## Parade and Fireworks at Tawas July 4th

### Supervisors OK Preliminary Plans for Isosco County Centennial Celebration

Isosco County will celebrate its 100th birthday next year. Tentative plans for a centennial celebration were presented by Miss Edna Otis of East Tawas to the Isosco County Board of Supervisors at the three-day June meeting which ended Wednesday.

Miss Otis, a former Isosco County newspaper publisher and a county historian, at a previous meeting of the board had been requested to investigate the possibilities of a centennial celebration. The tentative county-wide program as outlined by Miss Otis at Tuesday's session of the board would include contests, games, historical exhibits and parades. Miss Otis suggested that the parades should not only be a pageant of the county's early history, but picture its agricultural, commercial and industrial life and its great growth as a recreational area.

Miss Otis was asked by the board to organize a centennial committee which would include descendants of Isosco pioneers. This group with a committee appointed by the board of supervisors would be in charge of arranging a program and taking care of the details of holding the event. Miss Otis was assured that she would have the full cooperation of the board of supervisors.

Clarence Everett of Tawas City was elected member of the board of county canvassers by the board of supervisors. He succeeds George Beard of Osoda, who had resigned.

The county officers were authorized to attend their respective state conventions.

H. R. Apol, representing the state director of elections, appeared before the board at the Wednesday morning session. His mission was to explain the new legislation relating to elections. There was an informative discussion of a recent ruling by the attorney general. He ruled that township supervisors, clerks and treasurers may no longer act as inspectors of elections since by virtue of their office they are members of the election commission and township board of canvassers.

The board went on record as opposing the proposal to increase the price of game and fish licenses.

### COLLEGE STUDENT FROM TURKEY LOOKS FOR JOB DURING VACATION

A 20-year-old student from Istanbul, Turkey, who attends Park College at Park Hill, Missouri, is spending the summer in Tawas City with two other college companions while working to earn enough money to continue their education next fall.

At present Miss Sevin Kunt is job hunting. She and her two companions, Gloria Henson of Council Bluffs, Iowa, and Cynthia Jones of Cruthersville, Missouri, answered an advertisement in a newspaper to work as waitresses in a Northern Michigan resort, only to learn that they were unable to earn enough money at that job.

Majoring in philosophy at Park Hill, it was Sevin's ambition to attend her mother's alma mater in the United States. Her brother also expects to come to this country to attend the same college. Her father is a judge and her mother a school teacher.

Explaining that this was her first visit to the United States, Sevin said she liked the country at first sight. "Everyone at the college or places I have visited has been extremely friendly," she said.

Although she did not expect to visit Michigan, she said that she was impressed after seeing Lake Huron, the AuSable River and other tourist attractions in the state.

After her graduation from college, Sevin hopes to travel around the world before returning to Turkey. She will be a sophomore next fall.

Tuesday noon Sevin spoke before the Tawas Kiwanis Club, telling her impressions of the United States and about her native land. She was the guest of George W. Myles, president of the club.

