Dock Hearing Scheduled by U. S. Army Corps of Engineers

A public hearing, on application of the National Gypsum Company for modification of plans of an authorized aerial tramway (conveyor belt), steel pier, mooring and turning basin.

The hearing before the army corps of engineers on September 10 at the county building is of great importance to everyone in Isoco County. Businessmen, civic officials and private citizens, as well, are urged to be on hand to learn more about the new dock proposal which has so vital a role in the economy of the area.

The installation, to be used for loading lake carriers with gypsum rock from the company's new quarry a short distance inland, has been in the news since March 1956, when the company first announced its intention to expand quarry facilities south of Tawas City.

Since that time the lake loading installation to be located 1.6 miles south from the mouth of the Tawas River in Alabaster Township, has encountered opposition from nearby property owners who claimed, among other things, that the installation would lower property values.

The new proposal, announced two weeks ago by the company, is for an aerial tramway (conveyor belt) extending lakeward a distance of approximately 7,500 feet from the shore.

An enclosed overhead conveyor gallery would extend 375 feet lakeward from shore to a proposed pier extending lakeward an additional 676 feet for a total of 1,051 feet. Also, to dredge to a depth of 19 feet below water datum a turning basin on the north side of the pier, a mooring basin on the south side and a channel 200 feet wide extending lakeward a distance of approximately 7,500 feet from the shore.

The conveyor gallery would provide for a free vertical clearance of 14 feet above low water datum throughout its length except for a center support. The pier will consist of seven 50-foot square steel cells supporting a concrete deck so as to provide a free vertical clearance of 10 feet above low water datum for each of the six 50-foot openings separating the cells.

The National Gypsum Company proposal, changed recently from an earth-filled pier, seeks authorization from the corps of engineers

for an aerial tramway (conveyor belt), steel pier, mooring and turning basin.

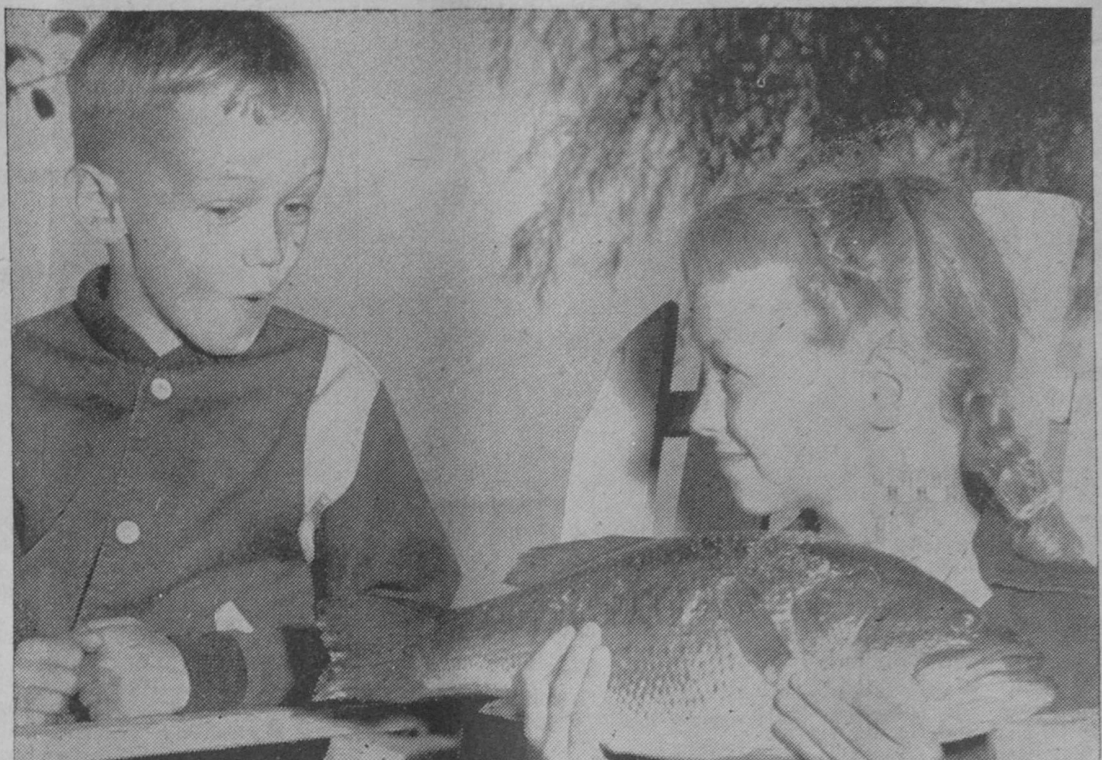
Funeral Services Held Sunday for Norman Brown

