

Water Skiing-Motor Boat Races Headline Water Carnival

Hydroplane motor boat racing will headline the first annual Tawas Water Carnival to be held August 24 and 25 on Tawas Bay, reports Mrs. Bertha Montgomery, secretary-manager of the Tawas Chamber of Commerce.

There will be from 40 to 50

boats here for this event and, under good racing conditions, many of the craft are capable of reaching speeds up to 110 miles per hour. In charge of the Tawas end of the program for motor boat racing is Carl Babcock.

Most of these boats will be

from the Detroit area and have staged races of this type in several surrounding states. The course will be set up to extend between the towns with the south turn as close inshore as possible for spectators view.

All heats for 48, 136, 225 and

266 cubic inch displacement class boats will be three laps around a one and two-thirds mile oval. Many of these boats participated at the recent marine derby national championship which was held at Louisville, Kentucky.

Included in the water carnival

program will be water skiing, skin diving demonstrations and a parade of sail and power boats of the Tawas Bay Yacht Club.

In charge of arrangements for water skiing is the Tawas Jaycees. Arrangements have been made by this group to have Jack Rine from

Cypress Gardens, Florida, appear here on August 24. At the present time, he is at Camp Hiawatha near Mio.

Included in his exhibition will be a two-ski turn around, back swan, a slalom and a one-heel trick. He will shoe ski and try a

barefoot skiing act.

The Jaycees has a number of local skiers lined up to put on several demonstrations. Intention of the local group is to form a water skiing club with the help of Mr. Rine.

All local water skiers will meet

with the Jaycees and Mr. Rine on Friday night, August 23.

Mrs. Montgomery said that a tentative program now set up may see skin divers with aqua lungs using colored lights below water to demonstrate the thrills of underwater sightseeing.

Held by Police After Firing Warning Shot

A 33-year-old Grand Rapids man, Richard H. Hineline, who is charged with firing a warning shot from a nine millimeter Luger pistol in the direction of a 15-year-old Grant Township boy Monday, is being held at the Isosco County Jail on a felonious assault charge.

Sheriff Ivan L. O'Farrell said Wednesday that Robert Kendall, son of Ray Kendall of Sand Lake, was fishing at a beaver pond on Pickett Creek in Grant Township. He told his father that Hineline fired a warning shot in his direction and then ordered him to leave.

Property on which the dam is located is owned by Seth Thompson of Prescott. Hineline is a friend of Mr. Thompson and was vacationing at his cabin for a few days.

Warrant for Hineline's arrest was signed by the father of the boy, who was about one-quarter mile away when the alleged shooting took place. A complaint was registered with the sheriff's department Monday night by Mr. Kendall and Hineline was arrested Tuesday.

Hineline demanded examination when arraigned before Justice Lester Weis of Oscoda Tuesday. Bond was set at \$1,000 which he was unable to post.

Immaculate Heart of Mary Parish to Dedicate New Church this Sunday

Formal dedication of the new Immaculate Heart of Mary Church, Tawas City, will be held Sunday, August 18, beginning at 12 o'clock noon. Solemn High Mass will be celebrated by the pastor, the Rev. Fr. Joseph A. Castanier, in the presence of the Most Rev. Stephen S. Woznicki, bishop of the diocese of Saginaw.

The new edifice is located on the corner of Elm Street and US-23 overlooking Tawas Bay. The architect is Paul Brysselbout of Bay City. General contractor for its construction was Davison and Rose of Tawas City.

The church is designed in the Solid Romanesque architecture of the twelfth century, with its steep-pitched roofs and solid masonry walls as built in Northern Europe.

It has two small transepts off the nave. The transept south of

the nave (main body of the church) has a side altar dedicated to the Blessed Virgin and the transept north of the nave contains the baptistry.

The nave seats over 400 parishioners and a large balcony over the narthex (entrance) will seat an additional 200 people for the summer Masses.

The altar and pulpit of the new church were designed by the Rev. Fr. John Zachary, OMI, of Ottawa, Canada. Frs. Zachary and Campbell of Ottawa have served the parish every summer since its founding.

On August 22, 1952, the feast of the Immaculate Heart of Mary, the parish was instituted by Bishop Woznicki of Saginaw. The first pastor was the Rev. Fr. Bernard Kirchman of Bay City. The parish altar society was formed in October 1952 and its original

enrollment was 71 members.

The first home of the church was in a theater located on Lake Street in Tawas City. The first Mass was celebrated in this building on September 7, 1952.

