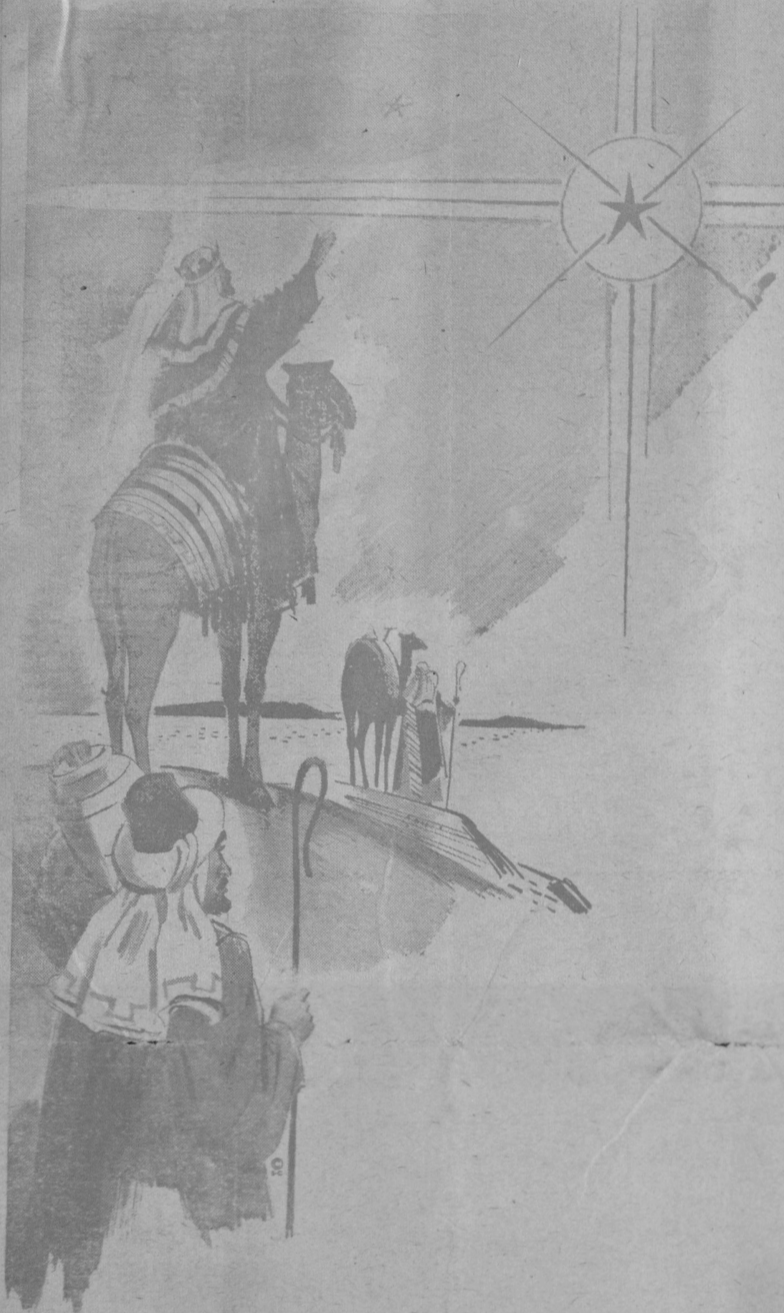

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Melvin Baker Predicts New Sales Record For National Gypsum in 1958

Disregarding the pessimistic outlook of many businessmen, Chairman Melvin H. Baker of National Gypsum Company predicted today that his building materials firm will set a new sales record in 1958.

"Because of favorable prospects for construction and improvements in the company's operations, we are optimistic enough to expect that National Gypsum sales, next year, will increase by about 10 million dollars," Mr. Baker said in a year-end interview.

"This probable gain will mean

a new sales record for the company," he said.

National Gypsum sales for 1957 were estimated at \$142,500,000, about six percent under record sales of 151 million dollars for 1956. Estimated earnings of \$13,000,000 for the year were down about 11 percent.

"Private and public housing starts this year will total slightly more than one million. We expect that close to 1,100,000 homes will be built in 1958."

Overall construction next year will exceed 1957's record dollar volume by "about two percent

but we can expect the market will be more competitive in terms of product quality and service with selective price increases rather than a general rise."

National Gypsum's chief executive pointed out that "home building activity has dropped more than 25 percent in the past two years due to short mortgage funds and unfavorable terms. Consequently a backlog of demand for new homes has been rapidly building up."

Mr. Baker said the shortage of mortgage money is expected to be less severe in the coming year "because of increased savings in the hands of lending agencies and because borrowing for industrial plant expansion will be less."

