elsewhere.

Built by the Farrel Birmingham Company of Ansonia, Connecticut, this huge press produces aluminum stock to be used in the manufacture of door frames, storm windows, windows and other allied products of the trade.

Fifteen days were required to set up the press after it was shipped here by the Detroit and Mackinac Railway Company. A crew of eight riggers set up the press. Frank Tracy of Farrel Birmingham Company was the erector. Two erectors from Grace Corporation, Grand Rapids, installed the ovens.

Explaining the operation of the giant press, A. W. Saur, the company's extrusion engineer, said that the first step in the semi-automatic cycle was to load aluminum billets (solid cylinders of alloyed aluminum) on an automatic conveyor which routes them through a gas furnace where the metal is heated to 800 degrees Fahrenheit.

After leaving the furnace, a hydraulic lift moves the aluminum into position for extrusion. The press exerts 3,000 pounds of pressure per square inch on the metal billets and extrudes or forces the metal under hydraulic pressure through the selected die, producing long strips of stock. The press is equipped with 63 different dies of varying patterns.

After the metal is extruded the strips, about 50 feet in length, are cooled on racks to room temperature, then cut to length. From there the metal goes to a 15-ton stretching machine. This operation not only straightens and stretches the metal strips, but compacts the molecules of the aluminum which makes for easier heat treatment and machineability.

From the stretching process the metal goes to a heat treating oven where it is aged and then removed for storage for future use on the production line.

To house the huge press, which alone weighs over 40 tons and has a 700 gallon oil capacity in its hydraulic system, the company built a 21,000 square foot addition to the building, making the extrusion process an independent operation.

With all operations of the extrusion process in a simultaneous cycle, it will require a crew of 10 men per shift in the department. The crew will receive on-the-job training.

## Civil Defense Unit in Need of Financial Aid

County civil defense director, Sheriff Ivan L. O'Farrell, this week called on the citizens of Isoco County to assist in financing the county civil defense unit.

"We realize that a number of our citizens cannot always take the time away from their regular pursuits to train themselves for the work required in civil defense procedure," said Sheriff O'Farrell.

"In that case may we suggest that each and every one of you as good citizens of the community open your purses and send a small financial contribution to your civil defense so that it may secure the much needed material and supplies which the federal or state governments do not furnish."

Sheriff O'Farrell was appointed to the post of director of civil defense for the county in 1953 by the board of supervisors. He immediately started, along with his staff, to organize the county into a compact working unit so as to be able to cope with any emergency, disaster or attack within the county.

First step in the organization was a complete survey of the county as to the housing available, feeding locations and warehouse space.

Then all doctors, nurses, technicians, hospitals were documented so as to be available at a moment's notice when required. All ambulances, buses and transportation facilities were documented and filed, along with all types of heavy duty equipment, power equipment and hand tools which would be vital to the unit in case of an emergency.

In September 1954 the director established a school where a group of 32 young men were trained.

These two Isoco County teams finished in the same order in the recent Tawas River Canoe Race. The time recorded in Wednesday's race was unofficially clocked.

## Fletcher's Assumes Control of Tawas City Station

Fletcher Oil Company of Bay City assumed direct control of its service station in Tawas City last week, along with several other company-owned stations in Northeastern Michigan.

The Tawas City station had been leased and operated by McKay Sales Company for the past 2½ years.

Thorald Curry, who had managed the station for McKay since last December, will remain with Fletcher as manager-operator.

## Tawas City Businessman Dies Saturday

Rudy Gingerich, Tawas City businessman for the past 19 years, died Saturday at Mercy Hospital, Bay City. He had been ill since October.

Mr. Gingerich had been owner and operator of an elevator and sales warehouse at Tawas City with an extensive business in feed, grain and farm supplies and a sales and service for International Harvester Company farm machinery. Since his illness, the business has been taken over by his son, Donald Gingerich.

Rudy Gingerich was born August 5, 1907, in Goshen, Indiana. He moved with his family to Tawas where he married Miss Jeanette Featheringill on March 30, 1929. They came to Tawas City in 1937.

He is survived by his wife; four sons, Donald, Marvin, Larry and Robert; two grandchildren; four brothers, Henry and Melvin of Turner; Simon of Macomb, Illinois; Edward of Culver City, California; three sisters, Mrs. Edna Shaeffer of Turner, Mrs. Fanny Schlaubauch of Millersburg, Illinois, and Miss Minnie Gingerich of Lansing.

Funeral services were held Tuesday afternoon from the Tawas City Methodist Church with the Rev. Ralph Edwards officiating. Burial was in the Tawas City Cemetery.

