National Gypsum Breaks Ground for New Quarry

Earth moving equipment began work last Thursday on National Gypsum's recently acquired quarry site west of Tawas City. It was announced by Board Chairman Melvin H. Baker. Development of this vast gypsum deposit kicks off the firm's 19 million dollar Great Lakes expansion program.

For the past two years, National Gypsum has conducted exploratory drilling to determine the extent of this vein. The company was seeking a new source of ore for contemplated mills in the Great Lakes region. Management proposed to establish these new facilities to consolidate its competitive position in this vital area.

Strategically located processing plants would relieve the load on its existing factories at Clarence Center and Akron, New York; National City; Shoals, Indiana; and Fort Dodge, Iowa. However, the entire scheme hinged on the discovery of a large, high quality, minable deposit so situated that rock could be transported cheaply and easily to the point of manufacture.

Last May, Mr. Baker revealed plans to work a new rock reserve in Northern Michigan. The company purchased 2,700 acres of land near Tawas City, between Lake Huron and its National City plant.

Surveys indicate that the land contains approximately 75 million tons, enough to build about 40 sites the size of Detroit. Under normal production requirements it will provide almost a 100 year supply of gypsum for three plants, two new Great Lakes operations as well as the National City mill which is National Gypsum's second oldest.

Work started Thursday on the National City Road, about two miles west of M-55, clearing a million square yard tract of dirt, clay and rock. Overburden on this section averages about 53 feet.

Qre will be extracted by the open pit method of quarrying. The quarry face will be broken by drilling and blasting. Shattered rock will be loaded by diesel shovels into trucks which will carry the rock to the primary crusher located below the original ground surface.

From the crusher, the broken rock will be sent by conveyor belt to a secondary crusher where it will be screened. The larger pieces will go to a second, slightly smaller crusher which will reduce them to the required size.

A conveyor belt will raise the crushed rock, dropping it into a stockpile. Recovered through a tunnel below the pile, it will then proceed via conveyor belt to the car loading building. Here a shuttle belt will spread the rock over the length of the railroad car which a locomotive will spot at the car location station.

Rock will be transported from the quarry by rail to stockpile near the shore of Lake Huron. Cars will be handled at dockside by locomotive similar to the one at the quarry. It will spot cars on the dumper platform where they will (See NEW QUARRY, page 8.)

No Change in District Solon Races Tuesday

Totaling 12,038 votes to his opponent's 6,228, James P. Mielock of Whittemore (R) easily re-won his state representative post in the Alpena district, which comprises the counties of Alpena, Iosco and Alcona.

Mielock totaled 6,173 votes in Alpena County, 4,065 in Iosco County and 1,800 in Alcona County.

His opponent, John E. Norkowski (D) of Alpena, had 3,691 votes in his home county, 1,703 in Iosco and 824 in Alcona.

Piling up more than a two to one margin, State Senator Charles T. Prescott (R) of Prescott won his sixth term in the state legislature in Tuesday's election. Senator Prescott totaled 25,619 votes in the 10-county 28th senatorial district. His opponent, Clayton Dishong of Lincoln (D), had 10,682 votes.

Congressman Elford A. Cederberg rolled to an easy victory over his Democratic opponent, William J. Kelly. The GOP incumbent totaled 71,979 votes to set a new record for him. Kelly was given 37,965 votes.

Trailer Park is OK By City Ordinance

Acting in accordance with the Tawas City zoning ordinance, the city council informed Frank Wilkusi Monday night that it would be permissible to build a trailer park on the site now occupied by the Huron Shore Rustic Furniture Company mill on First Street.

A letter from Mr. Wilkusi was read to the board, which also requested information as to the removal of the mill from the property and changing the zone from industrial to residential "B." The council would also approve this step if requested.

According to the zoning ordinance, trailer parks may only be constructed in industrial zones. Chief of Police George W. Ruth requested the council to go on record as recommending a speed limit of 35 miles per hour from German Street to the US-23 intersection on M-55. Another recommendation would be a speed limit of 45 miles an hour to German Street from the city limits. The state highway department is at present making a speed survey in that area.

John N. Brugger, local businessman, was present at the meeting and discussed parking problems with the council. The superintendent of public works is to investigate means of removing the space between curbs and sidewalks from Wheeler Street to the city hall to reduce the parking hazard.

