

# Tawas Extends Welcome to those Attending Industrial Workshop Today

What communities can do to establish and carry forward sound programs of industrial development will be the subject of an all day workshop for representatives of seven Northeastern Michigan counties to be held Thursday (today) in East Tawas.

Practically every city and village in Isosco, Alpena, Alpena, Arenac, Ogemaw, Oscoda and Roscommon Counties will be represented at the industrial development workshop which is scheduled to start at 9:00 a. m. in the East Tawas Community

Building and continue throughout the day.

Sponsored by the Michigan Economic Development Department, with the Northern Michigan Development Council and the Tawas Chamber of Commerce cooperating, the sessions will bring together representatives of railroads, utility companies, chambers of commerce, educational institutions, local, county, state and federal governments and others interested in industrial promotion.

This is the third in the latest series of workshops covering all parts of the state. Others were held last week and this week at Coldwater and Cheboygan, while additional ones are scheduled this month in Mt. Pleasant, Manistee and Adrian.

In announcing plans for the East Tawas meeting, Donald Weeks, director of the Michigan Economic Development Department, who will be one of the speakers, said: "Industrial development depends more on what is done in the local community than anything else."

He emphasized that all interests working together in any city or town could achieve more than any individual or group working on the outside. "These workshops, which were started in 1955, are planned to assist all communities in organizing or improving their own programs in economic development."

According to Osman Ostrander, president of the Tawas Chamber of Commerce and general chairman of the workshop, the program will open with welcoming remarks by

making an industrial survey of a community; raising funds for industrial promotion; developing sites for industry; forming an industrial development corporation; assisting local industry; looking for prospects; selling prospects on the community.

Among those attending will be State Representative James Mielock of Whittemore, State Senator Charles T. Prescott of Prescott and State Representative Walter G. Nakkula of Gladwin.

The workshop is intended solely to help community leaders to establish a sound and effective industrial development program.

The morning coffee break is to be sponsored by the Tawas Chamber of Commerce.

An added feature of the meeting will be a talk by an executive of the Abitibi Corporation, recently established paper manufacturing company in Alpena.