## Antique Car Owners to Hold Week-Long Conclave Here

A gas light parade of old-time cars with occupants dressed in linen dusters, veils and other costumes of motorists of the early 1900s will be a feature of a week-long tour of antique automobiles scheduled to be held in the Tawas July 29 to August 4. Some 115 persons and 50 old-time cars are expected to be here for the event from Michigan, Ohio, Indiana and New York.

Old time car owners will converge on the "twin cities" in a seven-day program which promises to be one of the feature attractions of the summer season in this area. All are members of either the Horseless Carriage Club, Veteran Motor Car Club or the Antique Automobile Club of America.

Donald Watson of Tawas City, who heads up the Tawas Chamber of Commerce's committee which is making arrangements to handle accommodations for the visitors, said this week that the group had a very interesting schedule of events planned.

"There will be entertainment for local people, too," he commented. After participants register at the Sunset Motel Sunday, July 29, where they will receive accommodations at various resorts, a 6:00 "restoration hour" will be held at the Barnes Hotel. Following this will be a kick-off banquet at the Barnes, followed by an outline in detail of the tour agenda by the committee. Plaques will be awarded to each driver.

At 9:30 Monday morning, the group will leave for a scenic lakeside drive to Oscoda. From Oscoda the drivers will travel through the Huron National Forest to Lumbermen's Monument where they will have a "relief" stop. At 1:00 p. m. they will return to Tawas via Silver Valley, traveling a total of 65 miles. A buffet dinner followed by a dance is scheduled at the East Tawas Community Building in the evening.

Tuesday, July 31, will be "Air Force Day." After an 8:30 o'clock breakfast at the Barnes Hotel, the old time car owners will make a side-light run to the Coast Guard Station at Tawas Point and then to Wurtsmith Air Force Base, Oscoda, where they will be the guests of Colonel Ralph G. Taylor, base commander. Following a luncheon at 12:30, special field events will be held on the base runways, plus jet rides and a special jet air show. Base personnel will be given rides in the old-time cars.

Drivers and their families will be able to spend Wednesday just as they want. A pioneer run will be held in the morning for those who wish to take it. At 6:30 p. m. a beach party will be held at Cabbie's Tawas Resort.

Highlight of Wednesday's activities will be a gas light parade (cars will be illuminated by carbide lamps) through the back streets of the Tawas to let the townspeople view the parade from their homes.

At 9:00 a. m. Thursday, the group will leave Sunset Motel for a scenic run to the estate of Les Peters near Curran. A dinner will be held at 7 o'clock in the evening at the Barnes Hotel.

The group will hold a trophy run starting at 9:30 a. m. Friday morning. A cocktail party will be held in the evening from 5:30 to 6:30 and an award banquet followed by presentation of awards is planned.

## Annual School Elections to be Held In Isoco County School Districts July 9

### Trustee Walter Niles Lone Candidate on Ballot

Walter H. Niles will be a candidate to succeed himself as trustee on the Tawas Area Board of Education at next Monday's annual school election, July 9. He is the lone candidate on the ballot.

The position of trustee is for a three-year period, from July 1, 1956, through June 30, 1959. Polls for the election will open at 7:00 a. m. and close at 8:00 p. m.

All qualified electors are urged to vote, regardless of the fact that there is only one candidate's name printed on the ballot. By going to the polls electors show their interest in school affairs and indicate their confidence in the board of education.

Voting precincts are as follows: Precinct No. 1, East Tawas City Hall; Precinct No. 2, Tawas City City Hall; Precinct No. 3, Tawas Township Hall; Precinct No. 4, Alabaster Township Hall. The annual school meeting will be held in the Tawas Area Gymnasium at Tawas City at 8:00 p. m.

Hale area school electors will also vote on three proposals on a separate ballot.

Proposition No. 1 asks: "Shall Hale Area School District, counties of Isoco and Ogemaw, create a building and site fund?"

Proposition No. 2 "Shall the monies remaining in and future receipts for debt retirement fund Number 2 of Hale Area School District be transferred to the building and site fund after all bonds and obligations of debt retirement fund Number 2 have been paid in full?"

Proposition No. 3: "Shall the board of education of Hale Area School District be authorized to sell one acre of real estate and school building situated thereon located in Section 2, Hill Township, Ogemaw County, the real estate and school being property of the district?"

The annual school election for Whittemore Area School will be held Monday, July 9. The polls will be open from 7:00 a. m. to 8:00 p. m.

