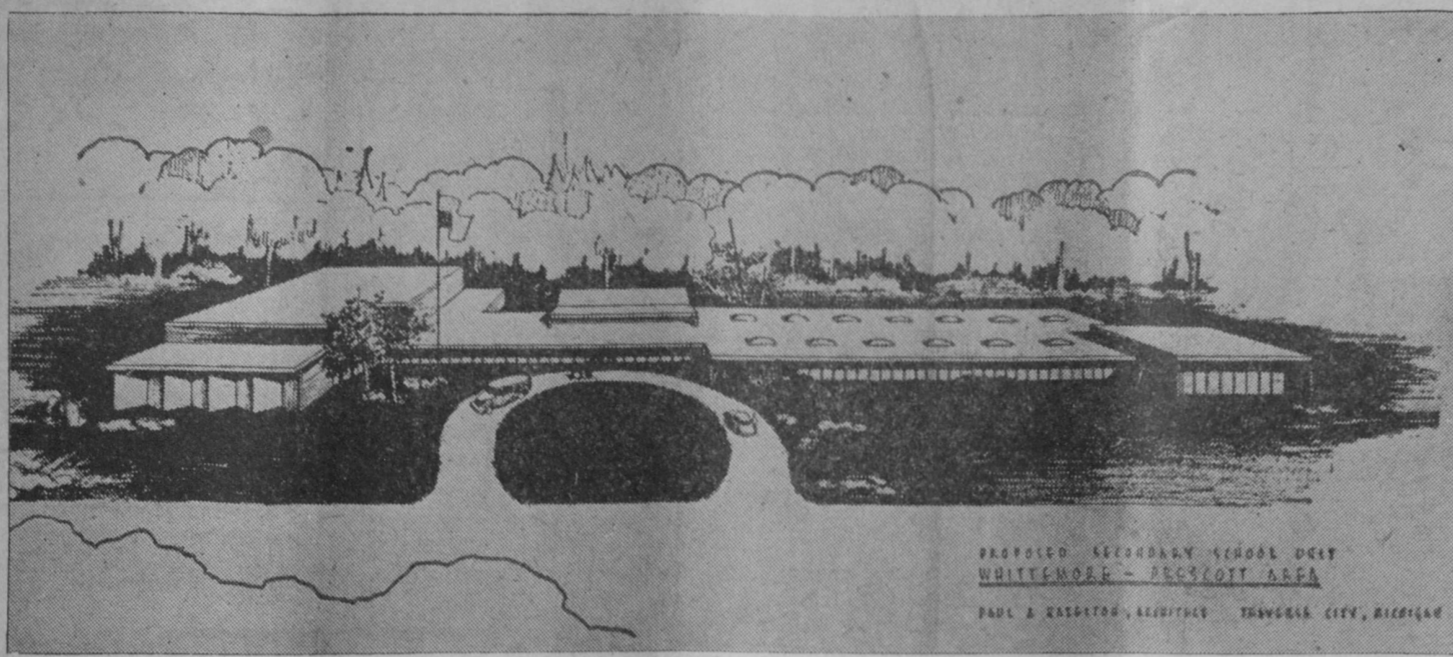

Whittemore - Prescott Area Vote on New School Aug. 27

On Tuesday, August 27, tax electors in the Whittemore-Prescott Area School District will go to the polls to vote on the question of bonding the district for \$550,000 to build and equip a new junior and senior high school. The board of education has employed Paul Hazelton of Traverse City as its architect for planning the new building.

Since the consolidation, a new high school building has become imperative for the district. The present high school facilities in Whittemore are not adequate to take care of the increase in enrollment which is a result of the consolidation.

The site for the high school is approximately half-way between Whittemore and Prescott where the board of education has a signed purchase agreement to buy 40 acres from the Prescott Ranch; 20 acres in Isoco County and 20 acres in Ogemaw County. The parcels adjoin each other and are on the north side of the road at the county line.

Preliminary plans for the new high school have been discussed and approved by the board of education and the Citizens Building Committee in the course of sev-

eral meetings during the past two months.

If the bond issue is approved at this election, the board of education plans to let contracts for the new building during January and February of this coming year with the assurance that construction will start next spring.

Only taxpayers may vote in the election next Tuesday. It is not necessary that one be registered but each voter must, in addition to being a taxpayer, be 21 years of age, a citizen of the United States, a resident of the State of Michigan for six months and a resident of the school district for

the 30-day period preceding the election. There are no absentee ballots for this election. There is one polling place, the Whittemore-Prescott Area High School in Whittemore. Polls will be open from 8:00 a. m. to 8:00 p. m.

An average mileage of 4.5 miles on the present state equalized valuation of the district will be needed. This is \$4.50 per each \$1,000 of state valuation.