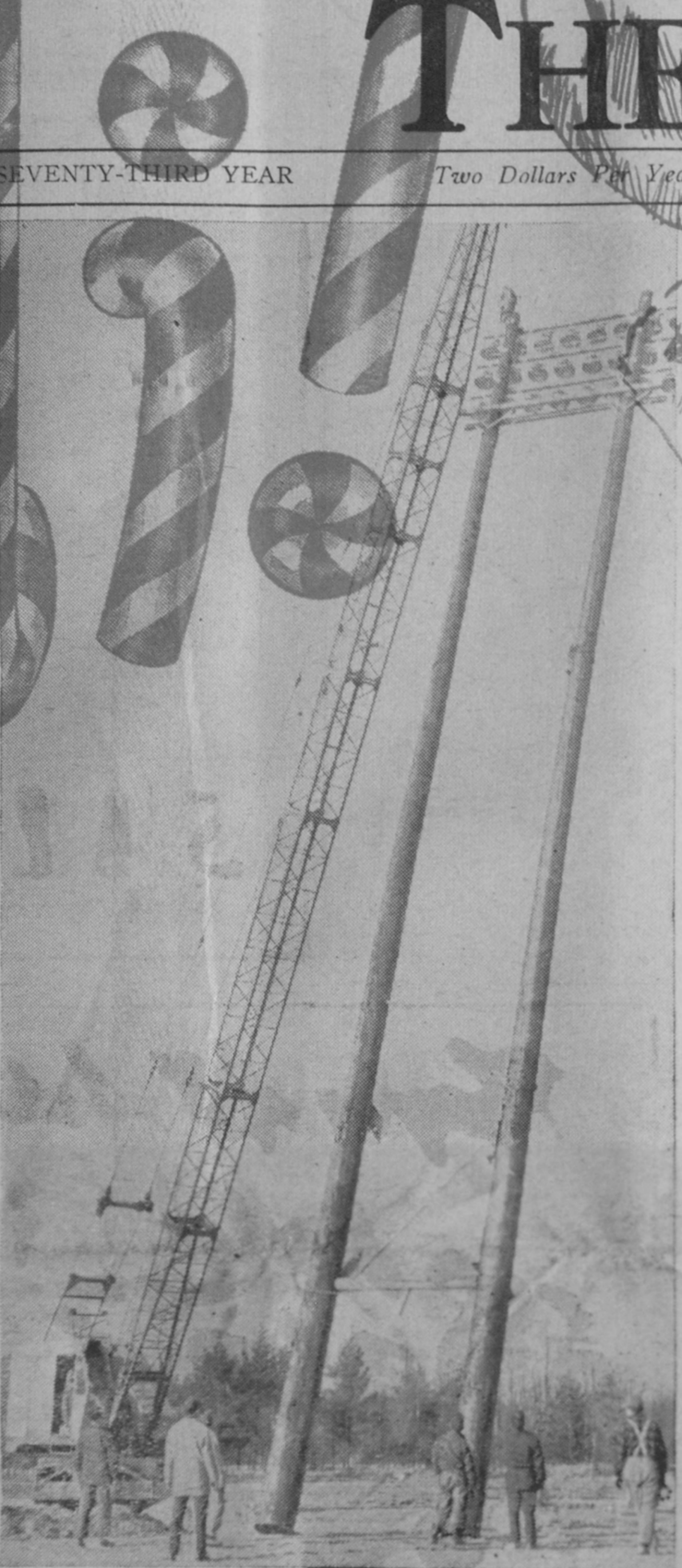

## Lights Installed at New Athletic Field

Another step in the plan to provide a lighted athletic field at the new Tawas Area High School before the start of the next school year was made last week with completion of work on installing light pole standards.

The 45,000-watt lighting installation was completed last Friday by St. James Electric of Tawas City, general contractor. Lighting equipment had been installed on the poles during the past month by St. James.

Services of a huge derrick with a 90-foot boom, owned by Muehlenbeck Contractors of Saginaw, was required to set the 10 90-foot cedar poles needed for the plans.

After being placed into holes drilled by a Consumers Power Company crew, the light standards tower some 79 feet above ground. There are 120 lights in all with a rating of 1,500 watts for each.

The new athletic field is located south-west of the new school building. The lighted portion will include provisions for both football and baseball. The area not lighted will include a practice football field and space for future development of soft ball fields, tennis courts and playground areas.

Two double poles, each holding 24 lights, illuminate the infield of the baseball diamond and the north side of the football field. Four single poles, with 12 lights on each, line the south side of the field and two single poles are located behind homeplate of the baseball diamond.

Underground wiring is yet to be installed by St. James. This is expected to be completed this month.

Planning for the lighted athletic field was started last June by the Tawas Area Board of Education and the Tawas Area Athletic Booster Club. During early fall the field was leveled and a base of clay and

## Plan 1958 Winter Sports Carnival

Silver Valley Winter Sports Committee took action Monday night to revise the traditional method of selecting a winter sports queen and her court for the carnival in February 1958—that is, the queen will be chosen from a group of candidates; the ticket sales as a means of selecting a queen has been discontinued.

This action was taken Monday after it was finally decided by the committee to again hold a winter sports carnival. There had been talk of discontinuing this annual event, but because of its promotional attraction for the area it will be continued.

The method of selecting a queen has been decided and all that remains now is to iron out details and a final program for the carnival week-end. Emphasis during the entire program is to be placed on youth.

A method of selecting the queen accepted this week by the committee is to have the four schools of the county select candidates, one girl from the junior class and one from the senior class of each school. Arrangements for making the final selection of the queen are still in the planning stage, but one method suggested was to have one or two representatives from each student council make the final selection.

Tentative acceptance was received Tuesday from Parker Advertising Agency, Saginaw, to have Ted Malone, nationally known radio reporter, visit the area over the

carnival week-end. If plans work out as anticipated, Malone will crown the queen and act as toastmaster at various events at that time. He is sponsored on radio by a Michigan meat packing firm, a client of Parker Advertising Agency and is heard over the American Broadcasting Company network.

Jack Parker, former East Tawas businessman, is owner of the advertising agency. He approached members of the committee two weeks ago with the plan and indicated this week that Malone's appearance here has good possibilities.

The carnival program discussed Monday night would include a fish fry, an early Saturday evening banquet, a dance at the new school auditorium and coronation of the queen Sunday at Silver Valley.