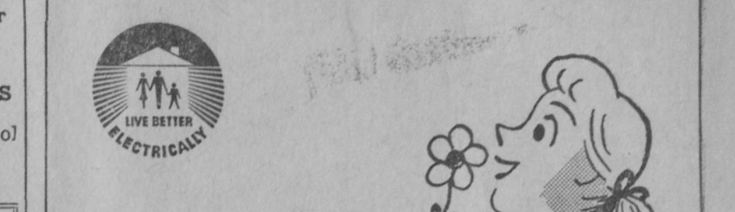

Here is a red letter day to remember! On July 1 the new grain standards set up by the federal food and drug administration will go into effect. The new levels will change the basis for judging the amount of contamination in wheat.
Elevator operators have been told that if the grain they ship does not comply with the new standards, it will be seized. That means that they will lose a substantial part of the money they paid for the wheat.
This could mean considerable loss to wheat buyers. Naturally, they have to protect themselves against such a loss by being very careful to make sure the grain they buy from you farmers meets the standards.
This is their responsibility, because the Michigan Department of Agriculture does not have any jurisdiction until the grain enters trade channels.
The Michigan Clean Grain Committee reminds us that most of the quality problems connected with keeping grain clean originate on the farm. You will be doing yourself a financial favor, and promoting cooperation with your elevator operator if you can offer him clean grain he can sell.
County A.S.C. office has check sheets to help you take a "new look" at your storage facilities. I have clean grain bulletins that will be sent you upon request.

using lead arsenate and phenothiazine.
Make a summer drench to control tapeworms a permanent part of your parasite control program. All your sheep and lambs should receive the regular phenothiazine-lead arsenate drench between June 15 and July 15.
Continue using phenothiazine and salt mixture to control other parasites.
Pasture rotation is also helpful in controlling parasites. For rotation to be effective, the sheep should not be left on a given field longer than two weeks, nor returned to the same field for at least three weeks.

every five years. Cold and slow growing conditions plus some wet period encourage leaf curl infection. Severe infection cannot be predicted.
Edward Kios, extension plant disease control specialist of Michigan State University, recommends that a spray of ferbam be applied for control. One and one-half to two tablespoons of ferbam per gallon of water is the proper concentration. Apply enough spray to get thorough coverage of the tree.
Timing is also important in the control measures. In the fall, put on the spray after leaf drop. In the spring, be sure to get it on before the buds swell. To be certain of control, apply the spray before infection begins.
Infected leaves become thick, swollen and brittle. They become puckered and curled and their color varies from light green to red. Early in the summer, the swollen, infected leaves soon turn yellow, wither and fall to the ground.

One of the sheep raiser's continual problems is his battle against internal parasites. One of the important pests that bothers Isosco County flocks at this time of the year is the tapeworm.
The tapeworm is a long, flat, segmented worm found in the small intestine. Unless the infestation is heavy, there are few outward symptoms to indicate that the pest is present. Whitish segments passed in the droppings are one sign. Some scouring may be noticeable.
Graydon Blank, animal husbandry specialist at Michigan State University, says at least arsenate used as a prepared liquid drench is very effective in controlling the tapeworm.
Use the prepared liquid drench because it is the safest. You should not attempt to mix the drench at home. Phenothiazine-lead arsenate drenches are available through local drug stores, veterinarians and from livestock supply houses.
If the prepared drench comes in the form of a powder, be very careful to follow instruction, and keep the solution well stirred while using it. Do not try to mix this drench yourself at home by

This is the sunburn season. The hot summer sun beating down can cause painful burns, not only to humans, but to animals as well.
Dr. G. H. Conner of the veterinary medicine staff at Michigan State University says that sunburn can cause serious and permanent damage to animals.
Three things must be present if sunburn is to occur. First, the animal must have a white skin, or one with very little pigmentation in it. Second, there must be strong sunlight. Third, the animal must be sensitized to light.
This sensitization is caused by certain types of forage and by certain chemicals. Generally, sunburn is associated with the chlorophyll in such green crops as buckwheat, rape, certain weeds, and even lush growths of winter wheat and rye. Something in these crops seems to make some animals sensitive to sunlight. Phenothiazine, the drug used to remove worms, can also cause photo-sensitization.
Most cases of sunburn can be prevented. You should always have plenty of shade available. It may have special value when the forage is growing rapidly. Watch white-skinned animals closely and if any signs of sunburn appear, keep them in the shade when the sun is bright. Feeding hay even while the stock is on pasture will keep down the chlorophyll agent concentration in the animals.
Peach leaf curl, a disease reported by many home gardeners in various parts of Michigan this spring, can be controlled by spraying either in the fall or spring.
The disease is important in Isosco County about three out of