Water Board Recommends \$65,000 Bond Issue for TC

A recommendation to start action on a proposed \$65,000 revenue bond issue for construction of water main extensions and installation of meters was made Monday night by the Tawas City Water Board. The recommendation requires approval of the city council before bonding attorneys are given the go-ahead.

The revenue bond issue, which does not require a vote of taxpayers, would finance construction of seven water main extensions in Tawas City, one of the most important being from Oak Street on US-23 east to the city limits. This main would tie Tawas City in with East Tawas's water distribution system and would be put into service on completion of the new East Tawas water filtration plant.

Also included in the proposal are several water main extensions for the addition of new users in Tawas City. These extensions include: From North Street on First

Avenue to Burrell's Subdivision; Elms Avenue and Crocker Boulevard; from Fifth Street on Ninth Avenue to US-23; Spruce Street main extended to M-55; from Crocker Boulevard on Elms Avenue to Grove Avenue; from Elms Avenue on US-23 north 2,000 feet.

Largest single financial outlay in the proposal would be for the purchase and installation of 500 water meters. Cost of this would be \$15,500.

City Engineer Clifford Spicer, who presented plans for the proposal at Monday night's meeting, said that it would take about four months of preparation before the bonds could be sold. Construction on the project would start sometime in March.

Spicer was authorized to send information on the proposal to bonding attorneys, as well as, to prepare a new water rate use schedule to take effect on completion of the tie-in with East Tawas.

Water Accidents Injure 3 Persons

Water skiing accidents accounted for injuries to three persons on Isoco County inland lakes last week-end. Two of the victims are reported in serious condition at Tawas Hospital.

John R. Telling, 36, Detroit, was rushed by ambulance to Tawas Hospital Saturday afternoon suffering from lacerations to the head and right arm.

Telling was towing his son, Larry, age eight, on water skis behind his boat. The boy fell off the skis and Telling, who made a sharp turn to go back to pick up the boy, fell out of the boat.

Attempting to make a grab for the stern of the craft, Telling was cut by the propeller. The injured man was able to grab the gas line to the outboard motor and pull it free. The boat made two circles before being recovered.

Trooper Carrol Harger and Sheriff Ivan L. O'Farrell, who investigated, said the accident occurred in about four feet of water.

William and Adelaide McDowell were injured Sunday afternoon when the boat in which they were fishing on Long Lake was struck by a boat towing a water skier. Mrs. McDowell, who received a fractured vertebrae, was taken by ambulance to Tawas Hospital.

Sheriff O'Farrell said that the McDowell boat was struck by a motor boat operated by Fern Stucky, 15, of Flushing. John Stucky, father of the girl, was issued a summons and is to appear before Justice H. E. Friedman on September 3.

McDowell told officers he was about 100 feet from shore fishing when the accident occurred. McDowell was thrown out of the boat into eight feet of water as the result of the impact. He received a knee injury, but was able to swim to shore.

Mrs. McDowell was knocked into the bottom of the boat during the crash.

Whittemore-Prescott Vote 443-74 For New Building

Whittemore-Prescott Area School tax electors voted six to one in favor of bonding the district for \$550,000 to build and equip a new junior and senior high school at Tuesday's election. Only taxpayers are eligible to vote.

A total of 510 votes were cast at the polls, located at the Whittemore-Prescott Area High School in Whittemore. There were 443 "yes" votes and 74 "no." Three ballots were spoiled.