At the Saturday night dance, the committee plans to put the emphasis on entertainment for the teen-agers. The committee is now attempting to hire a good "rock & roll" band to provide music for dancing and keep all other carnival activities at a bare minimum.

The East Detroit Lutheran Caravan will make its annual trek to Tawas on February 9 to spend the day at Silver Valley.

Archie Jones, American Legion Post of East Tawas will operate the ski area concession again this winter. The Jesso Hodder Post of Tawas City will handle the main area concession as it has during past years.

Donald Hoggabam, who is operator of the toboggan slides this year, came up with a novel idea for providing additional entertainment for the smaller youngsters who visit the valley. He suggested operating the return toboggan slide as a special ride for small children as well as its normal use as a return to the base of the toboggan slope.

Hoggabam said that this could be easily accomplished and would offer added fun for youngsters who are usually considered too small to ride down the regular slides.

He also reported that he hopes to operate the winter sports area at least one night a week for youngsters of the area on a trial basis. The toboggan slides are lighted and the ski area may be open at night on the same trial basis.

The winter sports park is all set to operate as soon as weather is cold enough to see toboggan slides and the skating rink. Roads leading into the park are now being improved.

## Work on National Dock Continues During Winter

With cold weather rapidly closing in on the construction season in this area, contractors for building National Gypsum Company's lake front loading facilities south of Tawas City are moving fast to get as much work done as possible while the weather holds out. Construction will continue through the winter.

Prime contractors for construction are Sorenson and Gross Construction Company, Flint, and A. J. Elkins Construction Company, Oak Park.

The dock plan calls for construction of an inclined overhead conveyor gallery extending 375 feet lakeward from the shore to a pier that will extend lakeward for an additional 676 feet for a total of 1,051 feet. The company will dredge to a depth of 19 feet below low water datum, turning basin on the south side of the pier and a channel 200 feet wide and extending a distance of approximately 7,500 feet from shore.

The overhead conveyor gallery will provide for a free vertical clearance of 34 feet above low water datum throughout its length, with the exception of a center support. The pier will consist of some seven 30-foot square steel cells supported by a concrete dock at a height to provide a free vertical clearance of 10 feet above LWD for each of its six 30-foot wide openings that will separate the pier supporting cells.

Ted Malone, nationally known radio reporter and news commentator, will devote his daily radio program Friday, December 5, to a story on Michigan's Detroit and Mackinac Railway.

Malone's broadcast will be based on a full-length feature story on the D and M entitled "Michigan's Backyard Railroad," appearing in the December issue of "Inside Michigan." The story, detailing the background history of the railroad and its continuing service in Northeastern Michigan, was written for "Inside Michigan" by Jack Parker, Saginaw advertising executive, who took a summer home at the Tawasides.

Malone's daily broadcasts are aired on 20 stations in Michigan including WBCM, Bay City, WISW, Saginaw, and WATZ, Alpena, at 7:55 a. m., and on WTAC, Flint, at 8:55 a. m.

## Set New Rules on Loan of Equipment

Oscoda Area, 1,038 children, \$8,802.24; Hale Area, 455 children, \$3,858.40; Tawas Area, 1,701 children, \$14,424.48; Whittemore-Prescott, 1,009 children, \$8,556.32; Reno No. 1, 57 children, \$483.36.

Russell A. Rollin, county superintendent of schools, stated that Tawas Area had received an advance state aid of \$25,000.

Results of the recent election conducted by the Tawas Chamber of Commerce saw the election of eight new members to the organization's board of directors. At a meeting set for December 11, to be attended by all directors, new officers of the chamber will be named.

The eighth new director, Steven Ezo, next highest in number of votes received, was named to replace Gerald Bronson, who has moved out of the city and had not been replaced on the board.

In business transacted at last week's meeting, the board of directors heard a progress report on Silver Valley. It was announced that anyone having keys fitting padlocks at the winter sports area should call the chamber office or turn them in at once. Otherwise the padlocks will be changed before the season starts.

Earl Morrison Wight was born June 10, 1902, at Fowler, New York. On December 2, 1927, he married Miss Irene Walthall of Toledo, Ohio. The family moved from Cleveland, Ohio, to East Tawas in 1935. Mr. Wight was an accountant and for several years had been located on Newman Street and later on East State Street. The family resided at Avalon Beach on US-23.

