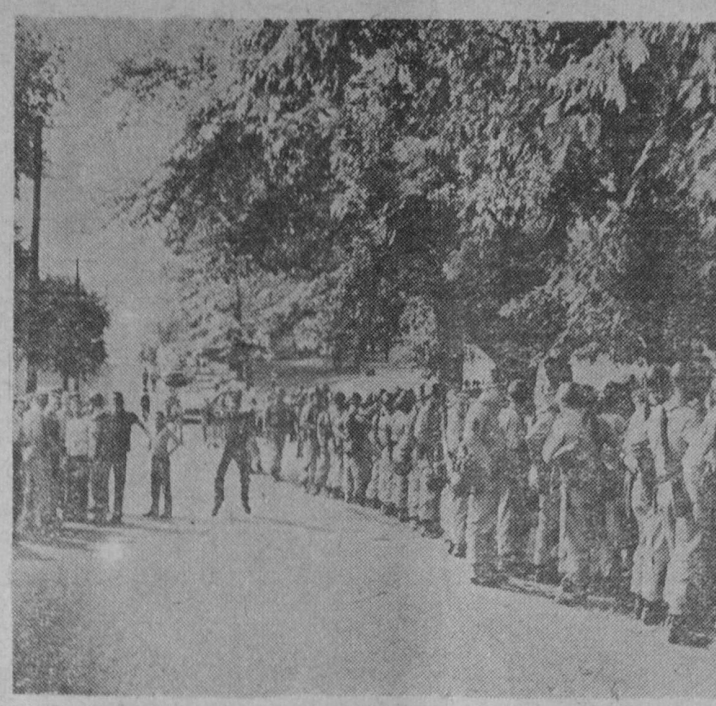
New Home Demonstration Group Being Formed

Through the cooperation of Kiwanis Clubs, Conrad Carlson, Frederick C. Holbeck, Gordon Hatch, soil conservationist, and our Iosco Soil Conservation District Board of Directors, a "Forest Tree Tour" is planned for Tuesday, September 25, from 1:30 p. m. until 4:00 p. m. It has been initiated to acquaint our Iosco County land owners with the ways and means of getting more dollars from idle acres and how to increase available feed for our wildlife. Briefly, the general program will start at 1:30 p. m. at the Lumbermen's Monument. At 1:45 p. m. Mr. Hatch will conduct a "tree identification" session. At 2:30 James Mielock, representing our Iosco Soil Conservation District Board of Directors, will tell our folks "the how, when and where" of tree planting. Mr. Mielock will have a tree planter in operation. At 3:00 p. m. Mr. Carlson will explain "How a land owner can harvest the most from his tree acres." How can we increase the feed for our wildlife? This will be answered at the conclusion of our tour.

Many of the farmers in the central and north central portions of Michigan will need to make a good many changes in their farming in the next decade if they are to make a good living. That is the conclusion of Richard Wheeler, a research farm economist at Michigan State University, after a close look at some representative farms in Mecosta County. According to the last census, there are more farms in Mecosta County with gross sales of \$2,500 to \$5,000 than with gross sales of more than that. Even \$5,000 is considered small business for a full-time farmer these days, Wheeler points out. Many of the farms in the area are operated by young men who want to do full-time farming and get an adequate family income. How can they do it on 60 to 100 tillable acres of sandy land and sometimes depleted soils? To some people, Wheeler says, irrigation sounds like a solution for these drouthy soils. But, a farmer would need a lot of courage to make the big outlays needed. Besides the high investment, a farmer has to figure that a ready market might not be available for the crops he can grow under irrigation. The farm economist thinks that a good dairy setup designed for hitting the fluid milk market offers the most promise for a number of farms.

Consolidation of farm units, shifts to soil conservation rotations, increased use of lime and fertilizer, selection of cows that will produce milk more economically and a variety of changes are needed. Many farm families will probably find off-the-farm work more attractive than the reasonable possibilities of their present land. A good living on many of these farms will hinge on making substantial investments in buildings and getting more land, or improving the present acreage. 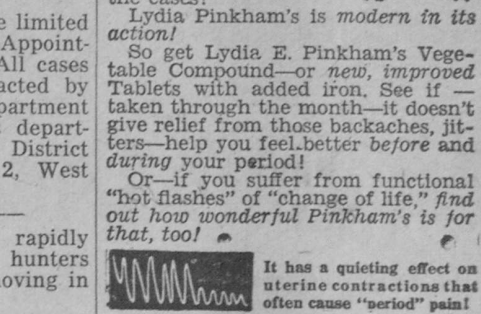

Farm Prices
Prices received by farmers declined three percent between mid-July and mid-August, following a one percent drop the previous month, which reversed an uptrend in the preceding six months, according to the department of agriculture. The drop was attributed to sharp declines in prices received by farmers for potatoes and vegetables, coupled with moderate declines for cotton, fruit and poultry. The mid-August index of prices paid by farmers for commodities and services, interest, taxes and wages, rose another point to 288 percent of the 1910-14 average.