On January 22, 1953, the Rev. Fr. Castanier of Bay City was named pastor due to the resignation of Fr. Kirchman because of ill health. During the summer of 1953 the MacMurray home served as the rectory. The present rectory directly behind the church was purchased later.

In April 1956 the first bricks were laid for the new church. A corner-stone laying ceremony for the new church took place Sunday, August 26, 1956, with Msgr. John H. Sonefeld of Saginaw presiding. The first Mass was celebrated in the new church by Fr. Castanier on February 17, 1957.

Try Again Saturday on TA Athletic Field

Another try will be made by the Tawas Area Athletic Boosters Club this Saturday to haul clay for the new athletic field at the Tawas Area School. Work was postponed last Saturday because of wet grounds.

Trucks and earth-moving equipment have been lined up by the boosters club. Anyone else wishing to contribute use of a truck should contact Dr. E. B. Cavell, Tawas City.

At Tuesday night's meeting of the Tawas Area Board of Education, Superintendent Reynold Mick told members that prices had been received on lighting equipment for the proposed field and that bids would be under consideration soon. Light poles have been ordered for the field and delivery is expected the first week of September.

Entries may be made from 9:00 a. m. to 11:30 a. m. Any entry made after that time will be exhibited but not judged. During the hours of judging (12 o'clock noon until 3:00) no person will be permitted into the hall, except the judges and the committee in charge.

Mayflower May Come Here

Proposal of the state highway department to purchase property on which the Greenwood and Watts school buildings are located in Grant Township was discussed Tuesday night by the Tawas Area Board of Education.

The property under negotiation is needed for the widening of M-55. The buildings are not used under the district's reorganization.

No price was set by the board for the proposed sale of the property. Secretary Walter Niles and Treasurer Waldo J. Curry were appointed by board president, Stuart White, as a committee of two to act on the matter.

Crosstowners Shut Out Tawas City, 4-0, Sunday

East Tawas shut out the Tawas City Drewrys, 4-0, in a well-played game on the winner's home field last Sunday. The win evened up a two-game series in league competition between the two teams, although Tawas City holds a slight edge with a practice game win.

Big Darwood Leopard was the winning pitcher for East Tawas. He scattered five hits during the game and the losers were able to connect with two hits in one inning.

On the mound for Tawas City, and charged with the loss, was Orville Revord. Revord limited the East Tawas team to only four hits and did not allow an earned run.

Both teams played on even terms until the third inning when East Tawas pushed across two runs. Johnson reached first base when he was nicked by a pitched ball. Durant moved the runner to second with a bunt. Lorenz was out short to first. DeLosh was safe on an error. Leopard followed with a long double against the

right field fence scoring both runners. Erickson popped out to first to end the inning.

East Tawas scored one run in the fourth inning after two men were out. Frank reached first on a fielder's choice and scored on Johnson's long double.

Isosco Schools Await Some 4,000 Children

Boards of education and school administrators are beginning the final August push to swing wide the doors of four Isosco County schools for entrance of an estimated 4,000 children the first week in September.

County Superintendent Russell A. Rollin said this week that there would be another round of student increases for every school in the county this year. This has been the case for the past five or more years.

Total enrollment last year was as follows: Tawas Area, 1,223; Hale Area, 413; Oscoda Area, 1,138; Whittemore-Prescott Area, 740; Reno No. 1, 18.

Tawas Area School will start its first complete year under one roof with high school and junior high school grades at the new school building on M-55. High school students moved to the new building in February of last year but junior high students finished out the year at the Alabaster unit.

Whittemore-Prescott Area School will begin its first complete year under its reorganization. A new building for this school is now in the planning stage.

In a notice to school administrators this week, Mr. Rollin pointed out a change in the school law this year which would materially affect school budgets.

"In the 1956-57 school year, we were allowed a transportation cost up to \$60 per pupil if they lived more than one mile from school. This has now been changed so that we receive a transportation allowance for those children living more than 1 1/2 miles from the school which they attend," stated Mr. Rollin.

"Most people of the State of Michigan are not aware of the fact that school laws are constantly being changed and made effective immediately," he said.

All transporting schools are to furnish the county school office with a map of every bus route and showing the point of pick-up for every child. Financial allowance will be made only to those schools complying with the law. (More on opening of schools may be found on page 10.)

Keiser's Grand Opening this Week

Grand opening of the newly remodeled Keiser Drug Store in Tawas City will be held this Thursday, Friday and Saturday, August 15, 16 and 17.

Construction on the building, which was started in March, was completed earlier this summer by Olaf Rose Builders, Incorporated, Tawas City.