Amount of the bond issue will be \$550,000. This amount covers everything, including the cost of the building, architect's fee, equipment, site preparation and land purchase.

Alpena Man Injured Trying Blockade Run

Richard F. Hinkley, 24, of Alpena, who ran one state police blockade and attempted to run another north of East Tawas early Monday morning, was charged Tuesday with felonious assault with an auto. His car, traveling at a high rate of speed, crossed the center line of US-23 and crashed into a state police patrol car to end the chase.

Hinkley is in critical condition at an Alpena hospital. After the crash he received emergency treatment at Tawas Hospital and was later removed to Alpena.

Hinkley, driving a 1951 Hudson, led a patrol car from the Alpena post on a wild chase and then ran a roadblock at Harrisville. The Alpena car was joined in the chase by the Alpena Sheriff's Department car.

The Alpena car radioed ahead and Troopers James Ewer and Cornelius Bykerk of the East Tawas post stationed a patrol car on US-23 about 5.9 miles north of East Tawas. The car was set up in northbound lane with red blinker light and headlights on.

The two troopers took up a position slightly south of the patrol car. Hinkley's car struck the patrol car head on. Both cars were total wrecks. The two troopers took to the ditch when they saw that a crash was inevitable. Ewer was sprayed by water from the radiator of Hinkley's vehicle.

State police said the 55-mile chase started when the Alpena car was flagged down by a gasoline station attendant who said that Hinkley had just driven away without paying for some gas.

Besides the felonious assault charge, he faces a non-payment charge in Alpena County.

The council was addressed by Elmer Werth of Tawas Industries, Incorporated, Tawas City, who stated that the Tawas area is large enough to justify a terminal. He said that such a facility is sorely needed for industrial progress, as well as for the convenience of business establishments.

Mr. Werth, who is mayor of East Tawas, reported that the East Tawas Council had passed a similar resolution recently and felt that the terminal could be realized by mutual assistance.

In other business transacted, the council approved a building permit submitted by Evelyn Colby, 207 Oak Street, for a 12 by 20 foot garage. Estimated cost of construction was \$800.

The council authorized its street committee to make a survey of First Avenue to investigate the possibility of black-topping city property on the east side of the street, adjacent to Brugger's Market. Work on this project would be on a property owner participation basis with the city.

Rail Contracts Let for New Quarry; Answer to Rumors

It was announced Tuesday from the home office of National Gypsum Company in Buffalo, New York, that contracts have been let covering the construction of rail facilities into the rock storage location, the new quarry site and into the present plant at National City.

Questioned about the project, C. H. Hill, plant manager at the National City plant, stated, "The release of this contract should answer many false rumors in circulation that the new quarry operation will result in the closing of the present National City plant with its employment of close to 300 persons."

A definite part of the present commitment for trackage is the installation of facilities for taking rock from the new quarry to the National City plant. This expenditure will help to make the benefit of lower cost from the new quarry available to the National City plant, thus bolstering its economic position still further for the future.

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Pupils Living Within One and One-Half Mile Radius Will Walk to School

A new policy in transporting students to Tawas Area Schools was announced this week by the board of education. The new policy came after a careful study of the effect of the changed law regarding reimbursement for transportation.

The new law will not allow reimbursement for transportation of pupils living within 1½ miles of the school they attend. Previously the law limited the distance to one mile.

Complying with this new law, the board of education will not carry pupils living within 1½ miles of the school except where extreme hazardous conditions prevail. With hazardous conditions,

transportation will be provided for pupils of kindergarten, first, second, third and fourth grades.

At the present time the board has declared US-23 as hazardous. Persons feeling that other hazardous conditions exist should convey their reasons to Supt. Reynold Mick for consideration by the board of education.

The board has stated further that people living on a regular bus route, whose children are within the 1½-mile limit of the school, may have transportation by paying the per capita cost of transportation to the school. Each year's rate is set by the state on the basis of the previous year's records and should not exceed

\$40 for 1957-58. This changed policy will in no way affect any pupils in grades five through 12 in East Tawas, nor in the majority of the rural section. Those in grades seven through 12 in Tawas City and the rural area within 1½ miles by road from the new school will come under the new policy.

This new policy will apply to those attending the Lutheran School, Immaculate Heart of Mary and St. Joseph School, who live less than 1½ miles from the school they attend.

