Assessed Valuation of Iosco Nearly 20 Million Dollars--

County Drops Condemnation Proceedings Against Loffman

Iosco County took steps last Friday to drop its circuit court condemnation suit against Matt Loffman of Baldwin Township for the acquisition of property for proposed airport expansion.

At last Friday's session of the board of supervisors, Prosecuting Attorney William R. Barber was instructed to proceed to secure an order of discontinuance of the suit before a verdict of the jury was affirmed by the court.

This action was made in the form of a resolution to the board of supervisors, passage of which was recommended by the board's aeronautics committee, consisting of Henry Oates, Blaine Christeson and Edward Burgeson.

In its formal resolution to the court, the board stated that the sum of \$18,000 as compensation to be paid Loffman for the property was far in excess of what it believed the value of the property to be.

This figure was set by a 12-man jury in Iosco County Circuit Court last February at the end of a two-day hearing before Judge Herman Dehnke.

The board also heard from a representative of a group of petitioners from East Tawas which has requested consideration of relocating the airport. Fred Kaiser, chairman of an airport relocation committee, presented petitions signed by more than 800 persons.

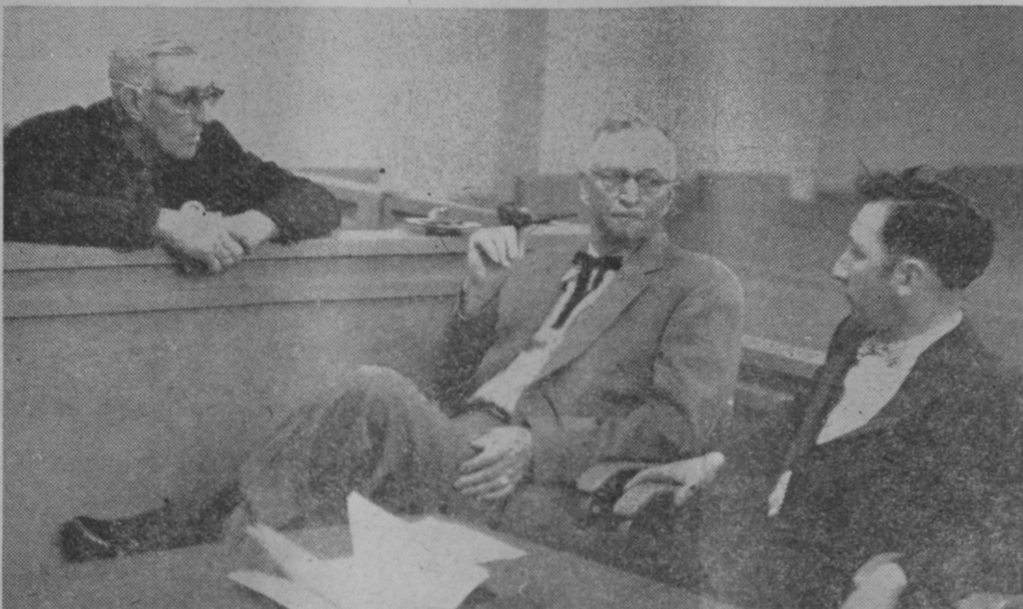
The board was also addressed by Carl Babcock of Tawas City, who urged that the present site be retained as an airport because of benefits to the county at this

The board of supervisors wound up its seven-day April session Wednesday afternoon. Last work of the session was setting up the county's budget for the next fiscal year. Equalization of the assessment rolls was finished Wednesday afternoon.

location derived through increased building on property adjacent to the airport. Mayor Elmer Werth of East Tawas, a member of the board of supervisors, also spoke on the subject.

The petitions were turned over to the aeronautics committee for further study on relocation of the airport. A report is to be made at a future session.

Monday morning Chairman C. S. Everett said that the airport question is a matter of great importance to the county and "it should receive a lot of careful

study by the committee before any further action is taken."

Much of the April session was taken up with footing and equalizing tax rolls in the various townships and cities of the county.