He said "the recent lowering of federal reserve discount rates tends to reinforce the assumption that more money will be available for mortgages in 1958."

The board chairman said "National Gypsum will compete for a larger market with its new products and new ideas in processing, engineering and design from our accelerated research program."

As an example, he mentioned that many home building products have been designed to reduce on-site labor costs.

"Other products," he added, "have been attractively restyled to capture more market from the more conventional materials."

Mr. Baker also discussed his company's continuing expansion of production facilities.

"By spring we will complete additions and modernization of the gypsum plant purchased several months ago at New Haven, Connecticut," he said. "Thereafter, the plant will be ready for efficient production of our complete gypsum line to supplement present distribution in the New England market."

He said National Gypsum's three-year asbestos mining and milling development at Thetford Mines, Quebec, will be completed by April.

"Thetford Mines will supply asbestos fiber to our three roofing and siding plants in the United States," he explained. "It will take care of our present asbestos needs with a surplus for future growth at substantial saving over present purchases in the open market."

Chairman Baker said his company will have a new acoustical tile in production at Alexandria, Indiana, this spring.

"We expect this production—employing a wholly new low-cost process—will provide us with a larger share of the fast-growing acoustical market."

At Tawas City, the company's new gypsum quarry operation, including stripping, crushing, rail-

He said completion of the Tawas City gypsum quarry was "timed to provide a storage pile at Waukegan, Illinois, where a new gypsum plant will be brought into production in the spring of 1959."

Mr. Baker said another new gypsum plant, also supplied with raw gypsum from the new Tawas City quarry, will follow at Lorain, Ohio, in 1960.

"National Gypsum Company is pushing ahead with its expansion program," the board chairman concluded, "because continued growth in population will call for an unprecedented demand for all types of construction and building materials in the years ahead."





Iosco Centennial Scrapbook Is Preserved for Posterity

The final chapter in Iosco County's centennial year of 1957 was written last week in a scrapbook containing information about special events which led up to and included the celebration last June which observed Iosco's 100th anniversary.

This leather-bound book was presented to the Iosco-Arenac Regional Library last Friday by the Iosco Centennial Committee, represented by Harris Barkman, secretary, and E. H. (Bert) Stickney, publicity director.

Accepting the book on behalf of the library was Miss Leonora Hass, regional library director. The book will be retained by the library for safe-keeping. It offers a wealth of information for future

reference material about the county.

Included in its pages are minutes, correspondence and miscellaneous data which the centennial committee collected in preparation for the celebration and lists of visitors who registered during the week-long observance at various communities in the county.

On its pages are found historical facts about the county written for the celebration and newspaper clippings telling of events which led up to and included the observance. One section is devoted to news pictures taken during the centennial week.

An interesting feature of the book is that it contains a 16 mm. motion picture film of the centennial parade and winners of various contests. The film was made by WJEM-TV, Bay City.

This book came into being as the result of action taken by the centennial committee at its final meeting several months ago. At that time the committee appropriated money for this purpose.

Mr. Barkman had charge of compiling the material for the book and it was bound by Carl Dubac of Saginaw.

Included are many old-time pictures which appeared in The Tawas Herald and this newspaper's photo coverage of the centennial celebration.

Miss Hass stated that because of the book's value, containing material that could never be replaced if it were lost, it will not be loaned out. However, it will be available at the library for use in future historical research.

