

New changes in the social security law may benefit low in-come farmers.

If their gross earning are be-tween \$600 and \$1,800 they now can pay self employment tax on two-thirds instead of one-half of gross earnings, regardless of whether income taxes are reported

on the cash or on the accrual

E. B. Hill, Michigan State Uni versity farm economist, says this means that if a farmer's gross income from agricultural self-em ployment is not more than \$1.800 ne may count his net earnings as either (1) his actual net earnings or (2) two-thirds of his gross farm

If a farmer's gross income is more than \$1,800 and his net farm earnings are less than \$1,200, he may use either (1) his actual net earnings or (2) \$1,200 as his selfmployment net income.

If a farmer's gross income is more than \$1,800 and his net farm earnings are \$1,200 or more, he must report and use his actual net income when figuring his social

Another new ruling provides that landlords who rent their farms for cash or on a crop basis are covered by the law if, by agreement with their tenants, they take an important part in the man-agement decisions or in the actual production of crops or livestock. Income received as rent by landlords, is not classified as selfemployment if they do not "partic-ipate materially" in making man-agement decisions, or in the actual production of crops or livestock on their farms. Therefore, it cannot be included in figuring income for social security purposes.