Supt. John Halbert said that the board of education plans to let contracts for the new building during January and February of this coming year with the assurance that construction will start next spring.

The board of education and a citizens building committee has held numerous meetings during past months to make preliminary plans for the new school. Since consolidation a new high school building has become imperative.

Site for the new school is approximately halfway between Whittemore and Prescott. The board of education has signed a purchase agreement to buy 40 acres of land from the Prescott Ranch; 20 acres in Isoco County and 20 acres in Ogemaw County.

Paul Hazelton of Traverse City has been employed by the board of education as its architect for planning the new building.

State Police Now Have 'Skin Diving' Troopers

With swimming and boating accidents expected to reach its peak for the summer season over the Labor Day week-end, the Michigan State Police prepared recently to meet any such emergency with its new "skin diving troopers."

Two weeks ago a special skin diving training school for 16 state police officers was held at East Lansing headquarters. Among the troopers selected for the training was Jack Barker, who is assigned to the East Tawas post.

The 16 state police skin divers comprise one two-man team from each of the department's eight districts. The purpose of the squad, believed to be the first organized by any state police department, is to search for drowning victims and to recover evidence thrown in lakes and streams.

Trooper Barker said that the majority of the troopers who attended the school had prior skin diving experience. His first introduction came two years ago when he was first assigned here. He purchased an aqua lung at the time and took up diving as a sport.

During the five-day school at East Lansing, the troopers were instructed in the techniques of diving with an aqua lung, proper use and care of equipment, physical effect on the body of the diver while underwater and the proper method of bringing a body or heavy object to the surface.

Board Follows New Law

Additional information received by the Tawas Area Board of Education from the state department of public instruction this week revealed that if any children living within 1 1/2 miles of school are transported, the board of education stands to lose at least one-fourth of its transportation funds coming from the state.

Supt. Reynold Mick said Wednesday morning that this penalty would amount to approximately six or seven thousand dollars. As a result, the board will comply with the new state law which was announced last week.

At Tuesday night's regular meeting, however, the board declared that M-55 was a hazardous area. As a result, youngsters who live on M-55 and attend kindergarten through fourth grade will be transported.

The new law will not allow reimbursement for transportation of pupils living within 1 1/2 miles of the school they attend. Previously the law limited the distance to one mile.

School will start on Wednesday, September 4, at the Tawas Area School. Superintendent Mick said students will attend only in the morning on Wednesday. First full day of school will be Thursday.

In other business transacted Tuesday night, McArdle and Graham were the low bidders on furnishing gasoline for school buses. Bublitz Oil Company was awarded the contract for furnishing No. 2 fuel oil with its low bid, and Myles Insurance Agency was the low bidder for insurance on school buildings.

Tawas Bay Insurance Agency was authorized to solicit for student accident insurance. This insurance covers the student while at school or going to and from school. Rates this year are \$2 and \$2.50, as compared to \$1.50 and \$2 last year.

Prizes are as follows: First prize, \$1,000; second prize, \$500;

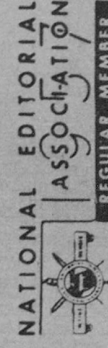
third prize, \$200; fourth prize, \$100; fifth through eighth places, each \$50; ninth and 10th place, each \$25.