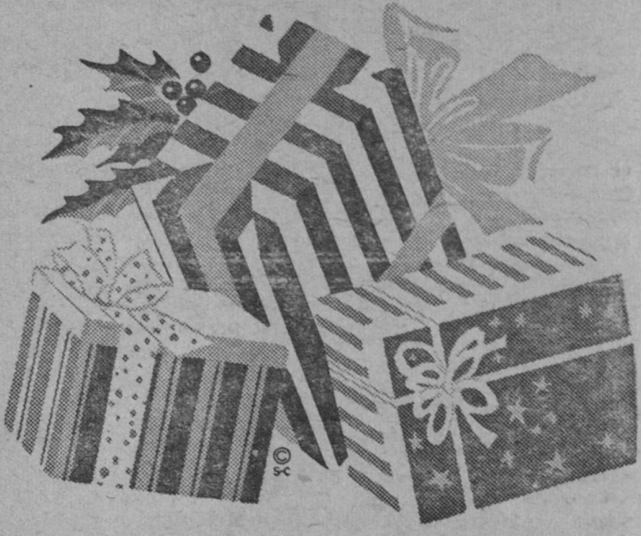

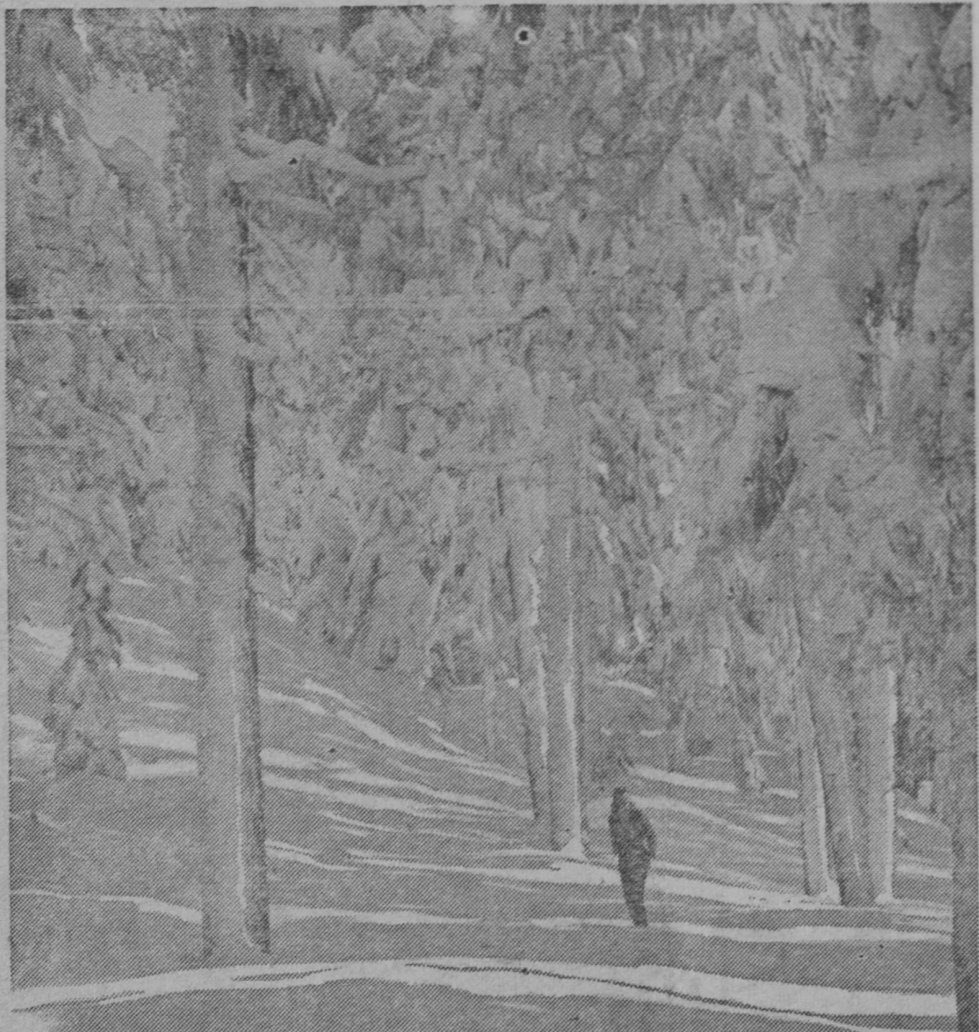

A fired-up Standish quint handed Roscommon its first loss of the season on the Arrow's court, 49-42, which dropped them into a second place tie with West Branch. The Orioles turned back Pinconning, 71-45, and Eastern climbed out of the league cellar with a 51-29 win at Sterling.

Tawas Area had little trouble disposing of Beaverton, holding the Braves to one field goal and three free throws in the first half while racking up 21 points in their own behalf. The losers started to hit in the second half but the Braves took the margin in both the third and fourth quarters with 18-12 and 14-11 scores to remain at the top of the conference along with Houghton Lake.

RADIATION CUT

The Atomic Energy Commission announced new standards somewhat reducing maximum dosages which atomic workers may accumulate.

The maximum permissible dosage of radiation has been three-tenths of a rem per week in AEC facilities. (A rem, Roentgen Equivalent Man, is a dose estimated to produce a biological effect equivalent to that produced by one Roentgen of X-rays.) This comes to theoretically 468 rems over a period of, say 30 years.

