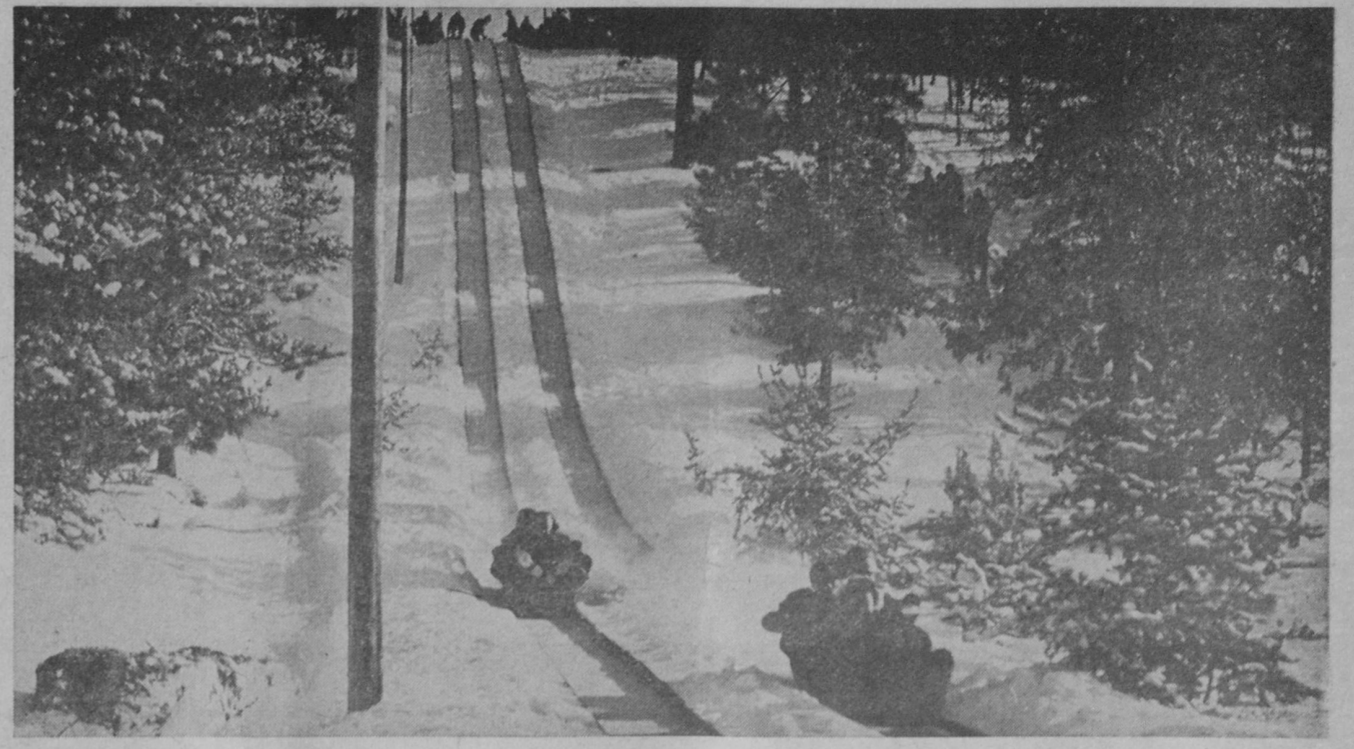

Record Total of Loans

A second one on Wednesday, February 13, at 1:00 p. m., at Grant Township Hall, another on Friday, February 15, at 1:00 p. m., at Reno Township Hall and the last one at Whittemore Area High School on Thursday, February 21, at 8:00 p. m. Plan attending any one of these sessions. Signing up at one of these meetings can assure you funds available for your eligible practices completed.

If your farm land is in need of lime it is important that you sign up for that practice. New developments in fertilizer practices means that we are going to need more lime in our soils. Edward Longnecker of Michigan State University Soils Science Department says that both the increased use of fertilizers and a change on the character of the fertilizers themselves are making our soils more acid.

He points out that farmers are using heavier and heavier applications of fertilizer, in order to increase yields. Higher yields, how-

ever, mean greater depletion of the supplies of calcium and magnesium in the soil.

Another factor is the use of more concentrated fertilizers. For example, instead of using ordinary superphosphate, we are now using treble superphosphate, which has less than one-third as much lime in it. A study has shown that in 1920, over half of the lime applied in the United States was in fertilizers. Now fertilizers supply only one-fifth.

A third factor in the increase in soil acidity is the increased use of nitrogen fertilizers. Most of these fertilizers leave an acid residue in the soil, which must eventually be neutralized if the soil is to remain fertile.

Longnecker says that the situation is likely to become worse rather than better. The new liquid fertilizers contain no lime at all. This is going to make it more important than ever that you give your soil plenty of lime.

The only sure way to find out is to send me a sample of soil from a field and have it tested. That takes the guess work out of "How much lime do I need?"

Whenever a herniated disc or spondylitis fails to respond readily to treatment, look for Brucellosis, is the advice of Dr. Joseph F. Griggs, director of the Claremont, California, Medical Research Foundation.

He made this statement in a report to the California Medical Association's annual meeting. He

said recent research indicates that 10 percent of all Americans have been infected with Brucella bacteria from infected cattle or meat, or unpasteurized milk.

Dr. Griggs and his collaborator, Dr. T. deVillafane Lastra of Cordoba, Argentina, showed that spondylitis and two varieties of herniated disc frequently result from Brucella invasion and subsequent degeneration of spinal bones, discs and joints. Many victims, said Dr. Griggs, are mildly ill with chronic Brucellosis for many years before spinal involvement occurs.

"Brucellosis should be definitely suspected when the usual forms of treatment fail—especially when surgical results are disappointing," he said.

Higher Meat Prices

The agriculture department has predicted that consumers will pay higher prices for meat this year since total meat production is expected to be less than in 1956, particularly pork. Retail prices on choice beef will stay above the 1956 levels throughout the winter and spring and are likely to climb again in the fall, but at a slower rate.