Final tabulations this week revealed that the assessed valuation of Iosco County for 1957 is \$19,943,525, an increase of \$824,695 over 1956.

The largest single increase in assessed valuation in the county, before equalizing, was turned in by Oscoda Township supervisor, Charles Smith. Oscoda Township now has an assessed valuation of \$4,604,100, or an increase of \$218,350 over 1956 figures.

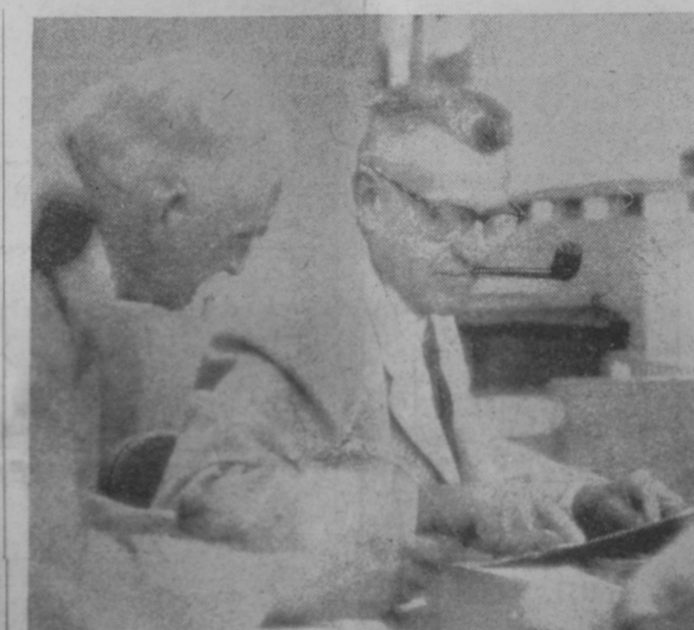
Other large increases were noted in Alabaster, Baldwin, Grant and Plainfield Townships, and the Cities of Tawas City and East Tawas.

The footing committee noted that one township showed a slight loss in valuation this year. This was found in AuSable, where a total valuation of \$1,150,400 was \$320 less than in 1956.

Charles Kurtzrock, deputy civil defense director for the county, reported Monday on activities of the local unit. He requested funds to be used for the purchase of equipment and supplies. The board appointed Supervisors Glenn Long, Clement Stephan and Harry Ceter as a civil defense committee.

Howard Hatton Named Third Ward Alderman

Howard Hatton, Tawas City businessman, was appointed Monday night as Third Ward alderman to replace George Tuttle, who recently took over his new duties as mayor of the city.

The appointment was given a unanimous approval by members of the city council. Only recently he was appointed to the water board to fill a vacancy created by the resignation of Randall Fox.

The new alderman joins John N. Brugger as junior members of the council. Others on the council include Clyde Eviol, Earl Davis, Walter Schuhmacher and Cecil Cabbie.

Clean-up days for Tawas City were set at May 8 and 9 by the council. Further information will be published on May 2.

Plans were made for members of the council and elected city of-

officials to attend a meeting of the Michigan Municipal League at Gaylord next week. Those who are planning to attend are Mayor Tuttle, Schuhmacher, Brugger, Davis, Clerk Walter Nelson and Supt. of Public Works Reginald Bublitz.

James Campbell of the Detroit and Mackinac Railway Company revealed plans for re-balasting track from the railroad bridge over the Tawas River to the yards. Campbell said that the tracks in this area would be raised about four inches. Sections of Court Street will be blocked off temporarily to facilitate the work.

Plan River Mouth Small Boat Harbor

Five years ago the Tawas River mouth harbor was a welcome sight to Myrl Kubic of St. Clair Shores—a rough sea on Lake Huron forced him to turn his small cruiser into Tawas Bay for shelter—last week Kubic returned to Tawas City and purchased 300 feet of river frontage and plans to improve harbor facilities here.

Myrl and his brother, Frank, who has lived at East Tawas for the past few years, are going ahead with plans this week for a small craft harbor which will eventually have about 50 boat wells.