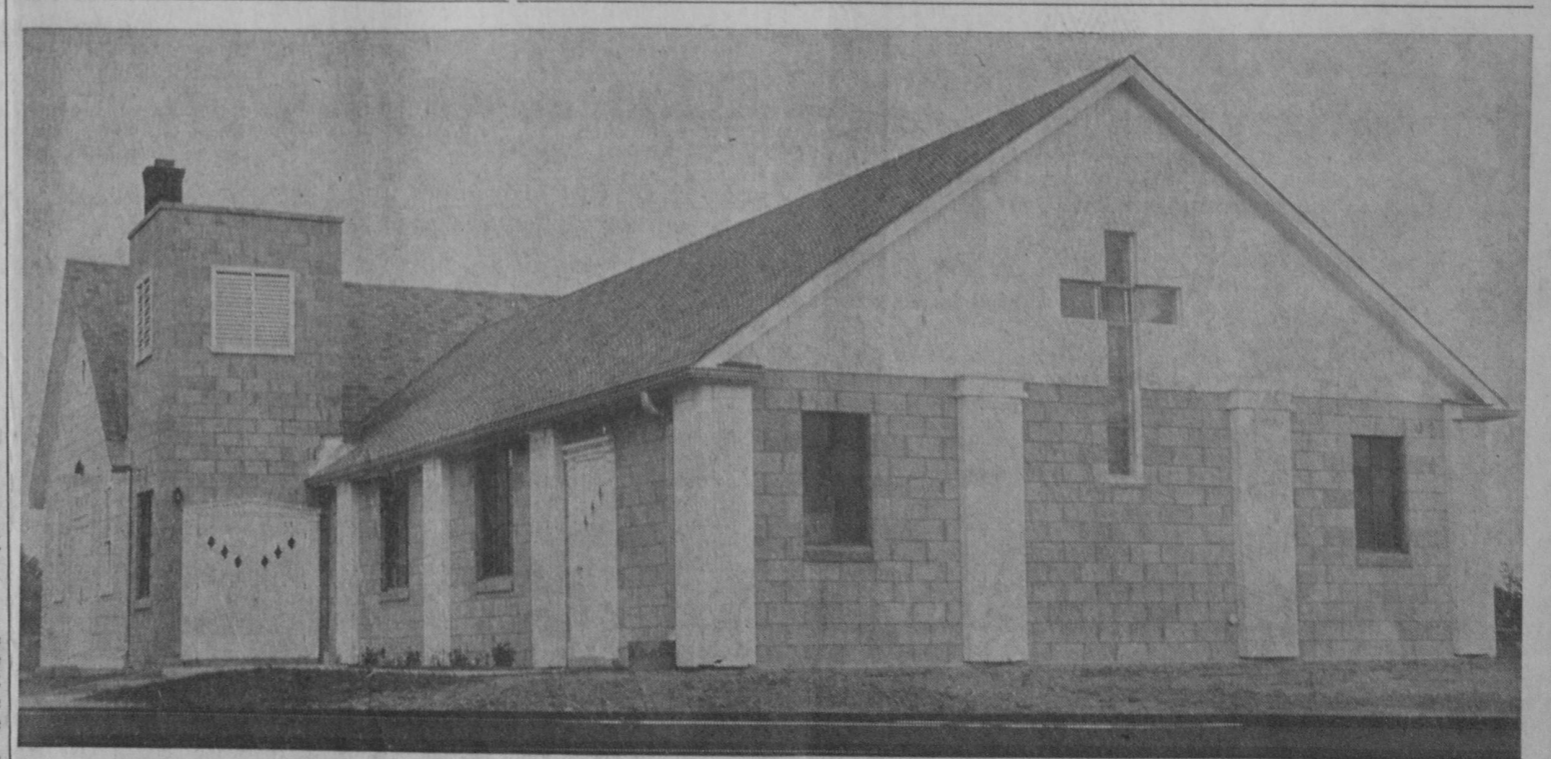

An added attraction during the two-day celebration will be a conducted tour of Wurtsmith Air Force Base and an old timers baseball game against the Oscoda Lakers.

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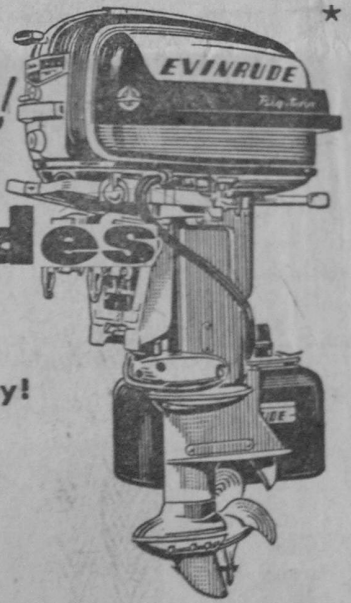

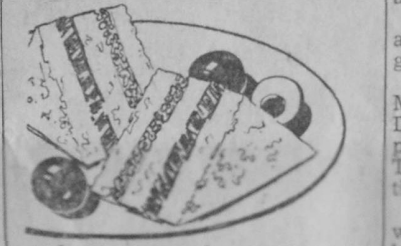

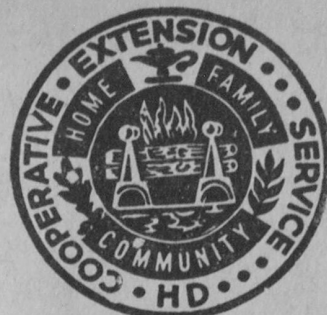

Now, during June Dairy Month Festival of Better Living, is a perfect time for considering just what dairy foods do for us.

