### SOCIAL SECURITY BENEFITS EXPLAINED

There may still be women between 62 and 65 who have not considered applying for social security payments. Many women have applied and applications can still be taken. Wives and women workers will be paid at a reduced rate which continues at the same rate after they reach 65.

The only change would be in the case of the wife. Since there is no reduction in benefit in the case of widows, on the death of the husband the benefit goes up to the usual three-fourths of the husband's benefit. This means, too, that widows will have no reason for not accepting payments before age 65. There is one problem arising in these cases. A number of widows have inquired whose husbands did not work at all or not long enough under social security for any payment to be made on their wages. Many of these women have wages of their own upon which the benefit will be paid. Therefore, for social security purposes, they are treated as women workers, not as widows. Their payments will be reduced permanently. The amount of the reduction varies according to each month the woman worker or wife is less than age 65. The full reduction applies only to those women who are under 65 during the full three year period.

Representatives from the Bay City Social Security office will be at the Federal Building, East Tawas, on November 29 at 10:30 a. m. Anyone wishing to file for benefits or desiring information should call on them.

### FARM PENSIONS

More than 140,000 self-employed farmers and members of their families have claimed old age and survivors insurance benefits this year, according to Commissioner Charles I. Schottland of the Social Security Administration. These were the first persons to qualify under the 1954 social security amendment and extended coverage of farmers.

Still-lives can be as simple as this one, yet effective enough to be enlarged and hung on a wall.

### Still-Life Snapshooting

Have you ever noticed how almost every national snapshot contest has a number of awards earmarked for entries in the "still life" category? Well, if you're like most of us, you've probably thought, "They're for the experts and the specialists—not for casual Sunday snapshooters like us!"

But that's where you're wrong—because still-life pictures are within camera range of everybody who can focus accurately and make time exposures. You need no more complicated equipment than a simple box camera, ordinary home lights or photo-floods, and—of course—a good eye for interesting objects.

Yes, in still-life photography, the "eye" really has it! For the idea underlying effective still-lives is first to choose pictorial elements that are interesting in themselves and then to arrange them in a composition that's pleasing to the eye. And you'll be surprised to see how very simple elements can create striking effects, achieving beauty just through the pattern of shapes and textures or in the interplay of shadow and substance.

We personally feel a few still-lives belong in every picture taker's repertory—and in his album, too. For you can't shoot even a single still life without learning much about lighting and arrangement that will prove invaluable to you in all your other snapshooting.

Remember, any grouping of objects can be made to serve your purpose—and the simpler the "props" the better. A willow-ware bowl, some glossy apples, plate and a paring knife arranged on a checked tablecloth—a collection of Dad's pipes and tobacco or Sister's record player and album covers—a bouquet of salad greens teamed with crust, herbs and spices—the top of Mother's sewing machine spilling over with fabrics, ribbons and spools of thread—any of these can yield a handsome composition either in color or black-and-white.

Still life arrangements are bounded only by the limits of your own imagination and willingness to experiment. Try an interestingly lighted view of little Kathy's ballet slippers, a music box and a tiny figurine—or give fancy a whirl with a composition that highlights bell, book and candle as its theme.