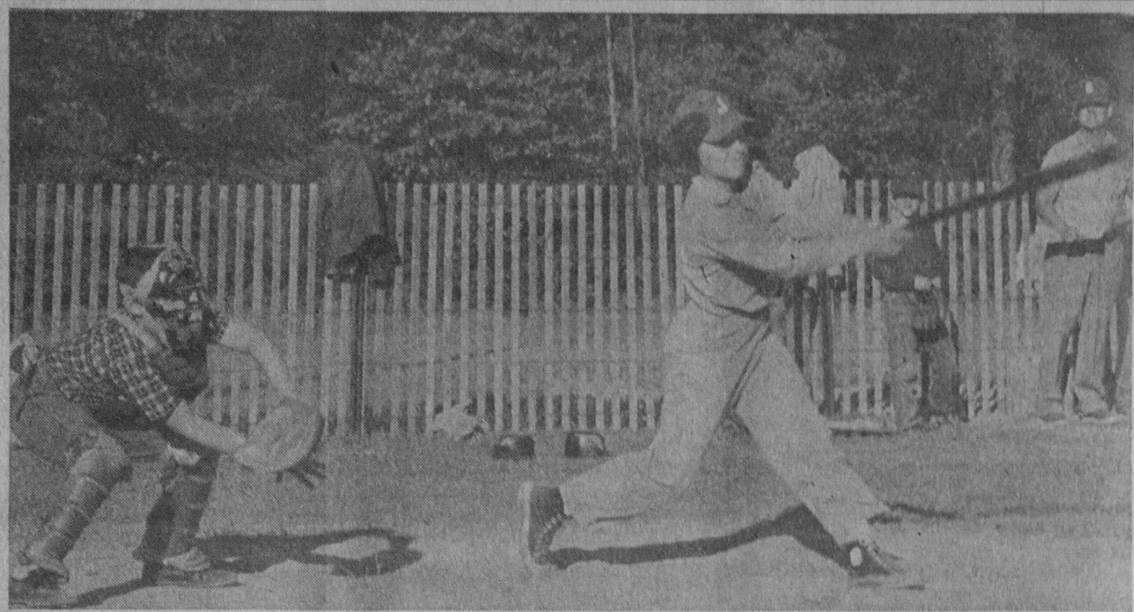

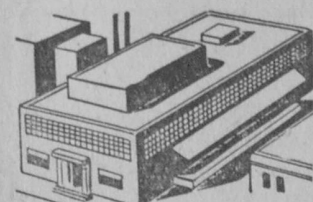

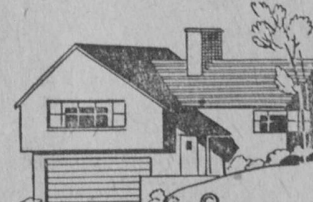

# Must Sign for Soil Bank Benefits Before July 20

Agreement forms for the new soil bank program are now available to farmers at the Iosco County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation office in the Federal Building, East Tawas.

They must be signed not later than July 20 if the farmer wishes to take part during the 1956 crop year, according to ASC Chairman Lawrence R. Ball.

The soil bank is a new feature of the national farm program authorized under the farm bill recently enacted. Its objective is to encourage farmers to reduce crop acreages and thus help overcome farm surpluses that are depressing the market.

Growers interested in taking part in the acreage reserve portion of the soil bank program have until July 20 to sign the soil bank agreements, designating the acreage of wheat which they wish to include under the reserve.

But a farmer who has already planted his wheat crop and who wants to plow or cut it in order to reduce the acreage below the allotment may not have much time before the deadline for adjusting his acreage. In Michigan, the deadline is June 30. The agreement should be signed before the farmer does anything with his acreage.

A wheat grower who wishes to participate in the acreage reserve this year first must have complied with his wheat allotment. If he can meet this condition, he then has three or four opportunities for earning payments on 1956 crops.

Such a farmer may earn payments either by underplanting, by crop loss through weather conditions or other natural causes, or by plowing or cutting a portion of the crop to reduce the acreage below the allotment.

Certain conditions for eligibility are attached to all the meth-

ods of qualifying for the acreage reserve. Payments will be \$1.17 per bushel based on either the normal or the appraised yield, according to the method of qualifying.

Payments for underplanting winter wheat, seeded last fall for harvest in 1956, may be made only if the farmer underplanted his farm wheat allotment because of adverse weather conditions. The rate for this practice is \$4 per acre.

The acreage reserve part of the soil bank act is available now but only applies to farmers having wheat allotments. The conservation reserve part of the act has not been made available as yet. Regulations will be made known at a later date.

Anyone interested in the acreage reserve program should contact the Iosco County ASC office immediately.

## Six-Foot Protest

PETITIONS TO CONGRESS these days are nothing new, as this 120-year-old document shows. An act of Congress in 1836 granted Michigan statehood on the condition that the Toledo strip, an area desired by both Michigan and Ohio, go to Ohio with Michigan taking the Upper Peninsula. A storm of indignation followed, and this lengthy protest, held by Patricia Reitz of the Henry Ford Museum staff, was signed by 109 residents of Whiteford township, Monroe county, who didn't want to live in Ohio. The Upper Peninsula, denounced in the petition as "the frozen and sterile shores of Lake Superior," later proved a bonanza of timber and iron ore.