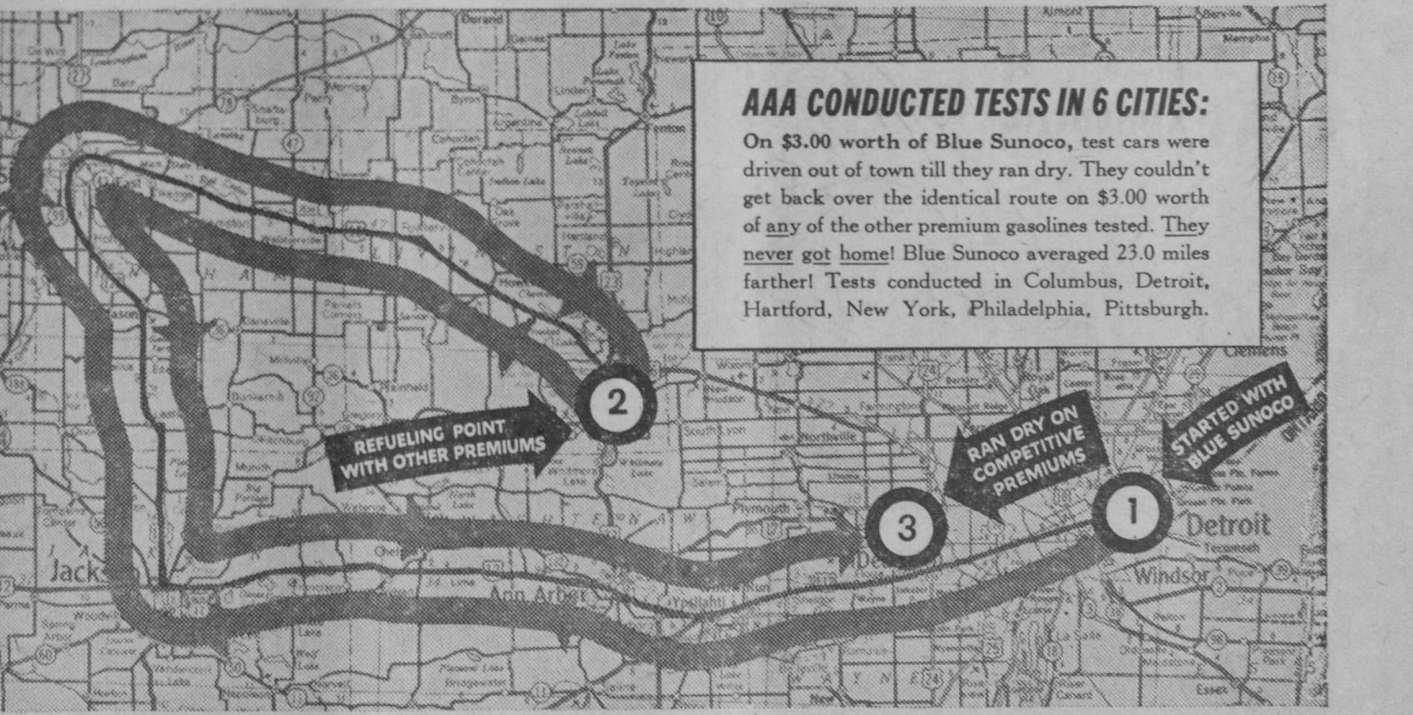

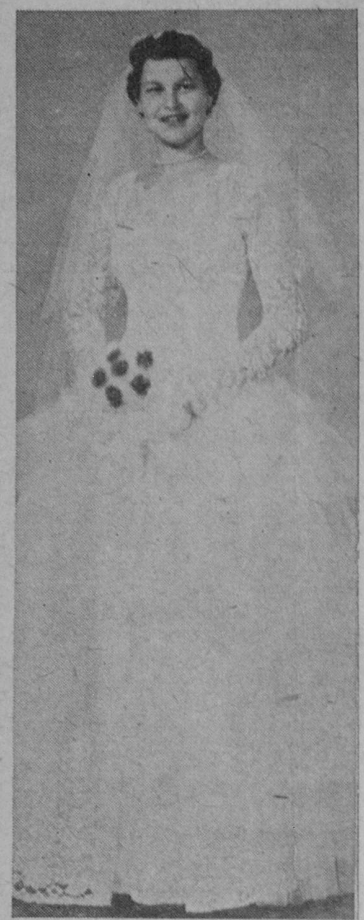