Work on cleaning out the present boat well was begun by Frank Chartier of AuGres. Chartier is cleaning out stumps which had been placed along the waters edge several years ago as a break wall and will probably start digging out the well this week.

Kubic purchased the property, located along the south river bank from the river mouth to the US-23 bridge, from James Dickinson, who had been owner for a number of years. Dickinson improved the breakwall along the river several years ago and dredged the boat well. Low water this year and wash-sand had filled the well considerably.

The new owners said Tuesday afternoon that plans now call for a sheltered boat well 200 by 200 feet. There will be about 25 individual boat wells completed this year with the remainder in 1958. Sheathing will be installed along the river bank, with a cat walk on

top for the convenience of boat owners and fishermen. The old boat house will be removed and a new one constructed in its place.

Rental of the boat wells, as well as marine service, bait shop, boat rental and gasoline sales, will be handled by Frank.

A 10-ton lift will be installed at the US-23 side of the boat well to remove craft from the lake for winter dry dock or for repairs during the summer.

Plans now call for a number of covered boat wells. They said that this part of the construction was still indefinite.

Saying that he has had his eye on the property since anchoring his cruiser here in 1952, Myrl said that the harbor was a natural refuge for small craft.

He owns a neon sign business in Ferndale and is spending a week here while construction on the project gets underway.

Frank plans to establish a radiator repair shop on the property.