MICHIGAN STATE POLICE "BACK THE ATTACK" ON TRAFFIC ACCIDENTS

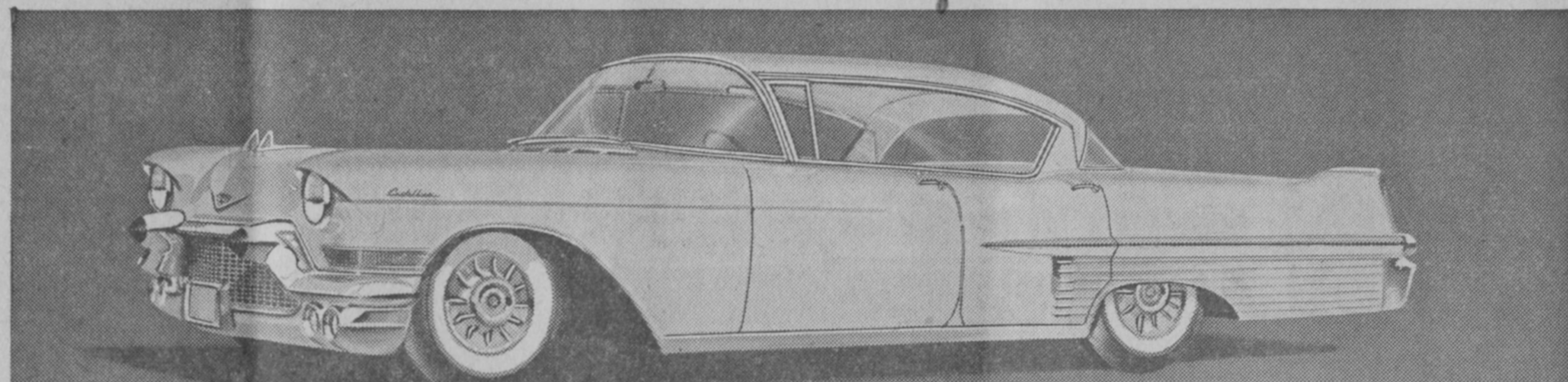

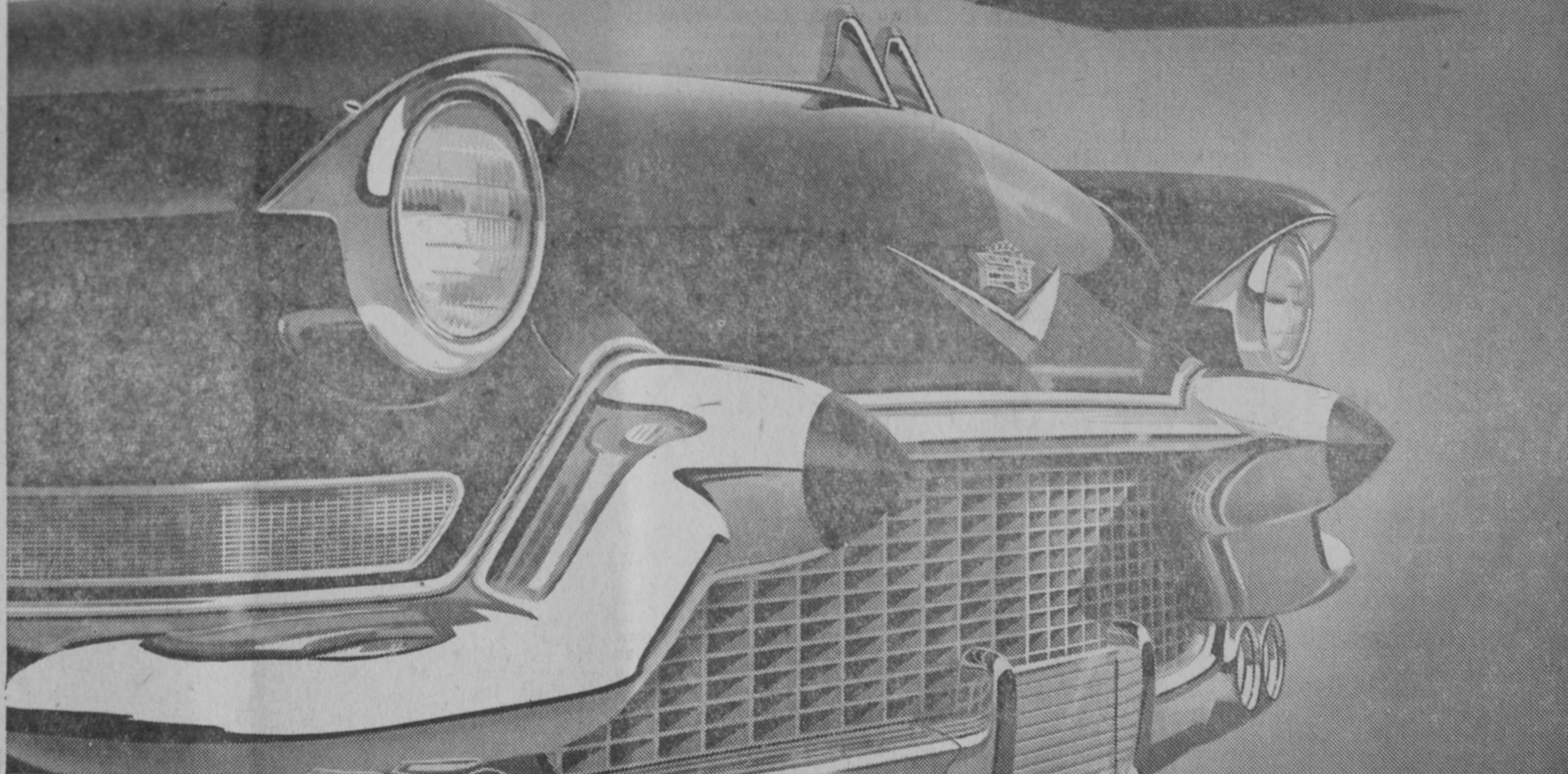

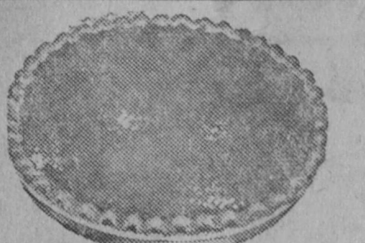

Resolution for Compulsory Slaughter of Brucellosis Reactors
Whereas, Isoco County has been cooperating in a Brucellosis eradication program conducted by the state and federal governments; and Whereas, Brucellosis is realized to endanger human health and may cause severe financial loss in cattle herds; and Whereas, it is known that the spread of Brucellosis is primarily from infected animals to non-infected animals; and Whereas, the goal of the eradication program is complete elimination of Brucellosis from the cattle herds and that a final step in an eradication program is the elimination of all reactor animals; and Whereas, the eradication program has reached the state in Isoco County, that the final step in the program is appropriate; This be it resolved, by the Isoco County Board of Supervisors, that the director of the Michigan Department of Agriculture be requested to order the slaughter of all Brucellosis reactor cattle in Isoco County, as authorized by Act 181 of the P. A. of 1919, as amended in Section 15B; Be it further Resolved, that the clerk be instructed to immediately forward a true copy of this resolution to the Director of the Michigan Department of Agriculture.