Surviving are his widow; two sons, Byron of Grayling and Allen in military service, stationed in Africa; a daughter, Lynda at home; two grandchildren, and two brothers, Glenn Wight of Waynesboro, New York, and Hugh Wight of Utah.

Mr. Wight was a member of Governor's Masonic Lodge No. 217 of Cleveland, the Els Khurahf Shrine of Saginaw, the Consistory and Scottish Rite of Detroit and Isosco Chapter No. 71, Order of Eastern Star of East Tawas. He was a member of the Presbyterian Church.

Funeral services will be held this afternoon (Thursday) at the East Tawas Methodist Church with the Rev. Ralph Edwards officiating. Last Masonic rites will be given at Greenwood Cemetery where interment will be made.

### Interesting Past of Christmas Card Custom

In London, 115 years ago, from a plate designed and engraved by a 16-year-old apprentice, emerged the first Christmas card!

Young William Maw Egley's quaintly cluttered card showed scenes of a formal banquet, a party dance and skaters. Beneath the illustration appeared the greeting, "A Merry Christmas and a Happy New Year to You."

The next famous card appeared in 1846, arousing shouts of protest from temperance crusaders.

Sir Henry Cole asked J. C. Horsely, a friend and artist at the Royal Academy in London, to design a card for him. The card, showing a family toasting Christmas with glasses of wine, was the cause of the furor. Sir Henry had sent 1,000 cards that Christmas—the last he ever sent.

The "Father of the American Christmas Card" is Louis Prang. His first cards were made in his lithography shop in Boston in 1874.

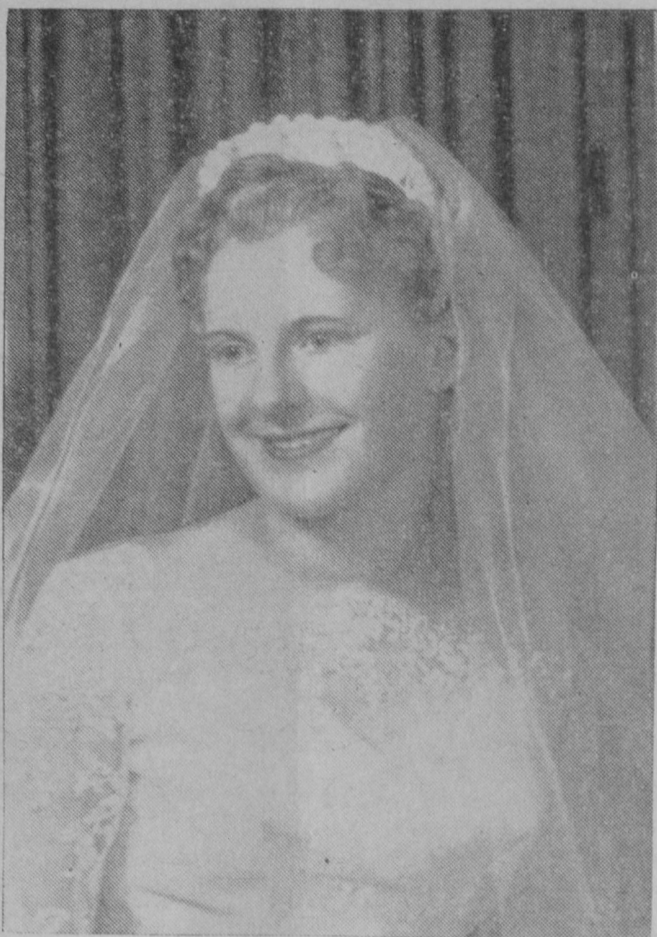
He was prompted along this line by his friend, Charles Dickens. The latter sent Prang a card he had received from Mrs. E. O. Whitney of England. Prang printed the card for his family and friends.

But, it was not until Prang began creating his own exquisitely beautiful cards that his fame spread. Before long he was selling his cards all over the United States for several dollars each.

Prang's card appeared in as many as 20 colors. Very few of them used Christmas scenes, but instead were illustrated with designs of spring flowers, harvest scenes and pictures of children playing.