Consumers Power to Have Power Interruption

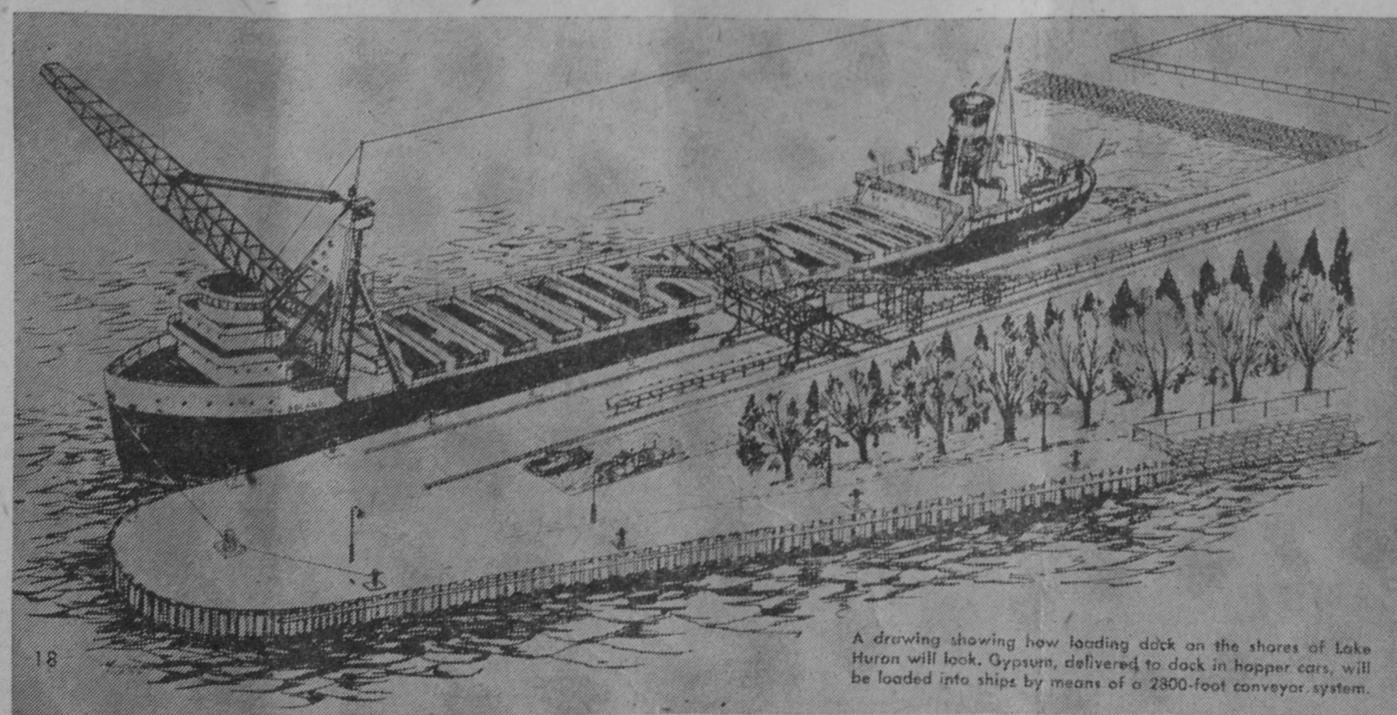

Looking ahead to summer we are reminded that it will be camping time before very long. A training school for camp counselors is planned for May 2 and 3. The purpose is to help both older 4-H Club members and leaders prepare to assist with a successful and interesting camp program.

Let's have another look at those vegetable garden plans. Our first discussion was about "succession planting" of vegetables. Repeated plantings of vegetables lengthen the season for garden-fresh products.

When garden space is small, some crops can follow others. For instance, when an early crop is harvested, a later one can be planted. Lettuce, spinach and radishes can be followed by beans, beets and corn. Early peas may be followed by late storage carrots, beets, late cabbage or turnips. When the early beans, peas and corn are finished, plant Chinese cabbage, winter radishes and late turnips or spinach.

This careful kind of planting can greatly increase the garden vegetable production from a small area.

Next garden tips will be about companion cropping.

Today is not too soon to start plotting on paper the way planting will be arranged to make your garden this year the best one yet.

Farm Events

From now on until leaves appear is the ideal time to plant trees, according to Harold Shick, extension specialist in park management at Michigan State University.

April 26 has been designated as Arbor Day in Michigan to emphasize tree planting and care. Many communities will conduct programs on that date to stress planting, but trees may be planted now.

The Michigan State University specialist lists these trees as suitable for planting in Michigan.

Large size (over 60 feet tall at maturity)—sugar maple, sycamore, London plane, American elm, red oak, white oak, bur oak, European linden, white, green and black ash, tulip tree or tulip poplar, thornless honeylocust or moraine locust, hackberry and Kentucky coffee tree.

Medium size (40 to 50 feet)—Norway maple, little leaf linden, gingko, English oak, pin oak, scarlet oak, mountain ash and sweet gum.

Small size (20 to 35 feet)—Iron wood, amur maple, tatarian maple, flowering crab and cherries, hawthorn, althea and flowering dogwood.

Shick makes these recommendations for planting the tree:

Choose the proper location. Do not plant trees under wires or over sewers, water or gas pipes if this can be avoided. Avoid planting close to walks, drives or curbs.

Dig the hole for the tree before planting. This will reduce the danger of roots drying out.

Keep roots wet during all the time the tree is out of the ground.

Prune about one-third of the branches to give the reduced roots a chance to feed the top.

Start your garden insect control program before you plant your seeds. Julius Hoffman of the entomology department at Michigan State University says that you can cut down and maybe even eliminate a number of your insect pests before you even get your seeds in the ground.

One of these pests is the white grub. White grubs are curved, whitish, soft-bodied grubs which live in the soil. These may be the larvae of the June beetle, the rose chafer, or in rare cases, the Japanese beetle. They feed on the roots of plants in lawns and gardens.

There are several of the newer chemicals that will help control these grubs. Chlordane, dieldrin or heptachlor will all do the job. They can be applied as a spray, a dust, or in granulated form. The chemicals should be worked into the soil during cultivation.

One application per year should provide long lasting control of soil grubs. In extreme cases, two applications may be needed.

Incidentally, these same chemicals that kill white grubs will also control wireworms, ants, sod webworms and strawberry root-wool larvae in the soil.

Indirectly, this is also a method of getting rid of moles, which feed on these soil insects. If the chemical gets rid of the insects, then it discourages the moles from working in your lawn or garden.

For further pest control make certain that all dead plant material and weeds are cleaned out of your garden before planting.

