#### 600 Whitetails Killed On Highways

Through October, about 600 whitetails had been killed in col-lisions with cars, trucks and other vehicles on state roadways south of the Muskegon-Bay City line. The total, at year's end, will almost certainly be a record high. In 1954, highway accidents killed 378. The next year it jumped to 685 and last year it was up to 748. The state-wide total last year was a record 3.127.

In addition, southern Michigan conservation officers estimate the real kill is actually 10 percent higher when mortally injured deer that lose themselves in woodlands are accounted for.

The total southern Michigan loss has grown to one-third the size of the legal hunting season harvest of whitetails in southern Michigan counties.

Heaviest losses are usually sustained in Kent, Tuscola, Livingston, Oakland, Montcalm and Calhoun Counties.
