# 62 MILLION VOTED IN 1952

## How Big Will Our Turnout Be November 6?

Whole World Watching to See if We Practice What We Preach



In the 1952 elections, Americans made a rather good showing.

More than 62 million of us voted—a record turnout for us.

But even with that record in numbers, only 63 per cent of Americans of voting age actually did vote—a smaller percentage than vote in Canada, England, Italy, France, Japan and many other democracies.

For a people who don't like to think that anybody else is better than we are—who feel a real let-down when we lose the Davis Cup or don't sweep the Olympic Games—we are behind our friends in other countries when it comes to voting.

**What Will We Do Nov. 6?**

If we slide off in voting in the elections this year—if fewer Americans vote—we will serve notice on our friends abroad that we are not as hot about democracy as we say we are.

By contrast, a man who votes shows the world that he believes in his form of government and its concept of freedom and liberty.

He demonstrates to all potential enemies that in a hot war, the enemy would face a united country that believes in itself.

**Your Vote Counts for Peace**

Your vote is a genuine deterrent to aggression.

If you don't vote, if fewer people go to the polls than in 1952, a potential enemy would be justified in construing this fact as a chink in our armor.

If you vote, you're doing what you can for peace.

If you sit this one out, you run the risk that you may contribute to blundering your country into war.

Your vote is the most effective letter you can write to your neighbors overseas—a vote of confidence to them that democracy can really work for peace in the world.