To be specific, dairy foods now furnish the American people one-fourth of our protein, one-fifth of the Vitamin A in our diet, half the riboflavin and three-fourths of the calcium. And for all this food value, we pay only 20 cents of our food dollar.

There's no doubt about it: Dairy foods furnish us with our outstanding food bargains. So celebrate the June Dairy Month by serving an extra bonus of milk, ice cream, butter and cottage cheese.

Next time you are in your food store, pick up a few cans of money-saving, time-saving evaporated milk. Try nonfat dry milk solids for your cooking, too. Serve delicious ice cream at meal's end or as a party snack—it is the fun food. And, of course, you will want to sample new kinds of cheese displayed by your grocer.

June's best buys definitely are dairy foods.

Mrs. Reginald Bublitz presented the evening's lesson on "Low Calorie Meals." Her well organized and excellent presentation on the subject, inspired all present to new endeavors in nutritional experiments.

During the course of the business meeting, conducted by the chairman, Mrs. James Lansky, the group decided to end the season with a festive note by going out for dinner during the last week of June.

After the business of the evening, the group enjoyed delicious strawberry parfait prepared and served by the hostess, Carolyn Kasischke, secretary.

Blueberries that are to be frozen should be fully ripe ones which are blue-lilac in color. Whether they are frozen in sugar syrup or unsweetened depends on the planned use. For fruit compotes and other fresh fruit desserts, use syrup. But berries for pies and salads should be dry packed.

Finger salads can be served right with the main course of the meal or served as snack foods.

For finger salads you need an ample supply of crisp raw relishes and a variety of dressings. When serving them as a salad course of the meal, use individual salad plates. Place a mound of dressing on each one and surround it with one or more kinds of relishes. Each person dips his own.

As a suggestion, cheese dressings are especially tasty with raw vegetables. Some are: Cream cheese thinned with mayonnaise and seasoned with chopped pickle; cream cheese mixed with blue cheese and thinned with cream; cottage cheese mixed with sour cream and then seasoned; sour cream, as it is or seasoned; cottage cheese thinned with cream and seasoned with garlic or onion salt. Another suggestion is mayonnaise or salad dressing

mixed with curry, dill catchup or horseradish.

Raw relishes, without any dressing can double as a salad, too. For crisp raw vegetables try small romaine or lettuce leaves; carrot or celery sticks; small chunks of lettuce or Chinese cabbage; watercress sprigs; cucumber sticks or slices; scallions, radishes, green pepper strips or rings; thick tomato wedges; or try tiny cauliflowerettes.

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AMAZON FLOATING CHURCH, ONLY ONE OF ITS KIND



Far up the Amazon River, in the interior of Brazil, may be found a church unlike any other in South America and perhaps in the world, for that matter—it is a floating church.

"This unique sanctuary," Kenneth Sherman, superintendent of the Tawas Seventh-Day Adventist Sabbath School, says,

"is one of the more dramatic examples of a South American church building program in which the local church is participating with a special offering Saturday."

Called the Templo Adventista, he said in announcing the special offering, the church is a white frame structure accommodating about 100 people. Three logs, four to six feet in diameter, keep it afloat. "Instead of walking or riding to church, as we do here, the church members arrive by canoe."

Mr. Sherman explained that the Amazon River at certain seasons rises as high as 40 feet, flooding the surrounding countryside. But the floods do not bother this church, he added. Anchored securely to the river's bed, it simply rises with the rising waters and floats at its moorings waiting for people to come to the next service.

The church officer stated that this isolated house of worship "floats" as a memorial to the mission's medical launch work among the Indians of interior Brazil.

The special offering to be taken by the church Saturday will also help in the enlargement of the Seventh-Day Adventists educational work in Brazil.

Farm Events

By MARVIN DAVENPORT County Agent

Thursday, July 5—ABA meeting, Grant Township Hall 8:00 p. m., Brucellosis progress report.