From that small beginning in 1842 grew a demand for cards that is so great today, many large companies work year 'round to turn out billions of cards of every description.

### OLD DEER HUNTING CAMP THING OF PAST

The old deer-hunting camp is almost a thing of the past. So says Warren Chase, chairman of the Department of Wildlife Management at the University of Michigan.

"Although deer camps have been going down in numbers in the Upper and Lower Peninsulas for several years, it was a surprise to me to find them reaching such a low state during the early days of the deer season this year," says Chase.

"Where we often had six or seven deer camps in 1950, this year we had only two in the McKinley Bridge area of the AuSable River."

Why is deer-camping declining? Says Professor Chase, "It might be said that deer-camping is being reduced because it is a rough, hard way to live. You guessed it. Those once rugged hunters are now living in cozy motels and driving out to the deer haunts in the morning."

"The main reason we may ascribe to reduced hunter numbers in the Lower Peninsula is the opening of the bridge to the Upper Peninsula. No doubt this will make a change in hunter numbers from now on but we will not know until after December 1 what the effects have been on this year's hunting."

"Another reason why the deer population has stayed down is that it reached its peak in 1949 and 1950, when there was great starvation of the herd due to lack of food and a severe winter. Since that time the deer food has not increased as much as was expected."

"There still may be some starvation but it is hoped that the food will increase fast enough in the next few years so that we may have as good hunting in this area in the future as we had at its peak."

### Postmaster Asks for Cooperation in Christmas Mail

Postmaster Kasichke said today, "We hope to keep up our good record on the Christmas mails by getting everything processed and delivered well before Christmas Eve." He said further that much depends on your cooperation in mailing your Christmas cards and gifts during the next 10 days.

The postmaster stated, "Most people realize that the early arrival of a Christmas card or gift is always welcomed, although there are still some who have the mistaken idea that a gift or card arriving on Christmas Eve has a special significance. Actually, it is the thought behind the gift or card, and not the time of arrival that is the important consideration."

The postmaster asks for your special cooperation to be sure that your return address and the recipients address are plainly typed or written on all labels and Christmas cards. Use zone numbers, and it is always a good idea to include an extra label inside your package. Parcel post size and weight limitations vary according to destination. Ask about them when you go to the post office to buy stamps.

Be sure to use first class postage on your Christmas cards, because this enables you to include handwritten messages. Cards sent by first class mail will be delivered promptly, and forwarded or returned, if necessary, providing you include your name and address on your Christmas card envelope, a custom, by the way, which is entirely socially correct.

Response to his "Mail Early" appeals to date have been excellent. The postmaster said, "Now it is a case of keeping up the good work to avoid those last minute Christmas pile-ups."

You can do both yourself and the post office a real favor by securing free labels at the post office which read, "All For Out of Town Delivery" and "All For Local Delivery." Place these labels on bundles of cards for local addresses, and on those for out-of-town destinations, and mail your out-of-town Christmas cards several days in advance of those intended for local delivery.

Plan your Christmas mailings so that all Christmas cards and gifts for most distant points are mailed first. Try to get all of your out-of-town cards and gifts into the post office before December 10, and those for nearby points should be mailed by December 15.

The postmaster has asked the cooperation of all business firms to postpone the mailing of circulars and catalogs until after December 25 to keep the mails clear for the Christmas rush.

### MARVIN DAVENPORT SAYS— Sheep Growers Urged to Keep Adequate Records

Michigan sheep raisers who are marketing lambs this fall are urged to obtain and save adequate records of their sales so they can make proper application for payment under the wool incentive program. Graydon Blank, extension sheep specialist in animal husbandry at Michigan State University, says that records of all purchases, as well as sales, are also required.

You will want to save your records of feeder lamb purchases now because it may be difficult to get them from auction files next spring when payment applications are due. The sales records must include the name of the buyer, his original signature, date of the transaction and the number and live weight of the lambs sold, with the description "unshorn" showing. Payments are made only on lambs that have never been shorn, regardless of whether they are sold as slaughter or feeder lambs. The final date for applying for 1957-58 marketings is April 30, 1958, but you may submit applications to your county stabilization office any time before then. Last year's records indicate that in some areas of Michigan less than one half of the eligible sheep raisers applied for the payment.