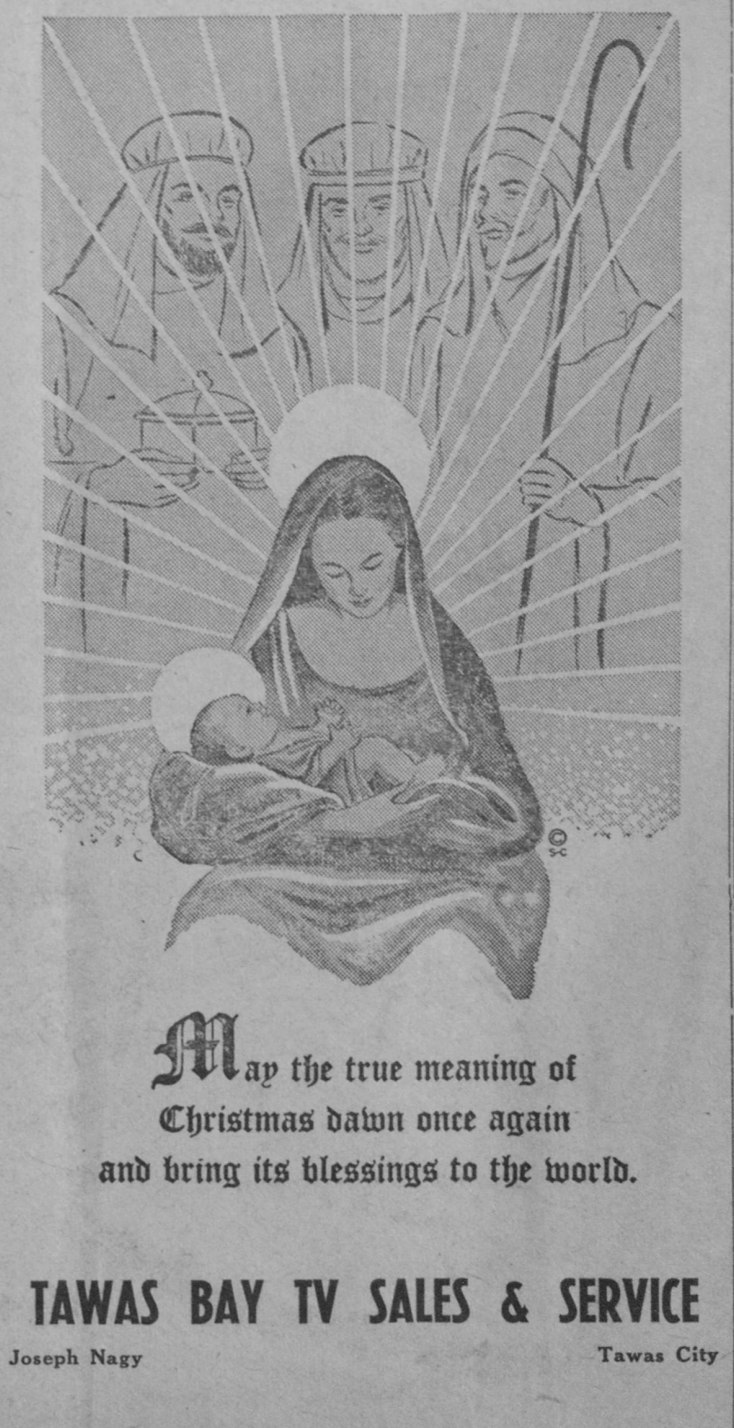

Christmas customs in other countries are interesting to learn. Here are a few you will enjoy:

Argentina Christmas comes in summer and dinner can be served indoors or out. Apple cider with nuts, nougat and almond paste are special foods.

Austria's wood-carved or paper-cut nativity scenes are popular. Roast goose and "trimmings" are featured for Christmas dinner. "Christkind," the infant Jesus, brings the presents and is the center of their celebration.

Australian Christmases are based on England's but the climate is warm so they never know a white Christmas. Carols are sung by thousands gathered in spacious parks on a balmy summer night.

Christmas greeting cards originated in Britain in the mid-nineteenth century. The traditional boar's head has become turkey with bread stuffing, roast potatoes, mince pie, and plum pudding often with wrapped good luck items baked in them. Recent Christmas custom is the queen's Christmas message.

A traditional Danish Christmas dinner menu: Cinnamon-sprinkled rice porridge, roast goose stuffed with apples, red cabbage, caramel-browned potatoes and applecake dessert made from layers of bread crumbs, applesauce and jam. Feeding the birds is a special observance at this season.

France features a family holiday, a religious celebration. December 6, St. Nicholas Day, ushers in the merry-making occasion for children.

Germany is homeland for the Christmas tree, candles and many present-day customs. Caroling is done by masked children and adults. On December 6, St. Nicholas goes from home to home punishing or rewarding children and filling stockings for the little ones.

In Holland Singerklass rides on December 5. There are gay parties and exchange of homemade gifts with a poem attached and read aloud. Christmas Day is much like our Thanksgiving. There are decorations and much good food, church services and singing, but the parties are over before that day.

December 13, Lucia Day, brings the month long Christmas season to Sweden. The eldest daughter portrays Lucia by wearing a white robe, crimson sash and a crown with lighted candles. She awakens the family to serve coffee and yeast-raised saffron buns on the first day of Jul.
