Let's have another look at those vegetable garden plans. Our first discussion was about "succession planting" of vegetables. Repeated plantings of vegetables lengthen the season for garden-fresh

When garden space is small, some crops can follow others. For instance, when an early crop is harvested, a later one can be planted. Lettuce, spinach and radishes can be followed by beans, beets and corn. Early peas may be followed by late storage carrots, beets, late cabbage or turnips. When the early beans, peas and corn are finished, Chinese cabbage, winter radishes and late turnips or spinach.

This careful kind of planting can greatly increase the garden vegetable production from a small

companion cropping.