Lamb feeders, particularly, should keep accurate records of the length of time they have owned a specific lot of lambs. Lamb payments are made only when you have owned lambs for 30 days or more.

The lamb sales and purchase records are required because payment is based on the weight produced during your ownership. The rate of payment is a fixed amount per hundredweight on the shorn wool incentive payment program. The payment rate for the 1957-58 marketing year will be determined in late spring of 1958. But you must have adequate and accurate records of sales and purchases before you can apply for payment.

They say a word to the wise is sufficient. If you have seven or more Christmas trees, bought, etc., cut and in your car or truck, better be sure you have a bill of sale with you. You could be stopped and by law the bill of sale should be presented.

If you need a "bill of sale" blank write me, stop in our office or contact Conrad Carlson, Huron National Forest ranger. This does not apply if you have six trees or less in your possession.

First round games in the North-eastern Michigan Conference were scattered through three different nights of play last week. Hollenbeck and Moss picked up their total on an eight and three tally, while Lee and Reiger had a nine and one count for their aggregate.

Beaverton jumped off to a 16-1 lead in the first quarter and was never headed the rest of the con-

test. Tossing in 11 more the second period, the Beavers enjoyed a 27-7 bulge at intermission and the winners kept the pressure on during the second half by taking a 17-6 third stanza count which was followed up by a 12-7 last quarter stint.

Moss led both squads with his 19 points while Guard Dave East set had six and one for 13 and Pat Kalahar picked up five and one for 11 to take the second and third spots. 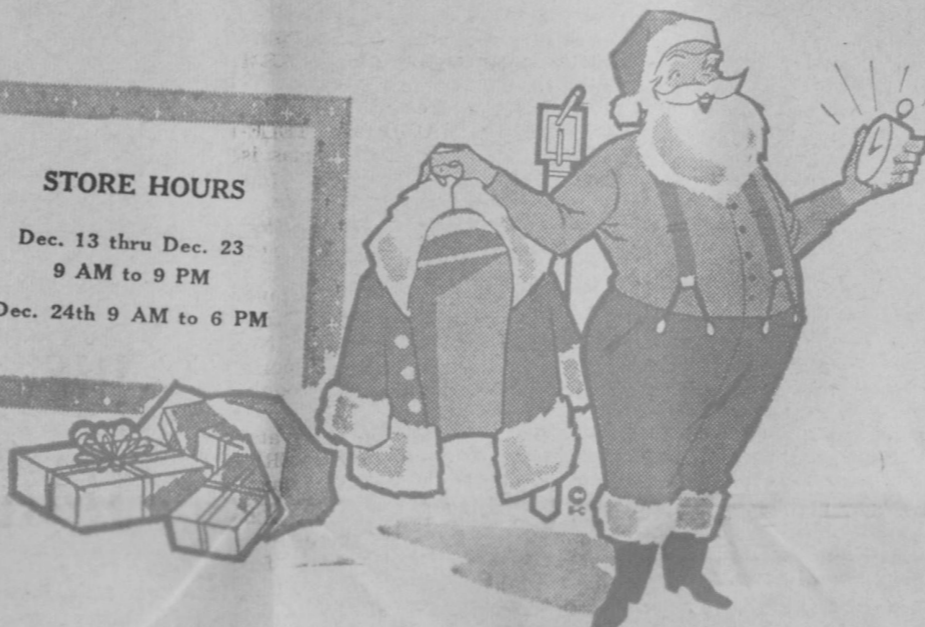

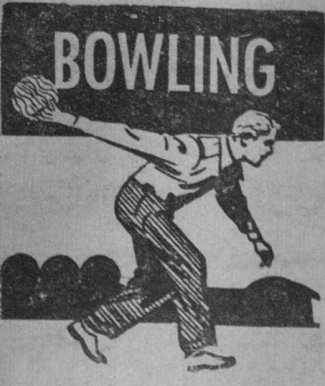

# Out of Legend and Fact Comes Santa Claus Image as We Know It

Why does Santa Claus have a white beard? Why does he drive a sleigh and have six reindeer? Why does he enter by way of the chimney? And where did he get his name, Santa Claus? How old is he and where was he born?