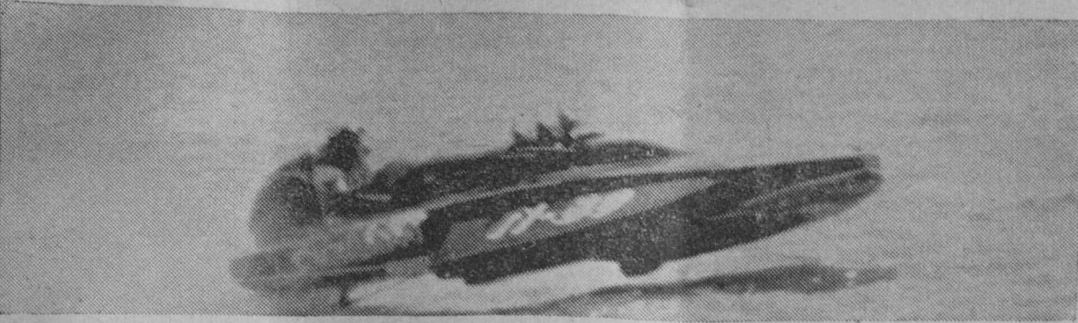

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IOSCO FARM NEWS—

Mark 12 Acres of Legume Plots at Daugharty Farm

By Marvin Davenport

Recently Russell Horwood, director of the Lake City Experiment Station, and I visited the Earl Daugharty farm. Our main purpose was to mark out 12 acres of legume plots and review our management practices of these plots. Viking Imported and Empire Birdsfoot Trefoils as well as Dollar clover and alfalfa are being used on this "semi-permanent" pasture demonstration area.

After we completed our work on the "plots" we visited some of Mr. Daugharty's reforested areas. The Daugharty farm is no different than most Iosco farms, with its varieties of soils. He has done an excellent job of giving each acre a chance to grow its best crop. We walked over "blow sand" acres that are producing excellent tree growth as well as wild game cover.

Most farmers know when they buy fertilizer that the numbers on the container signify the chemical analysis inside. In 5-20-20 for example, five pounds of nitrogen, 20 pounds are phosphoric acid and 20 pounds potash. But, Wade McCall, Michigan State University soil scientist, says that this is a question he is often asked. He also says that folks frequently want to know the details about the different types of fertilizers, that is, solid, liquid and gaseous.

Gas type fertilizers are the cheapest in terms of cost per pound of plant food, but they are limited in use since they contain only nitrogen. However, if you do need only nitrogen and want to use a gaseous fertilizer, remember it must be applied with special pressurized equipment.

Liquid fertilizers are easiest to handle when it comes to labor involved, but they, too, must be stored in a steel tank under pressure. They are commonly applied with a sprayer or through an irrigation system, although planters can now be equipped to handle liquids. The cost of liquid and dry, or solid, fertilizers will vary, depending on what process each is made.

Solid fertilizer is perhaps the most common of the three since you can get a higher chemical analysis. It usually presents no extra cost for application equipment.

Another popular question is whether or not a certain fertilizer should be applied in the fall. Nitrate nitrogen is the only true exception. The nitrates are best applied in the spring, while ammonia forms will not work effectively unless they are applied in the fall after the soil temperature is below 60 degrees. Otherwise, all other forms may be applied in the fall.

Rye is an old standby crop that has been in use for a long time, and in Michigan it just has not kept pace with the ever-increasing production of other small grains. Rye does have a great value, says Dennis Clananhan, Michigan State University crops specialist, when it is used for pasture and green manure. Farmers in Michigan are now using about three-quarters of the total rye acreage in that way. Balbo is the best rye variety; it emerges earlier in the spring and does not flavor the milk, like the other varieties do, when dairy cows are pastured on it.

Rye has generally been considered a scavenger crop, planted on land where other crops could not be grown. However, rye makes an excellent grazing and pasture supplement, also producing good cover which can easily be plowed down as green manure. Rye is no different than any other grain, it will respond to good treatment. Therefore, the rate of seeding is