Thursday, July 5—Sheep Day, Mt. Pleasant, 1:00 p. m. until 3:30 p. m. at Mt. Pleasant Fair Grounds.

The sheep day at Mt. Pleasant would be a day well spent for Isosco sheep raisers. I plan to go and George Lake will be on the program. Anyone else caring to join us is welcome (until riding space runs out). Drop me a card if you are interested. I plan leaving East Tawas at 10:00 a. m.

Farmers, do not forget your federal gasoline tax refund cards. We have them in our office.

Our recent legume varieties field day pointed out some things Isosco County farmers should know.

1. Fertilizers (particularly phosphate) and lime are essential if you want alfalfa to grow.

2. Trefolius may have a place in our pasture improvement program, but not on cultivated crop acreage. It is suited for those semi-permanent pasture acres.

3. Maybe Isosco County has an alfalfa all its own worth investigating. It is not well for us to jump at conclusions, but one of the alfalfas in our demonstration plots out-yielded the others by well over one ton of hay per acre.

The questions we must now ask are "is it wilt resistant, leaf spot resistant?" More demonstration acres and some experimental plots can best help to evaluate it.

An early harvesting can mean 15 to 25 percent more protein than a late harvested crop. I see several Isosco farmers have started their hay.

By early harvesting, we mean that one-tenth to one-third of the plants are in bloom. Late harvest is full bloom or a later stage of maturity.

This early hay is also more completely digested by the cow and that means dairymen will need to feed less grain along with it.

Donald Hillman, extension dairyman at Michigan State University, tells me that saving from early cutting will really show up next winter. Many farmers who make excellent hay find they do not need to buy much commercial protein to mix in the feed. The savings in protein alone can amount to \$25 or more per cow, according to Hillman.

Grasses like timothy, June grass and bromegrass mature earlier than alfalfa and most other legumes. To get the best feed value, meadows that are mostly grass should be harvested first.

The clover will need close watching because they change quite rapidly from bud stage to full bloom and are hard to catch at the one-tenth to one-third bloom stage.

Alfalfa has a wider range of time for harvesting than the other hay crops. Its protein content seldom drops below 13 percent even when harvested late. However, alfalfa produces the maximum amount of protein and total digestible nutrients per acre when it is cut early because a bigger second crop can be harvested. These principles are as true for hay crop silage as for dry hay. The earlier cut crops properly stored are the best feed.

Home gardens (including mine) have lost valuable nitrogen down the drain as the result of the heavy spring rains in Michigan.

Home gardeners should add nitrogen to their soil now or within the next few weeks. Unless there is an ample supply of this important nutrient, chances for a successful garden are reduced, according to John Carew, extension specialist in horticulture, Michigan State University.

For gardens that were not fer-

tilized this spring, an application of ammonium nitrate between the rows is recommended. Apply at a rate of one-fourth pound per 100 square feet. Be careful not to put any of the nitrate on the plants themselves.

Complete fertilizers may also be used to supply the nitrogen. Carew recommends an application of three pounds of these fertilizers per 100 square feet of garden area. Again, apply between the rows.

Analyses of 4-16-16, 6-12-12 and 5-20-20 are satisfactory.

For those who are not sure whether their garden needs nitrogen, we suggest putting on some of these fertilizers in small test areas. If these areas become greener than the rest of the garden, then the entire area needs nitrogen.

Rodents and birds are among the chief causes of contamination in stored wheat.

Isosco County farms should be taking steps to get rid of the causes of contamination right away. On July 1, new standards for wheat sanitation tolerances will be put into effect by the federal food and drug administration. The new regulations say that wheat containing one or more rodent pellets per pint will be labeled filth-contaminated and subject to seizure.

Here are three steps to prevent loss from rodent contamination. Rat and mouse-proof existing granaries; erect only rodent-proofed new granaries; and keep the rodent population down by getting rid of shelters and food supplies.

Rodent-proof storage is the only satisfactory protection. Even with proper sanitation and efficient control, rodents may come into a farm from some place outside to get into the granary.

A new Michigan State University extension folder, F-134, contains details on rodent-proofing grain storages. If you have not received a copy, drop me a line and you will get one.