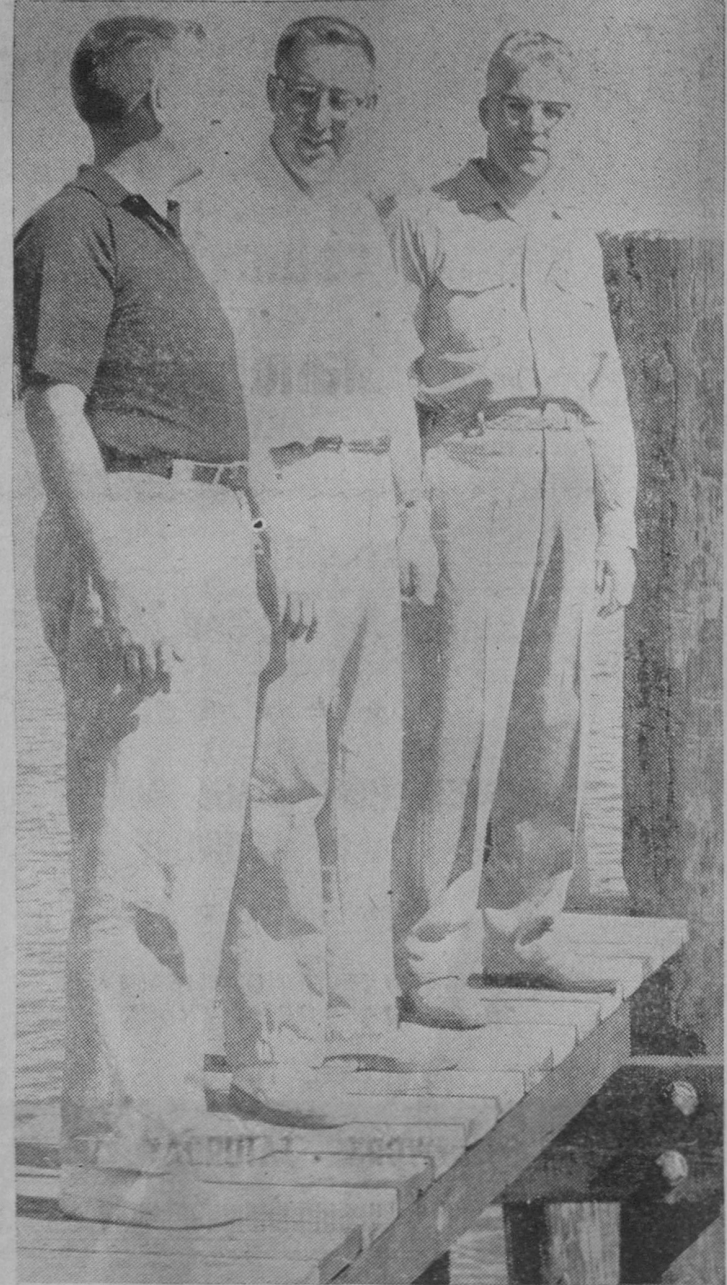

Commission Inspect Northern Areas Harbor Facilities

Michigan legislators and members of the Michigan State Waterways Commission were here Saturday during an inspection of harbor facilities at East Tawas, Caseville and Port Austin.

Those attending were: Rep. Lester Allen, Ithaca; Rep. James P. Mielock, Whittemore, chairman marine affairs committee of the house of representatives; Dr. W. S. Wellman, member of the Michigan State Waterways Commission; Keith Wilson, director, Michigan State Waterways Commission; Richard N. Schwartz, Lansing, member of the waterways commission.

Also, Sen. Clarence F. Graebner, Saginaw; Benjamin A. Williams, highway department; Rep. Michael O'Brien, Detroit, member of the marine affairs committee; Rep. John Fitzpatrick, member of the marine affairs committee; Sen. Garland Lane, Flint; Rep. Kenneth N. Sanborn, Mt. Clemens; Rep. Patrick J. Doyle, Dearborn.

Saturday morning the group viewed the waterways commission dock at East Tawas and then made the hour and a half trip to Caseville as guests of Fred Strawsine of Tawas aboard his 52-foot cruiser.

At Caseville, the party was met by businessmen of that area. After lunch Keith Wilson, director of the waterways commission, told the group of proposed plans to make Caseville an authorized harbor of refuge, cost of which is estimated at one million dollars.

During the past year, the waterways commission has spent about \$250,000 on improving and constructing harbors of refuge in the state. New facilities have been constructed recently at Mackinaw City, Alpena and Presque Isle County.

Those from Tawas who made the trip were Carl Babcock, Steven Peterson and Neil Thornton. Joseph Wolf, a reporter for the Detroit News who is writing a series of feature articles on harbors in Michigan, also made the trip.

The group then cruised to Port Austin to visit the proposed site of a \$1,000,000 harbor to be financed by state and federal funds. Work on this project is to start September 21 with completion by June 30 of next year.

Mr. Wilson stated that the waterways commission expects to spend about \$12,000 on the commission dock at East Tawas in the near future. Improvements here will include rock fill in the center section of the dock to reduce the surge of water which now handicaps docking of small craft.