The consent in writing of the owner and the occupant in control of the dwelling, as the case may be, to such parking use and occupancy and to the use of the sanitary facilities as herein provided shall accompany the application and be endorsed thereon. Upon the receipt of such written application as above provided, the Chief of Police shall cause an inspection to be made of such dwelling premises, vacant lot, House Trailer or Mobile Home, personally, and if he finds that adequate facilities are afforded on the premises for the disposal of waste and excreta, and it appears that the parking, use and occupancy of such House Trailer or Mobile Home complies with the Statutes of the State of Michigan and the ordinances of the City of Tawas City, he shall approve such application. Applicant shall pay to the City of Tawas City the sum of \$20.00 which sum shall be credited to applicant as follows, to wit: \$5.00 to cover the cost of the inspection and the balance of \$15.00 shall be used to extend the life of the permit for a period of three (3) calendar months, provided further that at the expiration of the three months period the applicant may extend the life of the permit for another 3 months by the payment of the sum of \$15.00 as above provided, and such permit may be extended for any number of additional 3 months periods as applicant shall make the necessary extension payments. Failure to tender such payments to the City within 15 days from the due date shall cancel such permit. To provide an orderly method of handling such extensions, the City shall bill the applicant quarterly for the extension coinciding with the Water Board's billing periods. Each permit shall be displayed in or on the House Trailer or Mobile Home for which it is issued, on the side nearest to a public street in such a manner as to be readily noticeable at all times." 10% SAVING IN LIVES ON MICHIGAN HIGHWAYS

With four months still to go, Michigan has already achieved its goal of a 10 percent saving in traffic deaths this year under the total of those who died in 1956, State Police Commissioner Joseph A. Childs reports.

Since January 1 up through mid-night of August 22, there were 896 fatalities compared with 1,090 in the same period of last year, a saving of 194 lives.

Tawas Holds Successful Water Carnival on Bay

Although choppy water shortened power boat races Sunday afternoon the Tawas area's first annual water carnival was described as "very successful" last week-end. Hundreds of persons jammed the waterways commission dock and cars were lined along US-23 between the Tawas to watch the hydroplane racing Sunday afternoon.

Water skiers braved cold weather Saturday afternoon to present a water skiing exhibition on Tawas Bay. Highlighting this was the performance of Jack Rine, professional skier from Cypress Gardens, Florida.

Saturday's program started with a parade of boats from Tawas Point following the shoreline to the SS Western States in Tawas City. Although the weather was cold, wind conditions were excellent and sailboats were able to participate in the parade.

An exhibition of skin diving was presented by local divers at the waterways commission dock. With 15 Detroit boats entered Sunday, the American Power Boat Association staged several races on a one and two-third mile course laid out on Tawas Bay between the waterways commission dock and the chamber of commerce office.

Motor boat racers saw ideal con-

ditions Sunday morning when an off-shore wind left the water calm, but by the time the races started, shortly after 12:30, the wind switched to the east and whipped up the water.

Six Persons Injured in 10 Isoco Auto Accidents

Six persons were injured in 10 automobile accidents investigated by law enforcement agencies in Isoco County last week-end. Three accidents involved personal injuries to occupants of automobiles while seven were property damage crashes.

A four-car collision on US-23, one mile west of the Tawas Beach Road, early Saturday morning sent three persons to the hospital, one in serious condition. State police officers had just finished investigating an accident when three cars and a parked wrecker were involved in a crash.

A car driven by Gladys Brown of St. Clair Shores had slowed down to pass the scene of the previous accident and was struck in the rear by a car driven by Thomas Savona, 22, of Wurtsmith Air Force Base. The Savona car glanced off the rear bumper of the Brown car and then crashed into the Orville Leslie wrecker which was parked on the shoulder of the road.

The Savona car hit the wrecker and crashed head-on into an oncoming car driven by Robert D. Goodman, 29, Union City, Indiana. The Goodman vehicle also crashed into the wrecker. The wrecker, which was not occupied and did not have its brakes set, was not damaged although it moved more than 20 feet from the point of impact.

Savona, suffering a severe concussion and spinal injury, was taken to Tawas Hospital by ambulance and later transferred to Mercy Hospital, Bay City, for further treatment. A passenger, John Hynds, also of Wurtsmith, and Goodman were treated at Tawas Hospital and released.

In the previous accident at the same location, William C. Barber, Ferndale, received minor shoulder injuries when his car was side-swiped by a car driven by Warren W. Lytle of Breckenridge.

Richard E. Mark, 29, Dobbs Ferry, New York, was treated at Tawas Hospital for a broken jaw and fractured right ankle Sunday night after his car crashed on the River Road, Oscoda. His car left the highway and collided with some mail boxes and a tree.

