



That is why it is so important that we get rid of the rats and mice on our farms before the rigid new grain standards set up by the Food and Drug Administration take effect this July 1. Proper storage facilities are

Proper storage racilities are needed for any permanent rodent control program, but it is also necessary to kill the ones already on the farm.

Donald Hayne of the zoology department at Michigan State

University says that poison is the best way to kill the rodent population around your granary He recommends the anti-coag ulant type of poison as the best and easiest to get. Both Warfarin and pival are anti-coagulant

That means the poison must be where the rats and mice can get to it easily. Set up a series of bait boxes around your grain storage area. These should be