Three building permits were approved. These included: Roy DePotty, 24 by 42 home and garage, \$3,000; Theodore Olson, Fifth Avenue, make addition to home, \$400; Fr. Joseph Castaner, move home from Elm Street to River Street.

There will be a joint meeting of the council and water board November 19 to discuss plans for the proposed new water system.

The meeting of Iosco and Arenac County Board of Education for the purpose of transferring certain properties of Sherman Township School District to the Tawas Area School District will not be held at Standish on November 12. The date of the meeting has been changed to 8:00 p. m. at the courthouse in Standish on November 19.

Iosco Casts Record Vote; Endorses Full Republican Ticket

Grace L. Miller Wins In Only County Contest

With voters turning out at the polls as never before in history, Iosco County endorsed the Republican presidential ticket of Eisenhower-Nixon by a 3-1 margin over the Democrat's Stevenson-Kefauver ticket. The total vote was 4,385 to 1,600.

While Republicans lost all races for governor, lieutenant governor, secretary of state, attorney general, state treasurer and auditor general, Iosco County voters supported the GOP slate headed by Mayor Albert E. Cobo of Detroit.

Mayor Cobo held a 3,537 to 2,370 margin over Governor Williams, while the other Republican candidates had an even slightly larger margin over their opponents.

However, this election again showed an advance in the number of Democratic votes in the county. Many voters chose to split their tickets, supporting President Eisenhower in his race and then swung over to Williams on the Democratic side.

In the only race for county office, incumbent Republican Grace Miller defeated her Democratic opponent, Thomas McGinnis, by the wide margin of 4,288 to 1,517. This, again, showed the number of split tickets.

Ballot workers throughout the county reported heavy polling on election day, and many returns were not reported to the county clerk's office until late Wednesday morning.

Mr. and Mrs. Sanford are the parents of five children, three of them being born at Tawas Hospital. Mr. Sanford is the former Harry Ann Murphy.