Dr. Harold D. Jones, East Tawas, treated for lacerations to the head and body at Tawas Hospital Friday night after his car went into a ditch in Reno Township. Investigating sheriff's department officers said that the Jones car, traveling west on M-55, hit a partial wash-out at the top of a hill and rolled into the ditch. He was alone in the car.

Personal Property Tax Hearing Set for Alpena Sept. 6

A hearing relative to personal property taxes in Michigan will be held at Alpena September 6, Carlton H. Morris, state senator from Kalamazoo, urges all interested businessmen, county supervisors and industrialists to attend the meeting.

Morris is chairman of a special committee of the state senate which was established during the 1956 session of the legislature to study the importance of the St. Lawrence Seaway toward the economy of Michigan.

This senate interim committee introduced Senate Bills 1236 and 1408 during the 1956 session. Purpose of these bills was to facilitate at the local level and under local control, an orderly development of port facilities. The bills were not reported out of the house taxation committee, although they passed the senate with only one dissenting vote. It is contemplated to again introduce this legislation in the senate.

In a letter to Elmer Werth of Tawas Industries, Incorporated, Morris said, "You may recall that the committee sponsored act 206 of public acts of 1956 which resulted in substantial tax relief from personal property taxes to users of public warehouses, ports and dock facilities. In the course of hearings in 1956 it was pointed out to the committee that the personal tax laws of Michigan, and especially the administration of the laws in many areas, are a major deterrent to port and warehouse development.

"It was also pointed out to the committee that the burden of the personal property taxes, not only on the port and warehousing industry, but also on manufacturing and retail industry, was creating serious problems which have and are continuing to have an adverse effect on the economy of the State of Michigan."

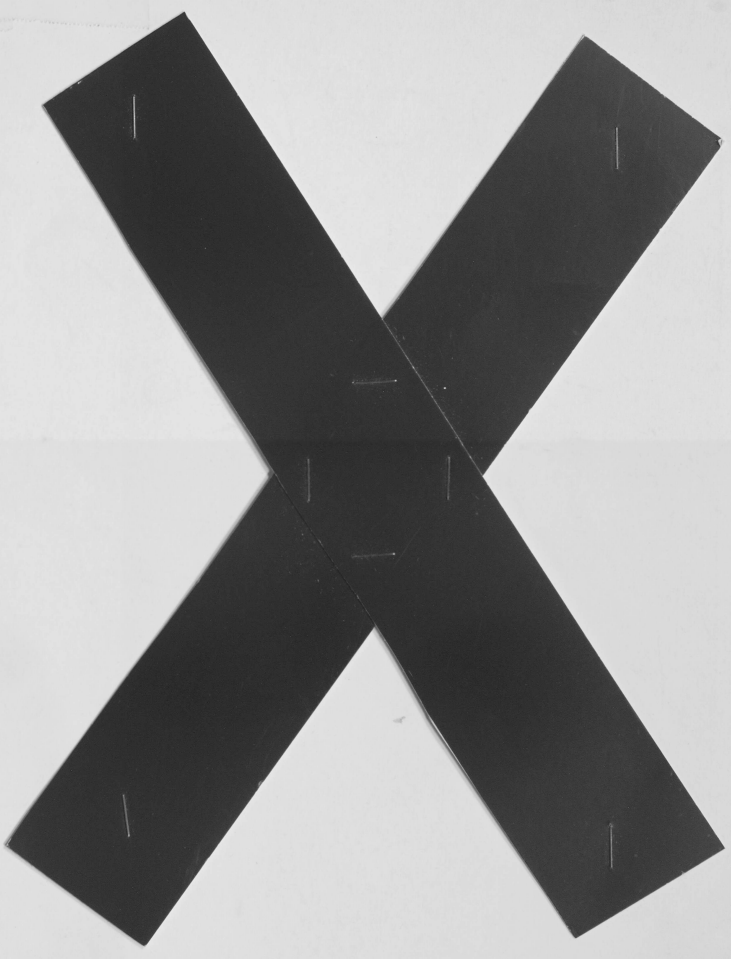