Suggestions on controlling rodents already present are also included in the folder.

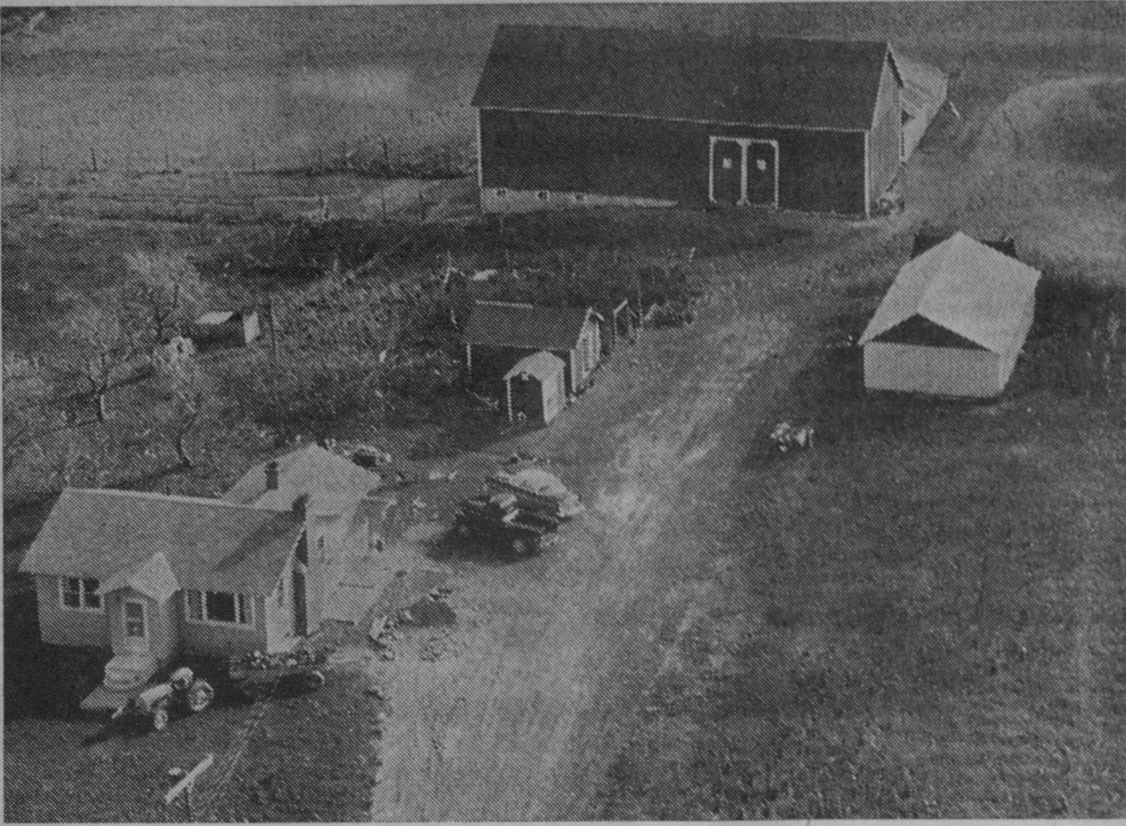

WAVE OF WINDOW SMASHING HITS IOSCO

Iosco County Sheriff Ivan L. O'Farrell warned parents Wednesday that his department was going to take drastic measures to stop a wave of window smashing which is going on around the county.

Sheriff O'Farrell said that 49 windows were smashed out at the old Wuggazer dry cleaning plant in Tawas City and 58 windows were broken last week-end at the Whittemore Area High School.

"Parents must watch their children more closely during vacation time while they are at play," Sheriff O'Farrell stated. "Besides these two incidents, windows have been smashed out of numerous cottages in the Long Lake area, several windows broken out at the SS Overniter at the Tawas City dock, and serious damage done to windows and doors to a Sherman Township farm house," the sheriff reports.

This latest wave of window smashing is being investigated by the sheriff's department, officers from the Michigan State Police Post at East Tawas and city police officers.

Sheriff O'Farrell declared that it is the responsibility of parents to watch their own children. "Should the offenders be apprehended and are under age, the parents will be the ones who are prosecuted," O'Farrell warned.