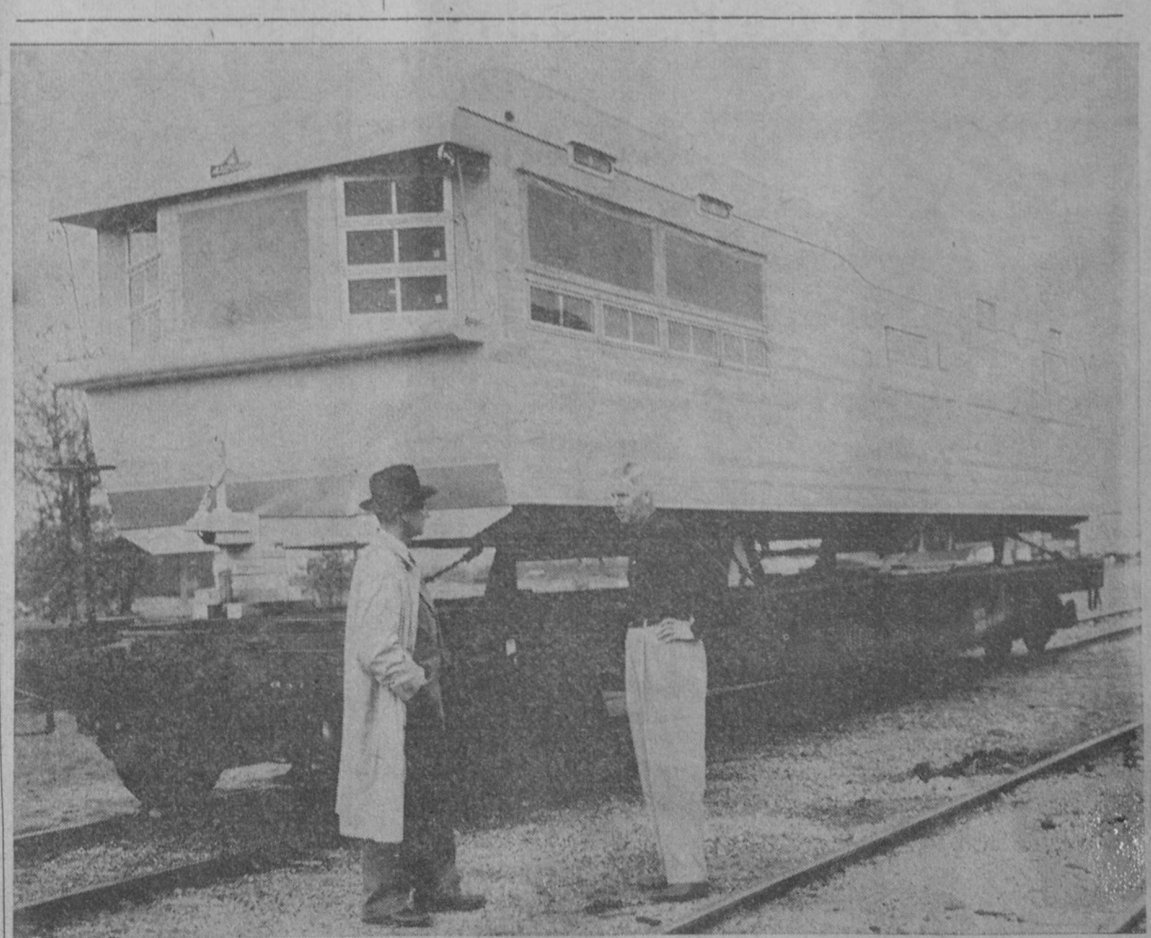

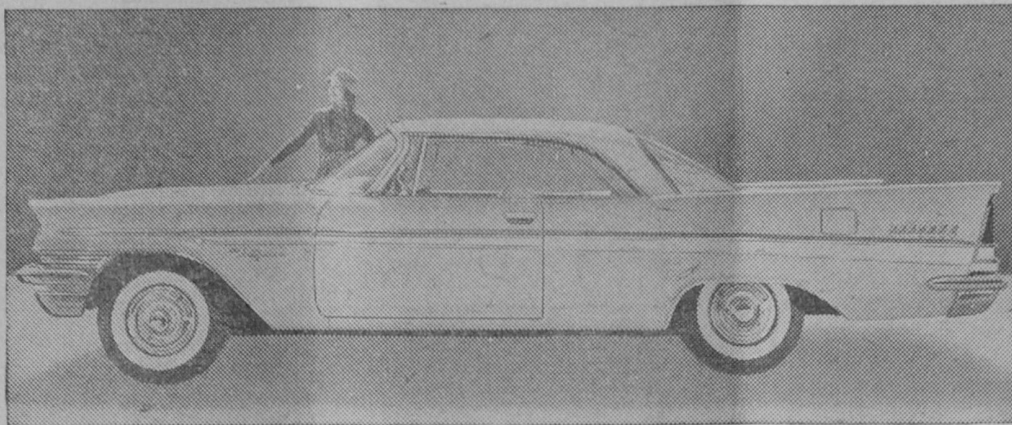

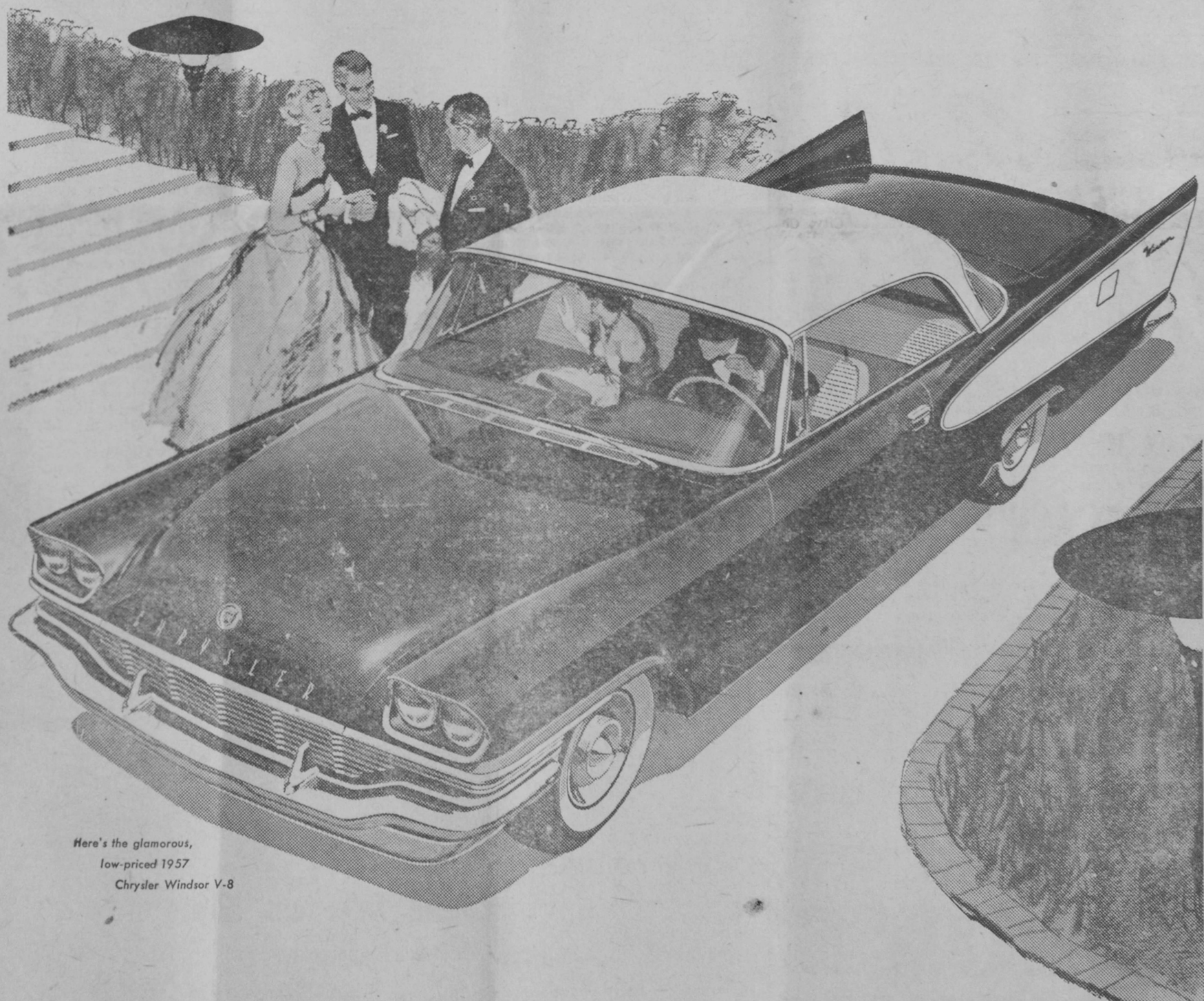
34 Iosco Students at Central Michigan Last Year

Farm Events

Poultry flocks will continue to get larger and will be the only enterprise on more farms in the future.

At least that is what a group of economists, poultrymen and researchers from 13 north-central states agricultural experiment stations think after doing extensive research on current trends in the poultry business. They agreed that:

Large flocks are more profitable than small ones. Eggs are usually of higher quality, there is less expense in handling them and the layers often get better care.

Producers with a larger number of layers can afford labor saving equipment, which makes the operation both profitable and attractive. The trend is the same in broiler and turkey flocks.

The small farm flock, however, will probably be here to stay, and for several good reasons, according to the experiment station workers.

If the small flock is at all profitable, it supplements farm income with less outlay of expense than nearly any other sideline enterprise, and the small flocks use family labor that might otherwise be wasted.

Few farmers keep records on their flocks, so they do not actually know whether they are making or losing money, and the money involved is so small that profits or losses are not very noticeable.

On many farms, the income from the chickens goes to the wife, and that is the only income that she gets in many cases. She will can-

tain to keep the chickens around when this is true.

If the farmers increased the size of the flock at all, it might involve a large outlay of money for buildings and equipment that he is unwilling to make.

Other trends mentioned in the study include more marketing through chain stores and modern methods of slaughter with more care at processing and inspection.

Greater mechanization of all parts of the poultry operation will be evident in the future, as efficiency is stressed, the study concludes. The publication is called "Trends in the Poultry Industry . . . Effects on the Mid-West" and is available from our office in the Federal Building, East Tawas.

Failure to get an early diagnosis of disease outbreaks can cut heavily into poultry profits.

Finding out early what the disease is can save poultrymen time in caring for the flock and money in costly drugs. When birds first show signs of disease, diagnosis should be made.

Diseased birds may be taken to local veterinarians or to the poultry diagnostic laboratory at Michigan State University for diagnosis. S. C. Schmittle, extension poultry pathologist at Michigan State University, says information about the flock should be at hand when examination is being made. Size of flock, how many birds are affected, how they are affected and other similar information is necessary for accurate diagnosis.

The poultryman should take typically infected birds along for diagnosis. If diseased live birds are not available, those that have died recently are satisfactory.

