Hunters Take to Woods for Wily Whitetail

An army of an estimated 400,000 hunters will take to the deer country this morning (Thursday), the opening day of the 1956 season for whitetail deer. Before the season ends about 70,000 deer, or a little less than last year, will be taken.

At least 275,000 "red coats" will hunt in the Lower Peninsula, where game experts figure there will be about 40,000 taken. This would mean a success ratio of about 15.2 percent for the hunters. Here in Isosco County, veteran hunters believe the herd made a slight increase in number, a yearly expectation since the early 1950s when the bottom dropped out of the deer population.

On the somber side of the deer hunting picture, Michigan State Police and local law enforcement agencies were preparing for the usual number of traffic accidents, hunter heart attacks and accidental shootings. Police urge hunters to be careful, not only in the woods with fire arms, but on the highways with the much more deadly automobile.

Western States Formally Opened; Conservation Head Challenges Legality

Host to Many Visitors During Opening Week

Officially opened as a marine resort on Tawas Bay, the SS Western States was host to a large number of visitors in its dining room and lounges last Sunday afternoon and evening. Now operating seven days a week, the resort has 100 rooms open and the owners expect to have an additional 75 ready by spring.

Expressing his appreciation to the response shown by the public, Sherman Rosen, manager, reported that the ship's large dining room had many customers opening day.

Once a cruise ship in the Detroit and Cleveland Navigation Company's Great Lakes fleet, the Western States has regained its status as queen of the lakes. More than \$100,000 was spent in its renovation and it is now the second largest resort in Michigan.

Chief chef aboard the Western States is George Rose, well known Michigan restaurateur. His wife is dining room supervisor.

Owner Robert Rosen and son, Sherman, were hosts Saturday to a group of visiting newspapermen, their wives and other guests at a dinner party aboard the converted cruise ship. Included among the guests were the mayors of the Tawas, George W. Myles of Tawas City and Elmer Werth of East Tawas, and their wives.

As preparations were being made to entertain the visitors, the owners learned that the state conservation department in Lansing was reported to have started legal action to prevent its operation.

Although no official word has been received by the owners from the conservation department, Michigan's daily press has reported that Gerald E. Eddy, department director, has claimed that the owners are violating the submerged land act.

According to Eddy's statement in the Detroit Free Press, "the ship is unlawfully occupying part of the lake bottom."

In a statement Friday night, Sherman Rosen said that to his knowledge, Lansing had never made an official inspection of the ship, nor had the owners ever been officially notified, one way or another.

Rosen expressed surprise over the announcement by Eddy. He said that when they purchased the ship a check was made with all state agencies before going ahead with the renovation.

"The United States Coast Guard at Tawas Point, although not having jurisdiction over such matters, made soundings at our request and reported that the ship was free fore and aft, with a slight impacting of sand at the paddle wheels," Rosen stated.

"In our opinion the conservation department's alleged charges are not true, the Western States is not permanently fastened to the lake bottom or dock," Rosen declared.

Meanwhile, the Tawas City Businessmen's Association has given its 100 percent endorsement to the owners and the operation of (See OPENING, page 8.)

Hale Farm Fire Takes Life of Roy Bannister

A 72-year-old retired Hale farmer-blacksmith, Roy Bannister, died early Sunday morning when fire destroyed his farm home southwest of Hale. His body was found in the charred wreckage of the building by members of the Hale Fire Department shortly after they brought the fire under control.

An over-heated stove was thought to have been the cause of the fire. His body was found on aavenport near the stove. He was living alone at the time.

First to reach the scene was Deputy Sheriff Leon Putnam, who was joined by John Webb and Henry Wilson, all neighbors. Deputy Putnam had spent the previous night at the home of his parents at Hale and was working at his farm located a short distance from the Bannister farm. He noticed the flames about 10 o'clock.

Waiting for the fire department to arrive, the three men could not find Mr. Bannister's car and it was not known at the time whether or not he was in the burning building. The car was later found in a ditch north of Putnam's where he had run off the road the night before.

Investigation revealed that a Milford man had taken Mr. Bannister home after he found him in the car.

After his body was found in the ruins, Sheriff Ivan O'Farrell and Coroner E. John Moffatt were called. He ruled death by accidental burning. The body was removed to the Forshee Funeral Home, Hale.

Mr. Bannister was born near Brown City, May 17, 1884. He moved to Hale 24 years ago.

Funeral services were held Tuesday afternoon at the Hale Methodist Church. The Rev. Richard Terwilliger officiated.

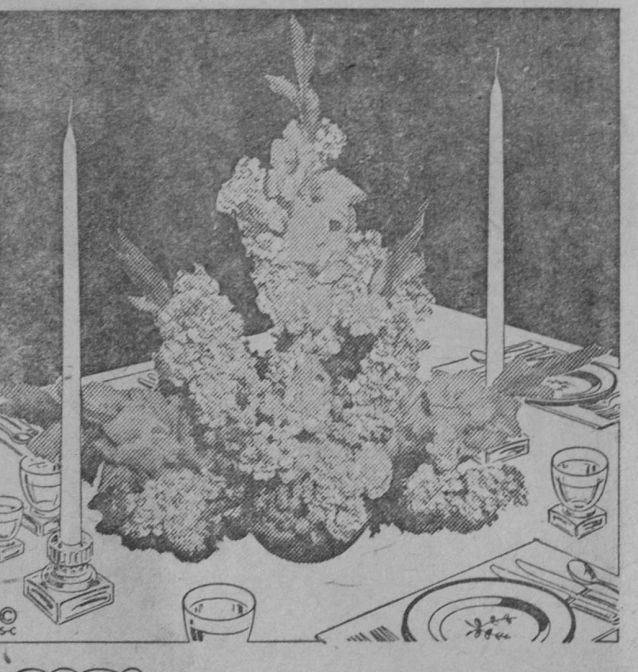

Brucellosis, a disease that infects both animals and humans, can be costly in human suffering and money.

Anyone who handles infected cattle is exposing himself to undulant fever, the human form of Brucellosis.

Undulant fever is a chronic, serious disease. It may make the victim weak and moody for months, even years.

For one thing, it comes in very large numbers according to Glen Reed, extension veterinarian at Michigan State University. Dr. I. Forest Huddleson, research scientist at Michigan State University, estimates that one cow's pregnant uterus may produce 150 billion Brucella germs.

The germs are most apt to spread at the time of birth and heat. They may pass from one cow to the other during natural contact of heat and calving. They are also spread through feed, pasture and water.

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Contamination may come from neighboring herds, carriers in public pastures, cows with germs in the incubation stage and calves

that carry the germs in their intestinal tracts and on their hair coats. Brucellosis is often spread by trucks, stockyards and farm implements, and occasionally by dogs, cats, birds and streams.

Carriers which have developed a tolerance to the disease may show no symptoms. This danger is lessened by greater use of the blood agglutination test on cattle sold for breeding purposes as required by Michigan law.

The cow which tests negative but has been exposed to the disease is still a real danger. The Michigan Department of Agriculture refuses to issue sales permits on these cattle.

How can the disease be wiped out? Eradication of Brucellosis in swine, goats and especially cattle, is the only way to do it, according to George Parsons, extension dairy specialist at Michigan State University.

That is the goal of the Michigan Brucellosis eradication program. By 1958, Michigan Department of Agriculture officials say that less than one percent of the cattle and only five percent of the herds in the state will have the disease.

By 1959, the disease is to be completely eradicated from Michigan, Parsons says.

The goal will be accomplished partly through Michigan's anti-Brucellosis laws and by education of the farmer through the eradication program.