Your home garden, like your family, needs a well-balanced diet. John Carew, Michigan State University horticulturist, says that the "basic three" of the vegetable garden are nitrogen, phosphorous and potash, along with several

trace elements; such as boron, magnesium and manganese. You can supply these through animal manure or commercial fertilizers. Carew recommends a combination of both.

Plants, like humans, have individual needs, too. In the average home garden, however, just as in the average family, you can not serve separate "meals" to suit all tastes. The object is to serve enough so all crops will have plenty. Here are our recommendations:

Have your soil tested for its lime needs, and then apply lime according to the indications of the test. How to take a soil sample is explained in Extension Folder F-174, available at my office in East Tawas.

Apply fertilizer like 5-20-20 before plowing the garden in the spring. If your soil is fairly heavy, use the fertilizer at the rate of 35 pounds per thousand square feet. If the soil is light, put on 15 pounds for the same area afterward. If you put on at least 10 bushels of manure per thousand square feet, you can cut your fertilizer application in half. Then, in the middle of the summer, around July 4, fertilize with 2½ pounds of ammonium nitrate per thousand square feet. This should be put in a band along each row, four inches to the side of the plants.

After each garden crop is harvested, seed the empty plots to rye. The whole garden should be seeded around Labor Day, even if you are still harvesting some crops. Rye is a green manure crop, and also will pick up left-over fertilizer not used during the summer.

This diet will keep your garden from going hungry.

Spring is the time for thickening your home lawn, claims Carter Harrison, Michigan State University farm crops department.

He points out that spreading a good quality seed over the lawn in the early spring will help fill out thin, or bare spots in a lawn. And, it will also serve to thicken the turf of an established lawn. It helps give a lawn that thick, healthy, richness that homeowners desire.

When you scatter new high

quality grass seed over your lawn, add with it a good lawn fertilizer. During early spring, when grasses first start to grow, there is often an off-color, yellowish tinge that will correct itself when the soil warms up.

This off-color is due to the lack of nitrogen, a fertilizer component, in the soil. In a cold soil, soil bacteria have not yet begun to release locked-in nitrogen.

Even though this condition is temporary, and will correct itself with the coming of warmer weather, many homeowners find it satisfying to add a nitrogen containing fertilizer in the spring to help give that first spring growth of lawn a deep, rich green color.

By starting early, homeowners can burn the lawn with the fertilizer. By waiting until it starts to grow, lawn owners may cause a fertilizer burn. You can not hurt grass if you do it now.

Musical Instruments Collected for Pitcairn Island

Musical instruments for use on tiny Pitcairn Island in the Pacific Ocean, made famous by the mutiny of the crew of HMS Bounty, are being collected this week by members of the Tawas Seventh-day Adventist Church.

The collection is in response to a short-wave message received from Pastor Lester Hawks of the Seventh-day Adventist Church on Pitcairn where the entire adult population are members of the Adventist Church.

According to Pastor D. E. Howe of the Tawas Adventist Church, the message from Pitcairn asked for used band instruments to replace those lost to the rigors of the island's tropical climate. Members of the church on Pitcairn maintain a church band for religious services and for other special occasions.

Tawas church members will send instruments to church administrative headquarters at Berrien Springs, from which point they will be forwarded to a ship whose course passes the island. Ships call at the remote island very infrequently Pastor Hawks reports. Islanders have gone without a ship calling at the island for periods up to three years.

The anchor of the historic "Bounty" was recently recovered from the waters surrounding Pitcairn by Pastor Hawks and Irvin Johnson, master of the sailing ship, "Yankee."

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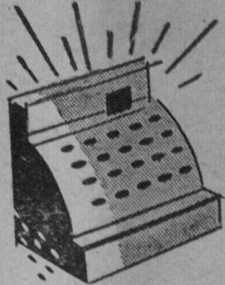
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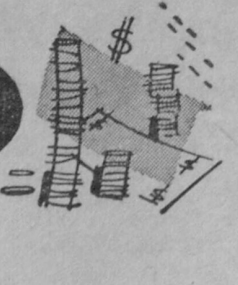

Saturday, April 23—Heart of the Home Classes at Hale, last of the series of four.