Under its recent expansion, the building was widened 39 feet giving the drug store portion 17 additional feet or nearly doubling the floor space. The remainder of the building is separated from the store by a wall and is to be rented as a doctor's office or retail business store.

Front of the building facing US-23 was completely remodeled with brick and glass and an aluminum faced marquee. The building now extends to the Ransom Building and is a handsome addition to the Tawas City business district.

Interior of the store was remodeled and redecorated with new display islands and fixtures. Fluorescent lighting fixtures in the new portion are supplemented by sky domes.

The Keiser building was constructed in the 1920s by H. J. Keiser Sr. The interior of the

building was completely remodeled in 1953.

In observance of the grand opening, Keiser's offers free gifts for all during the three big days. Among these are cigars for the men, flowers for the ladies' hair, balloons and suckers for the youngsters.

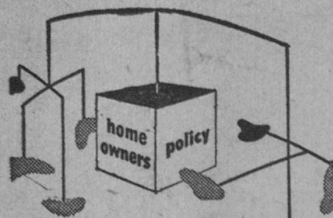

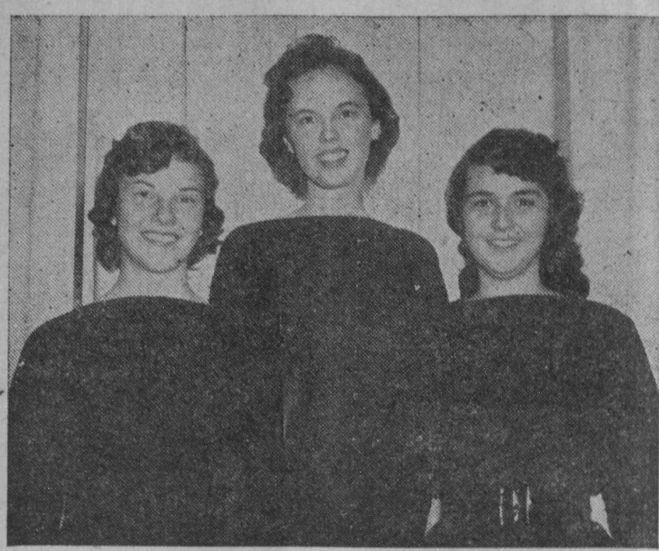
Youth Award Feature of Saginaw Fair

Cartier, rural youth department superintendent, made the presentation.

The rural youth department of the fair, under the direction of Mrs. Cartier, filled the need for an exhibiting department at the fair for rural youth who were unable to join 4-H Clubs or FFA groups, but there are many who now exhibit in all three divisions. 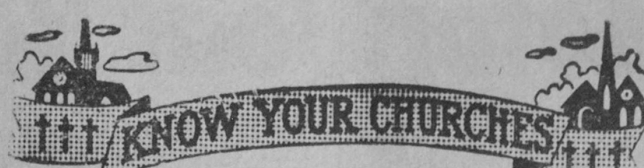

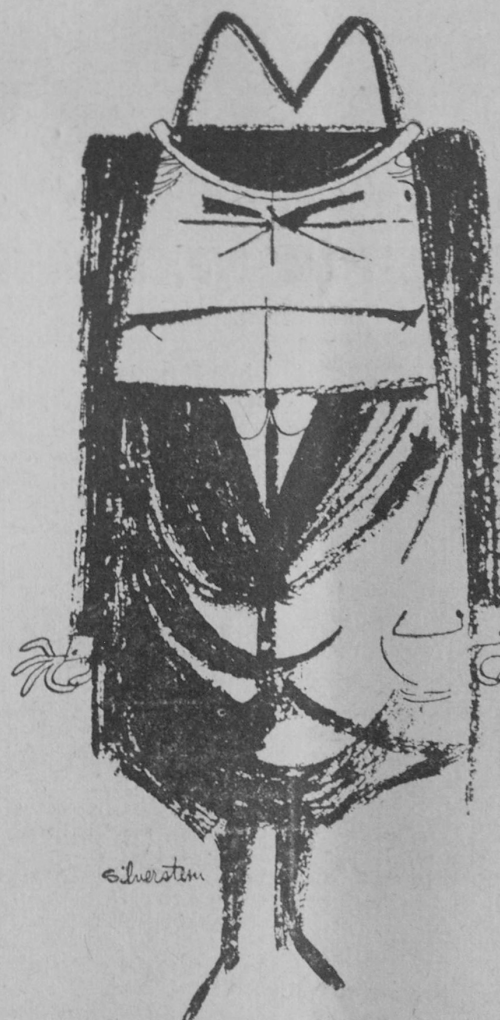