For small flocks, take enough birds to account for two to three percent of flock up to a total of six birds. If the diseased birds are under four weeks of age, take at least six along.

Iosco County dairy farmers will be able to adjust grain feeding to milk production by joining the new "weigh-a-day-a-month" plan for keeping milk production records.

Underfeeding of good cows and overfeeding of poor cows is a major cause for poor profits among Iosco County dairymen. A study of herd records of farmers on DHIA testing shows that differences in profit of up to \$100 per cow can be attributed to overfeeding and underfeeding of grain. Just as many cows were being fed too much grain for top profits as were being fed too little.

Donald Hillman, extension dairyman at Michigan State University, says that one pound of grain for every four pounds of milk is a good rule of thumb to follow when good roughage is fed. But by keeping a record of each cow's milk

production a farmer can easily determine the most profitable amount of grain to feed each cow. Weighing the milk helps remove the guess work from measuring returns.

Farmers not already keeping production records should contact the extension office for full details on joining the "weigh-a-cow-a-month" plan. Cost is expected to be as low as five cents per cow per month.

In order to make a reasonable return for his labor in the dairy business these days a farmer must have:

Cows that produce at least 10,000 pounds of milk each.
High quality roughage that must be fed liberally.

A return of at least \$350 in milk sales per cow per year.
At least \$1,500 income per \$1,000 invested in equipment.

More than 200,000 pounds of milk sales per farm worker per year.

The specialists found that when a farmer is not making a reasonable return for his labor in dairying, he may be weak in any one or all of the points they listed.

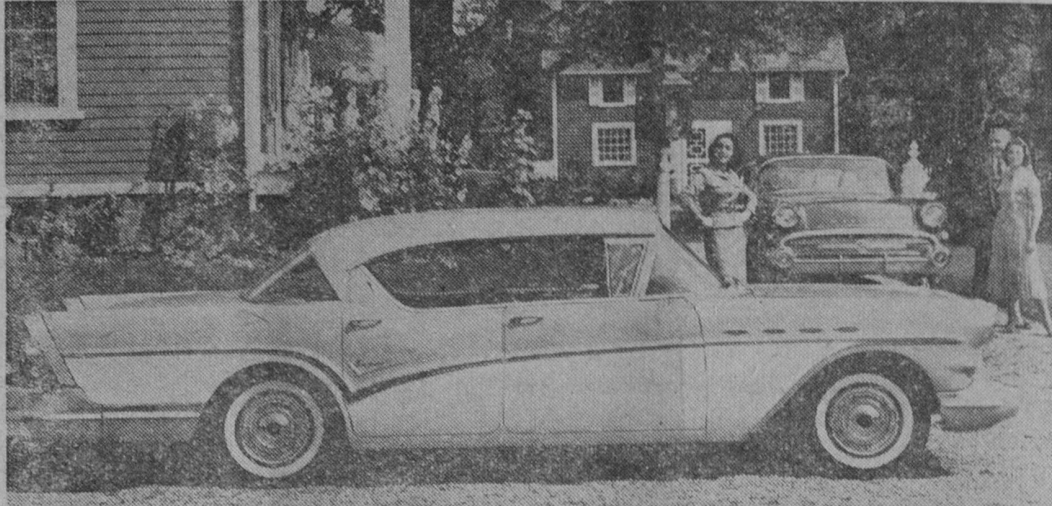

be turned upside down to spill the gypsum into a hopper. Then belts will lift the rock to the top of an enormous stockpile where a shuttle belt will distribute the gypsum evenly along the mound. The pile will sometimes hold enough rock for about two months shipping.

National Gypsum will dredge a channel in Lake Huron from the deep water to the shore to permit loading of lake carriers at dock-side.

The entire operation from quarry to ship will be highly mechanized. The flow will be controlled by electronic hookups and safety relays which will protect the equipment and remove the danger usually associated with rock loading and handling.

One freighter will carry the gypsum rock to the new plants on the shores of Lake Michigan and Lake Erie where it will be transformed into Gold Bond wallboard, sheathing, lath and plaster for the homes of the Middle West.