Wednesday, May 1—Home Demonstration Achievement program.

The home laundry will be center of interest for the last Heart of the Home class in Hale on April 23.

Simplified methods of washing and ironing are to be stressed as well as tips for the selection and arrangement of laundry equipment.

It does not matter if you were unable to attend earlier meetings, come to the laundry meeting if it fills a special interest need for you. Laundry is one of the most energy consuming tasks for homemakers. Learning easier ways to get the job done can help every woman. Mrs. Ruth C. Kettunen, Michigan State University home management instructor, has made a special study of work simplification methods for homemakers. Her suggestions are not costly and involved but offer possible and practical approaches to doing homemaking tasks more easily. You are invited and welcome to come. The time is 10:00 a. m. to noon.

Newly organized is a home demonstration group in East Tawas. Selected as temporary chairman and secretary are Mrs. William Stonehouse and Mrs. William Link. Mrs. William Robey and Mrs. Bernard Kopsinski will be leaders for the first lesson in lamp making. Hostess for the next group meeting on May 14 will be Mrs. Gary Greenwood. Mrs. Clara Coffin, Mrs. Arthur Ropert and Mrs. Victor Johnson met with these women at the home of Mrs. Kopsinski to discuss the home demonstration program.

The lesson on drapery construction was given by the home demonstration agent.

Curtains—panelled, ruffled and café—are construction discussion topics for home demonstration groups during the coming month. Even if a woman does not plan to "Do-It-Yourself" her new window treatments this spring (or later), knowing good methods, measurements and recommendations for fullness can help her shop more wisely for the ones she will buy. However, it sounds if some homemakers do plan to make their own to save money, because of special fitting problems, or for greater satisfaction.

Selection of construction of curtains and draperies has been a series of lessons which started last spring. While on the subject of window treatments, there is one more which homemakers might like to do—the selection and making of valance boards. This can be done if enough group members place a request for it to be included in next year's program.

Will it be the traditional ham at your Easter dinner table? Hams are available as whole, half, shank or butt. The butt or upper half of ham is usually priced about 10 cents a pound higher than the shank half. Butt half contains the least amount of bone, shank half makes the larger slices.

Will you choose cooked, or partly cooked ham? Read the label to be sure which you get and how to prepare it for the juiciest results. It must be well done. Carving is made easier when bone has been removed and the ham rolled. The cost per pound is more. Canned ham is another good choice for easily prepared meat. Whole ready-to-eat ham makes about four servings per pound compared to about three servings per pound for whole uncooked ham.

Ham is baked uncovered at 325 degrees. Whole ham needs about 18 minutes baking time per pound; half ham about 20 to 25 minutes. A glaze is put on ham 30 minutes before the end of the baking time. Remove the skin, cut diagonal lines about one-eighth inch deep and an inch apart across the fat covering. Spread on half the glaze and 15 minutes later spread the other half. Suggested glazes?

Orange—Moisten brown sugar with orange juice concentrate, garnish with slices of the orange. Honey or molasses can be spread as a glaze and studded with cloves. To one cup of jelly add one-half teaspoon dry mustard and two tablespoons of horseradish, spread Spice—one cup of brown sugar and one cup of juice from spiced peaches or crab-apples. Garnish with whole pickled fruit.

Municipal Officers to Attend Meeting at Gaylord

Municipal officials from 11 Northern Michigan counties will attend a special school for mayors, village presidents and councilmen, April 23, in Gaylord. The school will be conducted by the Michigan Municipal League for elected officials in the communities which comprise Region IX of the league.

However, the school is only part of the annual meeting of the municipal officials of Region IX which includes the following counties: Alpena, Cheboygan, Presque Isle, Montmorency, Otsego, Crawford, Oscoda, Ogemaw, Roscommon, Iosco and Alcona. Dr. William R. Gable of the Institute of Public Administration of the University of Michigan will lead a discussion of the functions of elected officials.

The second portion of the meeting will be devoted to a discussion of building codes. Sufficient time will also be allowed for a round table discussion of general municipal problems.