Even with the best reference sources, it is difficult to establish just one set of facts about Santa Claus. But, after all, is it so important whether the name Santa Claus has its origin in the Dutch "Sint Nikolaas" or "Sinterklaas" or in the German "Christkindl" or "Kristking" or "Krisis Kinglet"?

Such inconsistencies actually make the history of Santa Claus

and his forerunners all the more interesting.

It is generally agreed that the idea for modern day Santa Claus began with a young boy called Nicholas over 1,600 years ago. During his early years, growing up in the Asia Minor portion of present-day Turkey, he was generous and pious. These qualities grew within him until as a man he became the bishop of Myra.

His most famous deed of generosity was directed toward three beautiful daughters of a poor nobleman. He wanted dowries for these girls so they could be married and well cared for.

So, Nicholas on three different nights tossed bags of gold through

a window of their home so each daughter could be married.

This tale was translated into languages the world over and soon, whenever unexpected gifts were received, St. Nicholas was credited.

St. Nicholas, known by other names adapted to the spoken language, was pictured as a kindly, white bearded, black robed bishop who rode a white horse over the housetops when he distributed gifts.

So it is to St. Nicholas that we give thanks for Santa's custom of giving, full white beard, riding over housetops and, partially, for his name.

Santa Claus had many other forerunners, some who still bring gifts in his place to children in other lands.

Another "ancestor" of "Santa" came from Germany. "Christkindl," sometimes called "Kristking" is a little girl, a messenger of the Christ Child.

This same angel-girl also was the gift-giver to the Swiss children. There she arrived in a sleigh drawn by six reindeer.

In Norway, "Julenissen" or "Jul Tomten," a gay elf, left gifts in the hayloft and in return received a bowl of pudding from the children.

So, in Norway, Santa's fine helpers, the elves, were found.

Dr. Clement Clark Moore, a seminary professor, wrote "A Visit From St. Nicholas" ("The Night Before Christmas") for his seven children. He vividly described Santa Claus, bringing together all the many legends that were "known" at that time.

In 1863, cartoonist Thomas Nast was commissioned to illustrate Moore's poem. Santa Claus, much as we see him today pictured everywhere at Christmas, emerged on Nast's drawing board 94 years ago in New York City.

Three years later it was definitely decided that this red and white garbed fellow known as Santa Claus—with the big heart, the jolly face and abundant good-will—is here to stay and is quite, quite real!

The decision came in a famous letter published in the New York Sun in 1897. It was the answer to an inquiry received from Virginia O'Hanlon, an eight-year-old girl. She asked, "Please tell me the truth; is there a Santa Claus?"

The reply that stirred the hearts of people across the nation came from Francis E. Church... "Yes, Virginia, there is a Santa Claus... 10 thousand years from now, he will continue to make glad the heart of childhood."

### Work Toward Port Austin-Tawas Ferry Service

Named recently as chairman of a Tawas committee to work with the Port Austin committee for a Port Austin-Tawas ferry service was Carl B. Babcock, chairman of the Tawas Harbor Committee.

Others named to the committee by Joseph O'Connor, president of the East Tawas Retailers Association, were T. S. Dimmick, W. D. Nunn, Berkeley Smith and O'Connor.

The group's goal of utilizing the state ferries formerly employed at the Straits of Mackinac is meeting with growing favor in many quarters, reports Harry Schmidt of Port Austin.

Residents of Port Austin and Huron County were reassured last week that the harbor-of-refuge at Port Austin will still be constructed, despite stories to the contrary.

Keith Wilson, acting director of the Michigan Waterways Commission, announced that legal technicalities threatening the project had been cleared and that the corps of engineers was planning to advertise for bids no later than December 15.

The current plans of the corps call for advertising by that date to permit the opening of bids no later than January 15, 1958. If acceptable bids are received, it is anticipated that contracts will be awarded by the end of February to permit construction to begin next spring.

The legal technicality involved centered around the Submerged Lands Act of 1955, which does not give any state agency authority to permit the filling of the bottom lands of the Great Lakes, which are now owned by the State of Michigan.

However, an earlier act which created the waterways commission also extended to the federal government assurances that the necessary lands, including submerged lands, would be made available to permit construction of the harbors-of-refuge authorized at that time.

The proposed harbor at Port Austin is of vital interest to the ferry service linking the Thumb with Eastern Michigan.