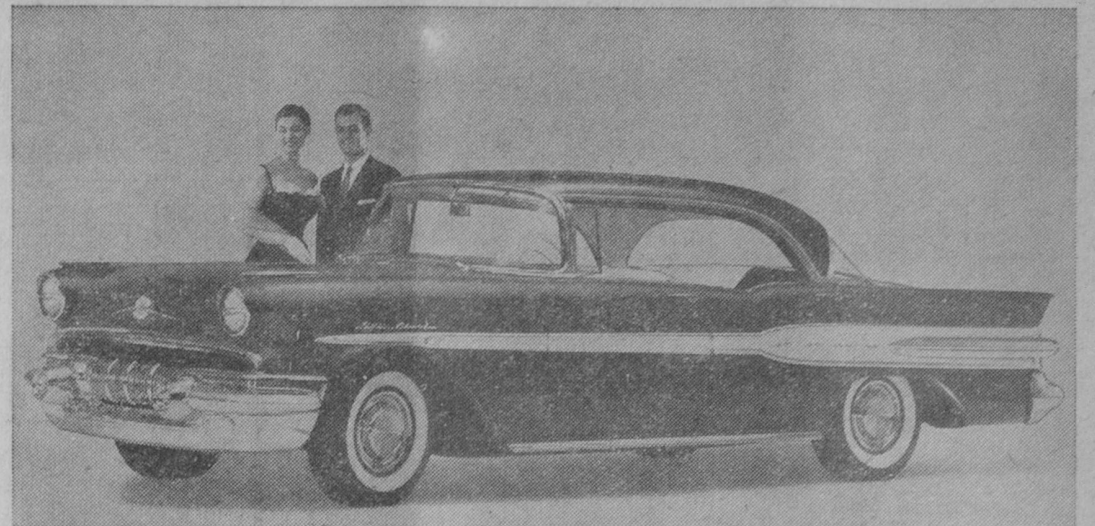

Pfc. Clyde E. Smith, 20-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Hugh Smith of East Tawas, died in Germany as a result of injuries received in a fall from a fence during maneuvers. He sustained a fractured skull and other injuries, was hospitalized and his parents were sent word that he was progressing satisfactorily. Pneumonia set in and he died on October 30. Arrangements are being made to send the body home.

Clyde Smith was born in Cheboygan September 3, 1936. He came to East Tawas with his parents in 1952 and attended school here. In November 1954 he enlisted in the army and went to Germany in May 1955.

Surviving are his parents in East Tawas; two brothers, Dale with the air force in California and David with the army in Maryland. He also leaves one sister, Shirley, at home.

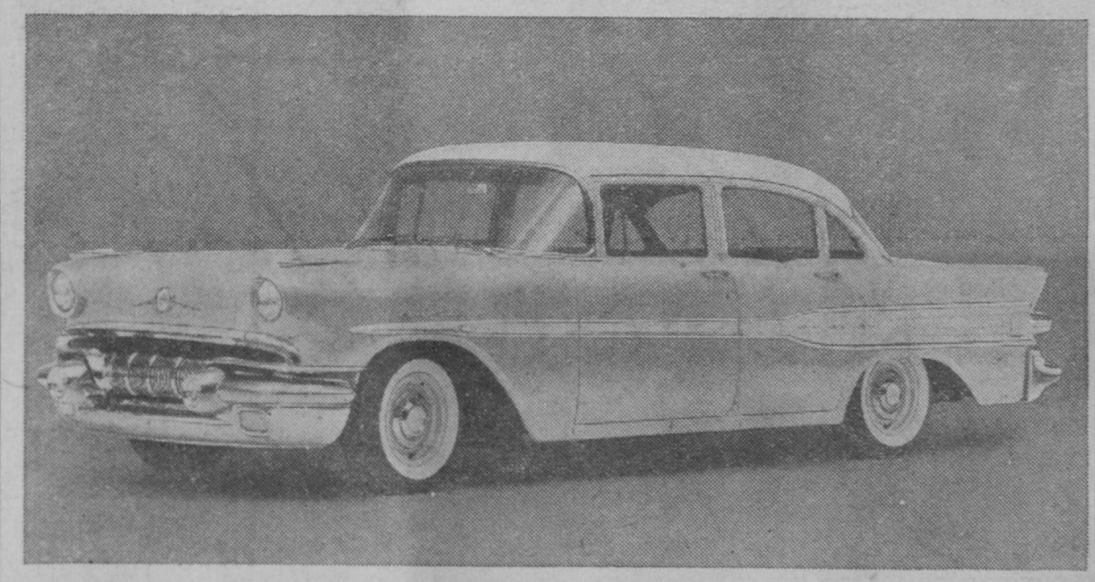