IOSCO FARM NEWS—

Forest Tree Seedlings and Transplants Will Soon be Available for Purchase

Forest tree seedlings and transplants will soon be available for purchase from the nurseries operated by Michigan State University.

Michigan State University Forester Ira Bull says the evergreen trees available for this fall and next spring are: Red pine, white pine, jack pine, Austrian pine, white spruce, Norway spruce and Douglas fir.

There is one important change in the list of evergreens for this year. There will not be any Scotch pine seedlings available from the Michigan State University nurseries. The forestry department decided two years ago to discontinue production of that species so they could devote their limited nursery space to growing more native evergreen trees and the two exotic species, Norway spruce and Austrian pine, which they believe are more important species in our reforestation program. If you would like some Scotch pine, the Michigan Department of Agriculture says there will be 33 million Scotch pine seedlings available from private nurseries in Michigan.

Orders for both spring and fall planted trees can be placed as soon as the forestry department price lists are received. They will have available approximately one million red pine, one million 250 thousand white spruce, 500 thousand white pine, 250 thousand jack pine, 500 thousand Austrian pine, 250 thousand Norway spruce and 200 thousand Douglas fir.

Order blanks for trees can be obtained from the forestry department, Michigan State University, East Lansing, or my office in the Federal Building. Planting and growing information is also available just for the asking.

Iosco Soil Conservation District has a tree planter under the supervision of Elmer Anschuetz, Tawas City, that does custom planting. Direct your inquiries to Mr. Anschuetz.

Why drive 200 or 300 miles to a camping ground? By doing some nosing around in or near Iosco County, anyone can find a camping and picnic area close to home. And, it will probably be just as good and less crowded than some of the better-known parks.

Many city, county and state parks, plus state and national forests, have camping and picnic areas that are not being used to capacity.

On the other hand, some popular camping grounds are so crowded that the number of people entering and the length of time they may stay must be limited by regulations.

There were 18 percent more campers in Michigan state parks as of July 29 than there were last year according to Harold Schick, extension specialist in park management, Michigan State University.

This season is running 11 percent ahead of last year in park visitors, too.

Schick, who just returned from a tour of parks, said one of the unexpected drawing points of the parks is the shortage of mosquitoes. Most of the parks are sprayed so there are fewer mosquitoes in the parks than there are in town.

Experiment with new areas on your vacation. Just do not go back to the place you went last year. Write to the State Conservation Department, Lansing 26, Michigan, for specific information. You will probably find that there are parks and camping grounds close to your home that you did not know were there.

By planning your trip ahead and arriving early you can save yourself from having to seek another camping place because the first one was full.

When you are in a crowded camp you will find that most people stay in one small area of the park. The park ranger will be glad to give you a map of the park and offer suggestions about the nature trails, wildflowers, animals, birds and many other scenic and historical points of interest.

You have to get the air out of the silage to make it cure into high quality feed.

When silage is cured right, most of the air will be squeezed out in the silo. Then plant enzymes and bacteria will finish the job by using up the remaining oxygen in about five hours. When the oxygen is gone, other bacteria can take over and start the curing process by forming lactic acid and other chemicals that make sweet smelling silage.

However, when silage is left loose and unsealed for two days, it will heat and spoil.

Burt Cargill, Michigan State University agricultural engineer, says the most important job in making good silage is to spread it as soon as you blow or elevate it into the silo. If you allow a cone to build up in the middle, the material will separate. Large particles like chopped cobs will roll to the outside and trap air while the finer material will remain in the center.

Spreading can help a lot more to pack silage than tramping. The weight of the silage, itself, will take care of the packing if it is spread uniformly.

Spreading is becoming more important now that farmers have larger herds and are building larger diameter silos. According to Cargill the center cone will build up much higher in the wider silo and leave more silage loose and exposed to air. Mechanical distributors will make the spreading job a lot easier in these big silos.

The other thing to watch is the moisture content of the corn. The best time to make good silage is when it is still green but well denting. When silage is too wet, it can damage the silo. "This structure is not built like a water tank," says Mr. Cargill. To be on the safe side moisture content should not be over 75 percent.

On the other hand if it is too dry, it will not pack well enough to force out the air. If you have one field that is more mature than the rest, harvest it first so the dry silage will be on the bottom of the silo. Then the greener material on top will weight it down, force out the air and it will cure well.

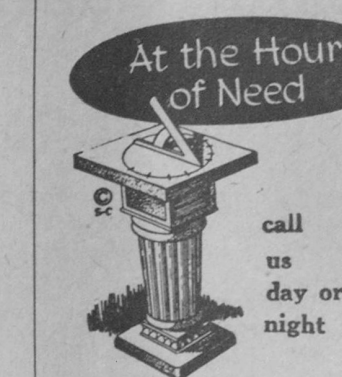
