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





WHEN THE WHITE PINE WAS "KING" OF IOSCO COUNTY-Sawmill smokestacks lined the Tawas Bay waterfront in East Tawas prior to 1900 when this picture was snapped. The photographer stood on the commercial pier, now site of the Michigan Waterways with his camera facing northeast. Location of these mills would be the present day state park and the area would also include the state police post, Anderson Coach Company and Lixey's. Saw and planing mills formed the major part of the economy of Tawas City, East Tawas, AuSable, and Oscoda during this period. After depletion of timber stands, the mills were soon torn down, remembered today only in pictures and the now thinning ranks of old-timers. This photograph is included in The Tawas Herald's collection of old-time pictures. The publishers would like to copy two or three pictures showing sawmill operations in the AuSable-Oscoda and Hale-Whittemore areas to use in this series and to be included in the collection.






